Salvage Committee Appointed

The Callahan County Salvage Committee, whose members were appointed by Judge Freeland held a meeting Tuesday morning to discuss the collecting of Scrap Iron, Metal and tires and rubber.

A Total of more than 900 tons of scrap iron has already been collected and sold by the farmers and ranchers in this County, but the material is needed badly in a thorough house-to-house campaign is being started.

All farmers and ranchers will be sent a card and are asked to return this card which will tell the Salvage Committee the amount of scrap iron or rubber each farm or ranch has to be picked up by truck.

Another card will be mailed to each person who has scrap iron, telling them when trucks with scales will come to their farm or ranch for the scrap iron or rubber.

This material will be bought or anyone can donate it, regardless of whether it is donated or bought, the Army needs all the scrap iron available for the manufacture of Army equipment and ammunition.

The Callahan County U. S. D. A War Board and the Callahan County Agricultural Victory Council are cooperating in this effort to collect the needed materials.

Jimmie Maltby Member Pioneer Family Dead

Jimmie Maltby, 61, died at his home near Rowden about 8 o'clock Wednesday evening as he sat in a rocking chair on the porch, where he was found a short time later by his nephew Warren Price. He had eaten supper and gone out on the porch only a few minutes before.

James Taylor Maltby was the youngest son of the late Capt. J. T. and Mrs. Maltby, prominent pioneer residents of Callahan county who established the home in Spring Gap Mountain in the late 70's where Jimmie was born June 18, 1881, where he has lived his entire life and where he died at the close of day Wednesday.

His only sister, Mrs. W. M. Price has lived with him for some years she and Mr. Price going there after Mr. Maltby's health began to fail some years ago and when Mr. Price died several years ago. Mr. Maltby was never married and is survived by his sister who is the only surviving member of the Maltby family; father mother, five sons and three daughters. Three nephews and two nieces survive, Warren Price, Jeff and Giles Maltby, Mrs. Ernest Higgins and Mrs. Billie Mae Bolinger.

Funeral services were held at 4 o'clock yesterday at the Methodist Church at Belle Plain, Rev. Royce Gilliland conducting the services. Burial was made in the family plot with his parents, brothers and sisters. Mr. Maltby was a member of the Baird Odd Fellows Lodge.

Official U. S. Treasury TEXAS WAR BOND QUOTAS FOR JUNE

WASHINGTON, D. C. June 1.—Henry Morgenthau, Jr., Secretary of the Treasury, today made known June War Bond quotas for the 3,070 counties in the nation to all State and County War Savings Staffs.

The June quota for the State of Texas is \$26,002,200. The county quotas, based upon a substantial increase over May quotas, are expected to reach ten per cent of income when the nation goes on a billion-dollar-a-month War Bond basis in July to help meet the war cost. "Everybody, every day, ten per cent," is the battle cry throughout the country. You can buy War Bonds at your Bank, Building & Loan Association, Post Office and at many department stores.

J. W. Farmer, 72, longtime resident of Baird was found dead in the home of his daughter, Mrs. Bernice Andrews late Wednesday afternoon.

Mr. and Mrs. Andrews went to Bonham the first of last week where Mr. Andrews had a position on some defense work leaving Mr. Farmer who had made his home with them for some years alone at home. Neighbors noticed Wednesday evening that they had not seen Mr. Farmer out all day as had been his custom and went to see about him and found him where he had fallen. A physician was summoned and said he had died from natural causes.

Funeral services were held at 5:30 yesterday afternoon at the Baptist Church, Rev. Bell Christian minister of Abilene, conducting the services. Burial was made in Ross cemetery beside his wife who died five years ago in April.

Burial bearers were Ernest Franke, R. M. Warren, Spencer Price, E. B. Brown, S. L. McElroy and Hugh Smith.

James W. Farmer was the son of W. B. and Fannie Farmer, early-day residents of Cross Plains. He was born in Bosque county Dec. 2, 1869 and came to Callahan county with his parents in 1882. The family consisted of the parents, 9 sons and 2 daughters. The parents and four brothers have preceded him in death. Survivors are his three daughters, Mrs. W. V. Walls and Mrs. Bernice Andrews of Baird and Mrs. W. H. Berry of California. Brothers surviving are: M. G. Farmer, Baird; E. C. Farmer, Austin; R. H. Farmer, Brownwood; O. B. Farmer, Ashford, Ariz.; U. L. Farmer, Phoenix, Ariz.; and two sisters Mrs. Dr. Thurman, San Angelo and Mrs. Percy Jones, Dublin and a number of grandchildren.

Mr. Farmer has lived in Baird for some thirty or more years being employed for some years with the Texas and Pacific Ry. Co. and later was engaged in the photograph business for some years. He served as Justice of the Peace of Baird precinct for several years.

Allred Pledges To Speak From Written Record

James V. Allred, candidate for United States senator, hit the trail this week with the formal opening of his speaking campaign at a homecoming rally Tuesday night in Wichita Falls.

