Dist. Supervisor Is Program Speaker

The three-day training program of Jehovah's Witnesses in Mineral Wells was highlighted Sunday when Harry A. Fetzik, district supervisor for Jehovah's Witnesses, spoke on the subject, "Who Will Win the Struggle for World Supremacy?"

V.A. To Increase Survivors Pay

Approximately 45,000 children and 30,000 dependent parents of deceased veterans will receive an increase of about 10 percent in their monthly dependency and indemnity compensation Edward P. Onstot, manager of the Veterans Administration Regional Office in Dallas, Texas, said today.

Authorized by the 88th Congress, the increased payments will be automatic, and will be included in the July checks mailed to reach beneficiaries about August 1, Onstot explained. There is no need to write the VA.

Two children, currently receiving dependency and indemnity compensation checks amounting to \$100 per month, will receive \$110 equally divided between them under the new law.

Three children, receiving \$130 per month, will receive \$143 per month equally divided between them. If there are more than three children, each additional child, now receiving \$25 a month, will receive \$28 a month under the new law.

In case of dependent parents living together with an annual income of less than \$1,000, their present payment of \$50 each will be increased to \$55 each under the new law, Onstot said.

Work To Start On New Rural Fire Equipment For County

Plans were made at a meeting of area ranchers and farmers Tuesday night at the Callahan County Court Room in Baird for the equipping of a new rural fire truck which was acquired recently through the efforts of the lower Colorado Soil Conservation Service District.

At the meeting it was decided to equip the truck, which was secured through the Surplus Commodity Corporation, with a 1,200 gallon tank and a 250 gallon per minute pump. In addition, a high pressure piston pump will be installed for rapid extinguishing of grass fires. The project will be financed through contributions solicited principally from those who will benefit most from it -- the rural people.

It was announced at the meeting that the City of Baird had agreed to maintain the truck, and the city contributed the 250 gallon pump for use on the truck. The Baird Volunteer Fire

Yes, Sue, I did come home, and have not been told to move on yet.

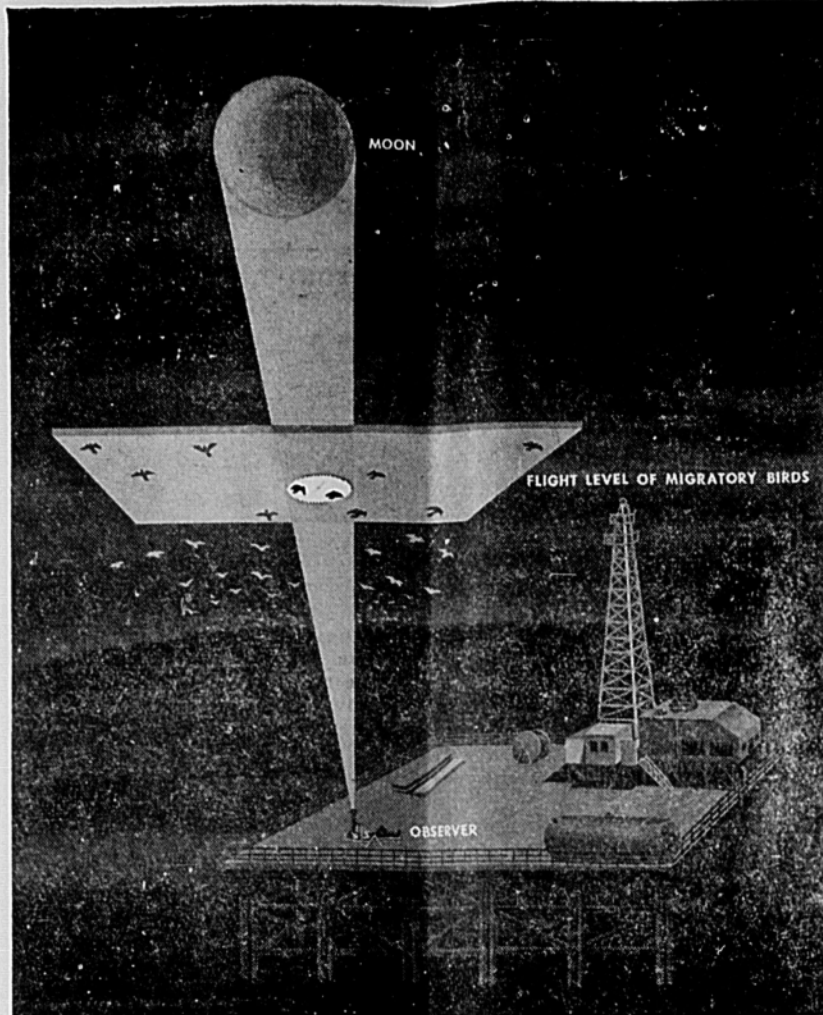
Your letter read with oodles of joy? Is that the word? Anyway am going to quote Mike (Your cousin), sorry I never wrote sooner.

