Bronchos zip to first victory by beating Quanah 28-14

The Clarendon Bronchos surged into the win column Friday night with a 28-14 victory over the Quanah Indians. The Bronchos' offensive attack was led by Sr. halfback Billy Gardner and Sr. quarterback Gary McClellan with some fine blocking from the right side of the Broncho offensive line. Jr. tight end Tim Brown sprung Gardner on numerous occasions that turned into long gainers. On the night Gardner rushed 23 times for 301 yds. and 3 TD's. McClellan also had a fine night running and throwing the ball. He rushed the ball 7 times for 93 yds., 1 TD, and threw a 25 yd. scoring strike to Billy Gardner. McClellan was on target 6 of 7 passes for 74 yds. and 0 interceptions.

Coach Allen gave his praises to the offensive showings of Gardner and McClellan and the defensive blocking of Tim Brown, Barry Hightower, and Phil Moreman. On defense he pointed to Hightower, Larry Davis, Mickey McGuire, Shawn Barker, and Mark Wilson as having outstanding defensive efforts. Terry Cole also played well at defensive end.

Quanah won the toss and elected to receive the opening kick-off. Lynn Thompson kicked off for the Bronchos and put the Indians inside the 30 for their first possession. Quanah kicked two first downs in moving the ball to midfield. But, the Bronchos held on downs at the 50 and punted with the Bronchos getting their first possession at the 20. However, the Bronchos ran two plays and McClellan fumbled the snap with Quanah recovering. The Indians four plays later, though, coughed the ball up with Larry Davis causing the fumble and recovering it at the 11. After picking up one first down, Gardner burst through the right side and the race was on. He was finally brought down after a 53 yd. gain on the Indian 30 yd. line. McClellan drew first scoring blood on a fine 50 yd. run. He eluded a good rush and began up field, darting and dodging defenders and made it into the end zone with 6:31 remaining in the 1st quarter. Lynn Thompson kicked the extra point and the Bronchos had the lead 7-0.

The Clarendon Bronchos fresh off a 28-14 victory over the Quanah Indians travel to Stinnett Friday night to meet the Rattlers. The Rattlers will be coming off a 10-7 victory over Canadian. They dropped their season opener 14-7 to Panhandle. Kick-off is scheduled for 8 p.m.

Coach Allen's comments on Stinnett: For the second week in a row we will be playing a team with a new head coach. Don Sesson coached Coach to the 1975 State Championship Finals and spent the last two years at Quanah.

Stinnett has 16 letterman, including four starters each way off a 5-5 club. The Rattlers are expected to be speedy, with 9.9 sprinter Willie Dodd (145) in the backfield. Some of their top performers will be fullback-linebacker John Sursa (195), quarterback-defensive back David Lantelme (160), tailback-defensive back Steve Orr, and tight-end linebacker Robin Wilson (190). Their defensive tackle Richard Hunter is 6'4" 190. He was out all last year with a shoulder operation.

They are definitely the largest team we have faced this year. Offensively they will run the "I" slot with a split end. Their execution of running, passing, and blocking are done well. Defensively we will see a 27 defense which is a 4-3 front. The middle linebacker John Sursa and defensive tackle Kevin Freike are two good defensive linemen. They will have 8 going both ways. We will need to control the line of scrimmage and I have confidence in our line that we can. We will do a better job of this than we did in our previous two games. I feel we can do this.

We came out of the Quanah game with some sprain fingers and we were concerned Monday with Ed Bromley's wrist thinking it was worse than a sprain, but lucky for us it wasn't.

Bids opened for Senior Citizens building

There will be fluorescent lighting and a heating and cooling system totally separate from the existing section of the building. When desirable, the two sections can be heated or cooled separately.

More money will be needed to finance the addition because the cost of materials has risen since the plans were drawn and submitted to the contractors. The Senior Citizens have at least 30 days in which to raise the extra several thousand dollars. A spokesman for the Senior Citizens feels they will be able to raise the money before the deadline.

At a meeting of Senior Citizens, board members and other interested persons, Friday September 15, 1978 bids submitted for the addition to the Senior Citizens Center were opened at 2 p.m.

