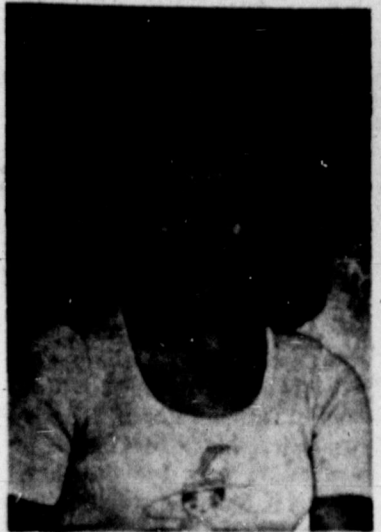


# The 27th Hedley Cotton Festival will be Friday and Saturday, 13 - 14.



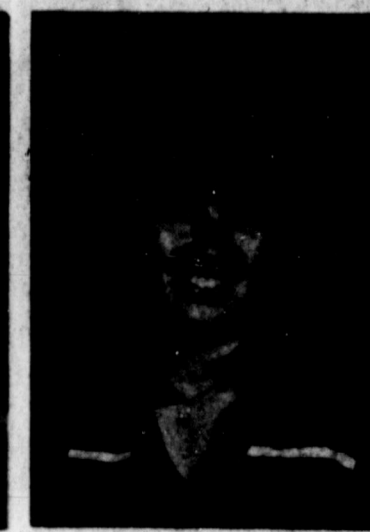

October in Donley County means Hedley Cotton Festival time and this year they will be celebrating the 27th of these outstanding events beginning with a kick-off breakfast Friday, October 13, and ending with a Square Dance beginning at 8:30 p.m. on Saturday, October 14, with Nicky Boom.

The breakfasts, to be held on Friday and Saturday morning, are open to the public and Clarendon, Lelia Lake and Memphis residents are to be seen there along with other persons from around the area, in addition to the folks of

Hedley. As usual breakfast will be served in the Lion's Club Hall.

The Old Settlers registration will be on Friday morning with a program to be held in the afternoon. Later will be the Amateur Contest for good entertainment.

Hedley's own home town boy, Ernie Houdashell, with KGNC Radio in Amarillo will be one of the celebrities present.

The annual bake sale held as a fund raising event to help individuals with the upkeep of Rowe Cemetery will have the usual delicious goodies to select

from.

## John Hill will visit Clarendon

Attorney General John Hill announced today his campaign for governor will visit several Northwest Texas and Panhandle towns during October 10-13 as part of a 10-day caravan swing through 285 towns across the state. Graham Hill, Hill's son who is an attorney in Houston, will lead the caravan that will start in Clarendon.

The 10 caravans will cover some 3,000 miles during the 4-day campaign stint. Towns to be visited include: October 10: Clarendon, Lelia Lake, Hedley, Memphis, Newlin, Estelline, and Childress.

October 11: the extreme eastern panhandle towns. October 12: the northern tier of

counties and October 13: Amarillo.

"Since we started the caravans during the Democratic Primary, we have sent out 50 caravans that have covered over 25,000 miles," Hill said. "My opponent is going to outspend me three to one, but we are going to counter that by reaching out to the people in every community we can possibly visit."

"People will beat money every time, and these caravans will put us in touch with the people who will carry us to victory on November 7."

Donley County Sheriff Truett Behrens took his bid for an increase in salary for his two deputies to the grievance committee last Wednesday and that body was unanimous in their decision for the salary increase.

Early in September Behrens requested, in writing, that the Donley County Grievance Committee be convened to hear his grievance relative to the deputies' salaries.

In reply to this letter W.R.

Christal, county judge, arranged a meeting of the grievance committee for September 22, 1978 at 2 p.m. and notified Behrens by letter. However the date was postponed when one of the members notified the county judge he could not be present.

In a letter to Sheriff Behrens, Judge Christal noted that every member of the grievance committee is required to be present to comply with Article 3912K,

## Records its third straight shutout

## Junior varsity beats Wellington 20-0

The Broncho defense recorded its third straight shut-out and the offense came through with the big 6 play as Clarendon won its third in a row, 20-0.

The defense received an early test when the offense surrendered a fumble on their own seventeen yard line on the third play from scrimmage. The tough Broncho defense proved that it was up to the task. When David Lane sacked the quarterback back at the twenty-seven the Broncho offense got the ball back and began their first scoring drive.

