## County cotton harvest two-thirds complete with 15,396 bales

A total of 15,396 bales of the 1977 Donley County cotton crop has been brought in to the three gins in the county. If weather permits most of the crop will be out of the fields by the first of the year. Hedley gin manager, W.B. Wiggins, estimated 70% of the crop has been gathered there, while workers at Lelia Lake and Clarendon gins estimated 60% gathered in these areas.

A combined total of 12,988 bales had been ginned Saturday afternoon Dec. 3 according to reports from the county's three ginning points. Gins were all surrounded by cotton trailers

with 2408 bales on the yards awaiting to be processed. All gin crews were working around the clock trying to clear trailers for additional harvesting.

All gin operators in the county reported they were well pleased with yields made from this year's crop, but expressed concern over cotton prices.

Most local farmers estimate the county will top a 20,000 bale crop this year.

### New machine increases number of bales of cotton harvested in county

A new cotton harvester known as the Rood now enables farmers to pick up cotton that was formerly wasted in the fields and not picked up with the use of ordinary mechanical cotton pickers. The Rood acts as a scavenger and cleans the field of all cotton once it has been harvested.

These machines, on a 100 acres of good cotton land, will pick up about 10 additional bales of cotton and can normally cover 15-20 acres in a day.

There are estimated to be 6-8 Roods presently operating in Donley County. Custom farmers with Roods usually share half of the cotton pick-up and half the ginning cost with farmers. Roods are new to this area. They are made in Phoenix, Arizona and cost about \$13,500 new. In Plainview this year it is reported forty Roods were sold.

### Hobby grows into a business

The beauty of flowers has always held a special fascination and love for Joane Leathers. Through the years she has experimented with raising many different types of plants and flowers, and her farm home, located east of Clarendon, reflected this love as the home abounded in a flower garden that delighted every passerby.

A few years ago the Leathers sold their farm and moved into Clarendon but Joane did not leave her love for raising plants and flowers behind. She found more opportunities to share her talent and hobby with others. At her son's wedding, Joane said, "I did the flowers and decided then I wanted to raise flowers and have my own business. So, I enrolled in a commercial flower arrangement course at Amarillo College and learned some principles of flower arranging under the instruction of Vie Bishop."

In the Spring of 1977 "Joane's Greenhouse" was opened in the family garage with a variety of potted plants. Soon a refrigerator was installed and cut flowers were added. Last Sunday, December 4, Joane had her

first Christmas open house. Joane, assisted by her husband, J.R. and daughter operate the business located at 720 South Bond Street. To reach Joane's from highway 287 turn south at Allsup's, go to 8th Street and turn right 2 blocks. Phone number is 874-3621 and is listed as J.R. Leathers. Joane is open for business 5 1/2 days a week, Monday through Saturday noon, with shop hours 8:30 a.m. - 6:00 p.m. She invites everyone to come see her variety of house plants, cut flowers and arrangements.

Some of the stock Joane presently has to sell includes large 2 blossom poinsettias, smaller 4-5 blossom poinsettias, klanchos, azelias, Christmas cactus, assortment of table arrangements, door swags and wreaths all for Christmas. Other plants featured in her shop include African violet varieties, hanging baskets, mums, gloxinias, and ferns of the Boston, grape ivy, rabbit's foot, artemisia varieties to name a few.

Joane has shadow boxes with arrangements in miniature and these are excellent for gift items. Also, dried arrangements and driftwood arrangements along with

numerous other types of houseplants and macrame hangers can be found at the new business. Seasonal additions are fresh holly and other Christmas greens.

The Leathers have begun to enlarge the business by adding a greenhouse which they have already under construction. Nursery stock is planned for future as the business progresses, and Joane says she will have spring bulbs a little later.

