## Donley County USDA report

### FAILED ACREAGE

Failed acreage applies to acreage of a crop that has been planted and failed due to a natural disaster. If the crop has not been planted, then it would not be failed acreage. So, if any acreage of wheat, barley, corn, milo, or cotton is damaged by a disaster and you choose not to harvest the acreage, you must have the crop appraised by a representative of this office before you make any other use of the land. If the crop is destroyed without an appraisal, you may be ineligible for program benefits.

### Final planting dates

Final planting dates for Donley County are as follows: Cotton, May 31; corn, May 31; Grain Sorghum, June 20; Soybeans, July 1.

### What does a final planting date mean?

#### I. Failed acreage provision

A. The date means that if you plant the commodity in question before the final planting date, it fails due to a natural disaster, the disaster prevents you from replanting before the final planting date, and the crop is appraised by a representative of this office, you are not required to replant the crop to be eligible for disaster coverage. However, you may plant after the final planting date and receive full program benefits, provided ample time is available to produce the crop.

#### II. Prevented planting provisions

A. You have 15 days from the final planting date to request prevented planting. There are some factors which could limit the amount of acreage for which payment can be approved:

1. June 15, 1978, is the final date to request prevented planting credit for cotton. If you are unable to plant cotton by this date [June 15] but you intend to plant after that date provided weather permits, you should file a prevented planting request to protect yourself. If you later get the cotton planted, this would eliminate the application.

2. The following items apply to the acreage eligible for prevented planting:

a. The maximum acreage that could be approved, if otherwise eligible, is the smaller of the 1977 planted or the intended for 1978.

b. Acres approved for prevented planting will count against the NCA established for the farm.

c. An intention to plant cotton must have been filed no later than May 31, 1978.

#### 3. The producer must

have been prevented from planting the commodity in question due to a natural disaster during the 30 day period prior to the final planting date. If most farmers did plant before the final planting date, you would have been expected to have planted, also.

4. If cotton herbicide has been applied solid on the intended acreage, the following would apply:

a. You must file a prevented planting application no later than June 15, 1978, at which time the area must be designated on the Photo-copy.

b. Any non-conserving crop (grain sorghum, guar, soybeans, sunflowers, black-eyed peas) planted on the intended acreage for cotton would reduce the prevented planting credit acre for acre.

(Guar planted and plowed under before maturity would not be a non-conserving

#### 5. If cotton herbicide has not been applied on the intended acreage, you would be required to:

a. File for prevented planting credit on cotton by June 15, 1978, at which time, the acreage must be designated on the Photo-copy.

b. Plant grain sorghum until June 20, 1978 and

c. File a prevented planting application for grain sorghum (if unable to plant grain sorghum due to disaster by June 20) no later than July 5, 1978.

d. If ANY non-conserving crops are later planted on the acreage intended for cotton, the prevented planting credit would be reduced acre for acre.

## Dr. Gilkey retains membership in AAFF

Dr. Richard L. Gilkey has completed continuing education requirements to retain active membership in the American Academy of Family Physicians, the national association of family doctors. The Academy formerly was

called the American Academy of General Practice.

The requirements call for members to complete a minimum of 150 hours of accredited continuing medical study every three years. Members become eligible for re-election at the end of the third year following their election to membership. The Academy, the country's second largest national medical association, is the only national medical group that requires members to keep up with medical progress through continuing education.

The Academy, founded in 1947 and headquartered in Kansas City, Mo., was instrumental in the establishment of a new primary specialty in family practice in 1969. The new specialty is expected to increase the numbers of family physicians available to serve the public in the future. The Academy's continuing education program is the foundation of eligibility for family doctors now in practice who apply for certification in the new specialty.

The simplest way of ridding your home or apartment of mice or roaches is the use of insecticides and pesticides. But if these highly toxic products are not used and stored safely, they can create a serious hazard for children and pets.

A 5-year-old opened the garage door, unscrewed the lid on a jar of weed killer, and then fed it to his 3-year-old brother. An 8 1/2 month-old girl who had been suffering from a cough for a few weeks died five days after her room had been sprayed by an exterminator. A 4-year-old girl was poisoned after eating a small quantity of rodent killer left under the kitchen sink.

Many people store these products where they can reach them quickly. A favorite storage place is the area beneath the kitchen sink—within easy reach of small children.

The U.S. Consumer Product Safety Commission estimates that some 8,500 children are treated in hospital emergency rooms every year after being poisoned by insecticides, pesticides, or similar products. Many of these accidents could have been prevented had a few simple precautions been taken.

- Keep all such products locked up when not in use.
- All insecticides and pesticides are poisonous. Always read the warning labels. The labels indicate the seriousness of the danger and list all hazardous ingredients. If your child is accidentally poisoned, the first thing a doctor needs to know is the identity of the poison. The label will also tell you what immediate first aid you can give.
- Do not spread pesticides or insecticides in areas where children or pets could touch or eat them.
- Do not spray insecticides near small children or pets. Never spray them on playpens, cribs or toys.
- Cover all food and cooking and eating utensils before spraying.
- Insecticides and pesticides used in farming are usually much more powerful than the household varieties. It is particularly important to keep these poisons locked up when not in use and to use them only with great caution.
- Many household insecticides and pesticides will soon be packaged in containers with safety closures that are very difficult for most children to open. Child-resistant packaging has the potential to reduce dramatically the number of youngsters poisoned, but only if it is purchased and then properly used. Be sure to:
  - Keep insecticides and pesticides in their safety packaging.
  - Close the containers properly after each use, re-securing the safety feature.
  - Remember that most children cannot open poison-prevention packages, but some can. Safety closures will help, but they can't do the whole job of protecting your children.

