WHO GETS DIABETES?

November is National Diabetes Month and a good time for us all to consider this important and very common disease. Although there is no cure for diabetes, the condition can be controlled to a large extent through diet, insulin, and drugs.

There are three characteristics common to people who tend to develop diabetes. Most diabetics have one or more of these:

1. RELATIVES WITH DIARFTES If one's parent or grandparent had diabetes, there is an increased likelihood that this condition could develop.


2. MIDDLE-AGED OR OLD-AGED

Although diabetes is often thought of as a disease of childhood, this is not the case. The great majority of diabetics .. about 80% ... develop the disease during or after middle

3. OVERWEIGHT

People who are overweight have diabetes more frequently than those who are of normal weight or who are underweight. This principle applies to the adult type of diabetes (diabetic children are generally thin).

Individuals having two or all three of these characteristics should be examined periodically by their physicians for diabetes. Testing is usually simple and inexpensive.


