Clarendon College has record fall enrollment

Clarendon College has announced final enrollment figures for the Fall, 1980 Semester. The total head count enrollment was 951 Students, the largest enrollment in the history of the college. The enrollment figures are divided among four instructional areas; academic, vocational-technical, adult-vocational, and community service. The instructional area and enrollment figures are listed: Academic 601; Vocational Technical 107; Adult-Vocational 191; and Community Service 52.

The figures reflect total enrollments for the classes offered at the Clarendon College campus, the Pampa Center, and off-campus classes in Childress, Wellington, and Shamrock. Dr. Bob E. Riley, Dean of Instruction at Clarendon College stated, "We are very pleased with the enrollment this fall, we feel that the 10 percent increase in last fall's enrollment is the direct result of Clarendon College attempting to be responsive to the educational needs in our service area."



States taxes up 11% over last year

State Comptroller Bob Bullock Friday said October payments to cities levying the optional one-percent city sales tax brings the 1980 total rebates to more than \$446.8 million.

He said payments of \$28.2 million were made to cities for the month of October.

Bullock said the October payments bring rebates to Texas cities this year within \$20.2 million of total moneys returned to cities during all of 1979, and with two months remaining in the year, 1980 payments should go well over last year's.

The one-percent city sales tax is collected along with the state's four-percent tax by merchants and businesses and returned monthly in the

cities where it is collected by the Comptroller's office.

Clarendon received \$3,596.46 for this payment period up from \$2,625.45 for the same period last year.

To date 1980 payments are \$52,294.72. For 1979 payments thru 10-25-79 were \$46,715.24 for a 1980 increase of 11%.

Pathfinder Club meets

The Pathfinder Club met at the Patching Memorial Club House October 10th with Mrs. Clarence Hamilton and Mrs. Tommy Saye, hostesses. Our speaker for the afternoon was Mr. Clarence Hamilton from Clarendon College. His topic of Donley County history was taken from "Donley County History, 1878-1910 Newspaper Accounts, of and by Early Settlers" collected by Clayton Ferris.

In an article by Katherine Patrick she writes "About five miles north of Clarendon, where Carroll Creek flows into Salt Fork, are a few foundations of homes and crumbling rock walls; all that is left of old Clarendon, that settlement so bravely begun by L.H. Carhart when in 1878 he brought a small band of men and women from the North and East and settled there. The first settlers in a country unmistakably stamp the true character of that country. We citizens of today are very thankful that the brave little band of home builders who settled on the banks of Carroll Creek many years ago were gentlemen and gentlewomen.


On April 11, 1882, the county was organized and the newly elected officers were sworn in by Judge Emmanuel Dubbs, then county judge of Wheeler County. Court was held in

Old Clarendon and as there were 11 counties attached for judicial purposes, it usually lasted several weeks. Al Gentry was the first elected sheriff and was very popular with the citizens. Temple Houston tried many cases and the courtroom was always crowded when he came; he was a very dramatic and interesting speaker."

From the Clarendon Chronicle published by W.P. Blake, Editor and Proprietor, July 4, 1903. July 1878, the little colony over on Salt Fork celebrated for the first time the Fourth in the Panhandle. "If a prophet had risen up last New Years Day and spoken of a celebration of Independence Day in Donley County, after the good old style of a jubilee he would without doubt have been regarded as a visionary lunatic, unworthy of attention. At the dawn 37 rounds of shots were fired. At 9 o'clock the flag was raised on the heights overlooking the town. The old bell was run

with gusto as the flag was hoisted. Prayer was offered by Rev. L.H. Carhart; the Declaration of Independence was read by J.H. Parks Esq., after which the whole assembly joined rousing in singing the chorus of America. After another song Rev. Carhart was called upon to respond to the toast "The Future of the Panhandle."

Mr. Hamilton told of the work of the Historical Commission. Our thanks go to Mr. Hamilton and other members of the Texas State Historical Commission for having our old courthouse declared an historical landmark. The contract for the courthouse was let on February 15, 1890, at a cost of thirty thousand dollars! At that time Hall, Briscoe, and Armstrong Counties were attached to Donley Co. for judicial purposes, and the size of the district justified an imposing building. Bulgar and Rapp were the architects and troutman Brothers of Trinidad, Colo. the contractors.

