## Grass fires plague county

Grass fires consumed approximately 1700 acres of pastures and around \$7,000 worth of fence posts in an afternoon blaze which originated last Thursday, July 17 on the Mark Allen ranch as far as can be determined, south of Clarendon on Texas 70 between Clarendon and Brice.

The estimate of 700 acres of burned land was on Allen's place and Sandy Camp, leased by Mrs. W.J. Lewis Jr. and used as a horse pasture lost 1,000 acres and the \$7,000 estimate of fence posts.

Clarendon firemen were assisted by McLean, Hedley, Memphis and firemen from Claude. Claude had an equipment problem and sent men to help. At the same time the Hwy 70 fire was in progress Wellington firemen came to Donley County and put out a grass fire south of Hedley.

Volunteer firemen do a job that needs to be done and each business which employees a fireman donates the service of his employee as the employee gives his personal effort to protect lives and property. Thursday found the post master serving as dispatcher at the firestation, the Clarendon Chief of Police called from Ministerial Alliance meeting to the scene of an automobile fire and a countless number of volunteer firemen out in the sun, soot and fire battling the blaze.

Sunday another grass fire burned parts of the property of Charlie Hearn, Lloyd Risley and Burk DeBord west of town. Such fires cannot really be estimated for a dollar value loss. This year with the heat the loss of grass and grazing land hurts

worse than usual.

As far as is known there were no injuries to firefighters and there is no known loss of stock in either of the fires. However due to the area involved and the rough country stock had not been gathered up in the area of the fire south of town.

Many thanks are extended to all the firefighters, local

and out of towners, to Gibson's for sandwiches and cold drinks, to all persons offering help and to the individuals who were on the site and aiding in a variety of ways.

A few scattered showers early in the week were some help but care should be taken to detect and prevent costly grass fires by all citizens.

## New Jail nearing reality

What Donley County and Clarendon citizens have been wanting and waiting for is nearing --- a jail which will enable local law enforcement to go about their job of defending the public against law breakers, protecting the innocent and doing it at home using the Donley County jail.

Costs of the new structure are expected to be \$320,000-\$340,000 now up from the \$225,000 estimate because of price increases during the intervening time. Cost of the building has been determined by the requirements of the Texas Jail Standards Commission for Texas jail buildings. These requirements are less demanding than the Federal requirements and are acceptable to the United States standards.

Revenue Sharing funds in the amount of \$160,000 have been accumulated to be applied to the jail construction.

There will be a bond election needed to provide the other money for the building construction since there must be cash in hand at the time the bids are let. Revenue Sharing Funds will expire in September unless congress makes provision for its continuation. Only time can tell whether or not the necessary legislation will be enacted.

Bond passage is needed as guarantee to insure the presence of available funds at the time of letting bids.

\$20,000 of the \$160,000 of Revenue Sharing funds will be used to make the 1981 repayments on the bonded indebtedness as there will be no tax increase in 1980 to make the repayment on the bonds for the first year.

Within the last three years, 14c has been deleted from the tax rate of the present valuation of the

county ad valorem tax. It will take approximately this same amount to pay the bonded indebtedness on the jail when the bonds are passed. Cost of the jail in Donley County is less than the earlier proposal which involved several counties with the facility out of County. Total cost with the Revenue Sharing money available is considerably less than some neighboring counties will be having to provide.

Corrections Consultants

and Associates Inc., have been employed to complete plans and specifications and these have been submitted to Texas Jail Standard Commission for concurrence and approval.

Donley County Commissioners Court will meet Monday, July 28, 1980 with the bonding representative and determine when the bond election will be called. Another article with additional information will follow.

## Donley County Appraisal Board meeting

Tuesday, July 8, the Donley County Appraisal Board met and voted unanimously to hire, Charles W. SoRelle from Amarillo to re-appraise the property of Donley County.

SoRelle was hired for approximately \$88,000 which figures to be less than \$13 per parcel of land.

The re-appraisal is a turn-key job to be complete by January 1, 1981. Cost of the re-appraisal work is being paid jointly by the state of Texas, and every taxing entity in the county and is payable in three installments, over 3 years. The 7 taxing entities of the county will pay for the service.

The fact that Charles SoRelle comes from an agriculture background was a prime consideration with the board in his selection.