After two penalties put the ball on the thirty-seven yard line, Terry Putman went for six yards behind the blocks of Van Choate and Mark White. On the following play, Bobby Weatherston received fantastic blocking from Scott Lewis and Brian Murray and raced fifty-six yards for the first score of the evening. Brad Thompson took a perfect snap from Chris Ford on a fake extra point play and hit Randy White in the corner of the end zone to make the score 8-0.

Tommy Lane made a fine play on the following to give Wellington the ball at their own forty but they couldn't advance it and were forced to punt. Hosea Hearn returned it to the Bronc thirty-five yard line.

The Broncos had a fine drive going before a fumble deep in Sky Rocket territory ended it at the thirteen. The Rockets picked up two first downs before Scott Lewis got to the quarterback for a big loss to stop the move.

Clarendon took over at the Sky Rocket forty-six yard line where Jeff Topper made a fine catch with a man hanging all over him, a pass from Lance Thornberry for thirty-six yards and a first down at the Wellington ten. From there Thornberry did it himself rolling around left end for the touchdown to make the score fourteen to nothing at halftime.

Strong efforts by both Rick Hayes and Alton Gaines on the opening series of the third quarter forced Wellington to punt to the Bronco sixteen yard line where the Broncs started their final scoring drive of the night.

To begin the drive, Terry Putman picked up ten yards and Bobby Weatherston twenty behind excellent blocking to put the ball on the forty-six

where the drive stalled. Brad Thompson dropped back in punt formation and got excellent blocking from the offensive and hit Randy White on a fifty-four yard bomb for the final touchdown to make the score 20-0. Tommy Lane's extra point try was rushed and the ball bounced off of the upright as the kick for point failed.

Wellington drove the ball inside the Clarendon twenty

five yard line twice in the fourth quarter but the stout Bronco defense continually came up with the big play to thwart the Rocket scoring hopes.

In the Broncos first three games this season, they have scored eighty points while giving up none. They try to keep their streak alive this week as they take on the Memphis Cyclones today in Clarendon.

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## Bronchos to play Childress Friday

The Clarendon Bronchos, after taking a Friday night off, will be host to the AA Childress Bobcats tomorrow night. Childress will be coming into the game at 4-0 while the Bronchos are 2-1. The Bobcats surprised everyone with the lopsided score it put on Wellington last week 43-12. The 12 points are the only ones yielded by the Bobcat defense this year - and they came late in the 4th Quarter; but, the No. 1 Defense was still in the game. All of Childress's victories have come at the hands of Class A schools. The only common opponent between the teams has been Quanah. Clarendon defeated them 28-14 and Childress 34-0. Kick-off will be 8 p.m.

Coach Allen's remarks on Childress:

Childress has had everything going "right" for them the last few years. They've been in the playoffs seven of the last eight years, and during the past three seasons, they've played 14 playoff games. This is pride and tradition but Clarendon has pride and tradition too. We are not awed by them because our kids believe in what we are doing and believe they can whip Childress. We realize we must play a near perfect game. That means no turnovers which will make it easy for them. Field position for us will be an important factor. Childress had such a near perfect performance against Wellington, we're hoping that was their one of the year.

Childress will be guided by #12 Perry Moren, (195) Jr. Qb. He is a good passer and is a definite threat running too. They will run from a set formation, Wing T. #40 Ricky Anderson, (163) is a returning offensive back. He was

an All-District performer last year. #82 Mart Morey (183) had a good night catching the ball against Wellington. On defense they are big. #62 Linebacker Larry Eggers (191) is a good football player. Their front line will average 195. They will use four or five both ways and will run defensively a 27, 4-3 front. We will go with our same line-ups that we have the first three weeks.

