Acreage allotments eliminated requiring set-aside is planted on the non-participating farm or farms.

The 1977 Food and Agriculture Act which will affect all producers on their crop production for the next four years, is the item in the news where ASCS is concerned. Newsletters and other means have been used to explain the new Act to producers in Donley County. Realizing the fact that not everyone in the County is a farmer, and not on the ASC mailing list - we therefore summarize the program for the

public.

Acreage allotments used in the past are now replaced by Normal Crop Acreage (NCA). This acreage is based upon 1977 plantings of the following 14 crops: Upland cotton, wheat, grain sorghum, corn, barley, oats, rye, rice, soybeans, sunflowers, sugar cane, sugar beets, flax and dry edible beans. Using the acreages of these crops planted in 1977, a preliminary NCA was set for each reporting farm. The County ASCS Committee was given authority to adjust, upon receipt of a request from the producer, these NCA's for: (1) abnormal planting in 77 as indicated by the acres planted in 75 and 76; (2) changes in farming operation to include land plowed for production in 78 prior to January 1, 1978; and (3) a shift in plantings of non-NCA crops to NCA crops.

SET-ASIDE PROVISIONS

At this time the only crops requiring acreage to be

At this time the only crops requiring acreage to be set-aside, or idled for '78, are wheat - 20%, grain sorghum - 10%, barley - 10%, and corn - 10%. These percentages will be applied to the acres planted for harvest as grain. The acres be applied to the acres planted for harvest as grain. The acres designated as set-aside acres must meet these requirements:

(1) it must have been tilled for crop production in at least 1 of the last 3 years; (2) it may be the prior year crop stubble or residue, provided it is sufficient to control erosion; (3) it may be seeded to a crop in the fall for harvest in the following year; (4) the acres may be seeded to sudan or sweet sorghum for cover; (5) seeding of small grains is allowed only if the crop is not permitted to mature; and (6) the set-aside acres may be grazed from October 1 through March 31. It is important that the participating producer remember that if he important that the participating producer remember that if he plants a crop requiring set-aside, the acres he intends to harvest, plus the acres required to be set-aside, cannot exceed the NCA acreage set for the farm. If he chose to plant rops not requiring set-aside, he may exceed the NCA even if he plants crops included in the list of NCA crops. The situation becomes more complex if he maintains more than one farm. Owners and/or operators of 2 or more farms will be in compliance on participating farms provided the NCA is not exceeded on the non-participating farm where a crop

Producers in compliance with these provisions will be eligible for all program benefits including, commodity loans through Commodity Credit Corporation, prevented planting and low yield protection, and will be eligible for a price-deficiency payment, if one is announced. Loan rates for 1978 cotton and wheat have been released. They are 44 cents per pound based on strict low middling, 1 1/16th inch. Micronaire 3.5 through 4.9 for cotton and \$2.25 or \$2.35 per bushel for wheat. Other commodity loan rates will be announced later. Should a producer, because of a natural disaster, be prevented from planting a crop, his payment will be based upon 75% of the farm yield on the approved disaster, be prevented from planting a crop, his payment will be based upon 75% of the farm yield on the approved prevented planting acres times ½ the target price. If a producer, because of a natural disaster, harvests a low amount of production, a low yield payment in the case of cotton, will be computed on the loss below 75% of the farm yield, times the acres for harvest. The rate of payment for cotton is ½ the target price. For producers of wheat and feed grains, the low yield payment is based upon the loss below 60% of the farm yield, times acres for harvest. The rate of payment for these crops is ½ the target price. These losses will never be paid on more than 75% of the yield for cotton, and 60% of the yield for wheat and feed grains. Target prices announced are: Cotton - 52 cents per pound; corn - 52.10 per and 60% of the yield for wheat and feed grains. Larget prices announced are: Cotton - 52 cents per pound; corn - 52.10 per bushel; wheat \$3.00 or \$3.05 per bushel, depending upon the level of total program production; grain sorghum and barley have not been announced. If the national average market price for a commodity falls below the target price, program participants qualify for a deficiency payment. The rate of payment will be the difference between the target price and the bisher of the average market price or the payment. payment will be the difference between the target piece and the higher of the average market price or the national loan rate. Payment is paid on the acres for harvest, times the yield, times the "National Allocation Factor", times the payment rate. The National Allocation Factor is applied only to those producers who do not voluntarily reduce their '78 plantings by 20% of their '77 plantings of cotton, barley, and wheat, 5% of the acres of grain sorghum and corn. The factor will be determined by dividing the national program acreases by the determined by dividing the national program acreage by the acres harvested. Bushels or pounds of production that earn a low yield payment will not qualify for a deficiency payment.

