Gordon Wood, head coach and Athletic Director of the Brownwood High School will be the speaker for the evening and Clarendon Coach Ted Allen feels he is one of the finest coaches and men around.

Allen's opinion does not stand alone for Lyndon Baines Johnson, who spoke at Gordon Wood's sports banquet a few years ago said of him, "This is the man I would have raised my sons, if I had a choice."

In addition to this tribute to his personal qualities his career record is almost phenomenal.

With 343 victories in 37 seasons as a head coach, Gordon Wood may well be the winningest coach in America. He has averaged an amazing 9.4 victories a year. Wood has won 8 state championships, 4 more than any other coach in Texas history. One of his most recent milestones came during the 1975 season when he recorded his 300th victory—a 14-0 decision over Fort Worth Southwest.

He is a member of the Texas High School Coaches Assn. hall of honor and the National High School Coaches Assn. hall of honor.

Twice he has been selected Texas high school coach of the year and his teams at Brownwood have been the subjects of articles in various major magazines in addition to "Spirit," a book released across the nation in 1973.

On May 14, 1971, Brownwood staged a "Gordon Wood Day" complete with former President Lyndon B. Johnson and former greats who played their high school football under Wood.

A real treat is in store for those who will be attending the All Sports Banquet this spring.

No other positions are contested for city positions in Clarendon but there is an unusual circumstance this year. Persons voting will be casting their vote for one position, filed for by Cecil McAfee, for a one year term of office. This one year is the uncompleted term which was held by Charles E. Deyhle. He will not be residing within the city of Clarendon for the next year and McAfee filed for his remaining term of office. Positions filed for by incumbent Shirley Clifford and James L. Kuhn and for regular terms.

In the Hedley city alderman uncontested race incumbents C. L. Taylor, V. C. Waddell and W. B. Wiggins are candidates.

Two grants approved for Donley County area

Governor William P. Clements, Jr. has approved two criminal justice grants affecting Donley County.

They are: \$7,994 to the Panhandle Regional Planning Commission for additional portable and mobile law enforcement radio equipment; and

\$28,737 to the Panhandle Regional Planning Commission for addition law enforcement technical equipment.

The local grants were among 124 approved by Governor Clements statewide from Law Enforcement Assistance Administration (LEAA) funds under the Crime Control Act of 1976.

There will be a nominal

charge of \$1 for adults and \$.75 for children. The public is invited to see this play which will be entered in UIL competition by Clarendon High School.

Bronchette Harriers capture back to back championships

After two narrow misses at Shamrock and Quanah, the Clarendon Bronchettes, coached by Dean Overcast and Charles Rust, captured two convincing victories at Lefores and White Deer over the weekend. The victories were paced by three explosive freshmen, Vanessa Calloway, Angela Gardner and Kelli Hardin, and the steadily improving efforts of the rest of the squad.

The team is a very young squad having only one senior and six juniors with the remainder being sophomores and freshmen. The lone senior, Janette Myers, has proven to be a multi-talented performer. She runs the 3rd leg on both the 440 and 880 relays and alternates between the 100 dash, 80 yard hurdles and the 220 dash. In the field event area she is a consistent performer in both the triple jump and the shot put.

The consistently improving efforts of the junior members of the squad is a story in itself. These girls are what some may call the work horses of the team. Their willingness to workout hard and run the longer races has set a shining example for the rest of the team. Sherilyn Walker is an improving and promising half-miler and has not finished below fourth in any race yet this year. She also runs the second 440 on the mile relay which is its own right has not finished below 3rd place this year.

Two other juniors, Jenny Deyhle and Adriane Youngblood, both are strong performer at the 440 yard dash. Youngblood is improving from day to day on the 440, making it her speciality. Deyhle one the other hand competes in several other events. Being a regional qualifier in the high jump a year ago, she has shown a great deal of flexibility and desire to perform in other events. Along with the 440 and high jump, Jenny also throws the shot and discus and runs the 3rd 440 on the mile relay.

The remaining three juniors on the squad are Kimbra Anderson, Lisa McAnear and Medina McAnear. These three girls run the mile or half-mile, which ever the team needs entries in. All three girls are spending many extra hours putting in long miles to train and prepare for their event.

Only two sophomores are running on the team this year. The first is Renee' Cosper. Renee' is another girl that has shown a lot of flexibility this year. She runs the first leg of both the 440 and 880 relays, and has also ran the opening leg of the mile relay. Other races that she has competed in this year include both the 100 and 220 dashes. Cosper also is a consistent performer in the long jump. The other sophomore performer is Jamie McAnear. Early in the season Jamie competed in the long distance races along with the rest of the McAnear clan, but due to injury has been limited only to the triple jump in the past few weeks.

This freshman class is well represented by eight runners. Two of these eight performers are distance runners. Bobbi Hightower in the mile and Cathy Mincey in the half mile. Both of these girls are steadily improving week by week. And they have both shown that they are willing to work for the honors they may receive in the future. Two more of this group are working to become top notch quarter-milers. Jackie Gardner and Anna Harrison both are improving daily. Jackie has ran some exceptionally good races but is lacking in the experience that is sure to come in seasons to come. Jackie is working to become a regional qualifier this year. Anna Harrison got off to a slow start on this competing season. After working all fall to be ready for season, Anna fell and injured her leg during workouts. But determination has kept Anna going and she is surely to be a strong performer in the future.

