



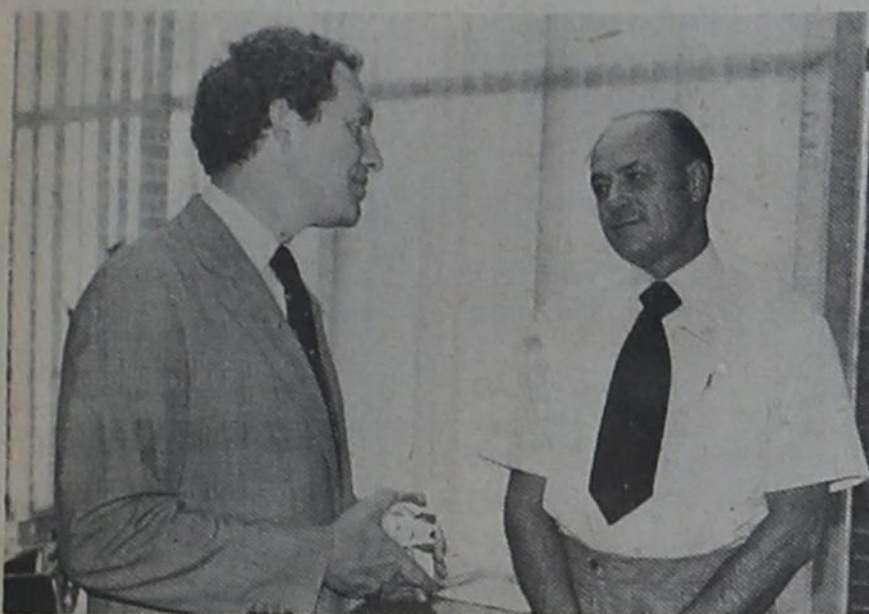

## Bob Krueger visits here

Bob Krueger, Democrat, arrived in Clarendon by helicopter about 7 a.m. Tuesday morning for his appearances at local cafes to meet with interested persons in his senate race against Republican incumbent, John Tower.

Declaring that the early morning flight from Amarillo to meet the sunrise was quite literally seeing "America the Beautiful", Krueger stated his views, recommendations and explained his initiative

on certain legislation to better the condition of the farmer, rancher and users of expensive fuels.

Krueger was accompanied on his rounds of cafes by Clarendon mayor, Leonard Selvidge and members of his campaign workers group.

While doing graduate work at Oxford University, in England, Krueger learned to

fully appreciate the United States and its government. "We do a better job (than any other government) of allowing people to do their job according to their own merit", he said, "in spite of the over load of paperwork." That is something he is working to change - the paper work for farmers, ranchers and small businessmen.

With 12 years of teaching experience as an English professor and Dean of Arts and Sciences at Duke University, his interest is still with small towns, of which he is a product, and the preservation of the vitality of rural towns.

Living in England decided his entry into the government of the United States, working to better the best government for the people and to help in the development of young persons.

see some game action against Claude."