One of the biggest savings to county taxpayers was the hiring of Charles SoRelle who for 18 months will serve as chief appraiser also for the salary of the re-appraisal work. This will be a savings to the tax payers of the extra salary, office facilities and staff for 18 months if SoRelle were not the person selected. In addition there will be a continuity in the office from re-appraisal to chief appraiser with no break-in point.

The savings is estimated at about \$30,000. The position of chief appraiser-tax collector was made in another contract with SoRelle. Salary for chief appraiser-tax collector will be \$23,400 in 1982; \$24,720 for 1983 and \$26,160 in 1984 as annual salary.

The creation of the county property and the other implementations new to Donley County and other county entity taxing entities are the result of S.B. 621 on taxing and is mandatory for the entire state of Texas.

When the re-appraisal is complete the Donley County Tax Appraisal Board will appoint a new review board which will then review all property appraisals in the

county. Results of the appraisal will be released about May 1982. At that time each property owner will be notified of the appraised value of

There will be no charge. It will be in Clarendon at the Donley County Community Action Corporation, 322 S. Kearney on July 28 from 10-2 p.m.

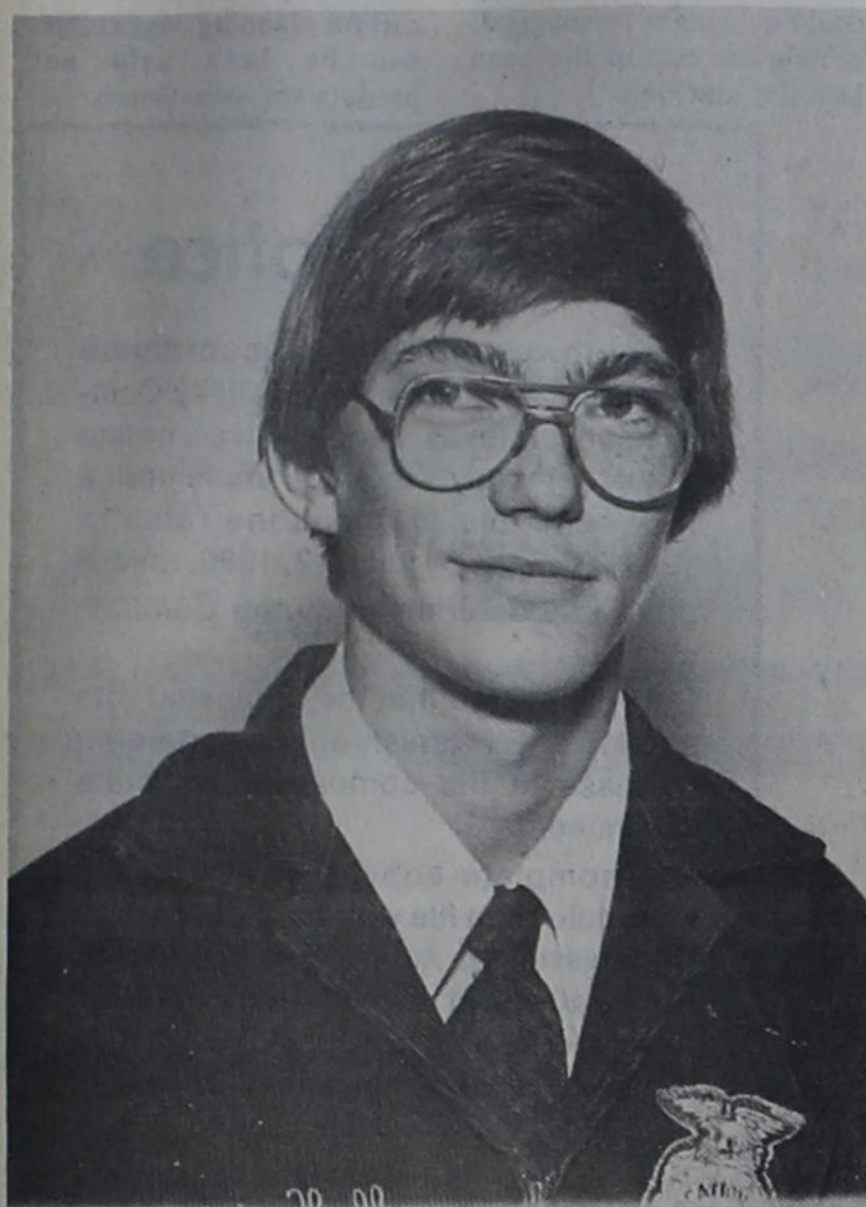
## Farm Bureau annual fete

Con't frm p. 1 Appraisal Board his property. At this time the property owner can go to the chief appraiser if he feels he has cause and/or appear before the review board.

