## Wayne Naylor new pastor First Baptist Church Hedley

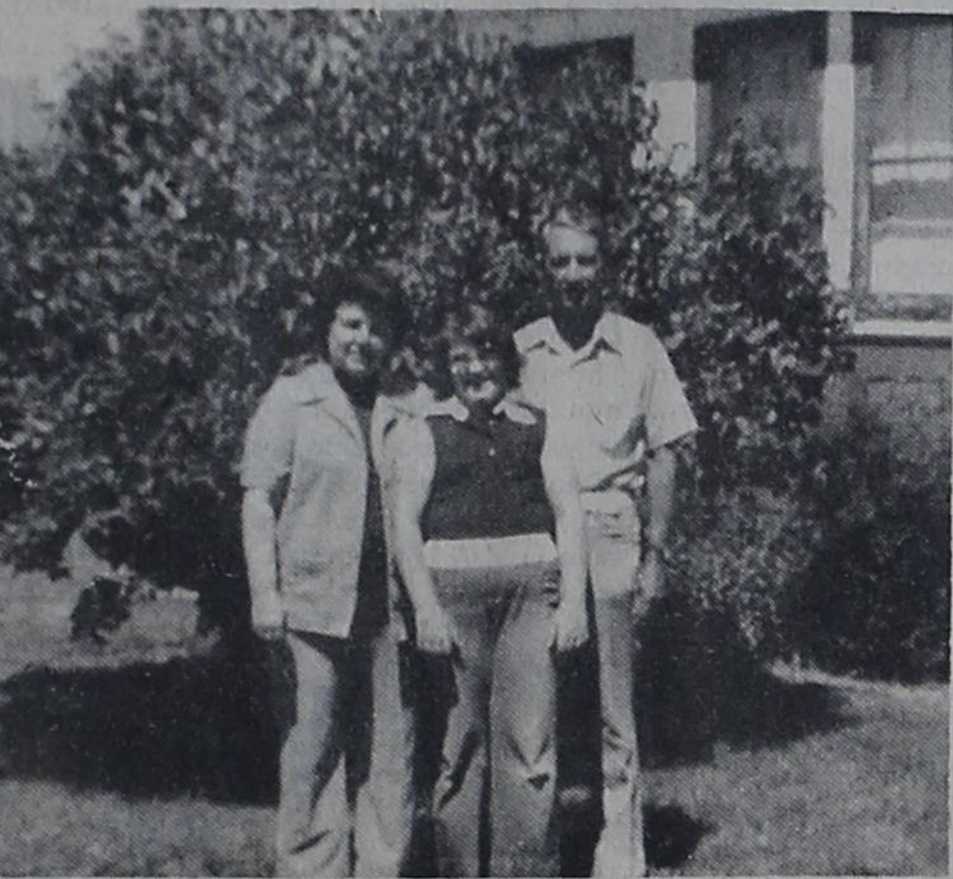
Wayne Naylor is the new pastor at First Baptist Church Hedley, Texas.

## Storm signal information

With spring and the severe storm season upon us it is time to explain the use of fire sirens as a weather alert or warning system for the citizens of Clarendon, when tornado warnings are issued for our area.

It must be emphasized that neither the Sheriff's office nor the Fire Department can tell you exactly when and where a tornado will hit. The individual must NOT rely entirely on these two organizations for information before taking safety precautions.

They will do their best to alert the public when severe weather is approaching Clarendon but it is the responsibility of each person to watch storm clouds and on their own initiative go to a place of safety if it appears necessary, whether the siren has blown or not. ABOVE ALL DO NOT CALL THE FIRE STATION TO CHECK ON THE WEATHER. THE LINE MUST BE KEPT OPEN FOR FIRE REPORTS. IT COULD BE YOUR HOUSE BURNING AND A BUSY SIGNAL AT THE FIRE STATION.

Your TV stations and radio stations are good sources of information for the latest weather bulletins concerning weather conditions. However nothing will equal the old eyeball once over if a cloud has been building since it was last reported, or if it has spent itself and becomes a pussycat.

For your information, with a suggestion to clip and save, here are the warning signals listed below:

1 BLAST of Siren: out of town or grass fire.

3 BLASTS: Building

2 BLASTS - Severe weather or tornado approaching -- Two blasts will be repeated several times.

Remember, this alert is just to get citizens to look at the clouds and make their own decisions as to whether to seek shelter.

