

### Librarians At Conference For Schools

Muleshoe ISD librarians recently attended the Texas Library Association conference in Corpus

Attending from the Muleshoe schools were Barbara Milburn, high school librarian; Jane Rudd, Watson Junior High librarian; Pat Graham, DeShazo librarian and Virginia Bowers, Dillman librarian.

While at the conference, they were privileged to hear several authors and other conference leaders who led discussions on many topics.

Jamie Gilson, author of many children's books, spoke about writing books for reading for fun. She pointed out that children must be caught by pleasurable reading and learn to enjoy reading at an early age.

Sid Fleicshman, author of the Newbery Award book 'The Whipping Boy,' spoke about his entry in the field of children's literature and how the ideas for books are germinated.

Another conference made use of the essential elements of curriculum for planning a library program to enhance the classroom curriculum.

The librarians said many other helpful and interesting conferences were conducted during the conference.

Exhibits of new materials and equipment were on display during the entire conference.

While attending the conference, the librarians got to watch the fireworks over the bay, which were part of the Buccaneer Days celebration for the city.

Each librarian returned to the Muleshoe school libraries with new ideas and more suggestions for how to manage the library to aid the overall learning program of the Muleshoe schools.

After failure to gain accept- scheduled in accordance with directives of the Public Utility Commission of Texas to update the company's unresolved 1984 filing for \$84.8 million of additional revenues, according to Janet Perkins, Public Affairs Manager for GTE Southwest.

She also said the financial information contained in the updated rate filing demonstrates the company has an \$81 million revenue deficiency based on a rate of return which is actually lower than the commission's last authorized rate of return.

GTE Southwest President E. L. 'Buddy' Langley said, "The last time the company raised rates was in 1983. We have known with increased expenses and capital investments that eventually we would have to ask for increased revenues.

"With the downturn in the Texas economy, we wanted to delay this as long as possible. However, since we are being required to update the current financials and process the merits of the rate filing, we have decided to seek the rates necessary to cover the revenue deficiency."

(Note: According to rate increase requests, local business access rates would go from \$22.15 to \$33.65 monthly, an increase of \$11.50 per month, or a 51.9 percent increase.

A one-party residence rate, which is \$8.55 monthly right now, and would go to \$14.45 monthly, raising it by \$5.90 per month or 69 percent.

Extended Area Service would be changed very little, dropping from \$3.55 to \$3.25 for business phones and increasing from \$1.35 to \$1.40 for residence

GTE filed a pctition early in 1987 to withdraw its 1984 filing, but some participants in the case resisted the move, voicing concern the company could be overearning because of changes in state and federal tax laws. As a result, the company was ordered to prepare the updated information by April 30. An extension was granted to allow for additional negotiation, but the parties to the case were unable to resolve the issues.

# She's Retired? Don't You Ever Believe It!

(Editor's note: This week's special 'In Profile' personality was rather reluctant to be publicized. "I don't need publicity," she said. "What I do, or have done, doesn't merit publicity."

We decided to let you, our readers, be the judge of that -- so let's get better acquainted with a very special lady -- Katherine Sanders -- who's one of the busiest ladies in town.)

Katherine Sanders came into this world at Oglesby, TX, which is some 16 miles south of Waco. She started out in that area, growing up with two sisters.

In 1928, she came to Bailey County with her family, and settled in the southwest corner of the county, near Goodland.

After completing her school years at Goodland, she attended West Texas State at Canyon and became a school teacher.

But, she was interrupted after she met Bob Sanders. She and her late husband were married and moved six miles to Maple.

She laughingly says her honeymoon trip was from Goodland to Maple, a distance of six miles. They stopped at a grocery store enroute and purchased supplies for their new home.

From ciere evolved a long career that is by no means over

Her first teaching position was at Goodland, where she had 17 students her first year.

Then it was to a school at Maple. At the time, she lived in Maple, when it first was established.

At the time, Maple had a cotton gin, then a store, then the residents worked on obtaining a post office, as Maple's mail was brought out from Littlefield.

"Back then, it was easy to get a post office," she said. "All we had to do was petition, and although it usually took a little while, we always got our post office. Now, you can't do that."

After teaching for awhile, Katherine started teaching at DeShazo Elementary in Muleshoe.

In all, she taught school for 42 years, all in Bailey County, before retiring a couple of years In the meantime, her late

husband, Bob, farmed and

worked at a cotton gin in the fall, hauling baled cotton to Lehman. She also said he drove a school bus after the cotton season, converting his truck into a school

It seems that individuals owned the truck body, and the school owned the bus chassis, which was placed on the truck

Katherine sparkled as she recounted stories of growing up with her two sisters, and cites a lifetime interest in reading.

Her mother encouraged reading, reading, reading.

Once a year, Katherine and her sisters were allowed to choose one book from a catalog. The book was purchased and read over and again as it joined an excellent collection of books.

"Capper's Farmer" magazine was also a sought-after treat for the rural family, along with other farm related publications.

