Price, a member of the

Senate Committee on Human Resources, invites any citizens of the 31st Senatorial District who has a concern regarding nursing home eligibility or alternate care services to feel free to call or write his offices in Pampa or Amarillo if they cannot attend the hearings. "All views and concerns reaching my office will be greatly appreciated and will assist the Senate Committee on Human Resources in taking initiatives in response to this critical situation," Price said.

## Proposals for 1981 wheat program

The Secretary of Agriculture proposes to make the following determinations with respect to the 1981 crop of wheat:

(a) Whether there should be a set-aside requirements and if so, the percent of such set-aside.

(b) The National Program Acreage (NPA).

(c) Whether there should be a recommended percentage reduction from previous year's harvested acreage and if so, the level thereof.

(d) If a set-aside is implemented, whether a limitation should be placed on planted acreage.

(e) Whether there should be a land diversion program, and if so, the extent of such diversion and the level of payment.

(f) Whether the special wheat grazing and hay program should be implemented.

(g) Whether to require compliance with the established farm NCA as a condition of eligibility for program benefits.

(h) The methodology to be used to adjust the established "target" price from the 1980 crop level and, if NCA and set-aside requirements are deemed necessary, whether the established "target" price should be adjusted further to compensate producers for complying with the NCA and set-aside requirements.

(i) The loan and purchase level for the 1981 crop of wheat; and

(j) Other related provisions.

Determinations (a) through (c) are required to be made by the Secretary by August 15, 1980. Comments on the proposed determinations are invited and must be received before July 21, 1980. ## Heat wave-no relief in sight

For the past fifteen days, beginning on June 24, the temperatures in Clarendon have been officially recorded as from 99 degrees (three successive days) to 108 degrees with an average of 104 degrees during the fifteen day period.

There is no denying the discomfort and damage done by the heat to crops and to animal life from the excessive temperatures. However Clarendon and other communities who rely on Greenbelt Water Authority do have plenty of water.

Some sections of the stricken areas in the heat wave area have run out of water or have had the use of it drastically curtailed. In Jacksboro the water crisis necessitated the emergency meeting on July 3, of the board of aldermen to help solve their problem with water rationing. According to the "Jacksboro Gazette-News" the water tower was empty at the time of the meeting and the only water available was that running in the pipes.

Watering is to proceed by the rationing rules there one day a week, two hours before 7 a.m. and two hours after 7 p.m. Failure to follow this rule will result in a \$200 fine. This is one example of water shortage. In Jacksboro the demand was greater than the amount the wells could be

## Residents injured in car wreck

Debbie and David Davenport, were injured in a one car rollover about 10 p.m. Saturday, July 5, on highway 294 2 miles north of Goodnight when Davenport swerved to miss an animal on the highway.

Those men born during the year 1960 must register at their local post office during the week of July 21. Those born during 1961 will register during the week of July 28, according to post master Bob McCombs. Post office hours are from 8 a.m. to 4:30

p.m. Registration may be made at any United States post office, since information will be listed as to their place of residence. However it is advisable to do so at the home town post office.

The post office will provide the cards which themen will fill out as their part of the nation wide registration. Other information can be obtained from the Selective Service personnel.

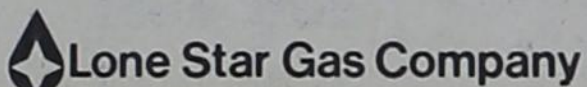

## Watch for screwworms

Although the weather continues hot and dry, livestock producers still need to be on the lookout for screwworms, Dr. John Holcombe, executive director, Texas Animal Health Commission, warns.

The eradication effort is now centered in Mexico where millions of sterile screwworms flies are being dispersed to mate with native populations which result in

no offspring.

TAHC inspectors are working closely with producers along the Texas-Mexico border. "We must rely on individual producers throughout the state to watch for possible screwworm infestations. We urge cattlemen everywhere to send in suspected screwworm samples to the eradication center in Mission. Special mailing

kits for doing this chore are available at county agent's offices and veterinarians," he said.

Thus far, only one confirmed case has been found in all of Texas. That was in Coleman County.

"This is not the time to become complacent. We need to know if there are any cases of screwworms in the

state. When and if we find one, that area will be saturated with sterile screwworms in order to wipe out that infestation. An unreported screwworm outbreak can hurt the entire program. This is why we need to keep watching for possible screwworm infestations and send in suspected samples," Dr. Holcombe explained.

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## Bookworm

A reminder to the children enrolled in the Sports Splash reading program: All books must be turned in at the

library, certified by a parent that the books have been read, by Thursday, July 31st. There will be more details

later in regard to our awards party.

The library met Thursday, July 10th. Miss Cline, the librarian, presented an excellent report.

The first six months of 1980 showed a good increase in library patrons, circula-

tion, and attendance in comparison to the first six months of 1979.

In 1979, at this time, we had approximately 580 active members. We now have 880.

The first six months of 1980 showed our attendance to be 3,185 patrons of C.B. Burton Library. 3,932 items were distributed for circulation.