The Donley County Appraisal Board has nothing to do with setting the tax rate. They do compile a tax roll and each of the several taxing entities will set their own tax rate.

The Donley County Appraisal Board also retained Jerry Courtney to act as their attorney.

Charles SoRelle will be writing some articles on the new tax system for the Clarendon Press this fall. These articles will help the reader understand the new Texas tax law #621.

For example, hardhats, or lighter weight "bumps caps," will protect the head from the sun as well as the common bumps and bruises of everyday jobs.

Gooch also suggests using protective eyewear and filter masks or respirators to protect eyes and lungs from dust or harmful chemicals. This is especially important when using anhydrous ammonia, pesticides or other toxic agents.

Gloves are good protection against common hand injuries, and should be used for many operations around the farm or ranch. However, Gooch warns that they should be removed when working with moving machinery parts since they could be caught or snagged, pulling the rest of the hand into the machine.

Safety shoes and boots should be worn by all agricultural workers, Gooch suggests, as even a minor foot injury can be annoying and slow down a busy work schedule. This footwear is comfortable and comes with "non-slip" soles for work on any surface.

Gooch feels that a common but often neglected injury is hearing loss due to many hours around noisy machinery. Many farmers and ranchers suffer some hearing loss, especially in later years, and this could be reduced by regularly using ear muffs or ear inserts and by purchasing quiet-running machinery.

With proper use of protective equipment and a little careful planning, agriculture can be both safe and productive, says Gooch.

## Bookworm

Children: Please remember to turn your books in by July 31st. Have your parents certify in your log book that the books have been read. "BROADWAY MUSICALS" is a beautiful new book we have in the library. It was given in memory of

June Palmer by her sister, Laverne Collins, of Amarillo. No other book about Broadway has captured the exhilaration-the energy, color, and sheer size-of the musical with such lavish coverage. This extraordinary volume

explores the musical theater in all its dimensions with nearly four hundred pictures, one hundred twelve of them in full color, including original production shots of all the great musicals, from Show Boat to a Chorus Line, on the 20th Century, and Sweeney Todd. The most beloved shows from the first decade of the twentieth century to the present, are all here. Charles Mercer, author of

twenty five books, including Rachel Cade, Enough Good Men, The Minister has written a new novel. It is titled "Murray Hill". Spanning more than eighty years, MURRAY HILL recreates a world in which the "book business" was a blend of printers and pirates. From the moment she defies turn-of-the century New York society to marry "a bookseller-a mere low publisher!" Cordelia Dorfman Lovejoy shares one overwelling ambition with her husband: to live "on top of Murray Hill" in Manhattan. Buddy, who plans to major in ranch management at West Texas State University, was one of 50 recipients of Houston Livestock Show and Rodeo scholarships presented at the State FFA Convention. The Show, which also presented 50 four-year, \$6,000 scholarships to 4-H members during their State Roundup in June, is the largest donor of agricultural scholarships in the United States. During the coming school year, the Show will have 389 students on scholarships in Texas colleges and universities, representing a commitment of \$2.1 million.

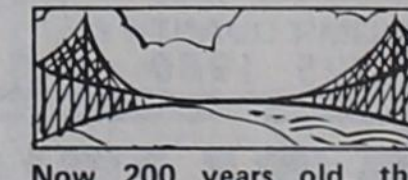

Adults wishing to form an adult soccer league should write the Clarendon Soccer League, Box 205, Clarendon.