Low bidder for \$26,380 was Goff Construction Co. of Amarillo. Other bids were Gilbert Bldg. Co. \$28,740; High Plains Bldg. Co. \$29,750; \$ 9,975 for paneling (optional); Geo. Melton Const. Co. \$34,954; Earl B. Morrow, no bid submitted; and Sam J. Smith Const. Co. \$38,386.

All bids submitted were from Amarillo firms.

Luther E. Wossum, architect, with the firm of Luther E. Wossum and Associates explained the building addition as to size and use. He pointed out such features as the office, a passthrough window and a patio to be adjacent to the building on the north.

Construction will be of wood frame with brick veneer, having a concrete floor and carpet; walkways from the units to the front with additional steps from the living units to the street on the east side.

Sales tax to be dropped on utility bills

The state's four per cent sales tax on utility bills for residential customers will be dropped after Oct. 1, but an overlap for billing periods beginning during the month of September will cause the tax to appear on all bills received during October and on some received in November.

Fred Foy, supervisor of statistics and state taxes for West Texas Utilities Co., said that instructions issued by the State Comptroller are specific on how the recently approved tax exemptions are to be applied.

"A lot of people apparently think that October billings will not include the tax," Foy said, "but this is not the case."

Quannah's second score of the game was set-up again by a Broncho fumble. This time Donnie Harris lost the control after the Broncos had taken possession on a Barry Hightower interception at the 10 yd. line. It took the Indians 4 downs to get it across with #42 David McGary scoring. The Indians elected to go for two points but Gardner broke up the pass in the end zone. This closed the gap to 20-14. An on sides kick by Quannah did not make the distance and the Broncos took over at the Indians 44 yd. line. Gardner immediately dashed for 15. Two plays later he was again in the end zone for 6 pts. McClellan connected with Brown for two points and with 1:34 remaining in the game the Broncos were in charge 28-14. Alvin Reese intercepted a Quannah pass to take away any hope they had of scoring again. Lynn Thompson came in at quarterback to kill the final seconds on the clock.

It was a deserved victory for the Broncos rebounding from the disappointing loss to Boys Ranch. The offensive line worked hard in opening holes for Gardner and McClellan. Turnovers did not plague the Broncos as it had in the opening game, but two fumbles did set up Quannah for scores. The defense played well holding the Indian backs to 174 yds. rushing. The Broncho secondary picked off 3 passes and the defense recovered 3 fumbles. The Broncos are 1-1 and Quannah stands at 0-2.

The Broncos for the second week are on the road. They will be challenging the Stinnett Rattlers in Stinnett at 8 p.m. Stinnett comes into the contest at 1-1 also.

Junior Varsity wins over Shamrock 20-0

The Broncos' superb defense kept the Shamrock offense the entire game and led the Clarendon Junior Varsity to an opening game win over the Irish, 20-0.

On the opening series, the Bronco defense led by Bryan Murray stopped the Irish cold but a roughing the kicker penalty gave them new life but it didn't last very long and the Clarendon offense got the ball and began their initial scoring drive of the ballgame. Clarendon marched downfield rather convincingly as Bronco backs continually found huge openings created by the Bronco forward wall and put their first points on the board when Lance Thornberry scampered 10 yards for the touchdown - the conversion attempted failed and the score stood 6-0.

On their second possession, Shamrock made their only real drive of the ball game but was stopped when Linebacker Jeff Topper forced a fumble and Terry Putman recovered it on the Clarendon 30 yd. line to halt the drive. On the very next play, Scott Lewis and Bryan Murray opened a tremendous hole and Bobby Weatherston busted through it untouched on a beautiful 70-yard touchdown. Randy White caught a Brad Thompson pass for the two-point conversion to give the Broncos a 14 to 0 lead.

A fumble deep in Bronco territory gave the Irish a great scoring opportunity but Mark White spoiled it when he hustled through to sack the quarterback on an excellent play to end the threat as the half came to a close with the Bronco leading 14 to 0.

Clarendon received the second-half kick and Terry Putman picked up eleven yards over Chris Ford and Van Choate to set us a beautiful 50-yard touchdown pass from Lance Thornberry to tight end Jeff Topper. The point after touchdown attempt was unsuccessful to make the score final at 20-0.

