



There are a living room, dining room, kitchen, foyer, 1/2 inch AA plywood used in the three bedrooms and a bath in the three stories of the house. Real miniature bricks are chimney and have to be

> grouted. The roof is hinged and lifts and the front of the house is also hinged. The front hinge is a piano hinge used because of the weight of the front wall. The windows raise and lower also.

Inside the walls are covered with fabric, vinyl and wall paper. The wood work is made from little wood strips to trim out the interior. Later the house will be electrified but its owner is of tender years and for safety's sake the wiring will come several years later. Plumbing is dummied in but fixtures are authentic, just miniatures.



One of the small cotton gins I saw was about 5 feet high and 3 x 4 feet in length and width. I had never seen anything like it. It was operated by electricity. One woman was putting cotton in at the top and another was sacking it up as it came out the bottom; another was tending to the seed in someway.

This was a gin for a small work unit. They said they had some larger gins for larger work units, but these people ginned their own cotton and took the ginned cotton to another place where it was baled. I saw some baled cotton and the bales appeared to be about 200 pounds.

Along the countryside, camels, sometimes hooked alongside a donkey, were pulling carts; others were being pulled by oxen. There were some small ractors, but these were in rarest form. There were also a lot of small two-wheeled carts pulled by one man or woman. City workers traveled from their homes to work on a sea of bicy-

Many rural Chinese lived in communes. I was able to visit a commune of about 13,000 families totaling about 57,000 people. Communes are broken down into brigades, which are 'communities''. At one brigade we went into a home and were greeted by a Chinese woman who was very proud to have us inspect her house.

The house had a large room downstairs with a concrete floor

and very simple furniture--two beds, a table, a small sewing Wood stoves need care machine, along the walls, and several chairs, including some chairs for children. She said that

> The warm glow of a cheerful fire in a wood burning stove may be irresistible. But before this cozy scenario becomes a reality, there is work to be done, says the Insurance Information Institute's Texas Insurance Information Center (TIIC).

Improperly installed stoves-most notably the potbelly, the box, the Franklin--can be fire hazards in disguise.

The Institute advises potential stove owners to follow some important guidelines set forth by the National Fire Protection Association (NFPA) and Underwriters' Laboratories (UL) for purchasing, installing and operating a wood burning

The following guidelines are essential for safety:

-- Select a stove made of sturdy material such as cast iron or steel. Look for those listed by UL or other recognized testing laboratories. Used stoves should be checked carefully for cracks or other defects.

SCS estimates soil loss

Estimating soil loss from cropland is just part of the job of the Soil Conservation Service, according to Jim Donaho, SCS District Conservationist serving the Donley County Soil and Water Conservation District.

The real task is helping farmers with conservation management and erosion control practices that will bring the soil loss down to limits where the soil will remain productive for years to come.

"Many fields in Donley County are still losing too much soil to maintain a constant level of productivity over a long period of time," says Donaho. "Many farms are actually losing 10 or more tons of soil per acre every year, which is excessive."

"If these erosion rates continue, nothing will be left eventually but the subsoil and this land usually has to be converted to pasture or trees. Even then it's not very productive," Donaho said.

The Donley County Soil and Water Conservation District is making an effort to get farmers to request assistance in estimating the soil loss on their cropland. In most cases, conservation practices can be applied to reduce these losses to a point where the land remains productive and farmers still make a profit.

"In the long run, conservation pays," says Jack Moreman, Member of the Donley Soil and Water Conservation District. "Bringing soil losses down on cropland in Donley County will not only benefit the farmer but will benefit everyone who depends on farm crops. I believe that takes in everyone."

Would you rather keep your topsoil 36 years or 2,000 years? A foolish question? Not according to conservationists

with the U.S. Soil Conservation Service, who say it is relevant to land management practices in the United States today. "We know that continuously

cultivating certain row crops, cotton for example, up and down the hill with no soil cover can cause a loss of an inch of topsoil in less than five years," Jim Donaho, district conservationist for SCS of Clarendon said. "This may not sound like much, but at this rate eight inches will be lost in 36 years. This is more topsoil than most conservationists can have a

farms have," he added.

"On the other hand," Donaho said, "there are proven, practical conservation methods that can be used on this same land producing the same crop, which will extend the life of the eight inches of topsoil indefinitely.'

How does the SCS estimate soil losses and come up with such widely-separated predic-

"Conservationists can take known conditions -- soil type, rainfall, steepness of slope, length of slope, and so forth-and feed them into a 'Universal Soil Loss Equation,' and come up with a reasonable prediction of soil losses," Donaho explained.

'This method is not theoretical, but is based on 50 years of research by the USDA's Science and Education Administration and State Agricultural Experiment stations, plus the accumulated experience of the Soil Conservation Service," Donaho said.

The following table is an example of predicted soil losses on a real cropland soil under different kinds of management. This example is a silt-loam soil with a gentle slope (2 to 5 percent) with an eight-inch layer of topsoil:

(A) Plowing up and down the hill, no crop residue on surface. Continuous corn. Avg. annual soil loss 36 tons per acre, 4.5 years to lose 1 inch of topsoil, 36 years to lose 8 inches of topsoil.

(B) Terraced, contoured, plowed in the fall, no residue on surface. Continuous corn. Avg. annual soil loss 13 ton per acre, 13 years to lose 1 inch of topsoil, 104 years to lose 8 inches of

(C) Terraced, contoured tilled in spring with a ton of residue left on surface (minimum tillage). Continuous corn. Avg. annual soil loss 7.5 tons per acre, 22 years to lose 1 inch of topsoil, 176 years to lose 8 inches of topsoil.

(D) Planted without plowing (no till), crop residue on surface all year. Terraced and contoured. Continuous corn. Avg. annual soil loss .6 tons per acre, 178 years to lose 1 inch of topsoil, 2,224 years to lose 8 inches of topsoil.

"The Universal Soil Loss Equation was developed so

systematic means of helping landowners decide on management of soil under various conditions," Donaho continued.

"The management shown on line A of the table is just about as bad as you can do," Donaho said. By adding terraces and contouring, as shown on the (B) second line, we can extend the soil's useful life up to 104 years.

"But look at the difference crop residue can make. Line C shows what happens when we use minimum tillage methods which leave about a ton per acre triends of man of straw, stems, and leaves on the surface. This procedure extends the expected life of the topsoil to 176 years.

'But if all known, practical conservation methods are used, as shown on the last line, the topsoil will last 2,224 years. Naturally, we think that in this length of time, by the use of crop residues and through normal processes, the soil will not really be lost at all, but will be usable indefinitely."

"Of course, soil erosion is always more damaging than we realize because erosion is just the first step in environmental and social degradation," Donaho said. "Every farmer knows that it takes more power and more fertilizer to try to maintain production on an eroded soil. The inevitable result of erosion is lower yields, higher production costs, and higher prices in the marketplace.

'We should also remember that the eroded soil doesn't just Russell's viper is used to treat disappear.