She and Bott became the parents of three children -- Bob of Amarillo, a business owner; Janie Ellen, a physical education teacher at Garland and Mary Elizabeth, lead teacher for the third grade at Arlington.

She is very proud her daughters following in her chosen profession, although she is equally proud of the accomplishments of her son.

At one time, all the local schools were located between West Third and West Fifth and West Avenue C and West Avenue D. Then, Richland Hills Elementary School was built on West 18th Street.

Katherine elected to not move to Richland Hills, now Dillman

Elementary. "I chose to stay at DeShazo with my young friends to help them," she said.

Back in the late 50's and early 60's, Katherine said she saw lots of hungry kids. This was during the years before the free and reduced lunch, and before free breakfasts.

She said she and then principal, Bill Taylor, worked out a system to provide meals for many of the youngsters, so they could have at least one hot meal a This no doubt, led up to her

very active participation in the senior citizen 'Meals on Wheels' program today. She has been a driver and deliverer of noon meals since Meals on Wheels started. She only took off during the time Robert (her husband) was critically ill, and before his death.

Sharing with her late husband, a common interest in youth. So other than her teaching duties at DeShazo, she was active in the Muleshoe Youth Activities Com-

She is active with the local Retired Teachers Association, and once a month, she and Ruby Garner, on a voluntary basis, prepare a noon meal at the Old Depot for the Jennyslippers,





# Carelessness Leads To Mower Accidents

"Carelessness' is the main factor in the more than 50,000 people injured each year in accidents involving power lawn

Proper mower servicing, observing standard operating precautions, and picking up rocks and other objects from the lawn prior to mowing will eliminate most accidents, said Spencer Tanksley, county agent with the Texas A&M University Agricultural Extension Service.

The lawn mower should be routinely services before each use. A properly operating mower is safer to use and cuts grass better than one in poor shape.

Routine service includes the checking of the blade for nicks or cracks, checking the blade to be sure it is securely attached to the shaft, checking the crankcase oil level in 4-cycle engines, and filling the fuel tank with fresh regular gasoline.

Always disconnect the spark plug wire before examining the blade, said Tanksley. The condition of the blade is critical to the mower's operation and safety. Remove, sharpen and balance the blade several times during the mowing season. Replace damaged blades.

Service the carburetor air cleaner and change the crankcase oil after every 25 hours of operation,

Langley said the four-year delay in the rate proceeding illustrates the complexities caused by deregulation and other major changes affecting the telecommunications industry in the 1980s.

GTESW initially filed for \$84.8 million in additional revenues in February 1984. Prior to hearings, the case was suspended to await a decision in another commission proceeding concerning changes brought about by the AT&T divestiture and competition in long-distance service. Due to the many complexities associated with these issues, explained Langley, a final order was not issued in this proceeding until September 1986.

"Our updated financials show we are not overearning," Langley said. "We have factored in all the changes affecting the company, both positive and negative, and the result is that the company still has an \$81 million revenue deficiency.

"The reduced expenses, such as the reduction in both state and federal taxes, have been more than offset by increases in other expenses and in our investment in providing service in the

state," he said. The company now expects the administrative law judge in charge of the company's filing will set a schedule of dates to allow other parties in the case to file appropriate testimony and data, and set hearing dates to consider the new proposed ideas.



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# **Notice To Taxpayers**

Taxpayers in the Bailey County Appraisal District have an opportunity to protest values proposed for their property for local taxes. The property owner must file a written "notice of protest" with the Appraisal Review Board (ARB) before June 21, 1988. The district's Appraisal Review Board will begin hearing taxpayer protests on July 11, 1982.

Official forms for a notice of protest are available at the Bailey County Appraisal District office, 104 E. Avenue C, Muleshoe. A letter from the taxpayer is also acceptable as long as it identifies the property owner, the property which is the subject of protest, and indicates dissatisfaction with some decision or action of the appraisal office.

Each protesting taxpayer may offer evidence or argument either in person or by filing an affidavit with the ARB. Taxpayers should be aware that the ARB has no authority over tax rates or taxing unit spending and will not hear protests of those matters.

The ARB will schedule hearings as property owners file protests and will inform them of the time, date, and place of their individual hearings.

The State Property Tax Board has issued a pamphlet called "Taxpayer's Rights; Remedies, Responsibilities" available at the Bailey County Appraisal District office, 104 E. Avenue C, Muleshoe, which explains how to prepare and present an appeal to the ARB.

## Selecting Correct

# Wood For Landscape

Wood used for landscape structures should be selected on the basis of end-use, rather than appearance or lower cost, said Charles Stayton, wood products specialist with the Texas A&M University Agricultural Extension Service.

Landscape structures, such as fences and decks, are usually fully exposed and have much horizontally positioned wood with attachment joints.

"These joints trap rain or other applied water and are slow to dry out, allowing the wood to exceed the 20 percent moisture content needed for decay," Stayton said.

In addition, many landscape structures will have wood in ground contact, which will decay unless redwood, cedar and cypress heartwood or treated pine is used. "Treated pine is always the best economic choice," Stayton said.