One of the more interesting statistics concerned the films that were shown. The viewers of these films totaled 1,089.

The library received six hundred and thirty five dollars in grant money. This money is from the state library system. It was used to purchase forty-seven children's books and forty-three adult books.

Well over three hundred dollars was spent from local funds. Twenty-nine books, mostly reference which we needed badly, were added to our collection.

Seventy five books were purchased as gifts, memorials, etc. for a total of 194 new books for our library.

## Food Stamps cut

An estimated 200,000 people, including 150,000 college students, will be dropped from the food stamp program and food stamp costs will be cut by \$80 million a year under rules published today by the U.S. Department of Agriculture.

Assistant Secretary Carol Tucker Foreman said the new rules, required by 1980 amendments to the Food Stamp act, will cause most of the 200,000 adult students (over 18 and under 60 years of age) who now receive food stamps to lose their eligibility on September 1. The only exceptions will be low-income students with disabilities, or those who: (1) work more than 20 hours a week, (2) head households with dependents, (3) participate in a federal work-study program, or (4) are enrolled in a work incentive program.

In addition to eliminating most college students from the program, the new rules will cause 50,000 more food stamps recipients to lose their eligibility when a new assets limit takes effect on October 1.

Under the present food stamp law, most food stamp

households must have assets worth less than \$1,750. The new law and regulations lower this limit to \$1,500. Households of two or more people, in which at least one person is elderly, will not be affected by the change. The assets limit for these elderly households will remain at \$3,000.

"The rules issued today carry out 1980 amendments to the food stamp law aimed at cutting program costs and tightening management," Foreman said. "Earlier this month, the semi-annual cost-of-food increase was cancelled, and new procedures lowering food stamp income limits took effect."

"Together these changes are expected to save \$448 million in the upcoming fiscal year," Foreman said. "With the publication of today's rules, we have implemented all of the savings provisions of the new law that will affect eligibility for food stamps and benefit levels."

The interim final rules published in today's Federal Register also exclude the counting of federal, state and local energy assistance payments as income or resources in determining a household's eligibility for food stamps. Vehicles used by handicapped people also will not be counted as a household resource. These latter two provisions become effective October 1, 1980.

### General Telephone information

The mandate to all businesses in today's inflationary environment is to reduce expenses wherever possible thus helping keep costs to customers as low as possible.

One way General Telephone Company has responded to this mandate is by reducing its utility (electricity and natural gas) payments by more than \$500,000 in the first five months of 1980. Projected, this could mean a

savings of more than \$1 million annually, according to Warren Brown, building administrator stationed in San Angelo, Tx., GTSW headquarters for operations in Texas, New Mexico, Oklahoma and Arkansas.

Major contributor to the reduction was a drastic reduction in the use of natural gas for heating company buildings -- particularly those housing switching equipment.

Also contributing to the reduction was installation of climate control systems, not

employed in buildings constructed in the 60s and early 70s when fuel was inexpensive. Roy Moon, energy coordinator, explained that climate control systems became economically feasible when the cost of gas climbed from 36 cents per cubic foot to today's \$3 per cubic foot.

The federal government also has been a partner contributing to the reduction of energy usage, it was pointed out. "Compliance with federal law regulating temperatures in certain business and public buildings at 65 degrees for heat and 78 degrees for cooling brought about an additional energy reduction which was becoming an economic necessity anyway," Brown said. "Lighting levels have been reduced, too, as much as possible while still meeting work and safety requirements."

Brown says further reduction in utility costs can be realized only with capital expenditures involving the installation of older buildings, installation of new control systems and conducting more extensive audits to determine where waste may be occurring.

"The money we are saving is real," Brown said. "It is only one of many company efforts to reduce expenses and improve efficiency in order to keep the cost of service at the lowest possible level."

## Control cattle grubs

Each year between June and September, Texas livestock producers can effectively control costly cattle grubs by applying livestock insecticides, says Ronald Gooch, Donley LCounty agent.

Grub control can be achieved with a variety of treatments which includes sprays, dips, pour-ons, spot-ons and feed mixes.

During late fall and winter, grubs appear on the backs of livestock. It's too late to begin control measures then since most of the damage has already been done.

In addition to controlling cattle grubs, an insecticide used now will also provide contact control of horn flies for two to three weeks. Gooch says this makes the overall cost of treatment favorable.

Insecticides suggested for grub control include coumaphos (Co-Ral), crufomate (Ruelene), phosmet (Pro-late), trichlorfon (Neguvon), famphur (warbex), fenthion (Tiguvon), and ronnel. Read and follow directions on the insecticide label before treatment. Cattle that are sick or under stress should not be treated, cautions Gooch.

The cattle grub is the larval stage of the heel fly. The adult fly has no mouth parts, so it causes no pain to the cattle. However, it frightens cattle, making them difficult to manage. Animals often seek relief by standing in shade or shallow water.

