J. R. Gillham, local F.F.A. Adviser, was advised by mail from the state F.F.A. headquarters today that his F.F.A. chapter had won their second consecutive F.F.A. Swine Production Contest in competition with the 689 other chapters in the state. The contest is sponsored by the Texas Swine Breeders Association and carries a cash award of \$100 and a silver plaque for the 1940,1941 contest



BARBARISM IN OKLAHOMA

Authors and publishers in all parts of the United States are making justified protest against what the Publishers' Weekly calls this country's most disheartening assaults on the freedom of speech guarantees of the Bill of Rights in recent years. These assaults have taken place in Oklahoma and include the book-burning episode in the stadium last year, the inences and \$5,000 fines on three men and a woman for having radical books in their possession and the indictment of eight others on similar charges.



NOTICE **TAXPAYERS**

House Bill No. 76, passed recently by the Legislature and signed by the Governor, releases all penalty and interest on State and County Ad Valorem Taxes, both real and personal, that were delinquent before July 1, 1940.

If you have any such delinquent State and County Taxes, you may take advantage of this complete interest and penalty remission NOW by paying-

ALL TAXES DUE

If a lien holder wants to pay all the delinquent taxes on the property on which he holds a lien, it will be necessary for him to pay a penalty of 6 per cent, unless all the taxes on all other property owned by the taxpayer, both personal and real, are paid at the same time. The above rule also applies to the owner of the property.

THIS LAW EXPIRES NOVEMBER 1, 1941

(This law does not affect 1940 taxes. The usual penalty will be collected on delinquent taxes for 1940.)

Under the Penalty Remission Bill, all penalty and interest are released if all delinquent taxes are paid.

Your 1941 State and County Taxes may be paid after October 1, 1941 with a Discount of 3% during the Month of October, 2% during November and 1% during December. No Discounts allowed during January, 1942.