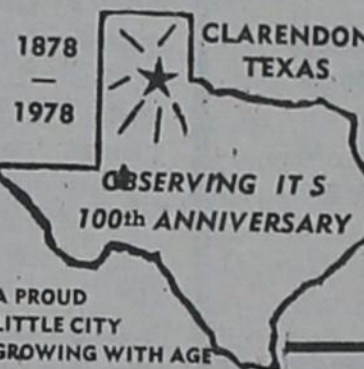

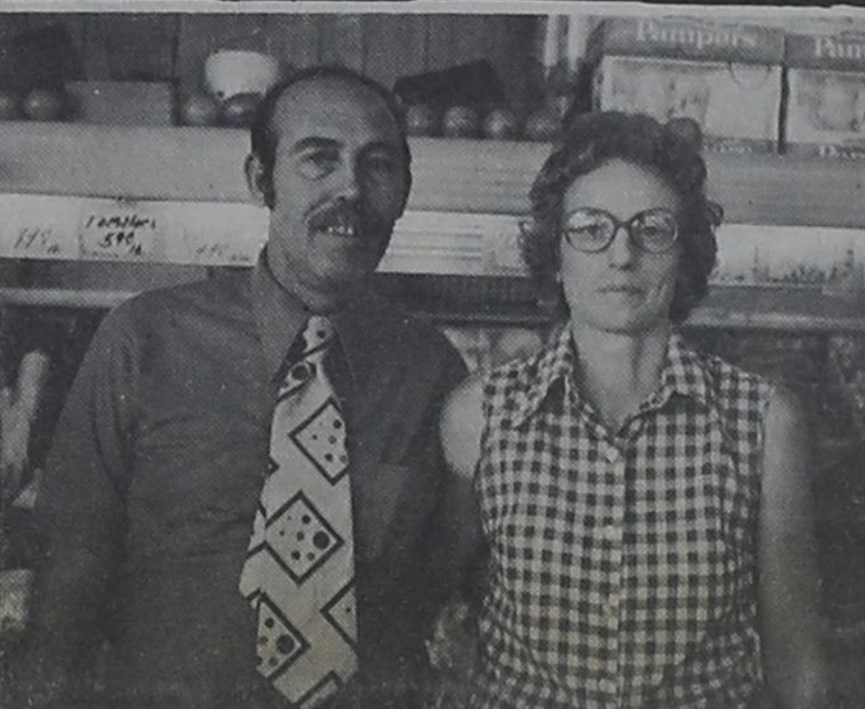

## USDA report

A new Economic Emergency loan service for farmers and ranchers who have financial problems caused by credit shortage or cost-price squeeze is now in effect through the U.S. Farmers Home Administration (FmHA).

Robert A. Keown, the agency's supervisor for Armstrong County, reports that FmHA is prepared to take applications at the Courthouse in Claude from 10:00 to 12:00 the first and third Wednesdays of each month or at the FmHA office in Clarendon.

Economic Emergency loans are authorized under the Agricultural Credit Act of 1978 signed by President Carter Aug. 4. They offer special help to farmers who are hard-pressed by recent shortage of credit from their regular lenders, or by debts accumulated during the recent period of low farm prices.

Keown said the Economic Emergency loan program was enacted by Congress, with Administration support, in recognition of the fact that "economic conditions, as well as weather, are often beyond farmers' control." FmHA emergency credit has previously been confined to loans for recovery from natural disaster, or the guarantee of private lenders' loans to livestock producers affected by economic conditions.

Under the new Economic Emergency program, any established farm operator -- individual, partnership, corporation or cooperative -- experiencing scarce credit or an overload of debt coming due, may apply for up to \$400,000 of credit through FmHA in order to survive in farming and continue their normal level of operation. Economic Emergency loans will not be made to expand a farm operation.

Loans made directly by FmHA will be at an interest rate equivalent to the cost of money secured by the government through sale of its securities to the public, plus an administrative add-on of up to one percent. The rate initially will be 8 1/2 percent. Guaranteed loans will be

made at rates negotiated between borrower and lender, with FmHA providing the lender up to a 90 percent guarantee against loss.

Loans for operating purposes will be made for terms of up to 7 years, with loan consolidations and rescheduling for another 7 years permitted, and 20-year payment authorized under special conditions. Real estate loans may be made for up to 40 years. Loans for annually-recurring expenses will be repayable annually.

Keown said initial inquiries about Economic Emergency loans can be made either through a commercial agricultural lender or the county FmHA office serving the county where the farm is located. The Act calls for decision by FmHA on individual applications within 30 days.

While introducing the new Economic Emergency farm loan, FmHA will continue all pre-existing services. They include various programs of non-emergency real estate and production loans to family-size farms, terms of which will soon be broadened under the recent Credit Act; emergency loans to farms damaged by natural disaster, or loans or grants for housing, community facilities and business and industry in rural areas.

# A few facts about early area schools

With the passage and adoption of the Gilmer-Aikin Laws the guidelines for school districts in the Texas school system were designed to be more uniform and advantageous for the students.

The purpose of the Foundation School Program Act (as set in the Gilmer-Aikin Laws) was to guarantee each child of school age in Texas a nine months school year, in a district meeting eligibility requirements as set by the act.

A State Board of Education, composed of 21 members, one from each of the congressional districts assumed responsibility for planning and policy making for the Public School System, and for Vocational Education. It has the specific responsibility for adopting policies, enacting regulations and establishing general rules for carrying out the duties placed upon it by the Central Education Agency and by the Legislature.

Within the structure of this law is the regulation for

classroom teacher units which depends on the daily average attendance of students.

Vocational teacher units and special teacher units are allotted separately from those of classroom teachers.

Other provisions provided was a scale for salaries, taking into account the amount of education and experience in the classroom, purchase and operation of school buses and the consolidation of dormant school districts.

School districts in Donley County vary greatly today from those of the early years of the community schools. Many of the districts fell into the dormant category when their numbers dwindled and two or more schools joined students and teachers.