# In the beginning ...

Christmas customs

Today we enjoy and anticipate the Christmas season to the utmost, carrying on the many traditions which our fathers and grandfathers did before us, but doing it all a bit casually or at least with little thought concerning the origins of the various Christmas customs, many of which are centuries old. Isn't it well to pause just a bit, to search out the reason for a few of the delightful customs which we have heretofore accepted, or taken for granted? Surely it will add pleasure as well as real significance to Christmas for our children if we tell them the origin of many of the things they look forward to at Christmas.

Let us begin with the custom of the Christmas tree. In practically every civilized country Christmas just isn't Christmas without a festive tree, and here in Clarendon many of us will undertake the task of selecting a tree and trimming it perhaps doing so this week. History indicates many nations claim the honor of having given the first Christmas tree to the world! Regardless of claims, Germany is generally credited with the introduction of the symbol, and in the old town of Altenberger stands a statue to the memory of the man who was behind it all.

It seems that in the old days primitive man regarded trees as the abodes of spirits.

They worshipped them as gods, held ceremonies and placed gifts beneath their branches, and the more powerful the god the more precious their sacrifices to him, which explains why very often one of their own number was chosen as a human offering when the pagans particularly wished to favor some god.

An old Legend records the transition of the tree from a pagan to a Christian symbol. According to the story, in the eighth century (twelve hundred years ago) a missionary among the Hessians came upon a group of natives who were preparing to offer a human sacrifice to the great oak which they worshipped as the "hide-out" of the thunder god, Thor. St. Boniface, sometimes called St. Winfred, had come from England to teach these people Christianity and was astonished by the procedure. Just as the sacrificed youth was to be killed the missionary raised his arm and ordered the ceremony stopped. The heathens were frightened and when the priest commanded them to chop down the "thunder-oak", they did it from terror. As the majestic tree fell to the ground with a thunderous roar "like a tower groaning", a young fir tree was for the first time noticed growing between the broken branches of the fallen oak. Why or how it grew there, no one knows, although the

legend claims it sprang up miraculously. The native worshippers were, of course, amazed.

Pointing to the fir, the earnest missionary admonished the pagans to accept it as a symbol of Christianity, and surprisingly they did. Facing them he said, "This little tree, a young child of the forest shall be your holy tree tonight. It is the wood of peace, for your houses are built of fir. It is the sign of endless life, for its needles are ever green. See how it points to heaven. Let this be called the tree of the Christ Child; gather about it, not in the wild woods, but in your homes; there it will shelter no deeds of blood, but loving gifts and rites of kindness!" Then, at the priest's command, they uprooted the fir tree and carried it to the banquet hall where it was looked upon as a symbol of everlasting life. In later years the evergreen fir, the orthodox tree, was lighted by small candles which represented the "Light of the World" and the gifts which were put about its base were emblematic of God's gift of his Son to the world, as Christmas gifts always should be.

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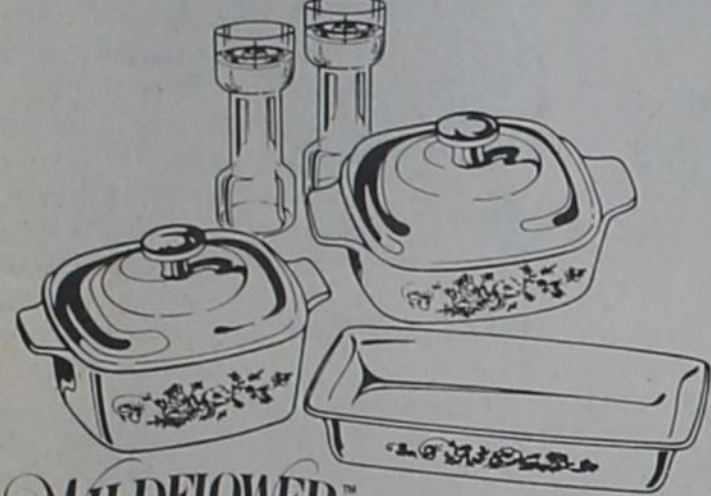

## Services held for 'Whit' Carhart

Funeral services for Isaac Whitfield Carhart, 69, were held in St. Timothy's Episcopal Church in Lake Jackson, Texas on Thursday, December 1, 1977.