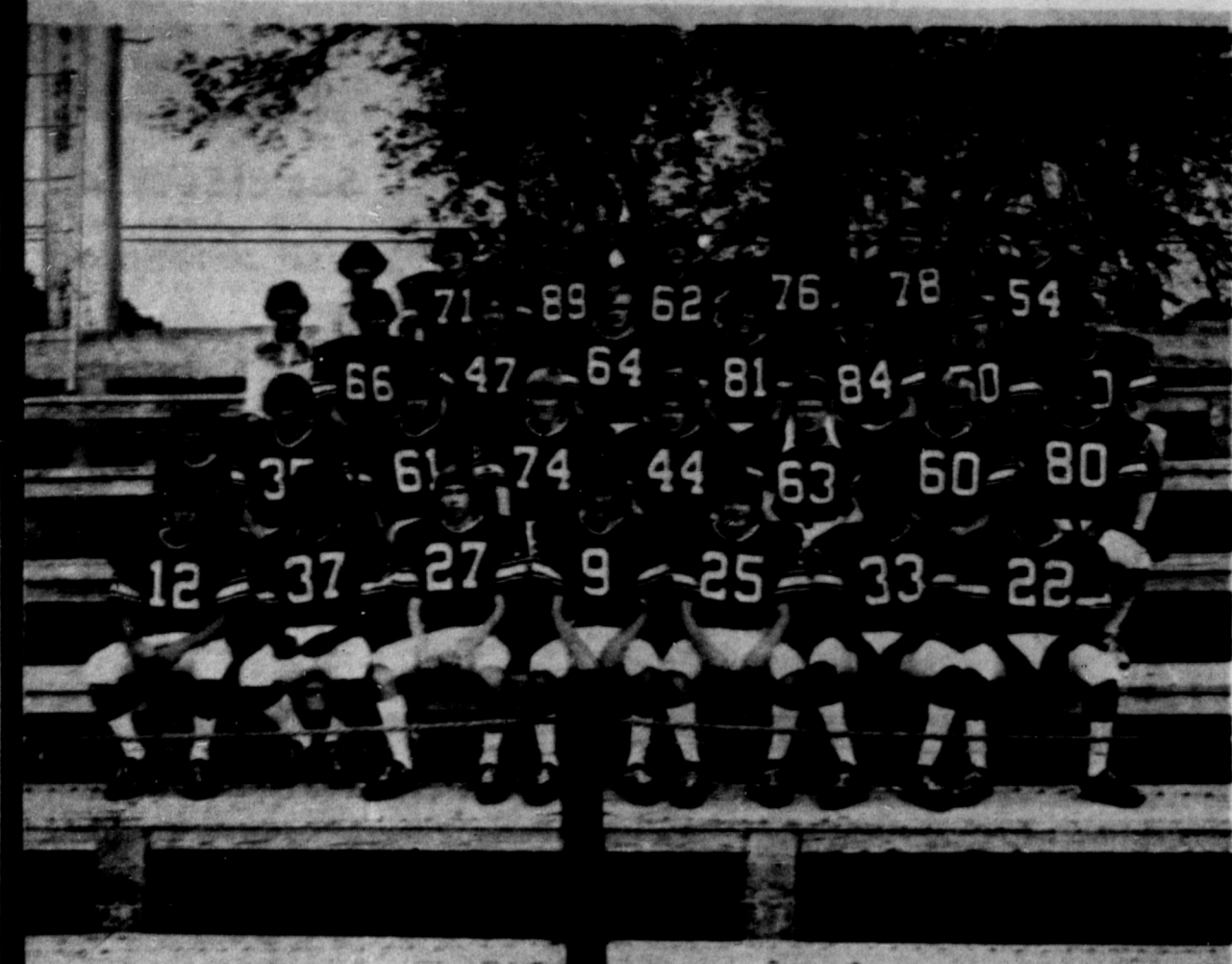

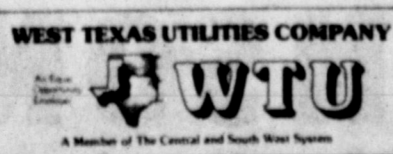
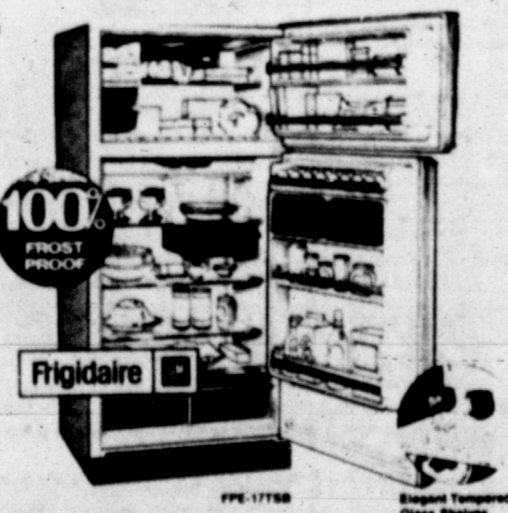