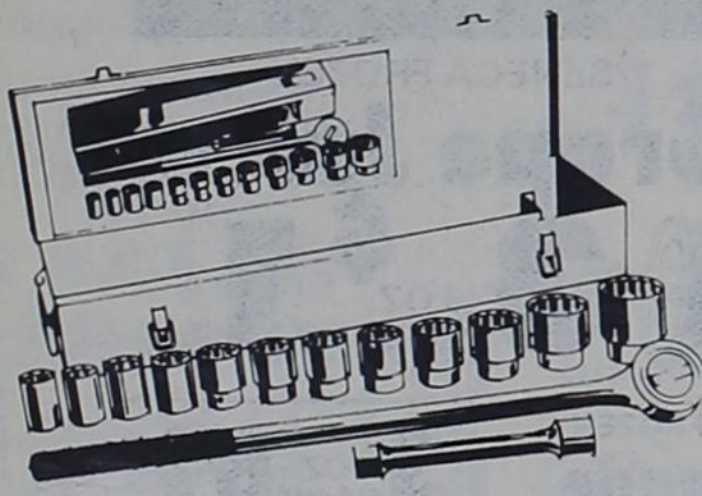

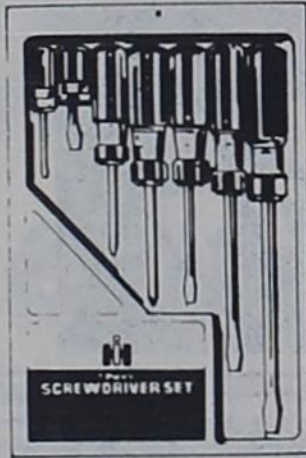

**The Consumer Alert**

AUSTIN—The United States Department of Labor recently announced that the Consumer Price Index has risen 14.4% since May, 1979. With this type of inflation, more and more people are seeking a fast and easy way to increase their incomes. Unfortunately, some individuals are hoping to get rich quick by becoming participants in illegal chain letter pyramid schemes.

The chain letter is one of the oldest and most resilient schemes in the annals of consumer fraud history. In recent months, the infamous chain letter in Texas has taken on a new twist - the letter has been eliminated! The new scheme, simply called an endless chain scheme, does not involve the purchase or sale of a good or service as with the typical chain letter. The organizers and participants of the endless chain offer consumers a membership in a club often called the Executive Investment Club or 32 Club. This club is composed of 64 members. Each consumer must pay \$1000 to join. After the consumer purchases a membership, his or her name is placed on a line on a chart resembling a genealogy chart with 64 lines. Each line is numbered 1 to 64.

On the number 1 line of the chart is the person who is closest to receiving money from the club. This individual, usually, has been on the chart the longest time. The person receiving money is said to be "on the payroll." He is the person receiving payments from new members.

As consumers purchase memberships, their names are placed on the line with the next highest number until all 64 lines are filled. A new member pays \$500 to the person whose name appears on the "payline" and the remaining \$500 to the person whose name appears on the line immediately before the new member's name. Once the

club has 64 members, it splits in half with the person on line number 1 moving to the "payline" and the persons on lines number 2 and 3 becoming the leaders of 2 new clubs. The two new clubs draw new charts moving each member's name closer to the number 1 position. Once everyone's name has been moved up the new clubs have 32 vacancies each or a total of 64 openings for both clubs. Each new club then recruits its own members until it reaches the maximum of 64 members. Then another split occurs.

New participants are encouraged to sell memberships in the club so that all members will move up the chart as quickly as possible, finally reaching the "payline" which entitled them to receive \$500 from each new member. The recruiting members represent that an individual on the "payline" can receive \$32,000 (\$500 from each of the 64 new members).

Consumers have no way of knowing the number of clubs which have been formed prior to one which they may join. If a large number of clubs have been formed already there may not be sufficient individuals available to join the club for it to split enough times to move the new member to the payroll. Further, it is not readily apparent to a consumer how many times the club will have to split before the consumer reaches the "payline." The consumer may not be able to visualize the large number of people who will be required to join for a new member to receive a payoff.

Hard lessons are being learned by people all over the state who have been arrested for violations of §32.48 of the Texas Penal Code. This statute prohibits promoting, starting, operating, or participating in endless chain schemes. The Attorney General's Office is assisting other law enforcement agencies in the investigation of these endless chain schemes.

It is important to remember that endless chain schemes are illegal because experience has shown that the schemes are bound to fail. Someone, eventually, will not be able to find individuals to sell memberships to and will lose his investment. The problem lies with market saturation. To be effective, an endless chain must expand its base geometrically. Because the geometrical progression expands so greatly in a relatively short period of time, no one is left to buy in. Normally, the only people who make money on these schemes are the individuals who start them.