Applications for all ASCS Programs will be given equal consideration without regard to race, color, sex, creed or national origin.

**Program Signup**

In order to be eligible for program benefits, you must sign an Intention to Participate during the designated signup. Signup is now in progress and will continue through April 30, 1979.

**Wheat Certification**

The final date to certify wheat acreage is May 1, 1979. This is only one day later than the final date to sign an Intention to Participate; therefore, measure your wheat and be ready to certify when you sign up. **Remember: Measure your acreage carefully.** You could lose all program benefits if the certification is incorrect. Measurements made in this office are not official unless we visit the farm and furnish measurements on an official notice.

**Grazing and Hay Program for 1979 Wheat**

A producer may be allowed to graze cattle or cut hay on wheat acreage equal to the larger of 40 percent of the intended planting of wheat, feed grain and upland cotton, or 50 acres. Wheat acreage designated under the grazing and hay program that is grazed or cut for hay would qualify for the same deficiency payment as wheat harvested for grain. The only payment you could receive is a deficiency payment provided one is made. Participants must comply with the NCA permitted acres.

**Oats Baled For Hay in 1979 Will Be An NCA Crop**

Oats, wheat, barley or rye are all NCA crops. If one of these crops is planted and harvested (by baling, grazing, or for grain) after it reaches the "DOUGH" stage, it will be considered to be a mature crop and will count as an NCA crop.

**Final Grazing Date**

The County Committee has determined that the final date to graze wheat intended for harvest as grain is April 1, 1979. In other words, the committee feels that if wheat for grain is grazed after April 1, it will damage the grain production.

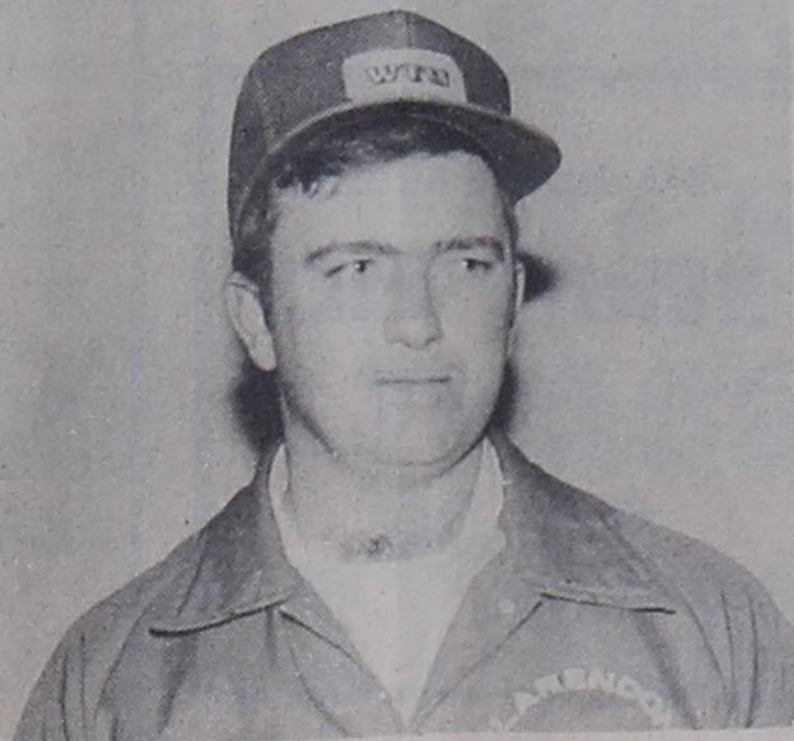
**Compliance Activities "Change"**

In our last newsletter, we impressed on you that there would not be any penalties, if a producer missed his certification by more than 5 percent, he would be out of the program. This is no longer true. We NOW have failure to fully comply provisions. If a producer misses his certification by more than 5 percent, but less than 10 percent, he will be eligible for program benefits, provided the county committee determines a good faith effort was made and he pays the penalty. If your certified acreage differs from the measured acreage by more than the larger of 2 acres or 10 percent, and the county committee determines a good faith effort was made, the case must go to the State Committee for

Enrollment figures released by Loyd Waters, Dean of Clarendon College - Pampa Center reflects that 546 students have or are attending the Center since the college opened in January.