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HEAT'S ON

I will be in Amarillo for the Naval Enlisted Reserve Association National Convention during the time I should be preparing this article, so I have gotten myself in a pickle. The jam I am in is that I can't do an interview with anyone in time for the deadline. So, I will give you some pickle and jam recipes.

Pickled Dilled Beans

- 2 lbs green beans
- 1 C white vinegar
- 2 TBS pickling salt
- 1/4 tsp cayenne
- 2 tsp dillweed

2 cloves garlic, crushed
Wash beans; drain. Trim ends. Cut beans to fit jars. Cove beans with boiling water; cook 3 minutes. Drain. Pack lengthwise into hot jars, leaving 1/2 inch headspace. In a saucepan combine vinegar, 3 C water, pickling salt, dill, cayenne and garlic; bring to boiling. Cover beans with pickling liquid, leaving 1/2 inch headspace. Adjust lids. Process in boiling water bath 10 minutes. Makes 4 pints.

Green Tomato Dill Pickles

5 lbs small firm green tomatoes
fresh dill heads or dillseed
garlic cloves
whole cloves
4 C vinegar
1/2 C salt
Wash tomatoes, slice 1/2 inch thick. Pack tomatoes loosely into hot quart jars leaving 1/2 inch headspace. To each quart add 3 or 4 heads dill or 2 TBS dillseed, 1 clove garlic, and 1 whole clove. In saucepan combine vinegar, salt and 4 C water. Bring to boiling. Pour boiling

pickling liquid over tomatoes, leaving 1/2 inch headspace. Adjust lids. Process in boiling water bath 20 minutes.

Pickle Problems

Shriveled pickles are produced by using too strong a salt, sugar or vinegar solution; overcooking; or over-processing.

Soft pickles are the result of using too little salt or acid, insufficient processing or not fresh cucumbers.

Apple Marmalade

- 1 orange
- 6 medium apples, peeled, cored and coarsely chopped (6 C)
- 3 TBS lemon juice
- 5 C sugar

Quarter unpeeled orange. Remove seeds. Thinly slice orange. In 8-10 quart kettle or Dutch oven combine first three ingredients and 2 C water. Bring mix to boiling. Reduce heat; simmer till apples are tender, about 10 minutes. Add sugar. Bring to full rolling boil, stirring constantly. Continue cooking and stirring till thickened and clear (220 degrees on candy thermometer). Remove from heat; skim off foam. Pour at once into hot sterilized jars, seal.

Carrot Jam

- 4 C grated raw carrots
- 3 C sugar

juice and grated rind of 2 lemons
1/2 tsp ground cloves
1/2 tsp ground all spice
1/2 tsp ground cinnamon
Combine all ingredients. Bring to a slow boil, reduce heat and simmer, stirring constantly, until thick. Pour into hot sterilized jars. Process 10 minutes in boiling water bath at simmering temperature.

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Dialysis Center

dedicated to
Cooke

The South Plains Dialysis Center held grand opening and dedication ceremonies Sunday at its new location, 4110 22nd Place.

In a surprise ceremony, the center was dedicated to Mr. and Mrs. Alex Cooke Sr. in honor of their extensive efforts toward establishing the center in 1973. Cooke was a kidney disease patient for several years prior to a 1970 visit to the Mayo Clinic in Rochester, Minn. After training there, he began dialysis treatments at home because there were no dialysis services available in West Texas at that time.

For responding to this need, the Cookes were recognized with a plaque naming them founders and with portraits, all of which were placed in the center's main lobby.

The new facility has expanded dialysis capability from 20 to 27 artificial kidney machines serving patients twice daily, Monday through Saturday. The center provides outpatient treatment three times a week for each patient, as well as separate treatment for pediatric patients and some home dialysis training. Patients range in age from 8 to 80 and some come from as far as 100 miles away for dialysis.

Future plans call for treating 32 patients simultaneously and for providing continuous ambulatory peritoneal dialysis. Training for that service is underway. In addition, dialysis patients and others with kidney disease may receive specialized services through the W. Tom Campbell Memorial Laboratory.