The Clarendon offense had another drive in fourth quarter that saw Tommy Lane making some exceptional runs but was halted when a fourth down attempt failed to pick up the necessary yardage for the first down.

The Broncos play the White Deer Bucks today as they try to improve their season's record to 2-0.

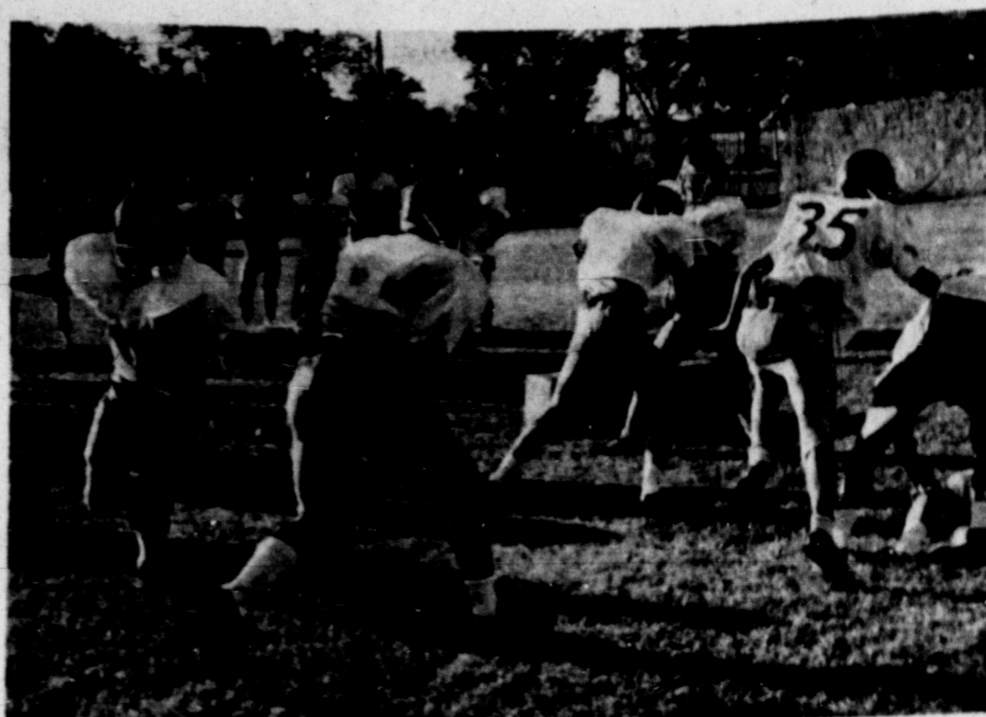

exemptions shall apply to each
regular monthly billing period
beginning on or after Oct. 1.
This means that if we bill a
customer for service from any
time prior to Oct. 1, the
four per cent sales tax will
be applied to the total bill."

Citing an example, Foy said
that if a meter is read on
Sept. 29, that particular
customer will be taxed on the
bill he received in October
and also on the bill he re-
ceives in November, since his
November bill is for service
from Sept. 30-Oct. 29.

The tax exemption was en-
acted during the special session
of the Legislature this summer
and applies to residential use
of electricity and natural gas.
Residential use is defined as "a
family dwelling, a multi-family
apartment, a housing complex,
or building or portions of a
building occupied as home or
residence."

The Legislature provided a
local option on the one per
cent city sales tax on utilities,
but most of the towns in the
West Texas Utilities service
area have indicated they will
continue the tax. Foy said that
so far, Junction is the only
WTU town which has announ-
ced it would abolish the tax.

"Our company will continue
to collect the tax for the
cities that wish to keep it,"
Foy said.

Texas Utilities Co. was announ-
ced Tuesday by Bill
Sayles, vice president and
director of WTU's Customer
Services Division.

Brooks, an employee of WTU
since 1961, will assist in
all functions of the Customer
Services Division, which in-
cludes working with the
Company's district managers
and local managers. WTU
serves 167 communities through
six district offices and 58
local offices in an area ex-
tending from Shamrock in the
Panhandle to Presidio in the
Big Bend.