Mr. Carhart was the son of the late Whitfield Carhart and Bessie Chamberlain Carhart. His grandfather, Isaac Whitfield Carhart, was mayor of Clarendon. He was a graduate of Texas A & M with a degree in Electrical Engineering. In 1933, he was married to Frances Carolyn Tull of Greenville. He was a member of the Society of Professional Engineers and a veteran of the Navy, serving in World War II.

He is survived by his wife, two sons, Dr. I.W. Carhart of Yakima, Washington, and Robert M. Carhart of Houston, a brother, Rufus Carhart of San Antonio, and three grandchildren.

## Last rites held for Ruth E. Stocking

Dr. Ruth E. Stocking, elder daughter of the late Jerome Daniel and Sarah Ward Stocking, died Nov. 29, 1977, at Portola Valley, Calif. Third oldest of eleven children, Ruth was born in 1891. Educated in Clarendon Public Schools, she was a graduate of Clarendon College, the Methodist institution of which her father was a founder-donor and President of the Board of Trustees.

Ruth Stocking attended Georgetown (Texas) University as a scholarship student and later was an honor graduate of the University of Texas. Extant among her papers is a letter of commendation (dated 1911) describing Ruth Stocking as "not only one who took the calculus but who understood it." She taught mathematics for an interval at Clarendon College, having among her students her brother, Collis, later on the staff of the President's Board of Economic Advisors.

After teaching at Clarendon College, Ruth Stocking was for several years on the staff of the Statistical Division, Department of Labor, Washington, D.C. Later she had a successful career in advertising with the J. Walter Thompson Agency of New York City.

Concluding the business world was not the preferred milieu, she entered medical training at a time when women were not welcomed in the field of medicine and, once in, were barely tolerated. There, as in other endeavors, she excelled. She became a biographee in Who's Who, one of four of her family described in those pages.

Following graduation from the University of Chicago School of Medicine (1931), Dr. Stocking served as Field Physician, Michigan Department of Health (1934-35). Next year she became Director, Bureau of Mental Health, Washington D.C. and Senior Psychiatrist, Board of Education, District of Columbia. Dr. Stocking became a member of the staff of Neuro-Psychiatry Division of Howard University Medical School.

In 1954, Dr. Stocking was appointed Director, Children's House, Washington, D.C., a position she held until retirement in 1965. Since that date she has been, first, a resident of Saratoga and, later, Portola Valley, California.

Her husband, Joseph Burton, born in Clarendon, Texas, died in 1957.

Dr. Stocking, on entering the medical profession, followed a family tradition wherein her father, a brother and a nephew were medical doctors.

Dr. Ruth E. Stocking is survived by a sister, Mrs. William McConnell, Amarillo, and two brothers: Collis A. Stocking, Arlington, Virginia, and Dr. Hobart E. Stocking, Stillwater, Oklahoma.

Interment is in Arlington National Cemetery, Ft. Myers, Virginia.

