## Bronchos win homecoming 26-20

Homecoming is an exciting time. But when a team is coming off an emotionally drawing near upset over the number 2 class AA team in the state and they're faced with playing a strong contender like Sanford-Fritch, the difficulty of the game seems to multiply 10 times over.

But under the approving eyes of homecoming queen Kathy Wilson and her attendants Jenny Deyhle and Medina McAnear, the Bronchos upended the Eagles, 26-20. The Bronchos were extremely sluggish at the outset through the end of the second half. Coach Ted Allen explained, "They were still patting themselves on the back. They kept playing Childress over and over. It was a good ballgame, but it's over and you've got to turn your attention to the business at hand." The Bronchos suffered seven turnovers, while the Eagles had 5 giveaways.

It looked as though, however, that Clarendon might jump on the Eagles as they had Childress when SF tailback Derrel Price fumbled after a vicious hit by Bill Cornell and Phil Moreman recovered. However, the Bronchos were ineffective on offense, losing 8 yards in two plays. A Lynn Thompson fumble was recovered by Eagle tackle Gerald Wyche. The blue and white visitors led by quarterback Kerry Rice began ripping off big yardage. After Price gained 12 up the middle, however, Alton Gaines broke up a Rice pass intended for end Mark Hamel. The next Eagle Aerial was intercepted by Dean Hawkins to kill the drive. It didn't do much though, as an errant handoff resulted in a fumble and a Fritch recovery at the 20.

The Eagles then drove to the 5, where quarterback Rice swept left end for the touchdown. The extra point try was wide.

Following the kickoff, Thompson gained six, but was hit hard on the next play by noseguard Doug McCoy while he was handing to Weatherton. Again, Gerald Wyche made the recovery. This time, though the Eagles could not move, Rice's third down pass to his tight end Wyche was intercepted by Alvin Reese.

This series, the Bronchos began to change gears. Weatherton ran for 10 yards and a first down, then exploded for an 85 yard touchdown run. Thompson's extra point was true, and the Bronchos led by a score of 7-6.

The Eagles came back strong, grinding out tough yardage. On a third and long situation, fullback Doug McCoy plowed 20 yards to the 10. Price made it to the five, and the massive McCoy went in for the score. On the extra point attempt, the Eagles were thwarted by the entire defensive wall and the Eagles led 12-7.

But when the Bronchos got the ball they could do nothing to improve themselves. A fourth down punt try resulted in a snap fumble by center Jon Nichols. The Eagles recovered on the 25.

But what the Bronchos were to fumbles, Fritch was to interceptions. Alvin Reese plucked off a Rice pass and returned it to the 35. Weatherton ran for 12 and fumbled. Again the Eagles pounced on it.

But, alas, the Fritch offense bogged down and Rice punted. The ball apparently hit Alton Gaines on the foot. The Eagles returned it to the end zone for what one official called a touchdown. But the rule stipulated that a fumble cannot be advanced, so Fritch had one final play in the half. Rice's pass attempt to Wyche was broken up, and Fritch led 12-7 at halftime.

Clarendon received the 2nd half kickoff, and the offense was

stymied. An errant pitchout was recovered by Broncho tight end Tim Brown. Clarendon punted, fruitless on their first series of downs.

Fritch ground the ball to the two inch line where "Doomsday III" held. Thompson brought his offense on to the field, exactly 99 yards, 2 feet and 10 inch from paydirt. On the first play he rolled out right heavily pressured, leaping high in the air he launched a pass incomplete. The referee said he stepped on the end line for a safety. Fritch led 14-7.

The Eagles could not move, however, and punted away. Clarendon did the same, for three offensive series in fact.

the big block on that one, wiping the last defender out with a picture perfect downfield hit. The Bronchos went for two, but Thompson's pass fluttered short as he was heavily pressured.

The Eagles did not give up, though. They moved downfield quickly and Rice hit flanker Mark Hamel for a 15 yard T.D.