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



Cotton exports

U.S. exports in the 1979/80 season (August-July) reached the highest level since 1926/27. Exports totaled 8.8 million running bales (9.2 million 480-lb bales), 50 percent above those of 1978/79. Foreign demand was strong as world consumption increased 2.0 million bales to total 65.0 million during the season. U.S. shipments increased to most markets. The United States harvested a large crop and was in a position to supply both domestic and foreign buyers with abundant supplies. The USSR, the second largest exporter, reported a record seed cotton crop, but proved to be a reluctant seller in export markets. (Foreign Agriculture Circular, Cotton, September 1980)





CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENTS
GENERAL ELECTION
NOVEMBER 4, 1980

PROPOSITION NO. 4 ON THE BALLOT

Senate Joint Resolution 18 proposes a constitutional amendment that would allow the Legislature to authorize the conduct of bingo games by certain specified groups for charitable purposes, subject to the limitations that operation of the games must be approved in local option elections and that all proceeds must be spent in Texas.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment to authorize bingo games on a local option election basis if the games are conducted by a church, synagogue, religious society, volunteer fire department, nonprofit veterans organization, fraternal organization, or nonprofit organization supporting medical research or treatment programs and if the proceeds are to be spent in Texas for charitable purposes of the organizations."

PROPOSITION NO. 5 ON THE BALLOT

House Joint Resolution 86 proposes a constitutional amendment that would allow the Legislature to authorize the Governor to exercise fiscal control over the expenditure of certain appropriated funds, subject to any conditions and limitations provided by law and subject to the approval of a budget execution committee that would be composed of the Gov-

ernor, Lieutenant Governor, Speaker of the House of Representatives, Chairman and Vice-chairman of the Senate Finance Committee, and Chairman and Vice-chairman of the Committee on Appropriations of the House of Representatives.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment to grant the governor power to exercise fiscal control over the expenditure of appropriated funds as provided by law."

PROPOSITION NO. 6 ON THE BALLOT

Senate Joint Resolution 8 proposes a constitutional amendment that would allow the Governor who appointed a previously confirmed official to remove that official from office subject to the advice and consent of the Senate; and if the Legislature is not in session, to call a special session of the Senate which may last no longer than 2 days for consideration of the removal.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment to authorize the governor to remove appointed officers with the advice and consent of the senate."

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A FEW DAYS OR FOREVER?

How long should prescription medicines be taken? This will depend on the type medicine in question and the condition for which it is being used.

Medicines used to treat symptoms that "come and go" are often taken for only a few days. Medicines used for acute pain, fever, and the common cold fall into this category. Such products are usually taken on an "if needed" or "when needed" basis.

Antibiotics and certain other medicines are designed to be taken for a specific period of time. The infection-fighter penicillin, for example, might be taken three or four times a day for a minimum of seven to ten days. If one skips doses or takes an antibiotic for fewer than the days determined by the physician, recovery may be prolonged.

Medicines used in chronic diseases such as high blood pressure, diabetes, heart failure, or angina are generally taken for life. The prescribed doses must be taken exactly as prescribed...usually on a daily basis.

For medicines to work effectively, they must be taken properly. When questions arise concerning the medicines you are taking, ask your pharmacist or physician.

Fish tails

By KATIE DVORAK
The water levels in many lakes around the state are lower than usual because of the severe summer drought. Some reservoirs have become obstacle courses for boaters because of submerged logs, stumps, fence rows and islands. Boaters should use extra caution in crossing the lakes because of the dangerous submerged hazards. Night boating could be a real hazard unless extreme caution is used.
But, in addition to a risk, the low water conditions will have some positive benefits in the future from a fisheries standpoint. "While the lake levels are low, there will be new growth of grasses and other vegetation around the fertile perimeter of the lakes", said Bruce Hysmith, Texas Parks and Wildlife Department biologist. "When the lake levels return

to normal, this vegetation will provide additional habitat for fish to spawn."
Even as the weeds and grass begin to die and decay in the water, there are other positive benefits. The decayed matter becomes a part of the food chain and in some cases, releases a mild acid into the water which has a clearing effect on muddy areas.
"Even now as the lake levels are low, there are some benefits," he said. "Many of the small forage fish have been forced from their sheltered areas around the shoreline into deeper portions of the lake. Basically, you have the same number of fish occupying a

smaller area of water."
In a concentrated situation like this, game fish are able to obtain food without exerting as much effort. With more food available, they may grow more quickly. Low water conditions also may help eliminate noxious vegetation in water, although this is not a problem in many reservoirs affected by the drought.



When asked about his guarantee on the work Lauderdale does on either a car or tractor, Phil commented that "I don't give a guarantee for a certain period of time, but if it breaks down or doesn't work like it should in a reasonable amount of time and it's my fault, I'll fix it until it's done right. That seldom happens."