**Lions Tale**

The Clarendon Lions Club held its regular meeting at noon on Tuesday with thirty members, one new member, and three guests present. Our new member is Charles Rushing and is sponsored by Lion Homer Estlack.

Following the regular opening ceremony Boss Lion Courtney recognized Lion Tex Selvidge who introduced Mrs. Eula Merrell who is connected with the Green Thumb organization sponsored by the National Farmers Union and funded by the federal government through the Department of Labor. Mrs. Merrell then introduced Mr. John Keith who is District Director for the Green Thumb organization and is over twenty-eight counties. Mr. Keith brought our program. He explained that the Green Thumb program involves work with elderly people. One person in five in rural areas is age 65 or over. Inflation is the number one problem of elderly people today. Average life expectancy is now 74 years. There are more people above age 65 now working than ever before.

Assistance to the elderly through the Green Thumb program is accomplished in three ways. Elderly people may be employed at \$2.90 per hour by Green Thumb for up to twenty-four hours per week in community non-profit organizations. The ultimate goal here is to move an elderly worker from Green Thumb employment to the regular work force.

Another way is a job training program whereby an employer may be reimbursed 40% of the salary of an elderly worker who is being trained. The third way which Green Thumb helps is by attempting to locate jobs for anyone over age 45. There are currently ten people involved in the Green Thumb program locally which represents combined monthly salary income of over \$2000.

Another guest, who arrived a little late, was Doreen Miley, District Scout Executive. Doreen told us that one of our members, Lion Estlack, was honored at a banquet in Pampa last Saturday night at which time he received the Silver Beaver Award in Scouting. Congratulations, Lion Estlack!

provisions, set-aside cannot be grazed for a 6 month period during the growing season. The non-grazing period is from May 1 through October 31, 1979. Remember, set-aside must be protected from wind and water erosion.

**Agricultural Conservation Program**

The County Committee has announced a sign-up for the LTA (Long Term Agreement) program. This program will allow us to write a contract with you to carry out conservation practices during a period of 3 to 5 years. All planning and technical responsibility is assigned to the Soil Conservation Service. The sign-up will end May 1, 1979. There are limited funds for this program; therefore, only a few applications can be approved.

**Foreign Land Owners**

Foreign persons owning agricultural land are required by law to register such ownership with the County ASCS office where the tract of land is located for administrative purposes. The deadline for filing the required forms with the ASCS office is as follows:

1. On or before the 90th day following the acquisition or disposition of any tract of agricultural land on or after February 2, 1979, or
2. On or before August 2, 1979, where a foreign person owned any interest in agricultural land on February 1, 1979.

**Program Crop Yields**

A notice of yields will be furnished for each farm that raised program crops in 1978. Producers have 15 days from date of yield notice to request a proven yield for each wheat, feed grain and 30 additional days to furnish production data

when an appeal is timely filed. Beginning in 1979, current year crop acreage must be reported and production data furnished for all farms in the county and adjoining counties in

which the operator has an interest if the farm is to be credited with a proven yield for any of the next 3 program years. This time limit for reporting acreage is set to assure opportunity to check the acreage.

If you plan to prove your yield, the following applies:

1. You must have acreage of the crop all three years of the base period and proven production each year. This requirement may be waived for 1976, 1977 or 1978 if there was no acreage that year or producer is unable to reconstruct production evidence. In such cases, we will average the yield proven for each year with the established yield for each other year.
2. File an acreage report for the 1976 crop year showing all the crops grown on a farm. In most cases, you don't have 1976 acreage unless you filed for disaster.
3. Production evidence for 1976, 1977 and 1978 will have to be submitted and must be separated for each year.
4. Producers whose records are used to prove yields for one farm shall report data for all farms in the county and adjoining counties in which they had an interest in any years for which the yields are to be proven. The evidence should be separated and identified for each farm. If you prove the yield on one farm, you must prove and accept the yield on all other farms you operate.

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### Bronchos win two championships

The Clarendon Broncho Track Team won two meets in as many days as they took the team championships at Lefors and Memphis. Competing in the Top of Texas Relays Friday at Lefors, the Bronchos made an impressive showing again in miserable weather. This victory was extra sweet in that they outdistanced old district rival Wellington 112-76. The Bronchos brought home First Place Medals in the 440 yard relay (45.5- Season's Best), Gary McClellan in the 100 yard dash and Long Jump, Mickey McGuire in the Shot, and the ever consistent Keith Floyd in the High Jump. It was truly a team victory - the Bronchos failed to point in only the two Hurdle Races.