The real story lies with the remaining three freshmen - Calloway, Gardner and Hardin. Vanessa Calloway is by far the fastest girl on the team. She anchors the 440 relay and runs the 100 yard dash. After a slow start on the season at Shamrock with a 3rd place finish in the hundred and the 440 relay, she has dominated the dash as well as bring home the gold in the relay. She has turned in one of the fastest clocking in the 100 this year in the Panhandle with

a 11.4 clocking in the field events is a steady point scorer in both the triple jump and long jump, again turning in one of the longest jumps in the panhandle with a distance of 17'2 1/2" in the long jump.

Another strong performer can be found in Angela Gardner, a all-district selection in basketball this year as a freshman. Angela runs the second leg of the 880 relay, 2nd leg on the 440 relay and since the Shamrock meet has been a dominating force in the 220 dash with a clocking of 26.6 seconds. In the field events Angela is a steady performer in both the shot put and discus throw.

The last of this "Terrific Trio" is Kelli Hardin, an honorable mention all-district basketball player and also a freshman. Kelli anchors both the 880 relay, which is undefeated in its last three races, and the mile relay, with the strength and poise that she has shown in these two races she can surely be a dominating force in years to come.

In the field events Kelli is a consistent high placer in the high jump with a best of 5'0".

All of these girls are top notice performers and should bring many honors to their high school and town.

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The mail is beginning to increase as more and more of the bills that have been introduced come out of Committee. If a bill is the least bit controversial it usually gets some amendments and changes after the Committee hearings. The Constitution mandates that most routine bills must be sent to committees where hearings are held. Usually the least

controversial bills are passed out and finally reach the floor. As the Session Progresses, the bills will be more controversial. **TAX REFORM**
 Bob Davis, Chairman Ways and Means Committee, has had hearings on his bill that has all the property tax revision items in it. These are the ones we voted on last fall that was in the form of a Constitutional Amendment. The sparks will fly when this bill hits the floor. I'm sure there will be a lot of revision in the bill before it gets on the floor.
 This bill includes taxing land on productive value. All land owned by aliens is excluded. Timber land is included. This will be controversial. Certain intangibles are excluded. All household goods are exempt unless held or used for production of income. Two automo-

biles are exempt from taxation for each family. "Automobiles" means passenger cars or light trucks. If a person has more than two automobiles the exemption applies to the two with the highest market value. A homestead exemption is included. Elderly and disabled are given \$10,000 additional homestead if they qualify under economic needs test. Generally speaking, this includes elderly or disabled housing income of less than \$7,500.00. Property tax is frozen for these individuals and cannot be raised under most circumstances. This should give you an insight to this very important legislation.
 There are 31 State Senators in the Texas Senate in Austin. 18 of these are lawyers or 58%. There are 150 elected members in the House of Representatives. 57 of these are lawyers or 38%.

Some people get the idea that lawyers vote as a block. Nothing could be further from the truth. They are the most independent thinking and voting group down here. There have been 1361 bills introduced in the House up to March 1st. The Legislative Council is in the process of working on another 2600. **RED RIVER COMPACT**
 After many years of negotiation Texas and Oklahoma have reached an agreement on how they will share the water rights affecting the Red River Basin. Last week I signed as a co-sponsor of a bill that when enacted into law would be a binding agreement between Texas and Oklahoma. The Legislature in Oklahoma would have to do the same thing. There is much to this project. It could ultimately be the vehicle through which we import water from the Eastern United States.

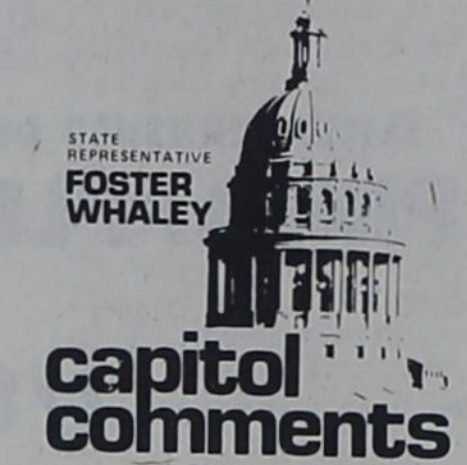

CELESTINE PINE'S CHERRY PIE
 How it's made, at its best, in North Carolina.
 2 cups sugar
 1 tablespoon all-purpose flour
 1 tablespoon waterground or regular white cornmeal
 4 large eggs
 1 teaspoon finely grated lemon rind
 1/4 cup lemon juice
 1/4 cup butter, melted
 1/4 cup milk
 Unbaked 9-inch pastry shell with edge turned under and crimped

In the large bowl of an electric mixer stir together the sugar, flour and cornmeal. Add the eggs; beat until thick and ivory color. Add the lemon rind, lemon juice and butter; beat just enough to mix. Pour into pastry shell. Bake in a preheated 350-degree oven on rack just below the center until the top is very brown and a knife inserted halfway between center and rim comes out clean - 50 to 60 minutes. Serve warm or cold.

