#### TEXAS HAS 88,443 MILES OF PASSABLE ROADS

Texas now has in all, 88,443 miles of passable road of all

Most rapid progress has been made in farm to market roads. 14,500 miles of which have been financed by the state highway department in conjunction with federal aid, since V-J Day.

The figures are from a survey taken by the Bureau of of which 63,041 miles are on lo-Public Roads at the direction of the United States Senate. Texas statistics were compiled by the highway department in cooperation with county road officials.

Farm-to-market roads are located upon the recommendations of district engineers after conferences with county commissioners. Location is determined by the highway commission on the basis of need as these figures show:

72 per cent of farm-to-market roads carry school buses; 74 per cent carry mail routes; 24 per cent carry milk routes; and 87 per cent carry one or more of these services

Other roads built under the farm-to-market program service oil fields and forest-lumber operations.

When the present program of farm-to-market road construction is completed, the vast majority of farm dwellings will be

within one mile of a paved road. The state highway system as of August 31, 1949 included 39,-096 miles of roads of all types, paved or financed for paving.


The counties have 1,606 miles of good paved roads and 9,226 miles of roads that have some mix up to surface treatment. The counties report 38,495 miles of gravel anl soil-surface roads.

According to the latest available figures -- 1947 -- local road administration on the county level expended \$45,500,000. No division was shown between construction and maintenance.

#### **Highest Secondary Road Bridge**



Texas' highest secondary-highway bridge and one of the major projects in the Texas Highway Department's multi-million dollar secondary road program is this bridge just completed across the Pedernales River canyon 30 miles west of Austin in Travis County. Rising 120 feet above the canyon bed and 90 feet above the waters backed up by the Mahsfield (Marshal Ford) Dam impounding Lake Travis, the structure is a four-span continuous deck truss bridge containing 680 tons of structural steel supplied by U. S. Steel's Virginia Bridge Company.

It is one of the longest secondary bridges in the state—900 feet—with two 200-foot approach spans and two 250-foot center spans. The bridge is also unusual in that, following erection of the initial approach span, the remaining three spans were erected using the cantilever method with a minimum of supporting falsework. Main supports consist of steel tower bents set on concrete foundations. General contractor for the superstructure of the new bridge, which carries a 26-foot roadway

M. 93 has already been let and work is expected to begin soon.

#### CHECK YOUR SOCIAL SECURITY NUMBER

> This advice was given workers today by Ralph T. Fisher, manager of the Abilene office of the Social Security Administration. Mr. Fisher pointed out that most employers conscientiously try to report each worker's social security number correctly, but it is only human to make mistakes occasionally.

When a worker has social security taxes deducted from his Mr. and Mrs. L. B. Russell and pay, he is paying premiums on an insurance policy. This insurance helps to provide financial security in the worker's old age after retirement. It also provides insurance payments to eligible survivors if a worker dies,'

Fisher said. "Eligibility for benefits hinges on the length of time a worker has been employed in jobs covered by social security. The amount of benefits payable depends on the total wages credited to his account. It is to the worker's advantage to have credit on his wage record for all wages earned. If his wages are reported under the wrong social security number," Mr. Fisher concluded, "he may not be credited with those wages. Later on, he and his family may lose benefits which should be theirs,'





#### MARRIAGE LICENSE LAW

In order that the public may become more familiar with the requirements set out in the new marriage license law passed by the last legislature, and which becomes effective October 5th. we are giving below a full text of House Bill No. 588:

An Act providing "for the protection of unborn children and the public health by requiring premartial examinations for syphilis; providing for examinations and standard serologic tests for applicants for mar-Any erroneous reflection upon riage, and physicians' certifiexamination under certain conditions; providing for the accepting of certificates from states other than Texas; defining a standard serologic test for syphilis; nothing in the Act shall affect or impair existing laws on the subject; declaring marriage licenses to be invalid unless performed with fifteen (15) days from date of examination; repealing all laws in conflict; and providing penalties for the violation thereof; providing a severability clause; and declaring an emergency Be it enacted by the legisla-

ture of the State of Texas: Sec. 1. No marriage license

shall be issued unless each applicant files with the county clerk a certificte from a duly qualified physician licensed to practice medicine and surgery in Texas, or in any state or in any territory of the United Sta-Home 206 tes where applicant may reside but who wish to marry in Tex-

as. The certificate shall state that the applicant has been given and actual and thorough examination, including a standard serologic test for syphilis. The examination shall not have been more than fifteen (15) days prior to the date of issuance of such license and the certificate shall show that the results of such examination, tests and history showed that the person examined was free from any infectious condition of syphilis. No physician shall issue such certificate to any person whom he knows or has reason to believe is infected with any condition of syphilis that would be infectious or who has any clini- shall impair or affect existing ade at the Abilene Fair Moncal evidence of infectious veneral disease.

Sec. 2. The certificate shall be accompanied by a report from the person in charge of the laboratory making the standard serologic test, or from some other person authorized to make such reports setting forth the name of the test, the date it was made, the name and address of the physician to whom the report was sent, and the name and address of the person whose blood was tested, but not stating the result of the test.

Sec. 3. The physician's certificate and laboratory report shall be on a form prepared and provided by the State Board of Health. This form is referred to in this Act as the certificate

Sec. 4. For the purpose of this Act, "standard serologic tests" shall mean all such tests or procedures as may be approved by the State Board of Health. Such tests shall be executed, for any phylician, without charge by all State, county and city laboratories. Private laboratories approved by the State Health Department may also execute the tests called for by this Act. The State Health Officer shall immediately forward to all county clerks the names of approved laboratories and, thereafter, those added, withdrawn, or reinstated. Only the certificate form required under this Act shall be accepted by the county

clerk. Sec. 5. Persons who may reside in any state or in any territory of the United States but who wish to marry in Texas may present certificates showing that the required tests were executed by an official laboratory or any of the other States or territories of the United States or by a laboratory certificate by any State Health Department. Such certificates shall be accompanied by an affidavit made by the director of the laboratory executing the tests stating that the laboratory has been certified by the State Health Depart-

Sec. 6. Upon a separate form to be furnished by the State Board of Health a detailed report of the examination or approved serologic test showing the result of the examination or together with the certificate form shall be transmitted by the laboratory to the certifying physician, and a copy of the detailed report of the laboratory shall be submitted to the State Board of Health, where it shall not be open to public inspection. Provided that it may be produced for evidence at a trial or proceedings in a court or competent jurisdiction, involving issues in which it may be material and revelent, on an order of
