A hobby is turned into a business

Golf and antiques have held a special fascination for Jim Terry. Some twenty-eight years Terry said he played golf professionally, and also during those years he acquired a collection of antiques. Over the years Jim's collection of memorabilia grew so he decided to try selling some of his collection and as a result became a dealer in antiques.

As a dealer some six years in Clarendon, Jim and his wife have traveled throughout the United States collecting merchandise for their business. In their travels Jim says he has found the east and particularly the New England States to be the best places to purchase old Americana. "People from California and Colorado and the western states are my best customers. Traditionally antiques and collectables move from the east to the

west," said Terry.

Jim sells antiques both retail and wholesale to other dealers. Of the total amount sold he says 50% of his business is wholesale; however, in recent years numerous antique items have been sold retail to businessmen for decor purposes. Other good customers have been museum curators, travelers, and local people. Jim explained it made him proud of his merchandise when museum people make purchases, for their interest proves the age and authenticity of his antiques.

At "Terry's Antiques" very unusual pieces of merchandise may be found and continuously the merchandise changes. Such items as a fifty year old light bulb, a hundred and fifty year old clock type meat rotisserie, and large wooden

cookie molds may be found there as well as some of the more popularly sought memorabilia i.e. kerosene and coal oil lamps, striking clocks, furniture, cut glassware, pressed glassware, pottery, and old advertisement signs of products and businesses.

Both Jim and his wife are very talented restoration artists. They skillfully rebuild and refinish furniture from bits and pieces and magically turn them into sturdy, useful, beautiful furnishings.

One of Jim's most recent purchases has been a Model A Ford automobile, and his current interest is in restoring this acquisition. Jim says he will completely rebuild the car, remove worn parts and replace them with

new. All chrome parts will be replated, a vinyl top will be made, and the body will be completely reconditioned and painted. Terry said he hopes to have the model A restored and like new by July 4th as he hopes to drive it in Clarendon's Centennial Parade. The year 1978, aside from being Clarendon's Centennial year, will mark half a century since the first Model A automobile went on the market.

Mrs. Smith was the eldest daughter of the late Mr. and Mrs. W.H. Cooke Sr. who came to Clarendon in 1887 on the first passenger train. She was the granddaughter of the late Colonel James Burch Cooke, who commanded the Seventh Tennessee Regiment of the Confederacy

Farm program signup deadline nears

1978 Farm Program Signup
Signup for 1978 program participation is March 1 through May 1, 1978.

Program Meetings
The following meetings will be held to discuss the new farm program:

Clarendon - February 21, 1978-Clarendon College Cafeteria- 7:00 P.M.
Hedley-February 23, 1978 Lions Club Hall 7:00 P.M.
Groom-February 22, 1978 Legion Hall 7:00 P.M.

Voluntary Reductions
If there is a voluntary reduction of acreage for 1979, the 1978 acreage will be used. 100.0 acres cotton planted in 1977; 80.0 acres planted in 1978-20% voluntary reduction. Any voluntary reduction for 1979 will be computed from the 1978 planting of 80.0 acres instead of the 100.0 acres planted in 1977. In other words, any voluntary reduction will be computed from previous years' plantings. This is true for all crops involved in deficiency payment program when a voluntary reduction is announced.

Offsetting Compliance Between Farms
(This is a change since our January Newsletter)
A. Owners and/or operators of two or more farms will be eligible for program

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benefits on participating farms provided the NCA is not exceeded on nonparticipating farms when a crop subject to set-aside is planted on the nonparticipating farm.

B. Furthermore, other farms not planting a crop subject to set-aside will not be required to plant within their NCA and the crops grown thereon will be eligible for applicable benefits to all producers thereon.

Loan Redemptions
For all loan redemptions, a certified or cashiers check will be required. No personal checks will be accepted. I realize this may be an inconvenience to you; however, we have no choice.

Emergency Feed Program
Anyone who is getting information together to complete an application for assistance under the Emergency Feed Program must have this information in our office by close of business on February 17, 1978.

1977 Cotton Deficiency Payment
No deficiency payment for 1977 cotton. Target price was 47.8 cents per pound. Marketing year average was 56.2 cents per pound based on SLM 1 1/16.

Grain Reserve Program Eligible Commodities-Farmer owned 1976 or 1977 wheat, corn, sorghum, barley or oats, including these commodities which are under Commodity Credit Corporation loan or purchase agreement.

