Tommie Saye receives national honor

Each year the National Eagle Scout Association presents a plaque and gives recognition to a Scoutmaster in his area for significant contributions to Eagle Scouting and the advancement program of the Boy Scouts of America in his troop. This year Tommie Saye, of Clarendon received this recognition.

In Texas Area IV, Tommie Q. Saye has been Scoutmaster of Troop 433, sponsored by the First Christian Church of Clarendon since 1965.

During the 15 years as Scoutmaster, Saye has seen 33 young men in his troop receive the Eagle Scout award and many members have been active in the Order of the Arrow.

Awarded the Silver Beaver in 1972, the Award of Merit in 1975 and the "Man of the Year" in Clarendon in 1976 he has further distinguished himself by providing the leadership which led to personal achievement by his troop members. His troop has the highest number of boys to earn the God and Country Award of any troop in the Adobe Walls Council.

Saye was selected as an Outstanding Scoutmaster of Area IV, Texas and is one of 28 other outstanding scoutmasters chosen from 57,000 in the United States to receive this award.

This prestigious award was presented at the regional luncheon held at the National Conference, Hilton Hotel, New Orleans, Louisiana with his son and daughter and his wife present.

Also present was Joe Chambers, Scout executive of the Adobe Walls Council, to share the presentation of the award.

Services held for Carl Morris

Funeral services for Carl William Morris, age 73, a resident of Donley County for 30 yrs., and Clarendon the past 16 years were held at 10:00 a.m. on Monday, May 26, 1980, in the First United Methodist Church, with Rev. Bill Watson, Minister of the Church, and Rev. Robert Brown, Minister of the United Methodist Church in Peterburg Texas, officiating. Masonic graveside services were conducted by Mr. Willard Copeland of Childress, serving as Master, assisted by members from Clarendon, Hedley, Memphis and Childress, Masonic Lodges. Interment was in Citizens Cemetery with the arrangements under the direction of Robertson Funeral Directors. Mr. Morris passed away at 1:45 a.m. on Friday May 23, 1980 in Medical Center Nursing Home. He was born Feb. 6, 1907 at Acme, Texas and lived in Hardeman County. As a young man in Kirkland he was a Lone Scout and was the last surviving member of the Elbection Legion Scout Troop. He attended school at Kirkland where he won first place in the State Mile Race for Kirkland High School. He attended Clarendon Methodist College where he was acclaimed as a debator, he went on to attend West Texas State College at Canyon. He married Pauline Kerr on Dec. 2, 1934 at Margaret, Texas, and moved to Hedley in Donley County in 1950. He was active in the United Methodist Church since early childhood, and served in many offices and recently taught the Men's Sunday School Class. He was a member of the Lions Club International, was a Pastor Master of the Hedley Masonic Lodge #991, Past Patron of Order of the Easter Star #413 at Hedley, a member of the Chapter & Council, and was a 32nd degree Scottish Rite Mason. He worked as an Agent for the Ft. Worth & Denver Railroad for many years before retirement.

Survivors include his wife, Pauline Morris of the home; a daughter, Mrs. Carol Brock of Amarillo; two sons, Dale Morris of Petersburg, Illinois, David Morris of Memphis, a daughter-in-law, Mrs. Dorothy Morris of Memphis, a brother, Roy Morris of Calimesa, California; and nine grandchildren. His oldest son, Carl W. Morris, Jr. preceded him in death.

Clarendon establishes reserve police officers

Chief of Police, Bill Hodges, makes the following report on the new reserve officers who recently finished training classes for reserve status.

The City of Clarendon presently has two full time officers and seven reserve officers.

These reserve officers are appointed by the chief of police. Their authority can be found in (Art. 998A, Sec. 3 (A) V.C.S.). These officers have attended 70 hours of extensive training. During the training of these officers the laws as they pertain to the state as well as the Federal Government. These men were trained in all around law enforcement. Upon completion of the reserve school they received from the state a permanent Reserve Officers Commission from the Texas Commission of Law Enforcement Standards and Education. Found within the code (ART. 998A Sec. 3 A VCS) these men have while on duty the same authority as regular police officer.