 Minute Steaks Potatoes

STEAMED ARTICHOKE
 This method may be new to you.

Rinse 2 very large (each about 3/4 pound) artichokes. Cut off stems at base and discard. Cut artichokes in half lengthwise. Arrange halves, overlapping if necessary, in a steamer with a solid-bottom top or a steamer with a solid-bottom insert pan. Steam, tightly covered, over boiling water until the artichoke hearts are tender when pierced with a fork and a leaf pulls out easily - about 30 minutes. With a spoon, remove thistle part from the hearts and the small purplish inner leaves. With a kitchen scissors clip off thorny tops of leaves and discard. Cover and chill. Serve cold with homemade mayonnaise as a dip for the base of the leaves and a dressing for the hearts. Makes 4 servings.



March 14, 1979
 At this writing (3 13 79) the House has just finished debating Article I of House Bill 1060 (substitute for the original HB 1060). This bill has 13 separate articles and will implement the Tax Relief Amendment that carried by 82% in last November's election. Article I covers the appraisal of farm land on productive value. All of Tuesday, March 13, was used in debating this issue. A host of amendments to cripple this article were proposed by a small urban block. Almost all were turned down by a two to one margin. A few minor amendments for the improvement of the bill were incorporated. All losses suffered by a school district as a result of using the productivity method are to be repaid the school district from surplus in State Treasury.
 Today, we will take up Article II which deals with taxing timber land on productive value.
 Other articles deal with taxing intangible property, household goods and effects, motor vehicle exemptions, residence homestead, exemption for elderly, limit on tax increases, replacement of lost school district revenue and limiting Legislative Appropriations to growth factor in Texas. In my opinion, the debate on this bill will take the rest of this week.

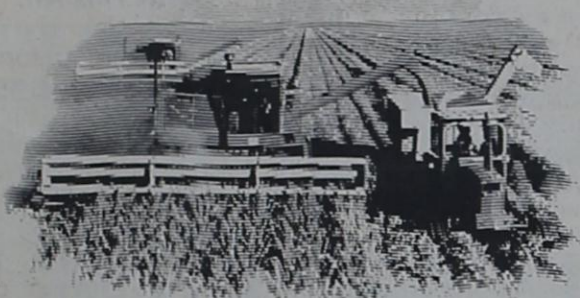

Texas Education Agency will test 78,850 students

The Texas Education Agency will test 78,850 elementary and secondary students April 3 - May 11 in order to assess statewide achievement in economic and career education.

Results of the tests, Phase II of the Texas Assessment Project, will be presented to the State Board of Education by January, 1980, according to Dr. M.L. Brockette, commissioner of education.

"We are continuing the Texas Assessment Project in order to meet the spirit of Senate Concurrent Resolutions 29 and 30 and Senate Bill 1 passed by the 65th Texas Legislature," Brockette points out.

"The results of these tests, like the earlier assessment, will provide information for regional and statewide planning as we work toward a more effective system of public education."

First elements of the Texas Assessment Project -- tests in reading, writing, mathematics, and citizenship -- were administered to some 94,000 public school students last spring. Results were presented to the State Board of Education in October and November.

Under the Phase II schedule, the following groups of students will be tested in two key areas: Economic education -- 22,450 fifth graders and 28,650 11th graders. Career education -- 14,625 eighth graders and 13,150 11th graders.

The economic education tests are designed to assess student learning in basic economics, the free enterprise system, the consumer education, according to Dorothy Davidson, Texas Education Agency associate commissioner for general education.

The economic education tests will be based on instruments developed by the Florida Department of Education.

"While we were able to use the Florida tests as a base, we revised some test items in order to make them more relevant to the Texas curriculum," Davidson explains.

The career education test packages will include a revision of instruments developed by the Texas Education Agency and used statewide on a smaller scale in 1975. The test items will

point toward career education categories of student objectives published by the Texas Education Agency in 1973.

These include: planning a career, getting and holding a job, responsibilities to the job, and the relationships between education and careers.

"These tests will continue our efforts to assess the Achievement of Texas students in learning areas which will enable them to function as adult Citizens in our society," Brockette says.

Instruction in economic education, including the free enterprise system, must be offered by Texas school districts. While career education is not mandated by law, it is a priority of the State Board of Education as well as a topic of high interest to the Texas Legislature, the Governor's Office, and the general public, Brockette adds.

The Phase II tests will, for the first time, gather information about school program characteristics believed to be keys to student learning.

"We will ask the schools for a limited amount of information about curriculum and instruction, teacher inservice, use of citizen advisory groups, school board policy statements, and other factors," Brockette explains.

Information gained from these program-oriented questions to school principals -- as well as the student test results -- will be compiled on a regional and statewide basis.

"We believe they will give us the information necessary to help plan improvements in public education throughout Texas," Brockette adds.

Phase II, like the earlier assessment, will not report any findings on individual schools, school districts, teachers, or students.

Results will be analyzed in relation to the ethnicity and sex of students, type and size of school districts, and home factors such as family economic status and language spoken in the home.
