Winter continues as more snow covers the area

Weather continues to be the news as Donley County residents awoke Friday morning to find almost 3½ inches of new snow piled on top of two inches of ice and snow already accumulated from the storm front which swept across the county only days earlier. Friday's snowfall was the heaviest for the

Along with the snow, which ended early Friday morning, came low maximum daytime temperatures of 23 degrees with Friday's nighttime, temperature, dis-

nighttime temperature dip-ping to 4 degrees. The snow storm brought back-breaking labor for many who had to shovel doorways

Officially 31/2 inches of snow was recorded by Tommie Saye in Clarendon. This snowfall yielded .35 inches of moisture. So far Donley County has received 1.67 inches amount of moisture in February, and Friday's snow brought the total amount received in 1978 to 2.08 inches.

Winds from a north-north west direction with gusts from five to fifteen mph late Saturday and early Sunday brought the chill factor to near zero Saturday night.

Sunny skies both Saturday afternoon and Sunday afternoon were most welcome and warming temperatures near 33 degrees brought some thawing. By Saturday after-noon highway crews had all state highways in the county cleared. Sunday night, how-lever, many city streets continued to be under ice and

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





4 - H program builds leaders

There are five keys to successful leadership.
A good leader believes in people, encourages them and gives them responsibility. The leader also acts as a talent scout and develops a positive attitude toward getting things done.
Anyone who is willing to tackle a job that requires cooperating with others can learn to be an effective leader.

This is where the 4-H program comes in--it can help youth become effective leaders, says Cynthia Manning, county agent with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service Service.

The national 4-H leader-ship program, supported by Reader's Digest, stimulates young people to become leaders through a variety of learn-by-doing activities. These activities help turn girls and boys 9-19 into the creative, inspiring indivi-

duals that others just naturally want to follow.

As a first step, 4-H members gain self confidence by becoming experts at something, whether it's baking a cake, fixing a bike or playing a game. Then, they share their expertise with others through demonstrations, speeches and strations, speeches and exhibits. Soon they are serving on committees and holding offices in their 4-H clubs. Or, as junior and teen leaders they are assisting younger 4-H'ers with their projects.

Finally, leadership skills Finally, leadership skills learned in 4-H are carried over into the larger community. Nine national 4-H leadership winners reported activities that ranged from spearheading local charity drives to organizing leader. drives to organizing leader-ship conferences for inner-city teens to chairing a county youth committee for a congressional candidate.