The purpose of the reserve officers shall be:

1. To serve the residents of the City of Clarendon.
 2. To assist the Police Department of the City of Clarendon in the performance of their duties.
 3. These men as mentioned before are trained quite extensively and can be called upon to perform as regular officers. I would like to emphasize again that these men do have the same power and authority as a police officer, when on duty. Further I would like to say there are several other reasons that a community should be in favor of such an organization.
- First the financial benefit that a city accrues from non-salaried volunteer personnel. Volunteer personnel can become a partner in a patrol unit during peak hours.
- Second, During emergencies often additional man power is needed, so with the reserve officers we have on call, trained, qualified personnel to assist in an emergency.
- Third, the reserve officers can assist during vacations and days off.
- The men who work are presently being utilized as reserve officers have purchased their own equipment and uniforms and have put in numerous hours already. If the city were to hire someone, paying them at the minimum wage level, the volunteer reserve officers would have earned approximately \$3,000. Since their time has been donated they are able to serve their community.
- These men are only concerned about serving this community and I believe they will do a good job.
- The reserve officers are Terry Ashcraft, Bobbie Kidd, Jim Lamplier, James Bredling, Charles Blackburn Sr., Charles Blackburn Jr., and James Mincey.

Voting regulations

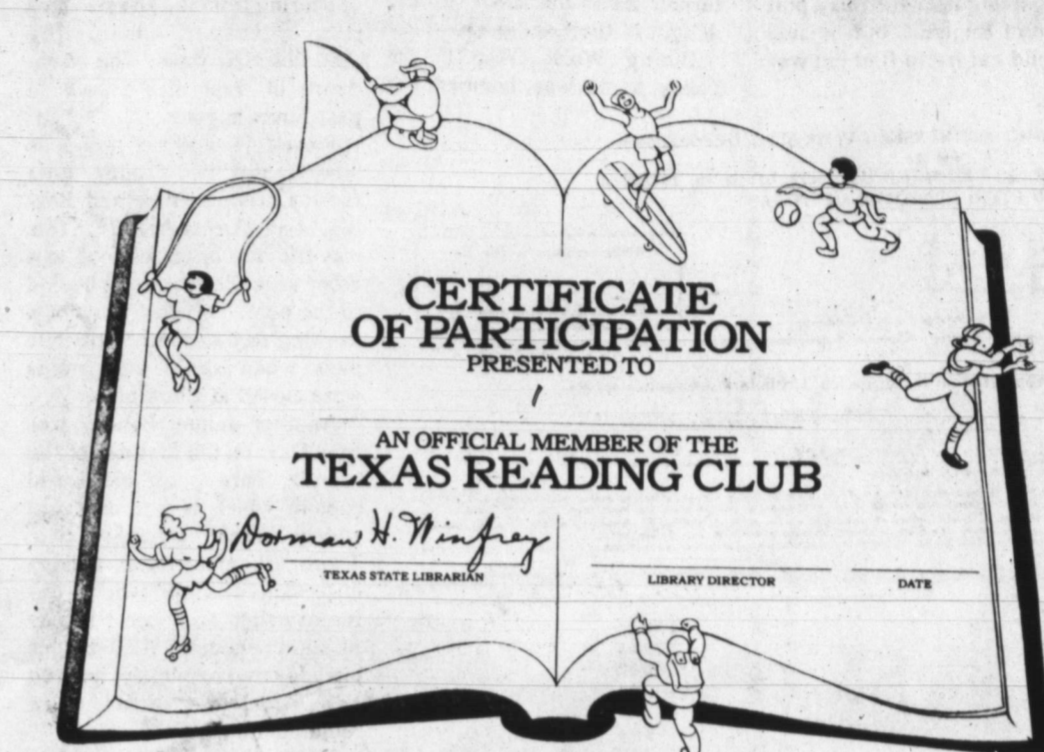
If you did not vote at all in the Democratic Primary Election, May 3, 1980, and if you did not vote in the Republican Primary on May 3, 1980, and if you are legally registered to vote, you are eligible to vote in the Democratic run-off Primary on Saturday, June 7, 1980.

All nine voting places will be open from 7 o'clock a.m. until 7:00 p.m.

By law, voting illegally is a Class A misdemeanor and if convicted shall be or can be fined not to exceed one thousand dollars.

Low income families to get help on energy bills

Donley County residents who qualify under Department of Housing and Urban Development poverty guidelines can apply the week of May 29 for help with their energy bills through the Energy Crisis Assistance Program (ECAP).

The program, administered locally by the Panhandle Regional Planning Commission, makes as much as \$400 per family available for the payment of overdue energy bills or for prepayment. The first step is to fill our questionnaires. That session will be from 10 a.m. to 4 p.m. in the Donley County Court House in Clarendon on Thursday, May 29.

