Board of Aldermen meeting Howardwick

The city council of the City of Howardwick met in regular session at the city hall on Saturday, November 8, 1980 at 8:30 a.m. Those present were Mayor Waldon E. Moore; Aldermen Carol Cole, Neal Mann, Leon May and Lawrence Whitehead; City Secretary Connie Milam and several guests. Alderman Melville Mills was absent.

Mayor Moore called the meeting to order, welcomed the guests and called on Cecil Mathews to lead the invocation.

The minutes of the October 11, 1980 regular monthly meeting and the October financial reports were read by the city secretary. A motion to approve the minutes as read was made by Alderman May and seconded by Alderman Whitehead. The motion carried - four voting yeas and one absent.

Mayor Moore introduced Mr. Raymond Willis of Granite, Oklahoma and Mr. Rick Rattan of Clarendon and stated that they had asked to meet with the city council to discuss the possibility of providing cable television to the residents of the city. They stated that they are in the cable television business with several operations including the one in Clarendon and that they wanted the opportunity to install a similar operation in Howardwick. The Smith and Jones Company, who was granted a franchise by the City of Howardwick on December 22, 1971 to operate a cable

television distribution system within the city, was represented and stated their position. The council thanked everyone for their comments and stated that they would take this matter under consideration.

Alderman Mann reported that he had talked with the game warden about having a game preserve designated and that the warden said that this would have to be handled by the Parks and Wildlife Department in Austin. Instructions were given to write to that office.

Alderman Whitehead reported that he had found a road grader that the city can buy for \$500.00. A motion to give Alderman Whitehead and May the authority to check this grader and to buy it for \$500.00 if they feel that it will answer the city's need was made by Alderman Cole and seconded by Alderman Whitehead. The motion carried - four voting yeas and one absent.

Mayor Moore stated that he felt that some one other than his self should be appointed as city judge. Instructions were given for the mayor to handle this appointment.

Alderman Mann reported that some one is pumping out septic tanks and dumping this waste in the city dump. Instructions were given to investigate into this and take steps to have it stopped.

Alderman May reported that the Ford tractor is still at the shop and that no estimate of repairs has been made. Also that the new tires for the Farmall tractor have been mounted and that it is back in operation. The question of whether the city should continue mowing was discussed.

Mayor Moore stated that it appears that the city will have to raise the annual maintenance assessments because the city does not have enough revenue to finance the needed street repairs. He also recommended adopting a late payment penalty.

The question of what to do when a firearm is discharged within the city was asked from the floor. Instructions were given to report such an incident to the chief of police.

As there was no further business, a motion to adjourn was made by Alderman Whitehead and seconded by Alderman Cole. The motion carried four voting yeas and one absent.

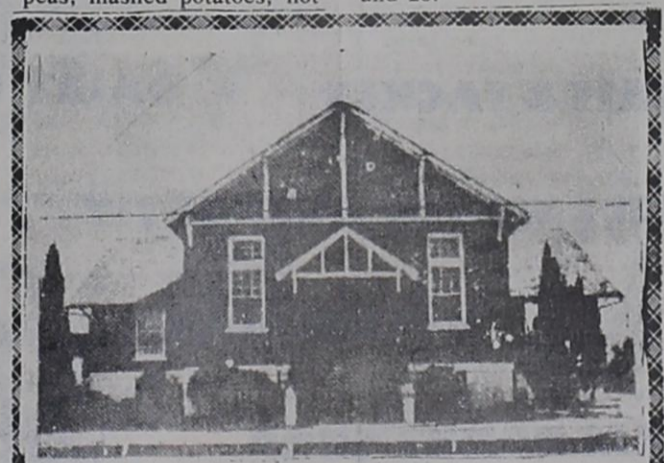

WHO GETS DIABETES?

November is National Diabetes Month and a good time for us all to consider this important and very common disease. Although there is no cure for diabetes, the condition can be controlled to a large extent through diet, insulin, and drugs.

There are three characteristics common to people who tend to develop diabetes. Most diabetics have one or more of these:

1. RELATIVES WITH DIABETES

If one's parent or grandparent had diabetes, there is an increased likelihood that this condition could develop.

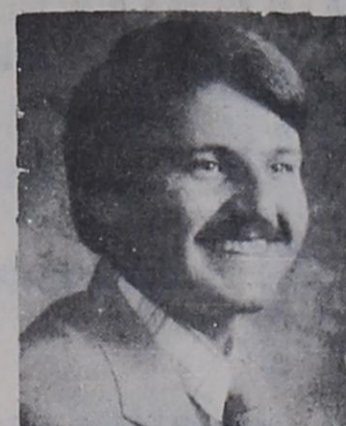
2. MIDDLE-AGED OR OLD-AGED

Although diabetes is often thought of as a disease of childhood, this is not the case. The great majority of diabetics .. about 80% ... develop the disease during or after middle life.

3. OVERWEIGHT

People who are overweight have diabetes more frequently than those who are of normal weight or who are underweight. This principle applies to the adult type of diabetes (diabetic children are generally thin).

Individuals having two or all three of these characteristics should be examined periodically by their physicians for diabetes. Testing is usually simple and inexpensive.