### Health hints for today

**COLDS.** The common cold uses more loss of time from work than any other illness. Some of us have them frequently and others seem never to have colds. Just what is a cold? Well, it is one of many adenoviruses that affects the upper respiratory tract. It starts with sneezing, a runny nose, a sore throat for a day or two and eventually a cough. These symptoms may vary, but most colds follow this pattern. It is important to note that the sore throat only lasts a day or a day and one half. The cough commences about the third day. What can be done for a cold once you get one? Well, Distan, Quilil, Contac and other

remedies do help. My favorite is Chex-it, which is a good decongestant and helps the cough. Usually a good cough syrup like Robitussin helps. The only time an antibiotic will help a cold is when secondary infection develops. This occurs the third or fourth day or later. You can tell when this infection develops, because you will suddenly become worse, your fever will go over 100, and you will start coughing more. What you cough up will no longer be clear mucous, but colored yellow or green. That is the time Penicillin and other antibiotics help, but not before. The one exception is that person with chronic lung disease, such as emphysema. Those persons

are placed on antibiotics when the cold starts. For children with colds, the symptoms are the same. The temperature may go up to 100.5, but is easily controlled with aspirin. For them the best over the counter drug is a decongestant like Triaminic Expectorant. There are many such preparations for colds and your pharmacist will help you select one. As with adults, the third and fourth day or later is when complications can develop. In children this is a high fever that aspirin won't control. Children more than adults need to be treated conservatively. They shouldn't have antibiotics for a cold unless they really need them. An infant or child

needs to build their immunity to the germs they meet in everyday life. We adults have already developed that immunity.

You may have good immunity to colds, but remember that colds are related to the number of the germs you receive. Stay away from someone with a severe cough, sore throat and runny nose. If you do get a cold, treat it properly, with rest, liquids and simple over the counter remedies. See your doctor only for the complications which he can help. He can't cure your cold.