Price support loans and reserve program: The availability date for loans on 1977 corn and grain sorghum has been extended, for reserve purposes only, from May 31, 1978, to September 29, 1978. 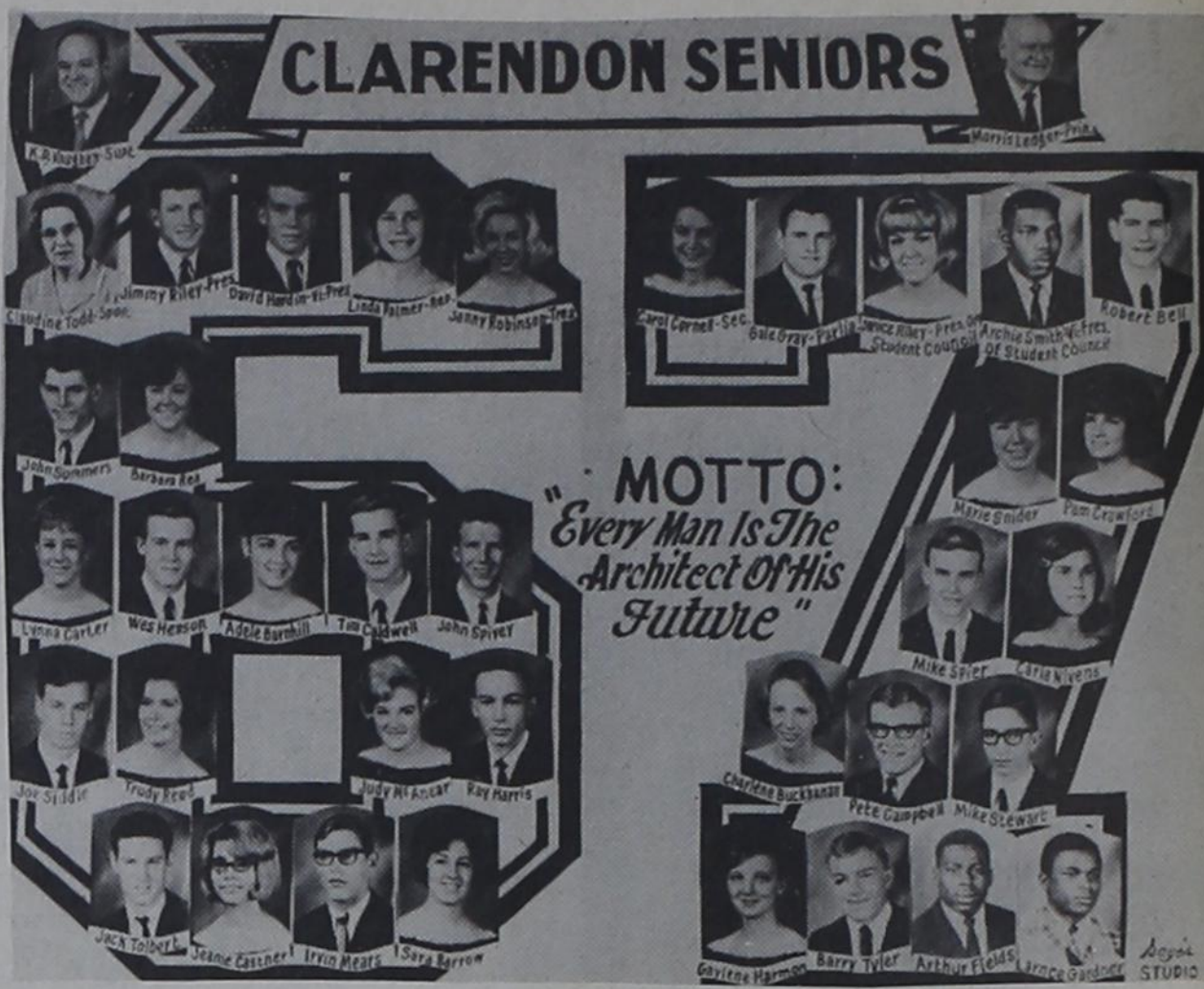
A notice will be sent to you approximately 30 days before the maturity date of your loan explaining the provisions of the loan maturity date extension.

1978 crop loans: The interest rate on 1978 crop commodity loans is 7 percent. Loans will mature on the last day of the ninth calendar month following the month in which the loan is disbursed. Donley County loan rates are as follows: Wheat - \$2.35 per bushel; Grain Sorghum - \$3.38 per cwt.; Corn - \$2.07 per bushel; Cotton - .4800 per lb.