The life cycle begins when the heel fly lays its eggs on an animal. The eggs, glued to hairs, hatch within a few days, and larvae (worms) enter the skin at hair follicles. The immature stages then migrate through

the animal's body for six to eight months and reappear in the animal's back in the fall and winter, forming knot-like marbles or cysts.

Cattle grub losses are affected in a variety of ways, says Gooch. Besides damaging meat and hides by their feeding activity, they lower beef cattle gains and reduce milk production throughout the year. Profit losses are estimated to cost the Texas cattle producers \$8 - 10 million each year.

## IMPETIGO AND CHILDREN

Infection of the skin's surface in babies and young children is called impetigo. This infection is usually caused by the bacteria streptococci and staphylococci.

Adults do not tend to develop this skin problem. Why? Adult skin is protected by a rough outer layer. Because babies and young children have not developed this protective layer, their skin is more prone to damage with resulting infection.

Scratching, rubbing, sun, heat, wind, and even sweating sets the stage for invasion by bacteria. These bacteria set up house in the damaged skin and begin to multiply. The result is the crusty, sometimes honey-colored sores that are frequently seen in children.

Although impetigo generally causes few serious problems to the skin, its real danger is to the kidneys. There is a strong relationship between impetigo and acute glomerulonephritis [a dangerous inflammation of a part of the kidneys].

What can be done? Some medical authorities say that all children having impetigo should be treated with oral or injectable antibiotics. Others argue that one or two small sores can be treated at home with warm water soaks followed with application of a non-prescription antibiotic ointment.

Although impetigo may appear to be only a minor problem, consequences to the kidney can be great. All impetigo deserves some form of care...extensive infection requires medical attention.

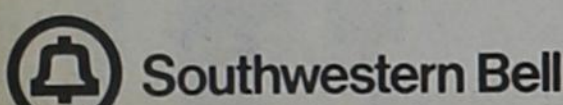

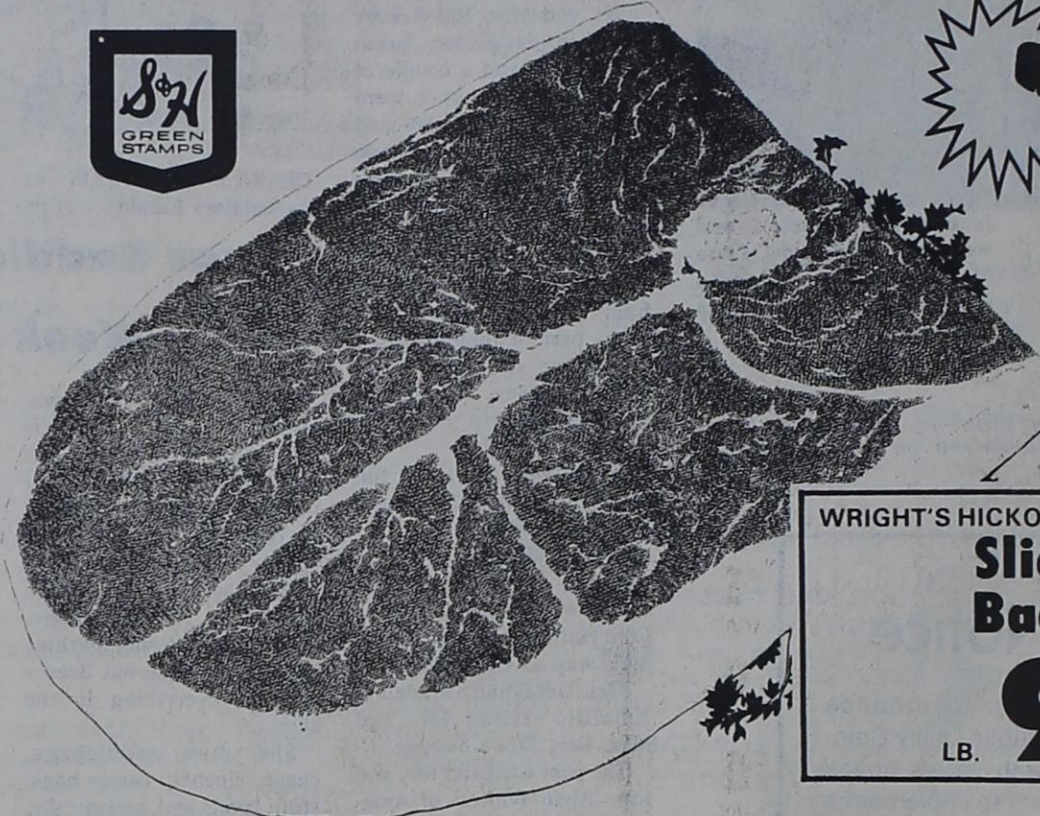

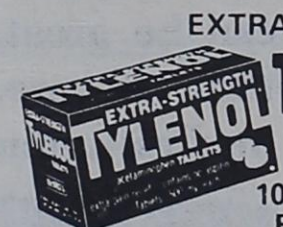