SIGN-UP

The sign-up period for filing an Intention to Participate in the 78 program will continue through May 1, 1978. If producers fail to sign this intention to participate, they will not be eligible for any of the program benefits.

ACP

A large number of Donley County farmers and ranchers have signed up for practices in the Agriculture Conservation Program (ACP). Practices in the 1978 handbook are: (1) Establishing or improving permanent vegetative cover. (2) Control of competative shrubs. (3) Establishing sod waterways. (4) Constructing water impoundment reservoirs. (5) Development of seeps or springs and installation of pipelines to conserve water. (6) Constructing wells for livestock water. (7) Improving irrigation systems. (8) Constructing of terrace or diversion terrace systems. The objectives of this program are to assure a continued supply of food and fiber necessary for a strong and healthy people and food and fiber necessary for a strong and healthy people and economy and to facilitate resource management by these methods. Shares on the cost of implementing these practices will vary from 30% to 75% of the cost, depending upon the priority rating of the practice.

Origin of haystack fires a mystery ton stack of hay burn to the

ground Saturday night on his farm west of Clarendon as firemen tried to contain the flames. There appeared to be no good cause for the fire. Monday just after noon a smaller stack, 75 tons, also burned to the ground. At \$66, a ton Mays suffered a \$21,450 loss in the two fires. Mays: farm is located 316. Mays' farm is located 3½ miles west and about 1 mile north of Clarendon. This places it some two m south of Lake Greenbelt.

Several unusual events have led to wide speculation as to the cause of the fire. It started in the top of the stack and was immediately out of control. Debris found after the first stack burned has not

the first stack burned has not been identified as yet but it looks something like ashgrey lava rocks, but is lighter in weight.

After the second stack burned, Mays found three more piles of the debris within a 20 foot radius.
Channel 7 TV, after interviewing Mays, is contacting military authorities. military authorities.

"At first I had the
impression of an arrow flying
thereach the air, and they

through the air, and then realized it was higher up, larger and going too fast," Saye related. "The front of it was white and the back end was blue. There it was and then it was gone." Saye did then it was gone. not mention it to his Scouts not mention it to his Scouts and none of them saw it. When he returned to town Sunday morning he told his wife about the unusual sighting and then learned about the burned haystack. Was it just coincidence that Was it just coincidence that he sighted the flying object at 10:10 and the fire was reported at 10:35? Saye

declined an opinion.
Two students from Texas Tech University who were weekending at the lake were on the opposite side and reported seeing a fiery streak at the same time Saye did. Several Clarendon residents also saw the bright object. No one can identify it.

Possible explanations range from Man made space debris to meteor fragments. Personnel from Channel 7 TV reportedly told the Mays they had been watching a satellite in orbit. Channel 4 TV said there were no meteorites reported for that time.

So the mystery remains at this time and no one can say whether or not the fiery object sighted near Green-belt Lake has any bearing on the haystack fires. One thing is definite, it was not an ordinary fire and M.L. Mays still has not made up his mind what to do with a half load of hay still in the loader.

ers had an estimated sales volume of \$6.87 billion for 1977, up from the 1976 total of \$6.55 billion. However, their net income suffered due

to low market prices and soaring production costs. "With the increase in agricultural sales in Texas, the state is continuing to the state is continuing to move toward the goal of becoming Number 1 in the nation in total cash receipts from agricultural products," points out Dr. Carl Anderson, marketing economist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service. "And, of course, the total agribusiness in the total

agribusiness industry in agriousiness industry in Texas continues to grow. Currently, every agricultural dollar turns around about three-and-a-half times, generating more than \$25 billion in economic impact within the business community and benefitting the lives of many people. Thus, acriently level. people. Thus, agricultural growth contributes substantially to the growth of the

Texas economy."

Looking at last year's estimated cash receipts, meat animals led the way, contributing \$2.48 billion. Cotton was the top crop, with cash receipts of more than \$1.45 billion.

\$1.45 billion.

Other top contributors in cash receipts were feed crops, \$819 million; food grains, \$485 million; poultry and eggs, \$358 million; dairy products, \$336 million; and oil crops, \$197 million. Cash receipts of \$286 million are estimated from agricultural related areas such as farmbased timber, horses, fish farming, hunting leases, farm pond leases and recreation.

The largest gain in cash receipts came from cotton, up \$416,000 from 1976. Cash receipts from meat animals were up \$91,000 from a year ago while oil crop receipts showed an increase of showed killer and fertilizer are brisk, as regoing with cotton again this year.





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