Failed acreage destroyed without feed or other benefit: We have been advised that in some cases disaster affected crops may be assigned a zero yield rather than the appraised yield. All of the following conditions must be met:

1. It is not or was not feasible to carry the crop through to harvest.

2. The crop was or will be destroyed without feed or other benefit, (wheat could have been grazed through

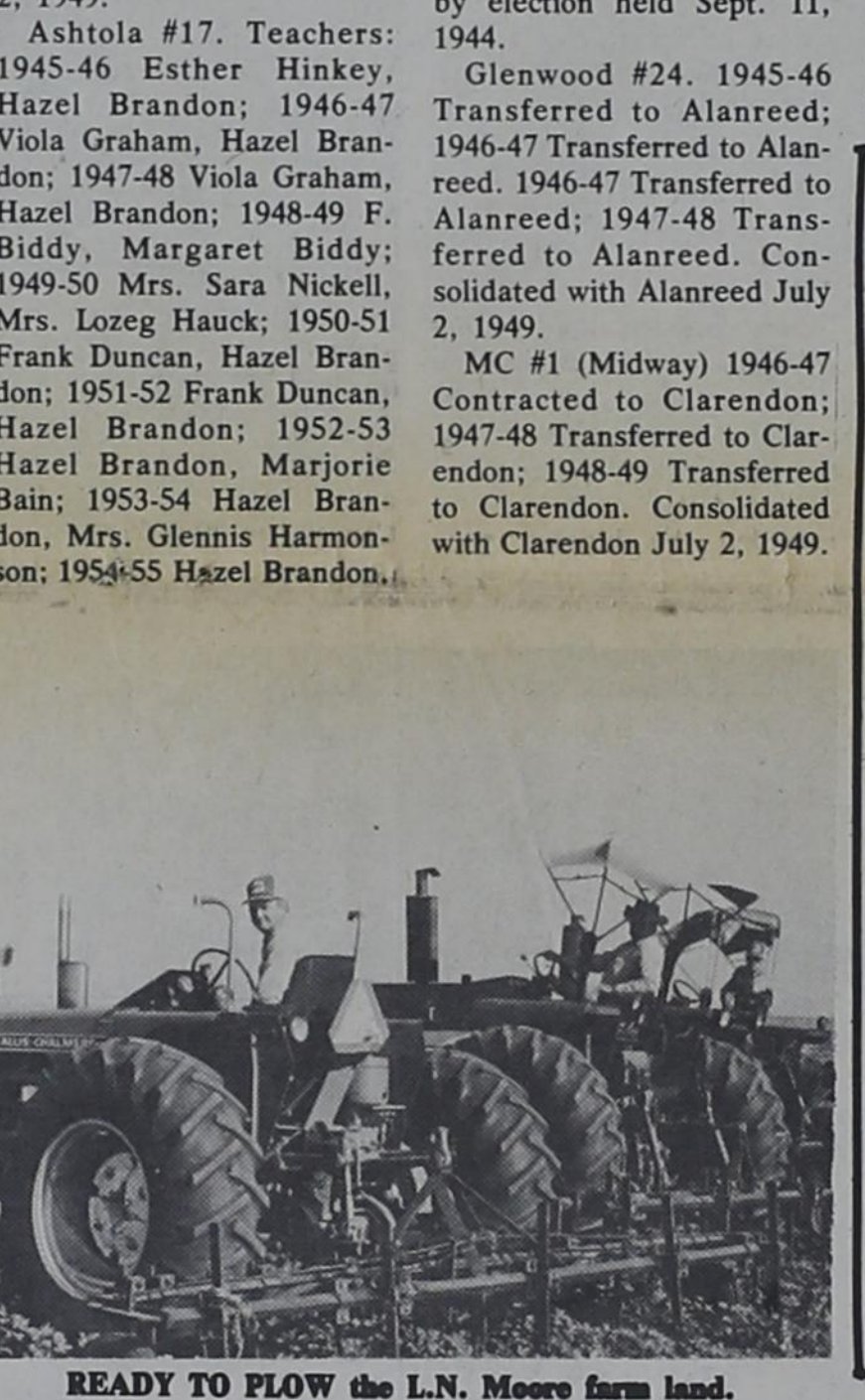

## Special Education classes

Special classes for young children, three and four years of age will be offered in the Clarendon school system for the 1978-79 school year.

