

six to eight months, as a team, Sandra Longan and Rickey Pierce have constructed between 20 and 30 saddles. In this manner much is learned in a comparatively short time. By rote is a very successful method of learning and quickly improving performance in the process. The same instruction in a conventional class for leather crafting would take much longer with probably three saddles

constructed per year. Aptitude has a great deal to do with handcrafting and in the case of saddles it takes experience and patience for a complex job.

Ala leather workers, employees, at Skinners are apprentices. There are many steps in the making of a saddle beginning with the selection of the leather to be used.

It takes one whole hide, two sides, for a saddle and the choice of hides must be made carefully so the weight of the hide is balanced and the heavy part placed correctly. Not all hides can be used and those which have been branded are avoided because of damage to

One person spends all his time selecting, planning and cutting the leather pieces for use on the saddles. After the parts have been cut out pre assembling is done with careful attention given to the placement for weight upon the saddle tree. This saddle tree is often made of hard yellow pine and is covered with rawhide. It is the frame for the leather covering. Some saddle trees for Skinners are purchased from McElroy Saddle Trees, a firm in El Paso. McElroy is the son-in-law of Gerald Mathews of the J.A.

In order, come the preparation and installation of the seat and cantle binding. This requires fitting and padding and handling numerous times for that perfect fit. The next step is the installation of the skirts, the lower part of the saddle which goes next to the horse. This portion of the saddle is lined with wool skin.

The back housing, or back portion of the saddle is covered next and with the installation of the fenders and stirrup leathers the saddle is built and ready for the trigger work. This involves cinches, stirrups, latigos etc.

With the construction complete the saddle is ready for the finishing department and cleaning and oiling of the leather.

Easy though it is to list the steps in assembling a saddle, the actual work is a painstaking job as individual as the person who does the construction. The cutter selects the type of leather for roughout, tooled or smoothe leather job. If the saddle is to be tooled the work is done after the pre-assembly.

Leather must be handled quite differently from synthetic materials and some of it must be wet to soften it for working. To case leather is to wet it; (just the right amount) put it in a plastic bag and let the moisture spread evenly throughout. All tooling is done on moist leather.

# TAX RELIEF FOR TEXANS!