## Behind The Hiding Place to be shown Howardwick's First Baptist

"Corrie: Behind the Scenes with The Hiding Place," a new full-length color release from World Wide Pictures, will be shown at First Baptist Church, Howardwick, on October 21, 1979, Sunday. A single showing is scheduled to begin at 6 p.m.

"The Hiding Place," a true story filmed in Holland and other European locations, is based on the experiences of Corrie ten Boom, who, with her father, sister, and brother, provided refuge for countless Jewish families. A secret room was constructed in their home as a hiding place for use during Gestapo raids. The ten Boom's activities were discovered, and they were sent to prisons and concentration camps.

According to Kenneth Bliss, Director of Distribution for World Wide Pictures, "The Hiding Place" has been extremely well received, both by audiences and film critics.

"Corrie" was produced to give people who have seen "The Hiding Place" or read her many best-selling books an opportunity to hear her share many of her memories about her life in Holland, her family, and her lifetime of service to others."

Bliss added that the film "offers a great lesson in the perseverance of a personal faith in a very dark and trying period of world history. Corrie ten Boom, now in her eighties, has a tremendous vitality, a

deep spiritual commitment, and a profound love for her fellow man. We believe we have succeeded in transmitting a part of her zest, personality, and source of strength through this film."

Bliss noted that the film includes "interesting sidelights on the experiences of the cast and crew during the filming of

"The Hiding Place." The Reverend Jack Daniel, pastor of First Baptist, stresses that the showing of "Corrie" is open to the public free of charge. "We encourage families to plan to attend together, for what we believe will be a memorable experience," he concluded.

# Is your church drifting away from you?

Be sure to watch this new television series

## Churches of Christ / Who are these people?

At the close of each Herald of Truth program, these words appear on your television screen: "Herald of Truth, a television feature of Highland Church of Christ, Abilene, Texas; produced under the supervision of its elders; supported by churches of Christ and interested individuals around the world."

On this program, you have heard Batsell Barrett Baxter introduced as minister of the Hillsboro Church of Christ in Nashville, Tennessee, Harold Hazelip as minister of the Highland Street Church of Christ in Memphis, Tennessee, and Joe Barnett as minister of the Broadway Church of Christ in Lubbock, Texas.

And perhaps you've wondered, "Who are these people? What—if anything—distinguishes them from the hundreds of other churches in the world?"

You may have wondered: "What is their historical background?" "How many members do they have?" "What is their message?" "How are they governed?" "How do they worship?" "What do they believe about the Bible?"

You have been gracious enough to watch this program, and you deserve an answer to these questions. Today, on Herald of Truth, we want to give you the answers.

Since this program is produced by the Highland Church of Christ in Abilene, Texas—supported by churches of Christ—and since all three speakers are members of the church of Christ, we feel we should tell you more about ourselves.

Worldwide, we have some 20,000 congregations and 2 1/2 to 3 million individual members.

There are small congregations, consisting of just a few members, and large ones made up of several thousand members. There are churches of Christ in every state in the United States and in 109 other countries.

Early in this discussion, I must point out that we are a people of restoration spirit—wanting to restore in our time the original New Testament church.

Dr. Hans Kung, a well-known European theologian, published a book a few years ago entitled *The Church*. Dr. Kung lamented the fact that the established church has lost its way; has become burdened down with tradition; has failed to be what Christ planned it should be. The only answer, according to Dr. Kung, is to go back to the scriptures to see what the church was in its beginning, and then to recover in the twentieth century the essence of the original church. This is what churches of Christ are seeking to do.

In the latter part of the 18th century, men of different denominations, studying independently of each other, in various parts of the world, began to ask: "Why not go back beyond denominationalism to the simplicity and purity of the first-century church? Why not take the Bible alone and once again continue 'steadfastly in the apostles' teaching...'" (Acts 2:42)

They said, "Let's plant the same seed (the Word of God, Luke 8:11) that first-century Christians planted, and be Christians only, as they were." They were pleading with everyone to throw off denominationalism, to throw away human creeds and to follow only the Bible.