Each person who wishes to qualify for funding must provide proof of income eligibility. That could include a food stamp authorization card, payroll check stub, social security certification letter, supplemental security income letter or any other document that provides proof of earned income. That kind of document should cover the six months prior to application.

1980 census still underway

Census takers in this area are completing the first follow-up operation of the 1980 Census, which involved contacting households that had not returned their census questionnaires by mail to the census office.

According to William E. Soule, District Office Manager, census enumerators in each county have been gathering the necessary information from households where the Census Bureau did not receive the mail response. This includes those which did not return their census questionnaires by the April 11 mail deadline as well as some households that did not receive the census form in the mail.

Census manager Soule explained that in many rural areas and smaller communities, census questionnaires were not delivered by mail on March 28 to some persons holding post office boxes or with a General Delivery address. Because the Census Bureau uses the "enumeration district" or physical area in which a household is located as its basis for counting, all questionnaires must have a code number showing this location. Where it was not possible to pinpoint a residence's location using only the post office box, forms could not be coded or mailed.

In those cases where census forms were not delivered by mail, a census taker should have called on the household during the first follow-up operation. Any persons who have not yet been contacted by a census taker, and who did not fill out the 1980 census questionnaire, are urged to call the district census office in Amarillo at 806/335-2877, giving their names, address and phone number. A census taker will then call to assure that every individual is counted in the census.

A second follow-up phase of the 1980 census begins at the end of May and involves contacting households that returned incomplete questionnaires, additional checks on residences that had earlier been reported as "vacant" and further attempts to reach households not already counted. Because Census Day was April 1, all information given to the Census Bureau should show the status of the household on that date.

Soule also added that jobs as census takers are still available in many counties. Pay averages \$4.00 per hour and persons will be asked to work a 40-hour week for several weeks, including evenings and Saturdays. To qualify for a position as a census taker, applicants must take a simple written test on basic skills.

Expenditures by out-of-state and foreign visitors to Texas rose to a record \$4.8 billion, according to the comprehensive 1979 Texas Visitor Industry Report just released by the State Department of Highways and Public Transportation. The number of visitors arriving by auto, air, bus and rail, 24.9 million, decreased 3.2% from 1978's unprecedented high of 25.8 million.

English couple visits Clarendon

Recent visitors in the Charles Rogers home were, Pam and Ted Hunter, of Chandlers Ford, England, near the world famous port of Southampton. The Hunters had come from Midland with Pam's sister Pat Dobbins and her husband, who make their home in Midland. Mrs. Dobbins is Mrs. Roger's sister-in-law.

For Pam Hunter and Pat Dobbins, this was the first visit the sisters had had in 10 years, when Mrs. Dobbins went to England for a visit in 1971 and only the second time they had seen each other in 34 years.

Pam and Ted Hunter were in the hotel business in England, they recently sold their hotel

around in London. In London the streets are laid out around squares. The problem with this is that various and sundry lanes, such as Pudding Lane, cut through the squares as little short streets and anyone unaccustomed to the city becomes holed up.

Pam and Pat Tolley, grew up in England in the vicinity of the deep water port of Southampton, from which the Mayflower sailed to America, Winchester, the ancient capital of England and famous for its cathedral and only 30 miles from the mind boggling Stone Henge, puzzle to scholars for hundreds of years. This visit covered many incidents as well as years as the two sisters turned back the clock to the delight of their audience.

During World War II the Tolley home was bombed out

three times, they were lucky, they said, they came though it alive and took up their lives where the bombing left off. Another adventure they shared as girls was the tour aboard the Queen Mary before she ever made her maiden voyage.

The great port of Southampton, busiest of the world in its heyday, had a unique feature which made it the most desirable port from which to sail into. It has two natural tides, so ships can sail twice a day. Shipping has been replaced to a large extent today by the great air transports and shipping is no longer the business it was in former times. Even the wet fish market with its fish managers is slowly disappearing from the streets. This is the marketing area near the piers. The abundance of fresh fish known in past times is gone.

Raised in a strict religious family, the two Tolley girls recall Christmas time and Boxing Day, December 26. This was the day boxes of food and other necessities were delivered to the poor. This day was not a working day so there were two days when shops and stores were closed at Christmas.

Another annual holiday was May Day, on the first day of the month. This is an old world custom which is not observed widely in the United States. There are many local holiday observances some where different saints are honored. Surprisingly enough St. George's birthday is completely ignored and lesser saints are remembered.