On Saturday, the Broncho depth overpowered Valley and host Memphis to win the Cyclone Relays. The Bronchos scored big in every event to win the Team Trophy with 230 points. 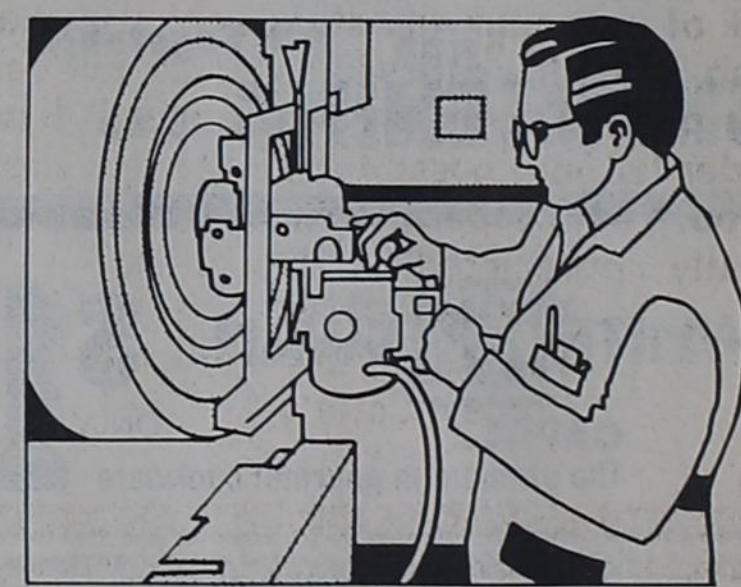

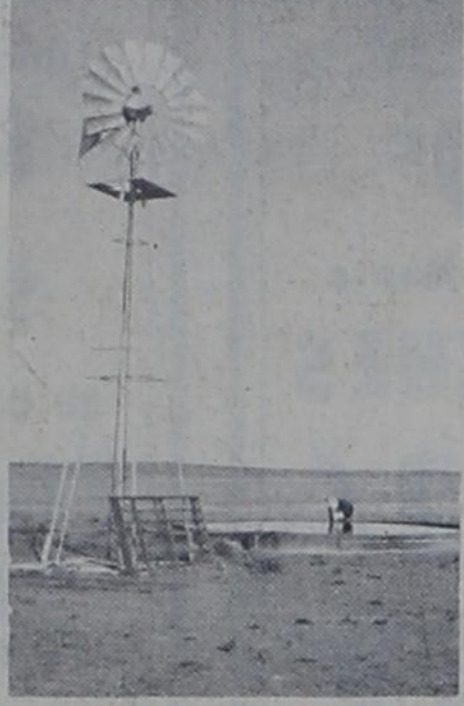

They also acquired a knowledge of logistical support procedures and of the mission, capabilities and employment of missile systems support units. ## Intensive Grazing Systems

Most of the Panhandle has received good winter moisture and there are high prospects for an excellent spring growing season. These conditions should be ideal for starting an intensive grazing system, according to Gary Briggs, Range Conservationist with the Soil Conservation Service in Pampa. An intensive grazing system is a method of grazing in which the rest periods for pastures are longer than the grazing period. This type of grazing is also known as High Intensity - Low Frequency (HI-LF), one herd, or short duration systems.

"The concept of intensive grazing systems is relatively simple," states Briggs. "Livestock is grouped into one herd and systematically rotated through a series of pastures. The number of pastures usually varies from 4 to 12. The length of the grazing period for each pasture is based on the amount of forage produced in that particular pasture. Generally, a pasture is grazed for 20 to 60 days and then rested for 4 to 12 months. The rotation system should be designed so a pasture is not grazed at the same time every year."

"There are many advantages associated with an intensive grazing system," reports Jim Donaho, District Conservationist with the Soil Conservation Service in Clarendon. "The chief benefit is that this system

will allow rangeland to produce more total pounds of beef at less-cost than with any other type of grazing. There is more uniform grazing distribution with this system, thus, more efficiently utilizing all forage in the pasture. Livestock is forced to use weeds and other less desirable plants as well as the high quality grasses that they normally use."