CLARENDON VS PANHANDLE AT PAMPA

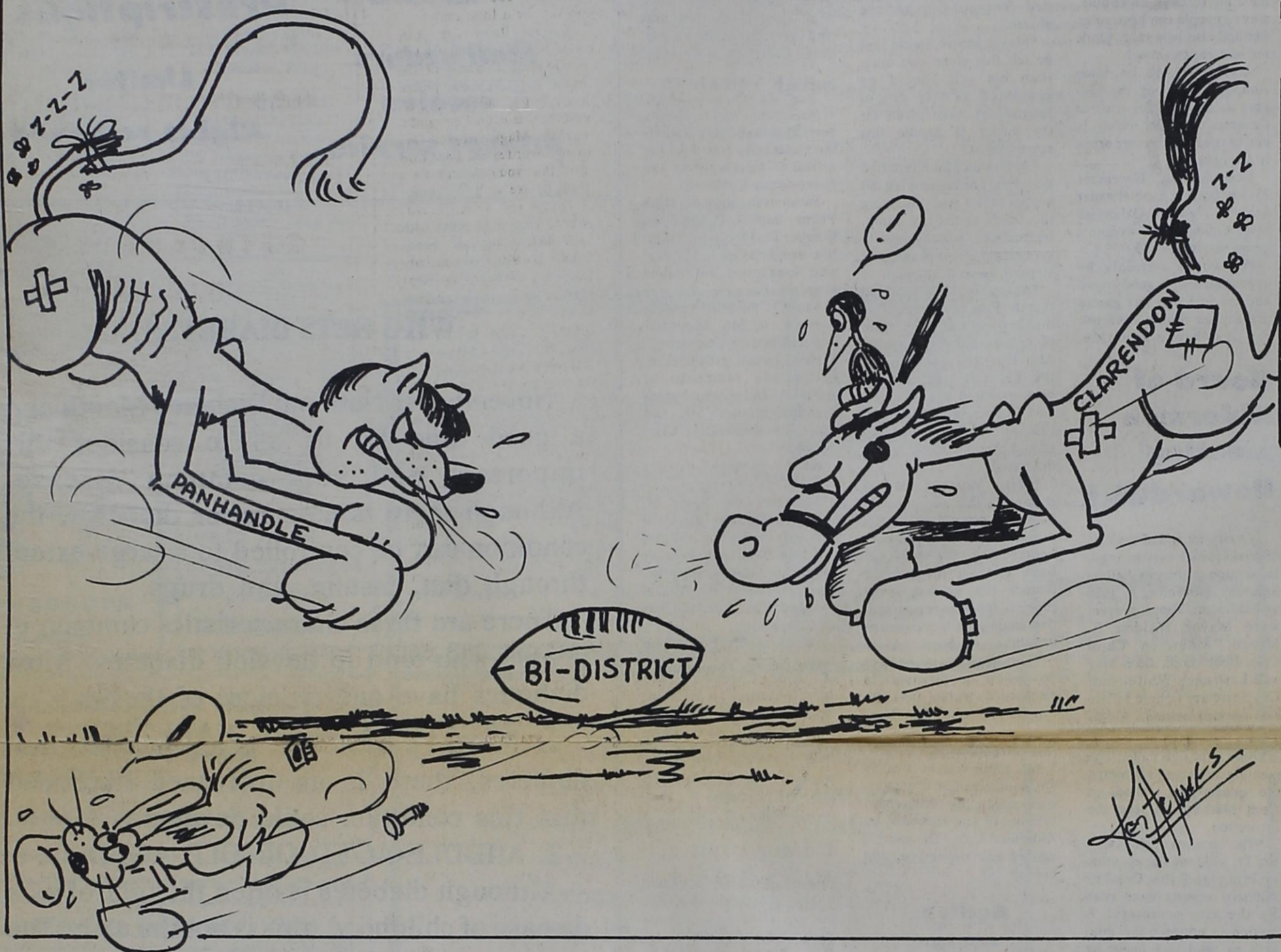

Mr. Snider from Groom has made some beautiful gun cabinets of unfinished pine that hold from 6 to 8 guns. One is fancy and the other is sturdy. He has also built a big, sturdy two story doll house. There are doll's cradles, chairs and little toddlers chairs and rocking horses. One of my favorite wooden shelves units was for little boys baseball gear. It is a

wall mounted shelf that features a little hole to balance the ball in, a slot to hand the bat and two pegs underneath, one for the glove, one for the cap! There are also planter and nick nack shelves, unfinished, for sale.

The Good Neighbors Club

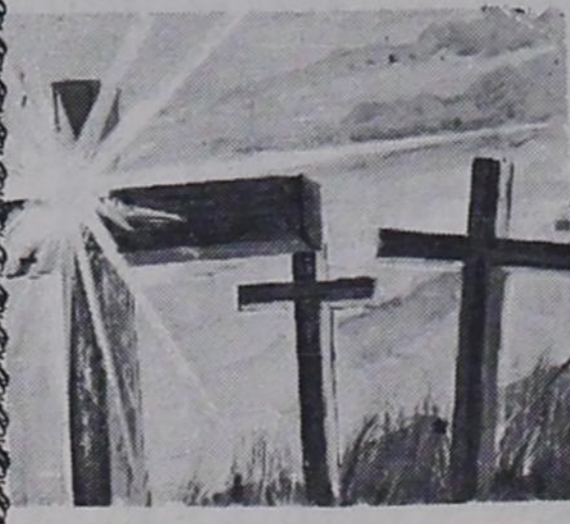