They taught that nothing should be required of people as acts of faith except that which is evident in the scriptures. They emphasized that going back to the Bible does not mean the establishment of another denomination, but rather a return to the original church.

We who are members of the churches of Christ are enthusiastic about this approach. With the Bible as our only guide, we seek to find what that original church was like and restore it exactly. We do not see this as arrogance, but the very opposite. We are saying that we do not have the right to ask for men's allegiance to a human organization—but only the right to call upon men to follow God's blueprint.

For this reason, we are not interested in man-made creeds, but simply in the New Testament pattern. We do not conceive of ourselves as being a denomination, but simply as members of the church which Jesus established and for which He died.

And that, incidentally, is why we wear His name. The term "church of Christ" is not used as a denominational designation, but rather as a descriptive term indicating that the church belongs to Christ.

We recognize our own personal shortcomings and weaknesses—and this is all the more reason for wanting to carefully follow the all-sufficient and perfect plan God has for the church.

Since God has vested "all authority" in Christ (Matthew 28:18), and since He serves as God's spokesman today (Hebrews 1:1,2), it is our conviction that only Christ has the authority to say what the church is and what we should teach.

And since only the New Testament sets forth Christ's instructions to His disciples, it alone must serve as the basis for all religious teaching and practice. This is fundamental with members of the church of Christ. We believe that teaching the New Testament without modification is the only way to lead men and women to become Christians.

We believe religious division is bad. Jesus prayed for unity (John 17). And, later, the apostle Paul begged those who were divided to unite in Christ (1 Corinthians 1).

We believe the only way unity among those wanting to follow Christ is possible is through a return to the Bible. Compromise cannot bring about unity.

And surely no person, nor group of persons, has the right to draw up a set of rules by which everyone must abide. But, it is altogether proper to say, "Let's unite by just following the Bible." That is fair. That is safe. That is right.

So, churches of Christ plead for religious unity based upon the Bible. We believe that to subscribe to any creed other than the New Testament, to refuse to obey any New Testament command or to follow any practice not sustained by the New Testament is to add to or take away from the teachings of God. And both additions and subtractions are condemned in the Bible (Galatians 1:6-9; Revelation 22:18,19).

Churches of Christ have none of the trappings of modern day organizational bureaucracy. There are no governing boards—neither district, regional, national nor international—no earthly headquarters and no universal organization.

Each congregation is autonomous or "self-ruled" and is independent of every other congregation. The only tie which binds the many congregations together is a common allegiance to Christ and the Bible.

There are no conventions, annual meetings nor official publications. Congregations do cooperate in supporting children's homes, homes for the elderly, mission work and such things. However, participation is strictly voluntary on the part of each congregation and no person nor group issues policies or makes decisions for the congregations.

Each congregation is governed locally by a plurality of elders selected from among the members. These are men who meet the specific qualifications for this office, given in 1 Timothy 3 and Titus 1. There are also deacons in each congregation who serve. These also must meet the Biblical qualifications, given in 1 Timothy 3.

Worship in churches of Christ centers in five items, the same as in the first-century church. We believe the pattern is important. Jesus said, "God is spirit, and those who worship him must worship in spirit and truth" (John 4:24). From this statement, we learn three things: (1) Our worship must be directed to the right object... God; (2) it must be prompted by the right spirit; (3) it must be according to truth.

To worship God according to truth is to worship Him according to His Word, because His Word is truth (John 17:17). Therefore, we must not exclude any item found in His Word, and we must not include any item not found in His Word.

To carry that point just a bit further—in matters of religion, we are to walk by faith (2 Corinthians 5:7). Since faith comes by hearing the Word of God (Romans 10:17), anything not authorized by the Bible cannot be done by faith... and whatever is not of faith is sin (Romans 14:23).

The five items of worship mentioned in the New Testament as having been observed by the first-century church are singing, praying, preaching, giving and eating the Lord's Supper.