Michael Bell, a 6'4", 190, pounder from Dallas, Texas and Byron Ladner a 6'0" point guard from Pass Christian, Mississippi are the latest newcomers.

Bell played for Coach Ellis Davis at Roosevelt High School in Dallas where he averaged 16.3 points per game and 10.6 rebounds per game for his district championship team.

Michael Bell is a good athlete with plenty of raw talent. He is a power type player and has played closed to the basket in high school," said Bulldog Coach Mark Nixon.

"He will have to improve his game out on the forward position when he gets in college. I believe he can do that, that effectively because he takes coaching well and is a hard worker. I'll guarantee you that we are glad to have him in our program."

Texans right to appear before boards of equalization

The State Property Tax Board (SPTB) reminded Texans of their right to appear before local boards of equalization to appeal values assigned to their property for ad valorem tax purposes.

SPTB Executive Director Kenneth Graeber noted that "the right to appear before the board of equalization is the single most important remedy available to taxpayers regarding the value placed on property."

The board of equalization is the taxpayer's opportunity to be heard in an informal setting and without incurring expensive court costs," Graeber added.

He pointed out that each local government which collects property taxes must have a board of equalization (BOE) to hear taxpayer appeals on values, and that most BOEs meet in the period ranging from May until about mid-July.

Taxpayers who rendered their property to the local assessor must be notified of the time and place of the board of equalization meeting if the assessor raised the value rendered.

Even those who did not render still have the right to appear before the BOE, but persons in this category will have to learn on their own when the board will meet.

Graeber pointed out that BOE meetings are open to the public, and the time and place must be posted in the administration office of the jurisdiction and with the appropriate county clerk. A city BOE, however, is not required to file notice with the county clerk.

The information is also available from each local tax office by phone; and, at least 10 days before the board meets, notices must also be published in a local newspaper.

Graeber said there are two basic situations in which taxpayers are entitled to receive an adjustment in their tax value:

If it exceeds local market values--If you can find and submit to the BOE the kind of evidence which indicates that the value assigned to your property is too high, then you would be entitled to a reduction in its valuation.

If it is valued higher than similar property--Regardless of what other property like yours is selling for, the value of your property on the tax roll should be about the same as the value for all similar properties in the jurisdiction.

The State Property Tax Board director reminded taxpayers that the BOE's sole authority is over the value of property. "The board must limit the taxpayer's discussion only to matters concerning property values. Discussions regarding the amount of taxes or the injustice

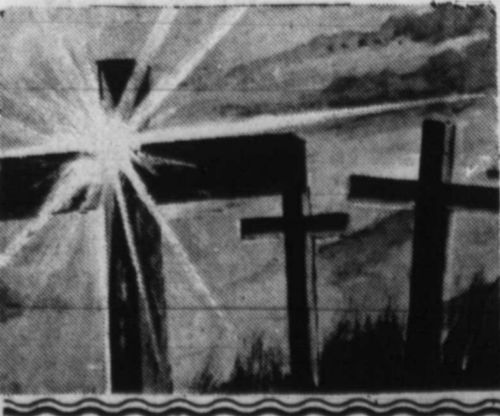

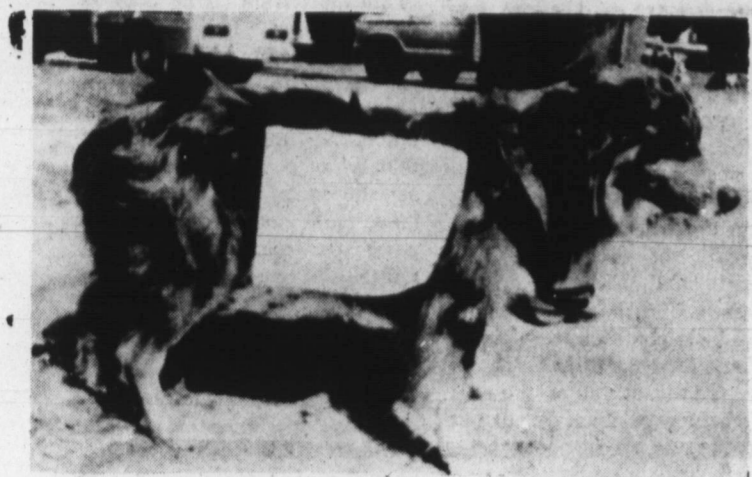

Sandra Longan - Skinner's employee of the week

Sandra Longan, Texas Saddlery, employee of the week, is a two year plus employee of the Company and works in the saddle department. After the first several weeks of her initial employment she has remained in the saddle department where her competence and compatibility make her easy to work with and learn from.