A good preservative choice, he said, is chromated copper arsenate (CCA). This is the "green colored wood" sold under several trade names such as Wolman CCA, Osmose K33 and Boliden CCA, Stayton said.

"CCA treated pine should have a quality mark stamp or a plastic tag stapled to it, showing it has been treated in accordance with established standards. It is important that these stamps or tags show the initials of the American Wood Preservers Bureau (AWPB) and the Southern Pine Inspection Bureau (SPIB) or Timber Products Inspection (TP) to certify proper

treatment," Stayton said. Quality marks or tags will

they won't

indicate whether the wood can be used for ground contact or above ground use, and may include the

symbols LP-22 for ground contact and LP-2 for above ground use. They also will show whether the treated wood was redried after treatment by using the symbols "KD" (kiln dried) or "KDAT" (kiln dried after treatment).

"CCA treated pine lumber used for landscape fences, decks and gazebos should be redried to prevent warpage and other defects caused by excessive shrinkage once fastened in place," Stayton said.

Many landscape fences and decks use a combination of treated pine and cedar, redwood or cypress. The treated pine is used for ground contact purposes and the naturally resistant woods are used for trim, fence and deck boards. Cedar is the most common wood used in such combinations in Texas.

"This works well as long as the cedar is all heartwood. In many cases it is not, and when it is used as fence boards in ground contact, it can deteriorate quickly due to decay. Even without ground contact, the exposed joints can trap rain and soon become decay sources," Stayton

"If a home owner prefers cedar or other naturally resistant

species and is unable to purchase all heartwood, he can periodically apply a pigmented wood preservative to the boards, and prevent ground contact to double the expected service life,"



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

#### SPS Sponsors Local Students At Symposium

Walter Lackey Jr., 16, son of Mr. and Mrs. Walter Lackey, Sr., was one of approximately 400 outstanding high school science students and teachers who attended the Texas Energy Science Symposium in Austin June 6-9. He is a student at Muleshoe High

Lackey was among 29 students and teachers, representing several schools throughout the Panhandle and South Plains of Texas, sponsored by Southwestern Public Service Company (SPS).

The symposium is an annual event sponsored by the Texas Atomic Energy Research Foundation (TAERF). The foundation composed of 10 electric utilities in Texas, including SPS. Although SPS does not own or operate a nuclear power plant, the Company's membership in TAERF reflects is commitment to many kinds of energy research.

The four-day Texas Energy Science Symposiuum was packed with tours, special demonstrations and presentations on such subjects as nuclear power, air quality, high-voltage transmission lines and excavation technologies for the superconducting super collider (SSC).

#### Texas wine makes debut in Italy

(AUSTIN)--Over 79,000 fairgoers enjoyed their first "Taste of Texas Wines" at "Vin Italy," the largest wine show in the world between April 8-13. Representatives of five Texas wineries, the Texas Department of Agriculture (TDA), and Texas Tech University participated in the annual show in Verona, Italy.

Llano Estacado Winery and Pheasant Ridge Winery, both of Lubbock; Messina-Hoff of Bryan; Fall Creek Vineyards of Tow; and Eluebonnet Hill Winery of Ballinger represented Texas wines at the United States exhibit at "Vin italy." The Texas Group shared the U.S. booth space with wine producers from California, New Mexico, Washington and Pennsylvania.

According to Danny Presnal, marketing specialist with TDA, premium Texas wines can compete with the best-quality wines anywhere in the world. "That's what we wanted to show people at 'Vin Italy,' " Presnal said.

Presnal helped represent the Texas wine industry at the show, along with staff members of the Texas Wine Marketing Research Institute at Texas Tech. The U.S. exhibit is a joint effort of the Foreign Agricultural Service, the U.S. Department of Apriculture, Texas Tech University, TDA and the participating Texas wineries.

Texas boasts 22 commercial wineries, as compared to 13 facilities in 1983 and just one commercial winery in 1975. Commercial wine production in Texas this year is estimated at 1 million gallons, with a retail value of \$30 million and a total economic impact on the state of over \$100 million.

"Grapes continue to be one of the most important alternative crops for Texas agriculture, and wine-making is pumping much-needed cash money to our state's farm economy," said Texas Agriculture Commissioner Jim Hightower. "New production is developing every year, but just as important is the superb quality of these Texas wines. Texas wines are just now coming of age, and as I predicted, they were a hit at 'Vin Italy.'

By Governor William P. Clements Jr.

In 1973, the U.S. Supreme Court responded to San Antonio ISD vs. Rodriguez with a majority opinion that found the Texas education system to be rationally based. In its decision, the high court also held that public education policy and finance are issues for the Legislature to oversee, not the courts. The justices stated that:

"The consideration and initiation of fundamental reforms with respect to state taxation and education are matters reserved for the legislative pro-

That ruling is especially appropriate today as Texans weigh the possible consequences of Edgewood vs. Kirby.




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