Also, because there is only one herd in only one pasture, there is a substantial reduction in labor, especially during winter feeding periods when cows are calving, or other times when livestock need to be watched closely. This system provides flexibility in herd management during drought, since the rancher has a better opportunity to analyze forage on hand versus rate of regrowth in grazed pastures. Finally, this system of grazing causes an improvement in range condition thus making the land more productive.

"While it is well known that a well-managed intensive grazing system will greatly improve productivity, there are many things which should be considered before implementing such a system," emphasizes Briggs. Extra fencing may be needed as there should be at least five pastures in the system. A short duration system will require more and better watering facilities. By the same token working pens will need to be equipped to handle larger numbers of livestock at one time. Also, there will be extra labor needs while working cattle, but overall, there is less labor and expense involved.

Since livestock is more concentrated, they will need to be

watched closely for signs of stress. Kind, timing, and amounts of supplemental feed will need to be monitored. Stocker operations may require continuous supplemental feeding in some cases. There may be some livestock movement problems with dogged calves, but these can be minimized with proper pasture layout. It is probably

better to begin an intensive grazing system with younger cattle as they seem to respond more efficiently than older animals that are used to less concentrated conditions.

According to Briggs, "A well managed intensive grazing system should help each rancher to run more cattle at less expense while improving the range condition."

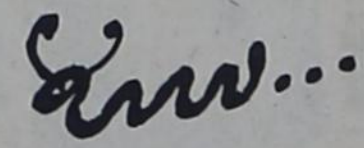

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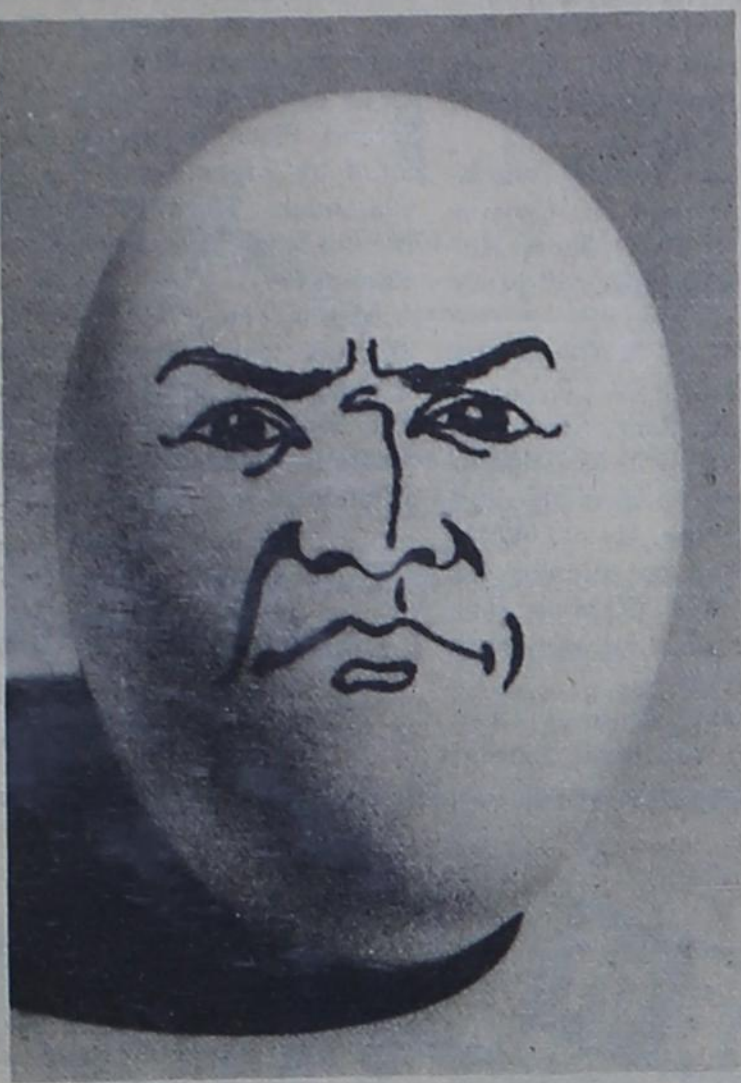
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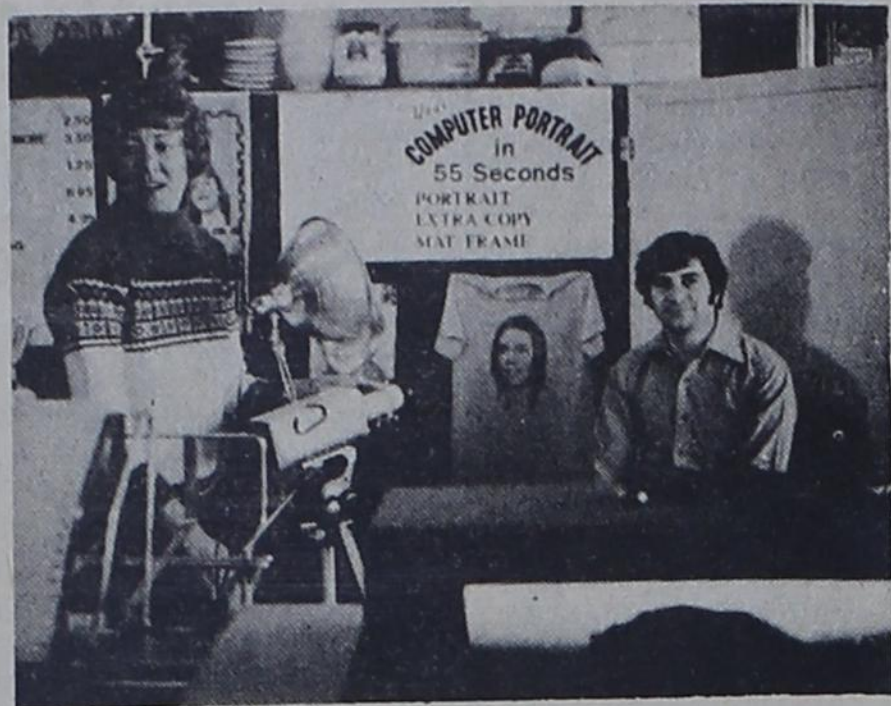