If you are asked to participate in any kind of an endless chain scheme - regardless of the representations made to you that they are legal, say no. The scheme is illegal, and in the end the chances are extremely high that you will lose.

**THE STING**

It is estimated that two million Americans are severely allergic to the venom of bees, wasps, yellow jackets, and hornets. Each year, fifty to one-hundred people die as a result of stings from one of these insects.

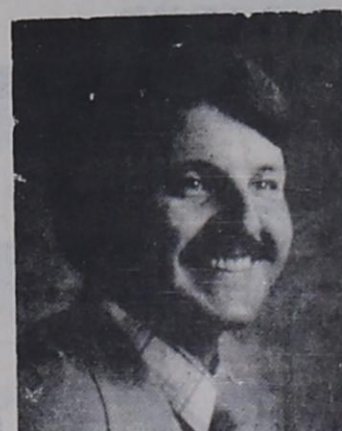
A person who is allergic to stinging insects usually experiences soreness and swelling. This may occur in parts of the body far from the sting. Chills, fever, joint pain, and swelling of the lymph glands can occur.

Death as a result of stings can happen in a matter of minutes to a few hours. The blood pressure drops and loss of consciousness occurs. For sting-sensitive people, stings should be avoided. This is often difficult in the summer months when the insect population is plentiful.

Physicians may prescribe an insect sting kit for their high risk patients. This kit consists of injectable adrenalin [epinephrine], a chewable antihistamine tablet, and a tourniquet. When used properly and quickly following a sting, such kits are considered life-saving.

Injections of venoms from stinging insects have been used with some success to "immunize" sensitive people against stings. Several injections are necessary to provide an adequate level of immunity.

Modern medicines help sting-sensitive people lead relatively normal lives without fear of stinging insects.