Pledging that he would pitch his campaign strictly on the written record, and not on personalities or abuse, Allred opened what he described as Chapter I of the "Book of Revelation" dealing with the record in Congress of the present junior senator.

In the first chapter, Allred cited the recorded vote of W. Lee O'Daniel against extension of selective service "at the very time the blueprints for the blitzkrieg upon Pearl Harbor and Manila had already been drawn" and against the recommendation of President Roosevelt, whom O'Daniel had said he "wanted to help."

Calling upon all Texans to unite in the war effort, Allred declared, "We must go into the factories, the stores, out upon the farm and ranches everywhere, and work 24 hours a day, seven days a week until our boys return victorious to their loved ones. All other matters are secondary to this high and sacred obligation. Obstruction tactics, isolationism, appeasement, arraying classes against class, and all other petty practices, tolerated in peace time, must go for the duration."

The former governor called for speedy action to aid "our little businessmen, salesmen and other employees facing liquidation and unemployment because of priorities and war adjustments."

Allred declared that their situation will become desperate unless the government speedily extends to them other avenues of service, employment and of credit.

Maintain Summer Production

WORMS

Rain plus warm days are increasing worm infestation in most poultry flocks. If the flock has not been recently treated for intestinal parasites, it is well that they be wormed using a reliable powder in the mash for two or three days.

GREEN FEED

Green feed is a balance—it picks up where management may fall short. See that they always have plenty. If tender green feed is not available, feed alfalfa hay.

GRAIN

Laying hens don't need as much grain in the summer as they do in the winter. An easy way of figuring grain for the days feeding is 1 quart for each 25 hens.

MASH

Keep 'm eating mash. This one food stimulates egg production. Don't try to be "scotch" let her have all she wants. Give her a wet mash at noon.

HOUSES

Now is the time to open those ventilators on the poultry house. Floor line ventilators reduces inside temperature of the house.

MAINTAIN EGG QUALITY DURING THE SUMMER PRODUCE ONLY INFERTILE EGGS

Losses from fertile eggs are costing poultry farmers of the United States 615,000,000 annually. This money would buy 15,944 Browning Machine Guns or 857 guns of the 155 m. m. class for the army.

CARING FOR EGGS

- 1. Keep a good clean litter in the nests. 2. Provide one nest for each five hens. 3. Gather eggs at least twice daily during the summer. 4. Keep eggs in a wire basket and in a cool place—recommendation M. S. 443—Iceless Refrigerator for holding eggs to check evaporation and reduce temperature. 5. Market eggs at least twice each week.

CONFINE BROODY HENS

Broody hens left on nests reduce egg quality, break eggs and cut into the profit.

SHELL TEXTURE

Keep clean oyster shell or ground limestone available in open hopper. If shells are thin, sprinkle a handful of oyster shell on top of the feed every few days until condition is corrected.

FARM AND RANCH PAYMENTS IN CALLAHAN COUNTY

There have been 1318 applications for payment submitted to College Station under the 1941 Agricultural Conservation Program and payments have been received on 1102 of these applications, amounting to \$84,834.76.

There are 1522 work sheets in this county and out of this number 192 farms did not make compliance.

There are 124 range work sheets in the county, of which 43 failed to carry out practices and earned no payment last year 78 applications were submitted under the range program and there are three pending range applications in the county office.

We have received payment on 62 range applications amounting to \$16,233.32. Approximately \$27,000 could have been earned by Callahan ranchers under the 1941 range program.

There are 719 wheat farms in this county, 212 of which are non-allotment wheat farms and are not eligible for parity payments.

Parity payments were not made on 38 wheat farms due to the fact that the wheat allotment was overplanted and one wheat farm failed to qualify for payment because the cotton allotment for the farm was overplanted.

One wheat farm received no payment due to not being operated in 1941 and four farms were operated by producers who refused to have the farm measured, consequently no pay-

ment could be made to them. The wheat parity applications submitted for payment totalled 463 of which 460 have been paid amounting to \$10,354.93. There was approximately \$11,200 which could have been earned by Callahan wheat producers.

There are 893 cotton farms in Callahan County. New Grower cotton allotments were issued on 75 of these farms and they were not eligible for cotton parity payments.

One cotton farm failed to receive payment due to the fact that the cotton allotment was exceeded and 19 farms were ineligible for cotton parity payments because the wheat acreage allotments thereon were exceeded.

No payment was made on 11 farms which were operated were not measured due to the fact that the producers refused measurement. Applications for payment under the 1941 Cotton Parity Program totaling 782 were submitted to College Station and all of these applications have been paid, amounting to \$31,013.77.

Payments totaling \$31,265.00 could have been earned by Callahan producers under the 1941 cotton parity program.