If you know the practices of churches of Christ, you are probably aware that in two of these items our practice is different from that of most religious groups. So, permit me to focus on those two, and state our reasons for what we do.

One of those is singing. One of the things people most frequently notice about the church of Christ is that we sing without the use of mechanical instruments of music—a cappella singing is the only music used in our worship.

Simply stated, here is the reason: we are seeking to follow only the New Testament and worship according to the instructions of the Bible. The New Testament leaves instrumental music out; therefore, we believe it right and safe to leave it out too. If we used the mechanical instrument, we would have to do so without New Testament authority.

There are only 8 verses in the New Testament on the subject of music in worship. The mechanical instrument of music is not mentioned in these passages.

Historically, the first appearance of instrumental music in church worship was not until the sixth century A.D., and there was no general practicing of it until after the eighth century. Instrumental music was strongly opposed by such religious leaders as John Calvin, John Wesley and Charles Spurgeon because of its absence in the New Testament.

The second item of worship where you may have noticed a difference is the Lord's Supper. This is a memorial which was inaugurated by Jesus on the night of His betrayal. (Matthew 26:26-28). It is observed by Christians in memory of the Lord's death (1 Corinthians 11:24,25). The emblems, unleavened bread and fruit of the vine, symbolize the body and blood of Jesus (1 Corinthians 10:16).

Churches of Christ are different from many in that we observe the Lord's Supper on the first day of every week. This follows the pattern of the first-century church. Of them, we read, "And upon the first day of the week...the disciples came together to break bread..." (Acts 20:7).

They met on the first day of the week to observe the Lord's Supper. Some have objected that the text does not specify the first day of every week. This is true—just as the command to observe the Sabbath did not specify every Sabbath. The command was simply, "Remember the Sabbath day to keep it holy" (Exodus 20:8). The Jews understood that to mean every Sabbath. It seems to us that by the same reasoning "the first day of the week" means the first day of every week.

Again, from a historical perspective, we know from such respected historians as Neander and Eusebius that Christians in those early centuries took the Lord's Supper every Sunday.

Perhaps you are wondering, "How does one become a member of the church of Christ?" Churches of Christ do not speak of membership in terms of some formula which must be followed for approved acceptance into the church. There is no set of rules or ceremonies which one must follow to be inducted into the church. When he becomes a Christian, he, at the same time, becomes a member of the church.

On the first day of the church's existence, those who repented and were baptized were saved (Acts 2:38). And they were added to the church (Acts 2:47). God did the adding when the conditions of pardon outlined in the New Testament were met. After one heard the Gospel and believed in Christ, he then turned from his past sins, confessed Jesus as Lord and was baptized for the remission of his sins. In this way, people then became New Testament Christians. The same is true today.

Churches of Christ have a reputation for placing much stress on the need for baptism. This is because the New Testament teaches baptism to be an act which is essential to salvation (Mark 16:16; Acts 2:38; Acts 22:16).

We do not practice infant baptism because baptism in the New Testament is only for sinners who turn to the Lord in belief and penitence. An infant cannot do this.

The only form of baptism we practice in churches of Christ is immersion, because the Scriptures always point to baptism as a burial (Acts 8:35-39; Romans 6:3,4; Colossians 2:12).

Baptism is extremely important because the New Testament sets forth the following purposes for it: (1) it is to enter the kingdom (John 3:5); (2) it is to contact Christ's blood (Romans 6:3,4); (3) it is to get into Christ (Galatians 3:27); (4) it is for salvation (Mark 16:16; 1 Peter 3:21); (5) it is for the remission of sins (Acts 2:38); (6) it is to wash away sins (Acts 22:16); (7) it is to get into the church (1 Corinthians 12:13; Ephesians 1:23).

Since Christ died for the sins of the whole world, the invitation to share in His saving grace is open to everyone (Acts 10:34,35; Revelation 22:17). Some will choose to come to Christ in faith and obedience and will be saved. Others will reject His plea and be condemned (Mark 16:16).