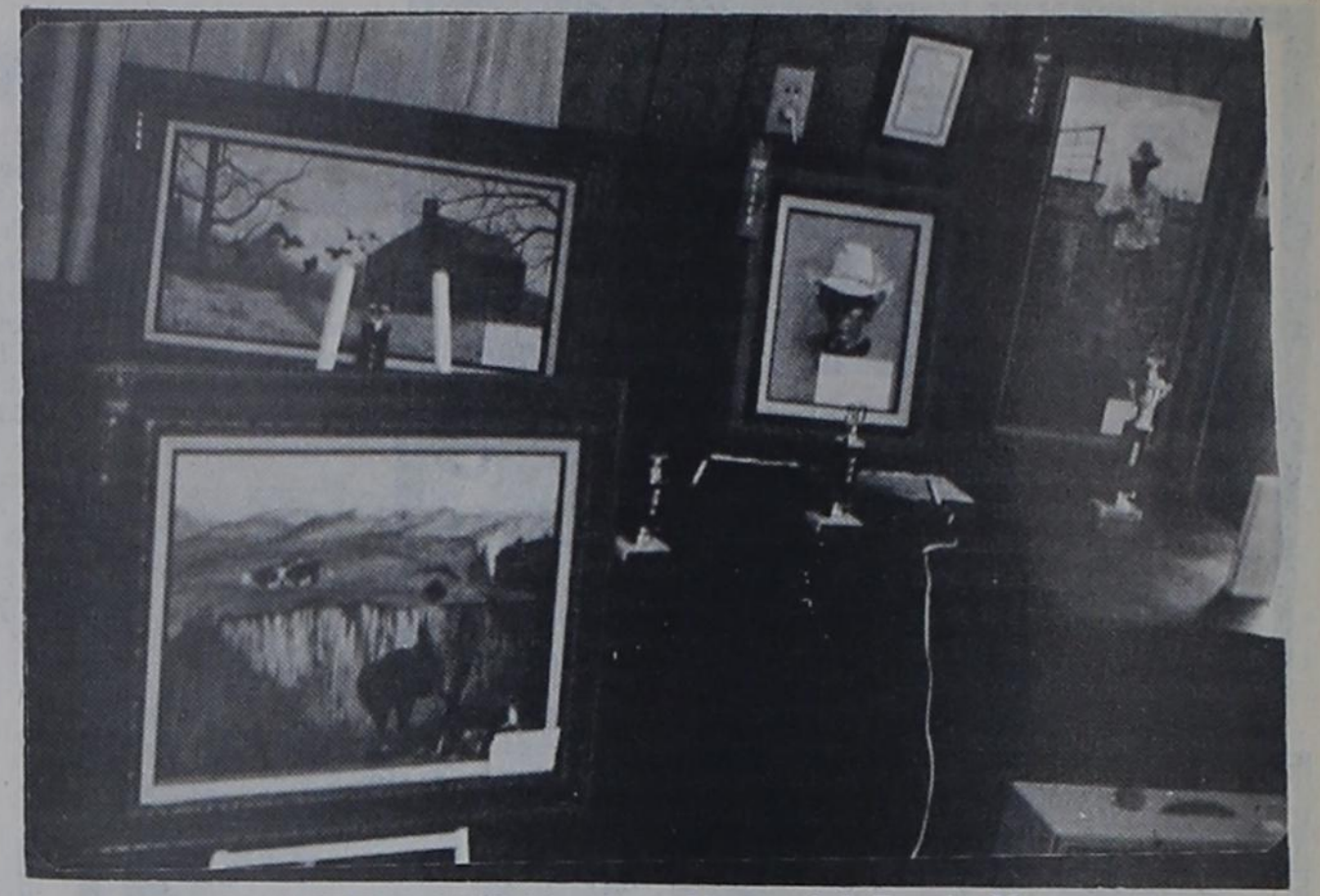

## Tips to keep you cool

Right now, the most important appliance in your home may be your air conditioner. Here are some tips from the makers of Day & Night and Payne air conditioners which will help your air conditioners work more efficiently and keep you cool longer.

\*Don't fiddle with the thermostat. Set the temperature to a comfortable level and forget it. Excessive "on and offing" can damage the components of the unit. Besides, energy will be wasted as the air conditioner tries to keep up with your changing demand.

\*If your clothes dryer vent is close to the air conditioner or heat pump, consider other ways of venting the dryer. Hot vapor from the dryer places an extra load on the air conditioner. Lint from the vent can cause damage.

\*Run appliances such as a clothes dryer and do as much cooking as possible in early morning hours. This is better than at night because in the evening on a hot day, the air conditioner is still working to bring down the temperature from the daytime heat.

\*Keep curtains closed on sunny windows during the day. Homes in humid areas should be kept "closed" with the air conditioning turned on during July and August -- even if the weather is cool but humid say the experts. Because dryer air seems cooler than humid air, your air conditioner can be "on" less when the humidity is low.

\*Trim shubbery and limbs back. Landscaping that hides

an air conditioner or heat pump may look more pleasing but reduces efficiency by curtailing air movement. Shrubs could cause damage if leaves or twigs are sucked into the unit.

\*Have the unit cleaned and checked by a qualified service representative. Coils should be cleaned. This is a job some homeowners can undertake themselves but first they should have the dealer's service representative do it and observe -- especially learn how to properly shut off electricity to the unit.

\*Filters, too, need to be cleaned, if permanent type. Disposable ones should be thrown away. Check these

once a month. It is a good idea to buy a throw-away filter to use while the permanent filter is being cleaned (with a garden hose on the driveway) and is drying.

\*Consider planting a strategic tree or build a sun-screen unit or heat pump is located on the south or west side of the house. However, it should be far enough away to minimize potential problems with leaves.

\*Insulate duct work. \*Caulk storm windows as well as main windows and doors.

\*Fireplace damper should be closed unless fire is in fireplace.

## Heat exhaustion - symptoms & corrective measures

Thousands of people have been stricken by heat exhaustion during the worst heat wave in the country's history. Many victims could have been spared this physical trauma, however, if they had followed a few simple precautions.

Who's most affected by heat? Although people who work outdoors, such as construction workers, city service employees, firemen, window washers, painters and gardeners are primary victims -- anyone who undergoes physical exertion when the temperature soars above 90 degrees F. is susceptible -- this includes joggers, bikers and even sun bathers.

Of course, the elderly must observe every precaution for heat exhaustion.

According to researchers at Wagner Thirst Quencher, the most common warning signs of which everyone should be aware are:

- (1) Clammy skin, (2) profuse perspiration, (3) tiredness, weakness, (4) headaches, cramps, (5) nausea, dizziness (possible vomiting), (6) fainting (the victim will regain consciousness when he falls down and blood rushes to his head).