Participation-Effective
March 1, 1978--no waiting for loan maturity or purchase agreement expiration. EXCEPTION-Immediate program entry for 1977-crop corn and sorghum will be announced later.

To participate in the program, you must file a request for price support no later than: February 28, 1978 in the case of 1976 crop barley, oats and wheat; and March 31, 1978 in the case of 1977 crop barley, oats and wheat.

Maturity-The length of the reserve loan is 3 years.

Storage Rates-The annual rate is 25 cents bu. for barley, corn, wheat, and sorghum, and 19 cents bu. for oats.

Storage Payments-CCC will make advance storage payments to producers annually. For warehouse-stored grain, producers are required to furnish proof they have provided for storage for at least one year.

Release Period-When the national average market price reaches 125% of the then current national average loan rate for feed grains or 140% of the then current national average loan rate for wheat, the producer may redeem the reserve loan without penalty.

Call Level-When the national average market price for feed grains reaches 140% of the national average loan rate for feed grains or 175% of the then current national average loan rate for wheat, reserve loans will be called. The producer has 30 days after the call to redeem the reserve loan or forfeit the grain to CCC.

Rotation of Farm Stored Commodities-With approval, producers will be permitted to substitute stocks to maintain quality.

Penalty for Early Redemption-The farmer must repay all storage payments plus interest on these payments, in addition to the original loan principal and interest. However, the repayment amount must total at least 140% (for wheat) or 125% (for feed grains) of the farmer's current loan rate times the quantity redeemed.

Goals-The national goals are approximately 300 million bushels of wheat and 715 million bushels of corn, sorghum, barley and oats. The reserve program is offered on a first-come, first-served basis.

Reserve Loan Interest-Interest charges are 6 percent.

Storage Facility Loan-The farm storage facility loan program limit of 2 years' production is increased by an amount equal to the amount of grain a producer has in reserve.

In a meeting Monday, Feb. 6, the Library Board met with Ann Ousley of the Texas Panhandle Library System from Amarillo. Ousley provided information regarding library grants, and gave to board members a list of benefits that accreditation would bring to the Gable Betts Burton Library.

Namely, accreditation would provide:

1. Use of professional artist based at headquarters to design bookmarks, posters and publicity pieces that could be reproduced in the hometown with Texas Library System assisting with printing cost.

2. Receipt of regular shipment of commercially prepared items for hand-out

in the local community.

3. Regular visit from consultant to keep services known and to assist in special needs and problems.

4. Free telephone to headquarters consultant and staff.

5. Opportunity to keep current through continuing education work shops with the use of professional literature, college extension courses and L.T.A. Classes and Conferences.

6. Collection of enrichment grants for purchase of printed material. Grants are based on local support 50 - 50.

7. Central purchasing for all collections from enrichment grants saving member libraries seven to ten percent. Discount also available for local budgets.

8. Monthly inventory of 150 current popular books through rental plan - subject to change.

9. Free direct telephone lines to interlibrary loan service headquarters and teletype connections with major resource libraries.

10. Free access to all book collections in system through reciprocal borrowing.

11. Free use of film in headquarters library post-

paid.

12. Use of cassette tape collection.

13. Enrichment of local collection through use of area loans of 200 titles selected from headquarters collection. The titles may be children's books or adult and come from duplicates in general collection.

14. Benefit of systems wide advertising of good library service through media and State Fair.

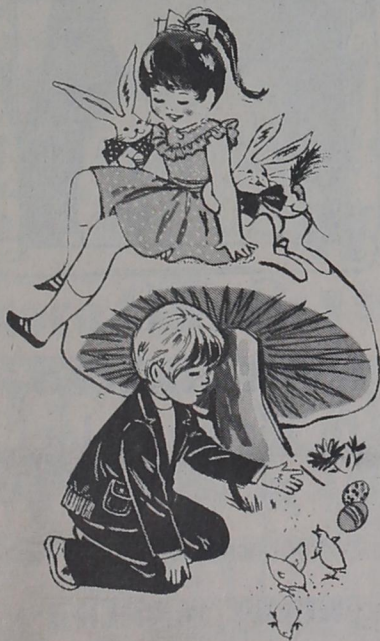
15. Benefit of information supplied members through system newsletter and other correspondence.

16. Knowledge that the Panhandle of Texas is becoming conscious of good library service and will be more receptive to good programs at home.

17. Knowledge that every citizen in the system has some type of library service with introduction of Books-by-Mail offered to citizens not served through a local library.