**Tax installment due soon**

Corporations operating on a calendar year basis must make their second quarterly installment payment of 1978 income tax by Thursday, June 15, if the corporations have expected tax liabilities of at least \$40 for the year.

These payments must be accompanied by FTD Form 503 and deposited in authorized commercial banks or Federal Reserve Banks, the Internal Revenue Service said.

The estimated tax and the amount of each installment can be computed on a Form 1120-W which is a worksheet for computing corporation estimated income tax. This form is not filed with the IRS but is retained in the corporation's records.

Supplies of Form 1120-W and a helpful pamphlet, IRS Publication 542, "Corporations and the Federal Income Tax," are available free from local IRS offices.

## Scott and White diagnostic center dedicated

Dedication ceremonies will be held June 17 for the new 205,000 square-foot Mabee Diagnostic Center, the Scott and White Clinic's new laboratory, research and patient-care structure named in honor of Mr. and Mrs. John Mabee.

The Mabee Diagnostic Center received its first patients on June 5.

Many Scott and White Clinic Departments are the beneficiaries of greatly enlarged facilities in this new structure, built at a cost of \$14.5 million.

The Mabee Diagnostic Center initially will provide space for 40 additional physicians, many of whom have come on the Scott and White staff in recent months. Later expansion will provide office space for a total of 200 physicians.

Departments which have moved into the Mabee Diagnostic Center include:

--Ground Floor - Laboratories, Medical Records, Endocrinology, Tumor Registry, X-Ray Therapy.

--First Floor - Pediatrics, Dermatology, Infectious Disease, Allergy, Community Internal Medicine.

--Second Floor - Orthopedics and Chiropody, X-Ray.

--Third Floor - Gastroenterology, Endoscopy, Fluoroscopy, Proctosigmoidoscopy.

--Fourth and Fifth Floors - Shelled in.

--Sixth Floor - Doctors' Lounge, Clinic Administration.

With many laboratory and medical support departments moving into the Mabee building, some 35,000 square feet of existing Clinic space in the main building has been renovated for expansion. Office and waiting areas have been redecorated for better patient access and comfort. Radiology and pathology laboratories are expanding into some of the vacated space.

The new diagnostic facility constitutes Phase II of the \$25 million Expansion Fund at Scott and White. Phase I brought the Lucy King Brown Special Treatment Center in 1975. These two structures are the most significant single additions to Scott and White since it moved to its present site in 1963.

In 1977, Scott and White celebrated its 80th anniversary of founding. In observance, a special time capsule containing artifacts and memorabilia from those eventful years was sealed and placed in the lobby of the Mabee Diagnostic Center

(adjacent to the picturesque fountain). In 1997, during Scott and White's centennial

ceremonies, the capsule will be taken out and examined. Until then, a chunk of the institution's history can consider the Mabee building as its home.

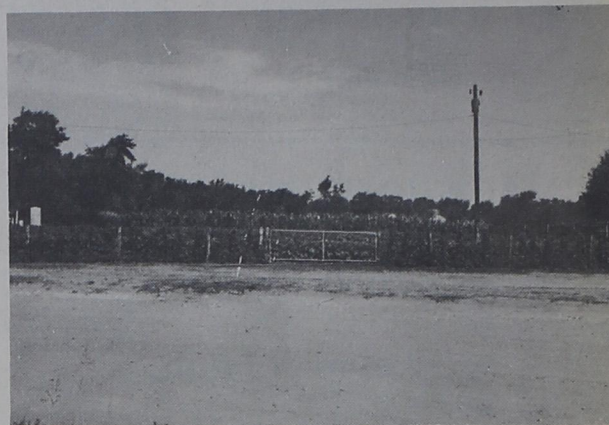
With the summer season yet to arrive and because the rains have prevented some seeding, this year's garden has not reached the stage to show up much; but, pictures of previous years tell their

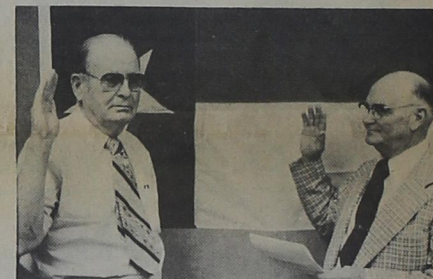

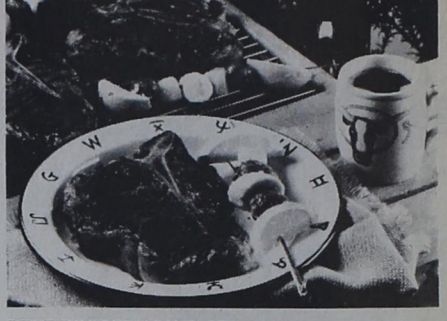

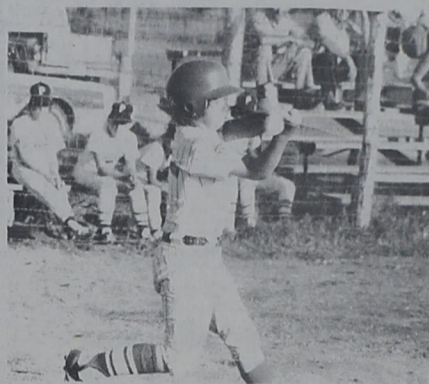

Questions and answers from the VA

Q -- I am a veteran and wish to sell my VA financed home to a non-veteran. Can I do so and be released from liability for the loan?

A -- Yes. If the loan is current, the purchaser assumes full liability for the loan, and the purchaser meets VA credit and income criteria, you may be released from liability.

Q -- After my husband died I received a monthly widow's pension from the VA. This benefit was terminated when I remarried. My second husband has since died. Can I receive anything from the VA based on the military service of my first husband?

A -- Yes. Providing your yearly income is within the current limits, you may again be eligible to receive a monthly widow's pension.