### Senator Price votes "no"

Senator Bob Price, R-Pampa, cast one of two "no" votes against Senate Bill No. 312, designed to take away all local utility rate making power from local municipalities Monday in the Senate Economic Development Committee.

Senator O.H. (Ide) Harris, R-Dallas, also voted "no" on S.B. 312. However, the bill was voted out of committee 5-2.

Senator Price told the committee that there was no way he could ignore the wishes of the majority of the people in the municipalities of the 31st Senatorial District who want to maintain at least some checks and balances in the rate making process.

"Utility companies argue that

it is a waste of taxpayers money to have our city councils involved in the process," said Senator Price. "The utilities say the case is appealed to the Public Utility Commission anyway. However, the record shows that cities have been able to effectively reduce rate increase requests by utilities. I still feel that the locally elected people who run city government should have input in the process."

Testifying against the bill was Mayor R.D. Wilkerson of Pampa. Wilkerson, speaking for the mayors of the 31st Senatorial District, told the committee that if local governments were left out of the process, they might just as well "throw in the towel."

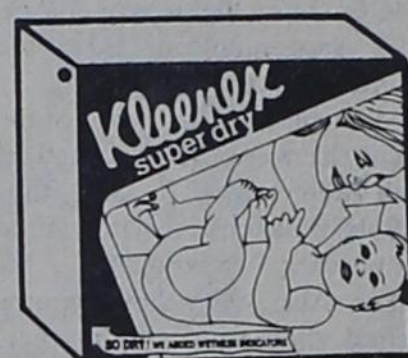


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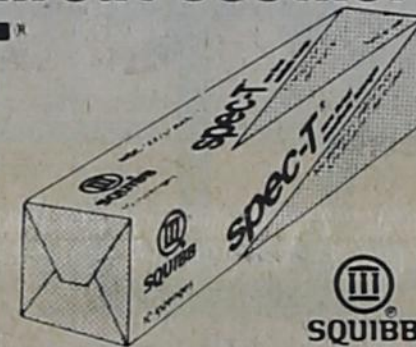
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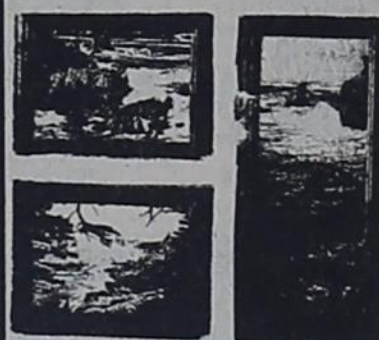
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