18. Assistance with cataloging problems and opportunity to have cards reproduced at minimum cost if commercial is not preferred. This cost is paid out of system funds for collection enrichment items.

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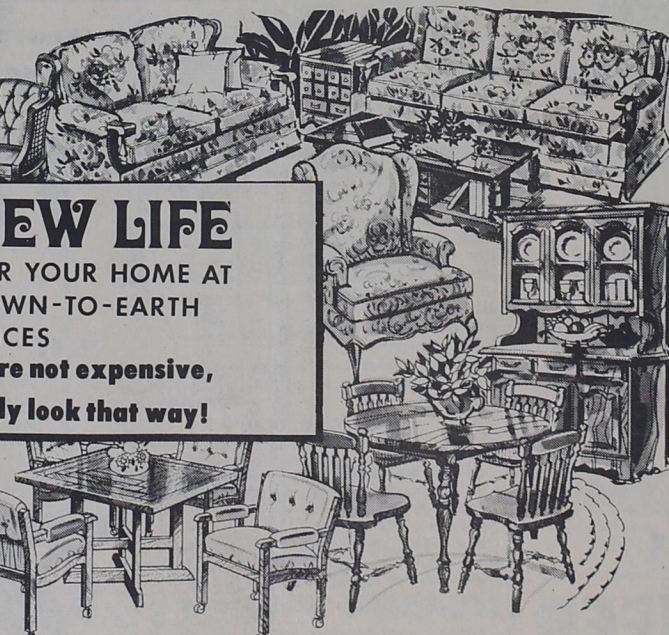
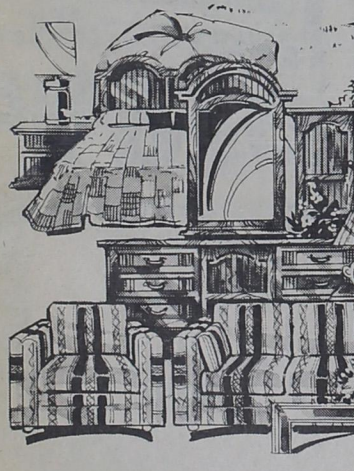

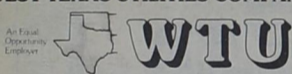

One week we had a sale. We sold popcorn balls and Rice Krispie treats to raise money to pay for our gas on the way down to Dallas.

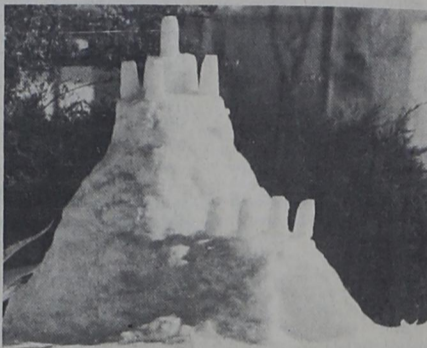

4 - H program builds leaders

There are five keys to successful leadership. A good leader believes in people, encourages them and gives them responsibility. The leader also acts as a talent scout and develops a positive attitude toward getting things done.

Anyone who is willing to tackle a job that requires cooperating with others can learn to be an effective leader.

This is where the 4-H program comes in—it can help youth become effective leaders, says Cynthia Manning, county agent with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service.

The national 4-H leadership program, supported by Reader's Digest, stimulates young people to become leaders through a variety of learn-by-doing activities. These activities help turn girls and boys 9-19 into the creative, inspiring individuals that others just naturally want to follow.

Each national winner received a \$1,000 scholarship donated by Reader's Digest.

As a first step, 4-H members gain self confidence by becoming experts at something, whether it's baking a cake, fixing a bike or playing a game. Then, they share their expertise with others through demonstrations, speeches and exhibits.

Soon they are serving on committees and holding offices in their 4-H clubs. Or, as junior and teen leaders they are assisting younger 4-H'ers with their projects.

Finally, leadership skills learned in 4-H are carried over into the larger community. Nine national 4-H leadership winners reported activities that ranged from spearheading local charity drives to organizing leadership conferences for inner city teens to chairing a county youth committee for a congressional candidate.

Other recognition for program members includes an expense-paid trip to National 4-H Congress in Chicago for one 4-H member per state, and up to four medals of honor in each county.

Winners are chosen by the Cooperative Extension Service, which conducts the 4-H program and awards are arranged by National 4-H Council.


