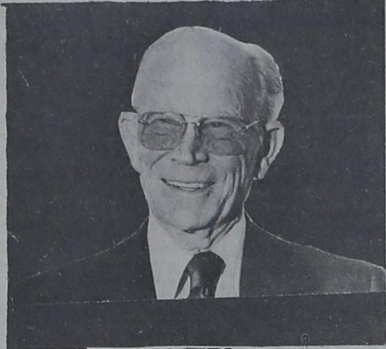

Clarendon College has announced the retirement of Beryl D. Clinton, Dean of Instruction. Clinton will retire from the college effective June 30, after serving the institution for the past twelve years.

Dean Clinton has served in the field of education since 1947, at which time he entered his first teaching position with the Childress Independent School District.

Clinton served in the Clarendon Independent School District from 1948 through 1950 and 1957 through 1958 prior to joining the college in 1966. Other service includes Amarillo Independent School District

from 1958 to 1962 and Superintendent of Schools at Stanton from 1963 to 1966.

A native of Stanton, Clinton attended West Texas State Teachers College (WTSU) and received his Bachelor of Science Degree from WTSU in 1947 and the Master of Education Degree in 1953.

Changes in the 1978 Farm Program

### Wheat Grazing and Hay Provision:

Producers may receive payment for wheat planted for harvest as grain which they elect to graze or cut immature for green chop hay or silage. The payment will be the higher of the 1978 wheat deficiency rate or \$.50 times the farm established yield times the acres for payment.

The acres for payment are limited to the larger of 50 acres or 40% of the total acres of barley, corn, grain sorghum, upland cotton and wheat intended for harvest for grain in 1978, not to exceed the wheat intended for harvest as grain in 1978. This acreage cannot be increased after signup, but will be reduced if it exceeds the maximum based on actual planted acreage.

The designated acreage must be protected from erosion. Other forage crops excluding corn and grain sorghum, may follow the wheat for grazing and hay, but not for grain or seed. These acres will not be recorded as 1978 wheat acreage and will be ineligible for 1978 deficiency or disaster payments and will be charged against the NCA.

### 1978 Voluntary Diversions

Producers on farms that grew barley, corn grain sorghum, or upland cotton in 1977 now have the option for voluntary diversion in 1978 for any or all of these crops equal to 10% of the 1978 acreage for harvest.

The payment will be \$.20 bu. for corn, \$.12 bu. for barley and grain sorghum, and \$.02 per lb. for cotton times the farm established yield times the acres for harvest.

The 1978 acreage for harvest of the crop with voluntary diversion will be limited to the 1977 planted acres. The total acreage of NCA crops, required set-aside, voluntary diversion and any grazing and hay acres for wheat payment cannot exceed the farm NCA.

Any producer who has already signed up in the 1978 programs may revise their intentions before May 1, 1978.

One-half of the payment for voluntary diversion and grazing and hay acreage will be made at signup time based on intended acreage. These payments will be charged against the 1978 payment limitation of \$40,000.

Sign-up - The final date to sign up in the 1978 program is May 1, 1978.

## Deposits continues to grow

Bank deposits in Clarendon continue to grow with a total city deposit of \$24,874,844.01 for the first quarter ending March 31, 1978.

This figure represents an increase in deposits of \$1,536,000 for the 1977-1978 year ending March 31, in deposits for the Farmers State Bank. Loans are up \$592,000 over the same period a year ago for a total of \$7,737,362.28. Total assets for the Farmers State Bank is \$17,651,582.70 to end the first quarter of 1978.

Figures for the Donley

County State Bank show deposits up by \$598,414.93 from the same time last year for a total of \$8,050,379.83. Loans have increased \$389,247.23 for the same period for a total of \$5,047,365.43. Total assets for the Donley County State Bank are \$9,746,199.84 with an increase of \$659,089.71

over the total for last year.

The economic state of the area is progressing and if deposits are any indication the climate is healthy for economic growth in this section of the country.

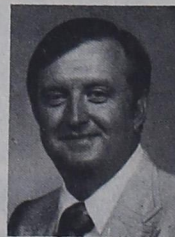