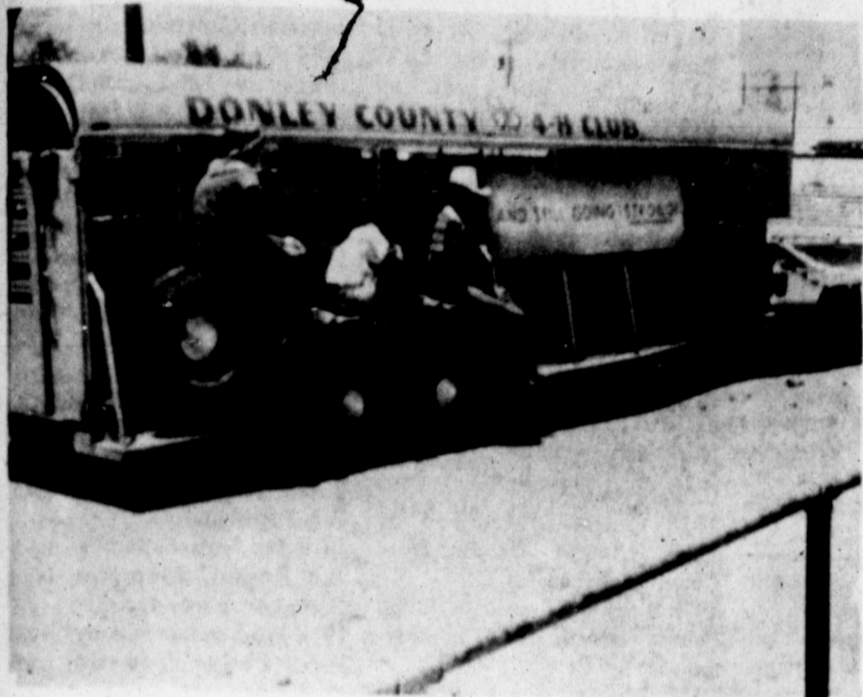

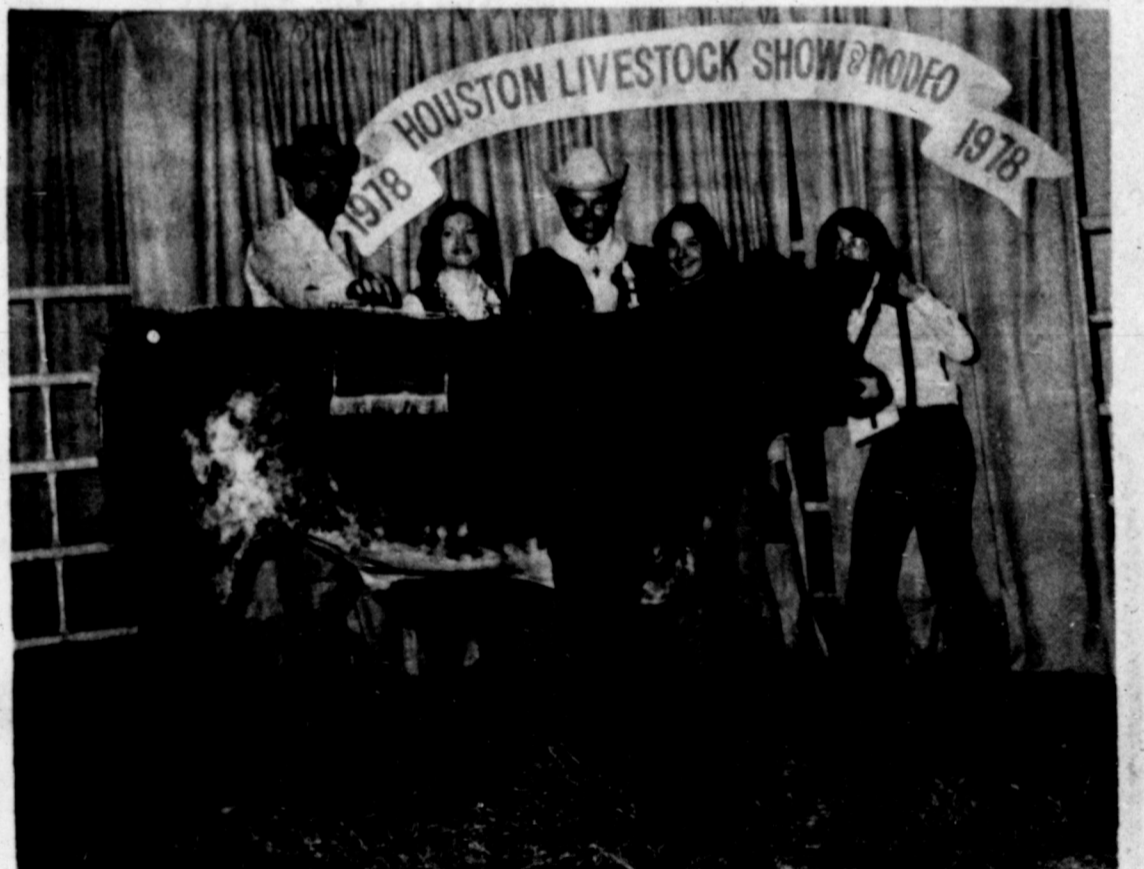

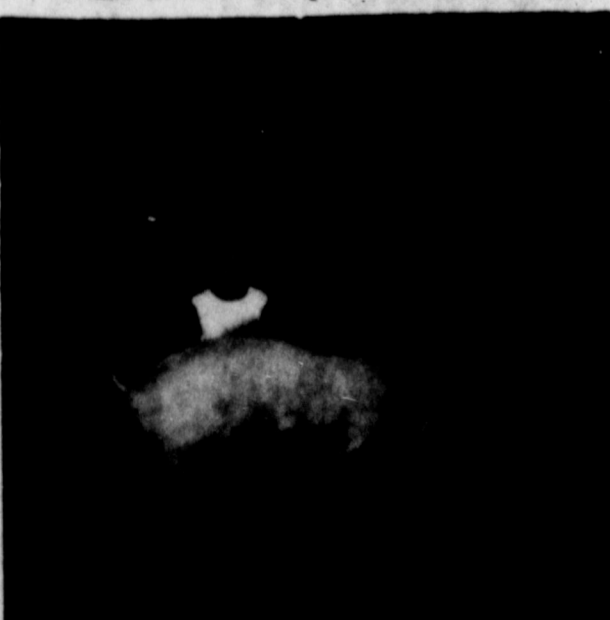
