1322 Pronghorn permits issued

The overall outlook for antelope is "average" as the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department issued a total of 1322 permits to the landowners with huntable populations of antelope on their property.

865 permits were issued in the Trans-Pecos, 21 in the Possum Kingdom and 436 in the Panhandle. Last year, 700 permits were issued in the Trans-Pecos with 408 pronghorns bagged by hunters.

The state-wide season is Sept. 30-Oct. 8 and hunters must obtain the permit from the landowner prior to hunting antelope. Lists of permit holders are located at most of the P&WD offices in West Texas. Hunters can also call the local Texas game warden for information on available permits in his district.





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

remedies do help. My favorite is are placed on antibiotics when Chex-it, which is a good decongestant and helps the cough. Usually a good cough syrup like Robitussin helps.

You can tell when this infection develops, because you will suddenly become worse, your fever will go over 100, and you will start coughing more. What you cough up will no longer be clear mucous, but colored yellow or green. That is the time Penicillin and other

For children with colds, the symptoms are the same. The temperature may go up to 100.5. but is easily controlled with aspirin. For them the best over the counter drug is a decongestant like Triaminic Expectorant. There are many such preparations for colds and your pharmacist will help you select one. As with adults, the third and fourth day or later is when complications can develop. In children this is a high fever that aspirin won't control. Children more than adults need antibiotics help, but not before. to be treated conservatively. The one exception is that person They shouldn't have antibiotics nce you get one? 