For the past year, Brooks
had been manager of plant
operations, with supervisory
responsibilities over WTU's

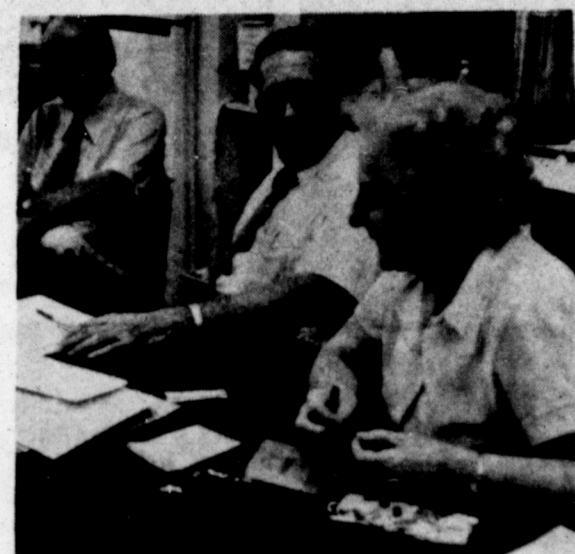

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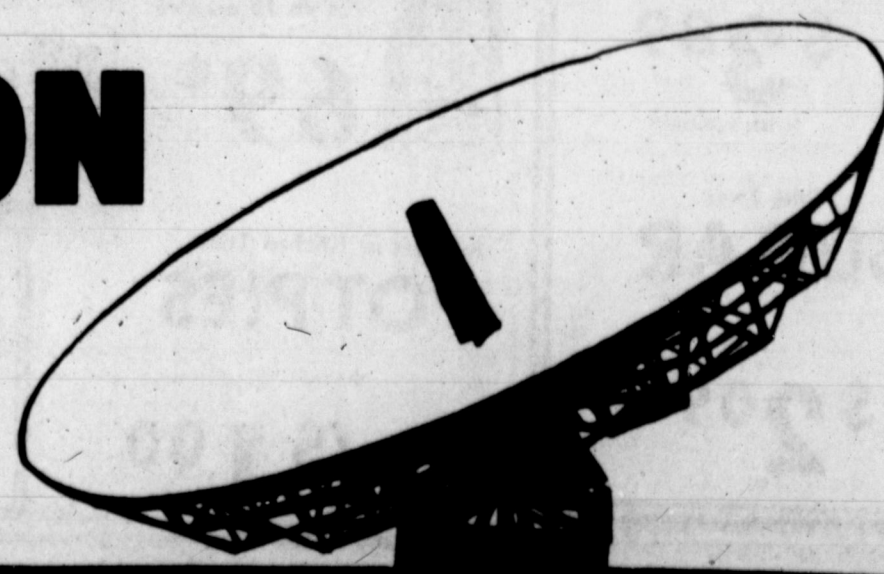

Known as a skeptic of long standing and having suffered with rheumatoid arthritis for 15 years, Mrs. Wes (Mary Joy) Knorpp, has recently undergone treatment which proved so dramatic in its relief that she is telling her story to contact those who know the debilitating effects of the disease.

To point out that her case is a severe one she gave this account. In the fifteen years she has had the disease she has

undergone 10 corrective surgeries which include her hips, knees, hands, fingers and ankles. Some of the joints were fused by surgery. During this time she suffered intensely as those who have, or are familiar with, the disease know.

Medications she has taken include Cortisone (both oral and injected dosage), gold, Endocin, butozolodoln alka, naprosyn, tolectin, and Motrin, all drugs usually used in the treatment of

rheumatoid arthritis, and three drugs used for other illnesses and now released for the treatment of arthritis, DBI-TD (developed for diabetes), Cuprimine (for Wilson's disease) and Cytosin an anti-cancer drug. These medications were taken in conjunction with aspirin, as many as 16 a day for all of the 15 years of rheumatoid arthritis.

Mrs. Knorpp pointed out that she has had whatever treatment her doctors said was necessary or advantageous. Each time she had surgery she had intensive physical therapy and five times the physical therapy was given without surgery just to keep her mobility, such as it was.

She had nothing but kind words for Mayo's, the Presbyterian Hospital in Dallas and Leo N. Levi National Arthritis Hospital in Hot Springs, Ark. famous for their great therapy. In all this time, with the best treatment available, she had

only a two year remission.