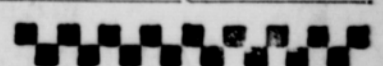

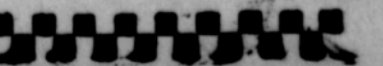

Notice Of Bond Election

THE STATE OF TEXAS: COUNTY OF CALLAHAN: TO THE RESIDENT QUALIFIED ELECTORS OF ROAD DISTRICT NO. 1 OF CALLAHAN COUNTY, TEXAS, WHO OWN TAXABLE PROPERTY IN SAID DISTRICT AND WHO HAVE DULY RENDERED THE SAME FOR TAXATION:

TAKE NOTICE that an election will be held in Road District No. 1 of Callahan County, Texas, on the 23rd day of June, 1942, on the proposition and at the places more particularly set forth in the election order passed by the Commissioners' Court on the 23rd day of May, 1942, which is as follows:

"AN ORDER" CALLING AN ELECTION ON THE PROPOSITION OF ISSUING FIFTY THOUSAND (\$50,000.00) DOLLARS OF BONDS OF ROAD DISTRICT NO. 1 OF CALLAHAN COUNTY, TEXAS.

WHEREAS, there has been presented to this Court the petition of T. A. White and 71 other persons, representing themselves to be resident qualified electors of Callahan Co. Road District No. 1, who own taxable property in said District and who have duly rendered the same for taxation, praying that this Court order an election in Road District No. 1 of Callahan County, Texas, to determine:

"Whether or not the bonds of said Road District No. 1 of Callahan County, Texas, shall be issued in an amount not to exceed Fifty Thousand (\$50,000.00) Dollars, bearing interest at a rate not to exceed 3 3/4 % per annum, payable semi-annually, and maturing at such time as may be fixed by the Commissioners' Court, serially or otherwise, in not to exceed twenty-two (22) years from the date thereof, for the purpose of the construction, maintenance and operation of macadamized, graveled or paved roads and turnpikes or in aid thereof throughout Road District No. 1 of Callahan County, Texas; and whether or not taxes shall be levied annually on all taxable property in Road District Number One sufficient to pay the annual interest on said bonds and provide a sinking fund sufficient to pay the bonds at their maturity."

which said petition was heretofore filed in this Court; and

WHEREAS, heretofore on the 7th day of May, 1942, the Commissioners' Court passed an order fixing a time and place for a hearing on said petition, to-wit: May 23, 1942, and directed the County Clerk to issue a notice of such time and place of hearing to inform all persons concerned of their rights to appear at such hearing and to contend for or protest against the order of such election; and

WHEREAS, the County Clerk has heretofore duly executed said notice by posting true copies of said order of hearing in three public places within said Road District No. 1, and another copy thereof at the Courthouse door of said County for ten days prior to the date fixed for the hearing, and said notice has also been published in a newspaper of general circulation published in said Road District No. 1, namely The Baird Star, one time, on the 15 day of May, 1942, which was at least five days prior to the

date fixed for said hearing; and WHEREAS, this Court, having met at the time and place set for the hearing of said petition, proceeded to hear such petition and all matters in respect to the proposed bond election, to hear the contentions for and protest against the calling of such election, and it is found by the Court that the said petition is signed by more than fifty legally qualified electors who own taxable property in Callahan County Road District No. 1 and who have duly rendered the same for taxation, and that the notice required by law to be given of said hearing has been given; and

WHEREAS, pursuant to the hearing held on said date and from the evidence submitted at said hearing, the Court has determined that the proposed improvements would be for the benefit of all taxable property situated in such Road District No. 1, and that it is desirable and necessary to issue the bonds of said Road District No. 1 in the amount of Fifty Thousand (\$50,000.00) Dollars to construct said improvements, and that said election should be ordered; and

WHEREAS, the Commissioners' Court further finds that the amount of said proposed bond issue, together with all outstanding bonds of the same nature heretofore issued on the faith and credit of Callahan County Road District No. 1, will not exceed one-fourth of the assessed valuation of the real property of said District; and

WHEREAS, said Callahan County Road District No. 1 has heretofore been legally created by an order passed by the Commissioners' Court on the 14th day of November, 1917, which order is of record in the minutes of the Commissioners' Court;

THEREFORE, BE IT ORDERED BY THE COMMISSIONERS' COURT OF CALLAHAN COUNTY, TEXAS: That an election be held in said Callahan County Road District No. 1 on the 23rd day of June, 1942, which is not less than thirty days from the date of this order, to determine:

"Whether or not the bonds of said Road District No. 1 of Callahan County, Texas, shall be issued in an amount not to exceed Fifty Thousand (\$50,000.00) Dollars, bearing interest at a rate not to exceed 3 3/4 % per annum, payable semi-annually, and maturing at such time as may be fixed by the Commissioners' Court, serially or otherwise, in not to exceed twenty-two (22) years from the date thereof, for the purpose of the construction, maintenance and operation of macadamized, graveled or paved roads and turnpikes or in aid thereof throughout Road District No. 1 of Callahan County, Texas; and whether or not taxes shall be levied annually on all taxable property in Road District Number One sufficient to pay the annual interest on said bonds and provide a sinking fund sufficient to pay the bonds at their maturity."