These classes are designed to aid children in their readiness program before entering kindergarten.

These classes will be special classes for children who have a special need. They may have a speech problem, be immature, or slow in intellectual development. The experiences which they receive here will help them to be successful when they enroll in the public school.

All classes are being taught by Mrs. Thelma Shields who has had special training in the field of Early Childhood Education and is fully certified in this area by the Texas Education Agency.

Before a child may be enrolled in this special class, it must be given certain tests, called a screening to

establish eligibility. Any child who exhibits a developmental lag in accordance with its chronological age may be admitted. Developmental lags are most generally found in the motor, visual, auditory and language skills.

This program is being conducted with the full cooperation and participation of the Clarendon Independent School District and all parents of children, age three and four, are urged to contact Mrs. Thelma Shields to make an appointment with her for the screening tests and evaluation of their children. This service is free of charge as a part of Texas' Plan A for Special Education from the Eastern Panhandle Cooperative Schools, James Stavenhagen, Director.

## The cooperative school work program

**What is the Cooperative School-Work Program?** Just as the name implies, this program enables a student to receive both academic and vocational training. The Co-op student receives more practical, work-oriented knowledge than other students, thus he is better equipped to take immediate advantage of job opportunities.

**What is the purpose of the Co-Op. School - Work Program?** The purpose of the program is to prepare handicapped students to enter the world of work, so that they can be as self-sufficient as possible upon graduation from high school. This program makes tax paying citizens out of students who otherwise may well be recipients of some form of government assistance. This helps promote a healthy self concept, and a feeling of satisfaction in the student.

**Who is eligible?** Any student who is currently enrolled in Special Education classes, or who is eligible to receive such services, may participate in the Co-op. School - Work Program, with the approval of the Admission, Review, and Dismissal Committee.

**The special curriculum** - In the classroom phase of the program (usually the first year or two in high school) each student continues with academic subjects, especially reading, writing, and math. Those who can achieve a degree of success in certain regular classes are placed in these classes. Their progress is carefully monitored.

The Vocational Adjustment Coordinator (V.A.C.) places the emphasis on teaching Co-op students the necessary attitudes, habits, behaviors, and skills required to obtain, and keep a job in the community. These skills include learning how to complete an application, learning what to do in a job interview, learning how to get along with fellow workers, developing self-

assurance, and taking pride in doing a job well.

**The real thing - the job**  
When the student has received maximum benefit from class work, and has demonstrated basic social skills, the V.A.C. will assist in placing the student in a part or full time job in the community. While on the job, the student will remain under the careful supervision of the V.A.C. who works with the student and the employer to assure job success.

**What are the requirements for graduation under the Co-op Program?** School districts vary on some points, such as the length of time a student must work, the number of credits they must earn, and so on, but most require that the student:

- \* Must successfully complete at least two quarters of full time employment.
- \* Must have reached the age of the graduating peer group, which usually means they must be at least 18 years of age.

- \* Must have received approval of the Admission, Review, and Dismissal Committee.

It should be noted that when Co-op students have met the requirements for graduation, they are eligible to participate in all senior activities, including graduation exercises, and to receive a regular high school diploma.

## Clarendon Junior College teachers

Clarendon College is a state supported institution with 62% of the funds coming from the state, and one eighth of its support derived from the taxing district, the Donley County line.

## Sales and Use tax report

State Comptroller Bob Bullock Tuesday said Texas cities netted a record \$236.4 million in sales tax revenues during the 1978 fiscal year, a 14.8 percent increase over the previous budget year.

Bullock said his office mailed checks August 15, 1978 totaling \$20.1 million to 903 cities as their August share of the local option, one percent sales tax.

The current state budget year ends August 31. The city sales tax is collected by merchants along with the state sales tax and rebated monthly to the cities in which it was collected by the Comptroller's Office.

The City of Houston recorded the biggest per-

centage increase in sales tax collections among the state's larger cities, with revenues up. Locally, Clarendon received \$1,902.07 for this period, up 0.00% for this period in 1977. Hedley was up 52% with total 1978 payments to date of \$2,449.60 as against 1977 payments for the same time of \$1,610.61. Howardwick shows a payment for this period of \$1,238.61 for an increase of 13%.

A five county, including Donley County, shows Memphis, in Hall County, down 0.00%, Silvertown, in Brisco County, up 20.00%, Tulsa, in Swisher County, no change and Claude, in Armstrong County, up 30.00%.