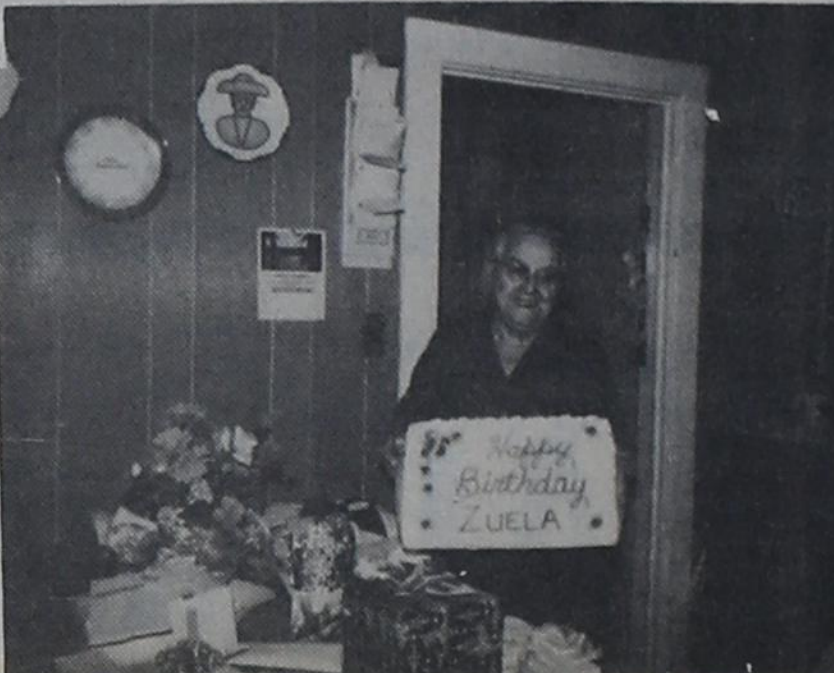
## Earl Strong Adams buried here

 The Bronchos host Valley Tuesday, Dec. 6 and travel to Hedley Friday, Dec. 9.

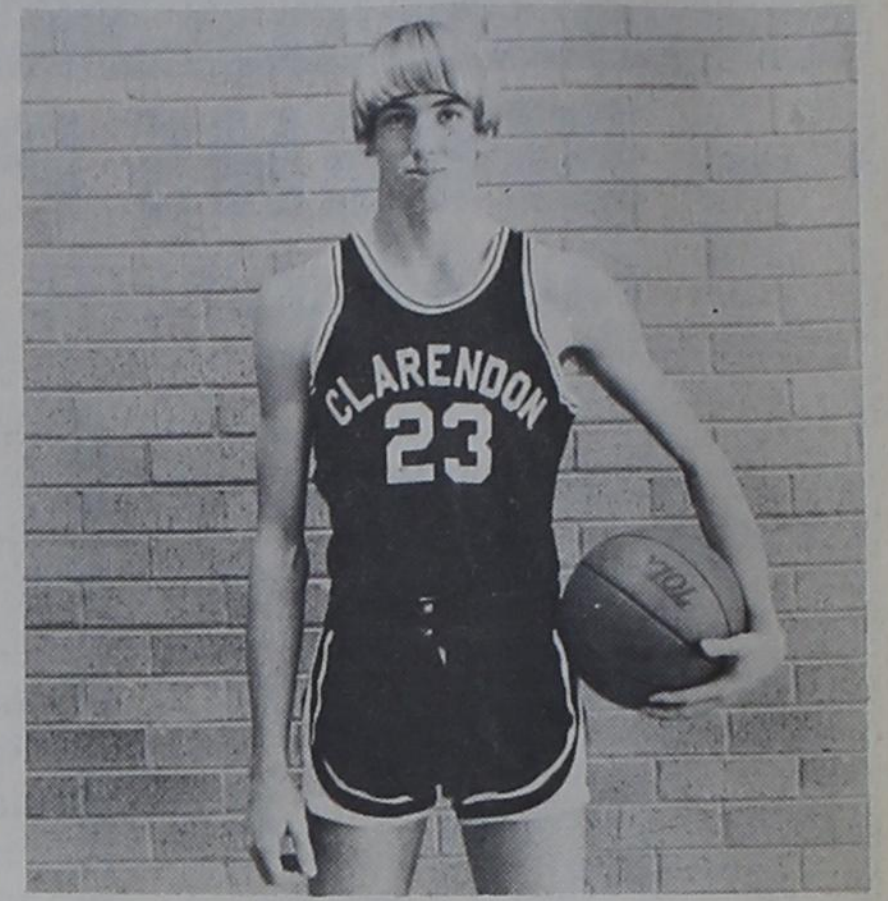
**Girls play shows 3 - 6**