Yes, my dear, there was a carpet out for me when I returned to the home of my youth. Of course, was not the red carpets that is spread out for the VIPs. But this was laid by our Father on high, and was the most beautiful sight I had seen in Baird in many years. Was so white and so pure. Was, of course, marred by the youth of today driving these new-fangled wagons down to the Depot and rushing back to the Court House and the same thing over again. Honestly though, it was a

pretty pattern on the snow. Dirty spots of course where the cars had skidded, but on the whole, looked like a giant flower that our Father had caused to grow on the pavement of our Market Street.

It must have been some 50 years since I saw snow in Baird. I can't recall just when, yet I am supposed to have a good memory, by some.

Then there was so many changes, all supposed to be best. In the name of progress. Yet when I look out over the hills and direction and see the bare hills as I did when I arrived, kinda made you think what is progress if its going to take all the beauty from a country. Looked like angry God or the gods had held down his anger till he could stand no more, and with one mighty sweep of his hand had struck down the trees that He had so lovingly allowed to grow in abundance here on the hills where I, and others of my youth ran and hunted over the rocks, down the hills to the creeks and through the mesquites and great oaks and blackjacks. Even the creeks are not there now. So many lakes having been built that the watershed is just not there now. And too, the creeks were filled with dust from the many cattle that over-grazed

AUSTIN - Rumors concerning a special session continue to bounce around the Capitol.

Most persistent rumor is that Gov. John B. Connally will 'line-item' veto the appropriations bill which he contends "short-changes" higher education... then call a special session in the fall.

In a line-item veto, he would strike out items he considers unnecessary. Then try to convince Legislators that the money should go to higher education instead.

Some lawmakers think they will be called back in September. Others pick October. Those who predict a fall session believe they again will have to tackle the subject of congressional redistricting. They didn't agree to a solution in the regular session.

SPEAKER SATISFIED - House Speaker Byron Tunnell of Tyler thinks a summer session is possible.

Tunnell said he is making no vacation plans until he is certain he won't be called on to preside over the House in late June or July.

But the Speaker stated he was well satisfied with the budget passed by the Legislature. He said, "They apparently did what they thought was right, and I for one will stand behind them."

"The 58th Legislature met its challenge and did its work," Tunnell said proudly. There were many times during the 58th session when the Speaker and the House seemed at odds. But when the session ended most House members agreed that Tunnell had been a good referee.

"I have never asked anything but the right to take my position and give another man the same right," Tunnell stated when the bustle of the 58th dissolved into post-session silence. "That is what I really like about the House: There is such a mixture of philosophies, ranging from liberals like Bob Eckhardt to mine. Somewhere in between may be where the answer lies."

INSTANT RAILROAD COMMISSIONER - Many nice things have been said about Jim C. Langdon since Governor Connally appointed him to the Railroad Commission to replace Bill Murray. One thing for sure, he adapts to changes easily.

In two short hours, Langdon resigned as chief justice of the El Paso Court of Civil Appeals; withdrew from the race for the State Supreme Court place which Judge Frank Culver of Fort Worth is expected to leave; was sworn in as railroad Commissioner; announced as a candidate for re-election in 1964; and went right to work.

Then he and Commissioner Ben Ramsey made the announcement the oil and gas industry was waiting for -- a 28 per cent allowable for June.

GOVERNOR'S CHOICE - Langdon's appointment was the third he has received during three administrations.

Gov. Allan Shivers appointed him 112th District Judge in 1954. He was elected to that bench twice. Then Gov. Price Daniel appointed him Chief Justice of the El Paso Court in 1959. This post he resigned to accept Governor Connally's appointment.

BILLS VERSUS LAWS - A quick tabulation of the results of five months of labor by the 181 members of the 58th Legislature reveals that only about 31 per cent of the bills passed both House and Senate, to become laws.

A total of 1,723 bills were introduced. Of these, 543 were passed to law. Most of the weeding out was done by committees. They reported as favorable only 786 bills as compared with 906 in 1961.

SUPREME COURT BACKS COMMISSION - State Supreme Court upheld the Railroad Commission's right to authorize an operator in a particular oil field to conduct a survey of another operator's well to determine if it were illegally slanted.

Case at bar was L & G Oil Company (headed by H. G. Lewis Jr. of Kilgore) versus the Railroad Commission et al.

L & G charged that a Railroad Commission order permitting Tidewater Oil Company to authorize Sperry-Sun Surveying Company to run a slant hole survey on an L & G well in the East Texas field was illegal.

The 126th District Court in Austin had supported the Railroad Commission's order.

But while the Supreme Court affirmed the right to give the order, it said it was improperly worded and sent the case back to the trial court.