Earlier this year Mary Joy was told she was a candidate for more surgery on her ankles and she had begun having terrible headaches. She saw her doctor and he was unable to find anything causing headaches when he tested her eyes. It was about this time she read an advertisement in the Amarillo paper and heard about a couple in Happy who had had some special treatment which was just short of miraculous for arthritis.

Mrs. Knorpp and her husband went to Happy and talked with one of the patients, 81 years old, who had taken the treatment eight years ago and had never been back, on Labor Day weekend. Returning home she called the clinic in Mexico for reservations and began her treatment on Friday of the same week.

There are two clinics who give the same treatment in Mexico, the Arthritis Special Clinic in

Juarez, Mexico and the Clinic of the Specialists at Piedras Negras, Mexico. The drug is DMSO, made in Germany.

DMSO (Diemethyl Sulfoxide) is manufactured in Germany, where aspirin was developed and like aspirin is derived from a tree. DMSO is the substance that holds wood to a tree. DMSO was discovered in 1876 and was researched in the United States from 1962-1965 for several diseases of which arthritis was the most extensively researched. It was banned by the F.D.A. because of a lens change in the eye of a pig and some other animals, not all, used in the laboratory experiments and receiving massive doses of DMSO. Some animals used showed no such change and there has been none in the patients who have taken the drug and had had their cases followed up.

Because it is banned in the United States the drug is shipped to Mexico and administered from clinics there. Mrs. Knorpp said of the clinic in Juarez, where she was treated, that it compared favorably with the famous hospitals she had been in as a patient, both in the immaculate maintenance and the treatment. She rates herself as a professional observer of such places.

Before any treatment is administered the patients medical history is checked, extensive blood tests (nine to be exact) are made, a cardiogram is made and a urinalysis taken. X-rays may be made and drugs are checked.

DMSO is not an experimental drug and is a prescription drug in about a dozen European and Latin American countries. It is now used, with government approval, in the United States for inflammation in horses and greyhounds who become arthritic. Greyhounds, after treatment, are able to race again. Several hundred patients banned in the United States and from an article in Science Digest, the report states that DMSO gave relief when all other drugs used failed.

To continue with her explanation of condition, Mary Joy noted that x-rays taken in Dallas in August showed skeletal damage to her ankles. Her left elbow would not bend enough to get her arm to her head (she feared she would be unable to feed herself soon) and her right shoulder was frozen (remained stationary at her side).

The preliminary examination and laboratory tests Mrs. Knorpp was started on the treatments. These consisted of three intravenous injections of three hours duration each, injections consisting of DMSO and glucose. No other drugs are mixed in this treatment. The treatments are given each day for three days with a three hour duration.

Imagine the joy experienced by this patient, (Mrs. Knorpp) when at the end of the first hour of treatment she felt a cool sensation in her ankles, swollen and hot from inflammation. For the first time in seven months she could flex her ankles up and down!

At the end of the second treatment the patient is tested for joint pain by walking and flexing the joints. If pain is still present a direct injection is made into the painful joint. The lessening of pain and swelling continues all three days.

When the treatment is completed the patient is given medication for six months in the form of DMSO tablets to be taken three times daily before meals and a muscle relaxant with one-half tablet to be taken before meals. Patients are cautioned about over straining muscles which have been unable to function and warned to restore their use gradually.

Cost is the big item for most of these arthritis patients who have had medical bills for many years most of the time. Mrs. Knorpp had to have the major treatment; she did not stay at the hospital but did, of course, have her treatment at the clinic. Her cost was \$551 for treatment and six months medication.

For those who are not able to take care of themselves and do not have a traveling companion and stay at the hospital, the complete package, treatment, hospital and six months medication runs \$600 to \$700.

is a blessing.

Lesser treatments, including the examination without the hospital, may run \$80 to \$100. Those who want motel accommodations can stay at Laquinta Colonial Motels near the clinic for \$18 per night for two. Also there is no language barrier and taxis are available.

This article and interview is Mrs. Knorpp's way to contact all the arthritis sufferers, to give them hope, to make available to them this same chance to be free of pain and to get help before the permanent damage is done to joints. She has more detailed information to give any one who wishes to call or write her for it.