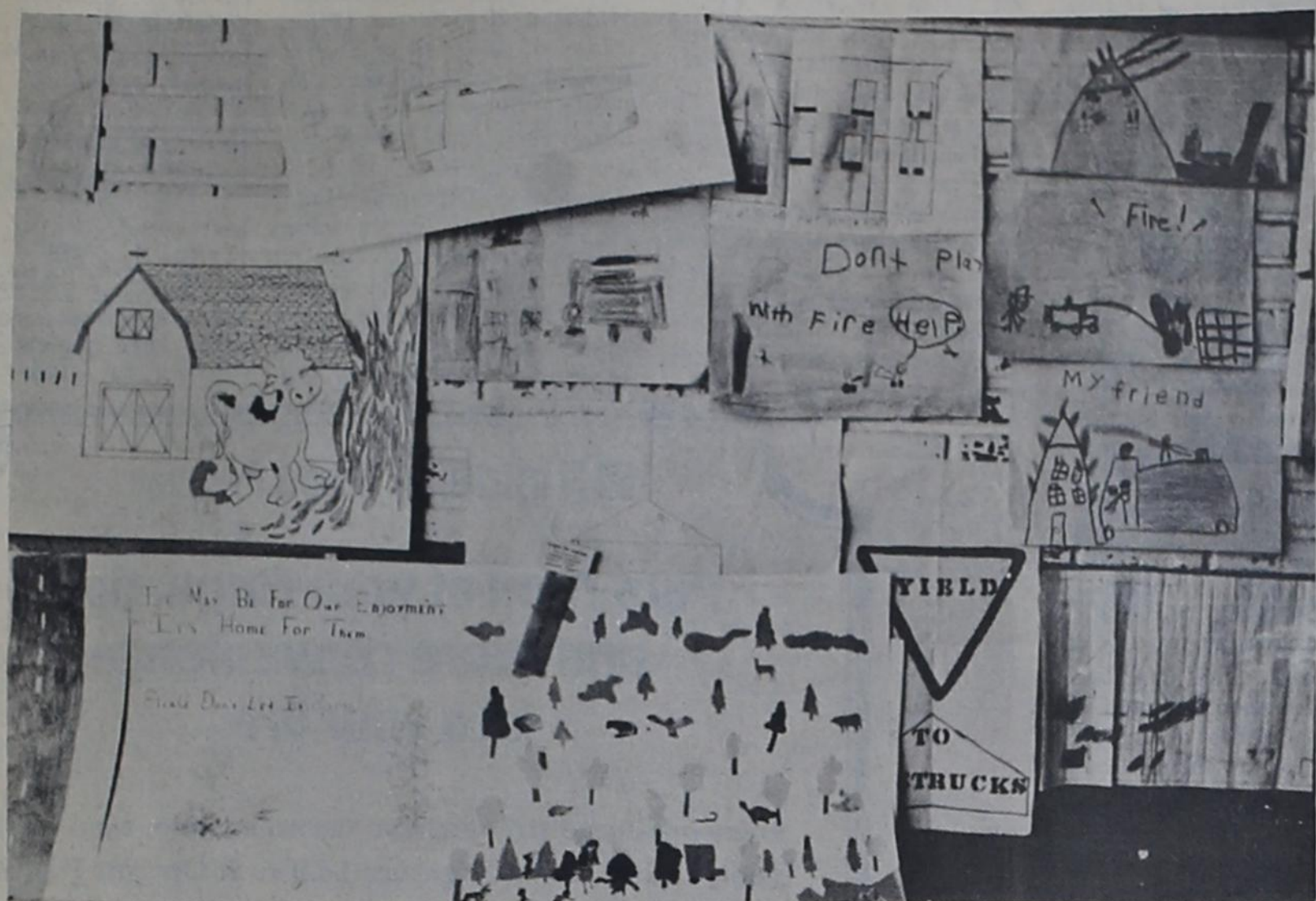