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the pastures, then the farmers plowed up so much of the virgin soil that we knew in those days. No, Honey, I am not bitter about this. Why? Well, I have in the past 40 years wrecked many old buildings that were landmarks, just as dear to many as the hills and creeks were to me. What do I miss most? That's hard to say. But I do miss the many cheery yells of the kids I swam with. Hunted possums and the coon. Twisted the rabbits from the prickly pear. The juicy gum and mesquite beans we ate. The dove cooling, running with wings dragging the ground to lead you away from her nest. Perhaps two young birds asleep and hungry because the naughty

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boys would not let the mother find a dainty morsel for the infants.

Then I miss seeing the cow horses ground hitched in front of the bars and stores, the yells of the happy waddies as they returned to the home ranch after a shipment of fat cattle. The bawling of the calves and mothers as they looked in vain for their own, that were then, perhaps, on the way to Ft. Worth or Kansas City. Then I miss the cotton wagons on the street, many times from miles away. Entire families aboard the wagon, awaiting the sale to purchase the needed clothing and grub for another six months. Then the wheat wagons unloading at the depot. Ah yes, Sue, there is a difference.

Not a girl nor lady do I see with a bonnet on now. Not a baby feeding as then. Oh they feed them now as you were fed, from a bottle that has been scalded 100 times or more before you dropped and broke the gosh darn thing. Not a day do I see now, a lady slyly open up her waist (see I am old fashioned, I don't know what they call that outfit they wear now) and gently guide the source of bone and strength to the babe's mouth.

But what hits me the hardest, what the devil do the old men do for something to whittle on. Heck, honey, I can't make kite sticks or nigger shooter handles from those cardboard boxes that merchandise comes in now. Why I have seen many time, soon as Henry Lambert of M. M. Terry unloaded a box of dry goods at Schwartz, Boydstuns, Powells or Foy's that the elderly men had sharp knives ready to start carving before the first board of soft pine was removed. Why Honey, a man can't even find a kitchen match to build a tooth pick or a digger for the gum of his ear. They use these darn lighters or throw-away paper matches. Now who can make a tooth pick or a wax remover of that kind of stuff. Again, you can't find a hair pin on the streets, and even those bobby pins are bent and rusted. The girls now use a roller about as large as their grandmothers rat that made her hair look so beautiful.

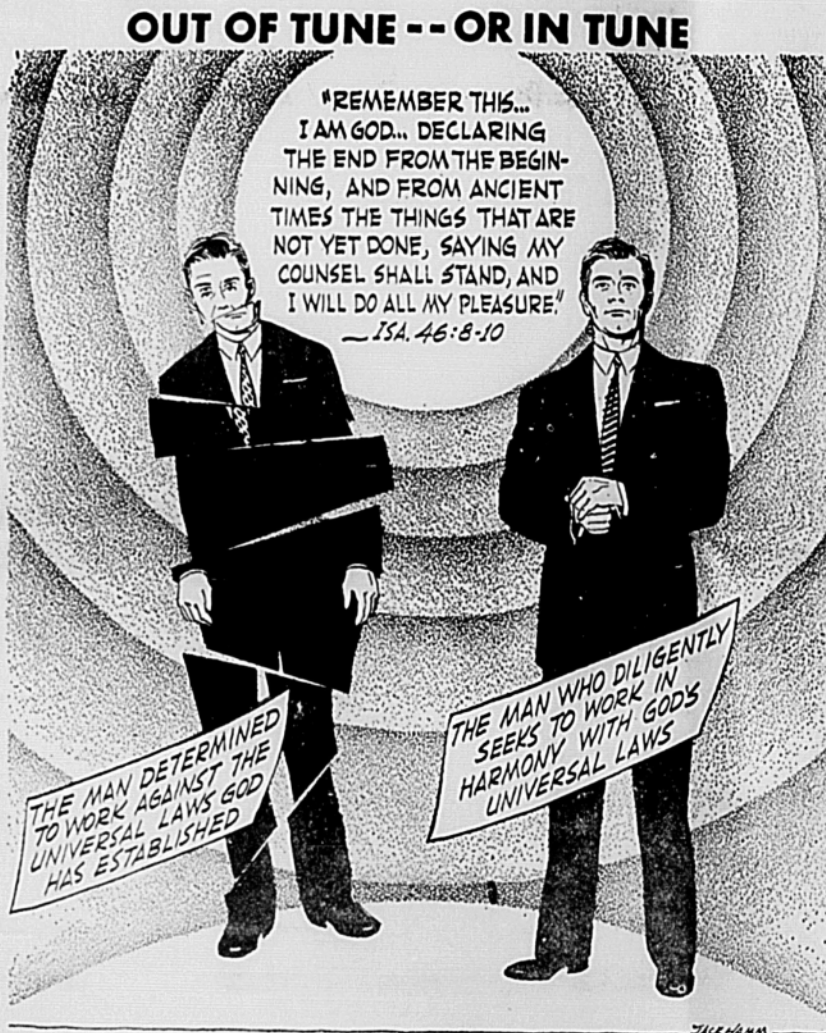

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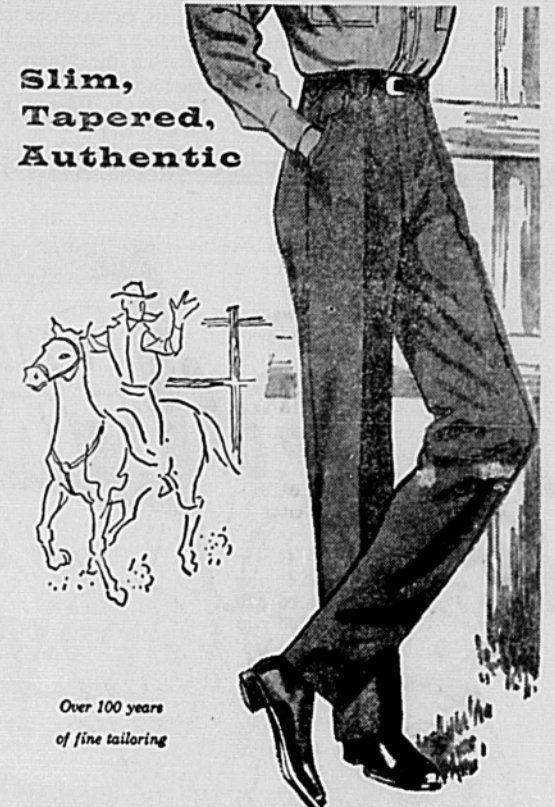

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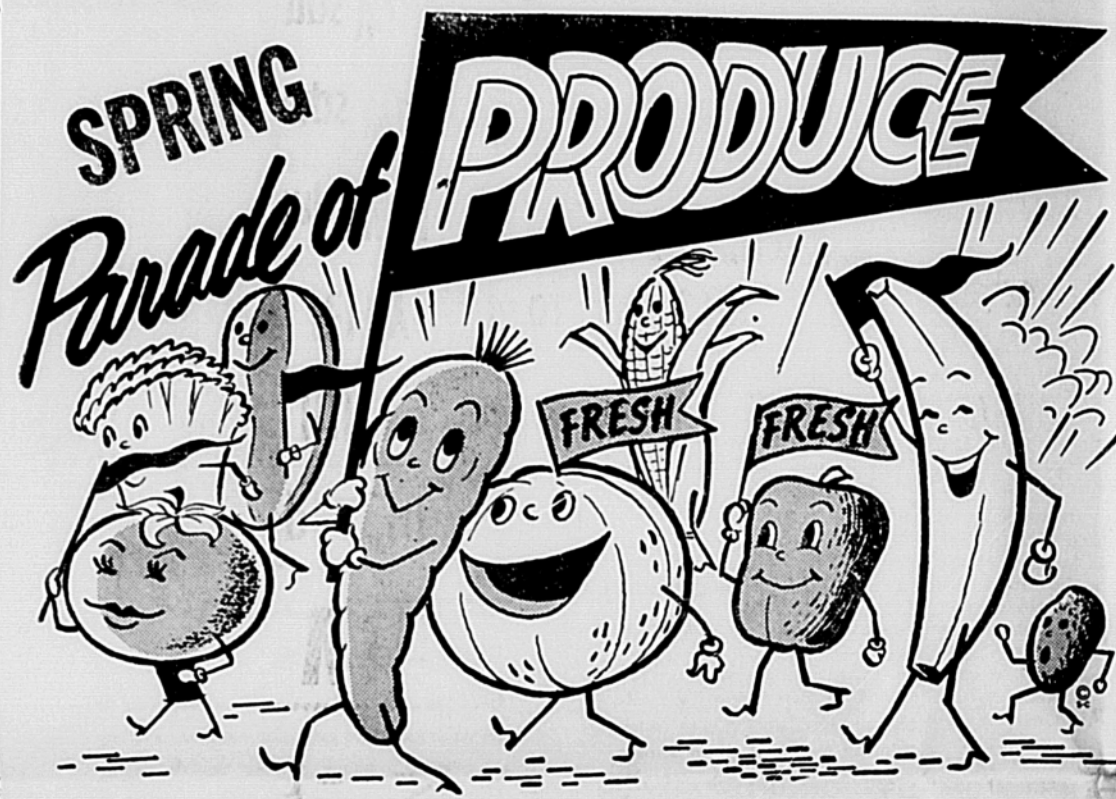