Under the instruction of two young men from Oklahoma, who had attended a training school for saddle construction, Sandra began with assembly on a saddle tree. They taught her the generalities of saddle construction. Then she learned the specific techniques which set the Texas Saddlery constructed saddle apart from run-of-the-mill merchandise.

In order of construction the saddle is put together thus: first the horn and gullet followed by the seat tin and ground work, rigs, fronts, cantle, backs, cantle and fillers. Next the jockeys are set wet and let dry.

Then the split leather seats are fitted, the cantle back is put on and secured by hand sewing.

This old method of hand sewing is one of the details that make the name Texas Saddlery respected through the quality of the work. Next the skirts are put on, the back housing and fenders added and the saddle is tied and rigged out.

The sound painstaking care of quality construction to make a saddle feel and wear well is the same on all saddles at Skinners. On more elaborate and expensive models the leather is beautifully hand tooled by Wanda Holman, shop foreman in the business or by Harlan Webb, master craftsman of fine saddles who lives in New Mexico.

The tooling is done after the leather is selected, studied and cut with a die clicker. It teases about a side and a half of leather to cut the saddle from. Part of the crafting is to cut the pieces from the section of the leather best suited to each particular part of the saddle, top grade for each step. Instinct and experience provide this vital knowledge.

A highlight for Sandra was the chance she had to make a trophy saddle for E.V. Dorsey, the well respected professional roper. This was a special order and done as a promotion to be used in the famous Cheyenne Rodeo in July. Sandra got to do the work on this saddle, a beautifully tooled saddle by Harlan Webb. Included in the tooling were the words: E.V. Dorsey Texas Saddlery.

This was a rarity for Texas Saddlery is a wholesale supplier of saddles and all tack and related items. However the

Alcoholics fm P 1

heard about the bill during their monthly meeting, May 22. Representative Bill Caraway of Houston, sponsor of the measure, spoke to the judges and sheriffs from the 25-county area during the meeting of the Panhandle Alcoholism Recovery Center (PARC) at the old air base near Amarillo. The bill's original sponsor, Mike Ezell of Snyder, was defeated in recent Democratic primaries.

The proposed legislation's

major feature will allow law officers the option of taking someone arrested for public drunkenness to a treatment facility rather than to jail. If that is the course of action, the intoxicated person will be dealt with not as a criminal, but as a victim of alcoholism. In the language of the Act, "This custody shall not be considered an arrest and the record of the custody is confidential."

The arresting officer will be expected to make an on-the-spot judgment regarding the extent

of incapacitation. If he decides on treatment, he has three options: forcibly, if necessary, to take the person to an improved treatment facility or emergency medical facility; if that is not possible, the person can be jailed, but the officer must still notify the nearest public treatment facility. Even though the person is jailed, his anonymity is still protected under the language of the proposed law.

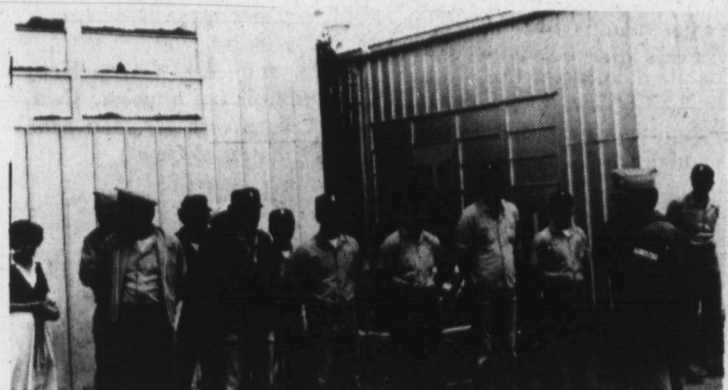

It is flooded with high pressure water through these simulated leaks and holes and the men are timed to see how fast they can plug the holes and "save the ship from sinking".

A voice powered phone system was installed to simulate battle station conditions on board a ship and some of the equipment to map and plot were repaired and installed. In all,

these 30 sailors spent their Memorial Day week working for the preservation of their Reserve Center's preparedness. The military reserves are an essential part of this Nation's defense system. Without them the entire military force would not be adequate to fend off attack or to effectively go to war. 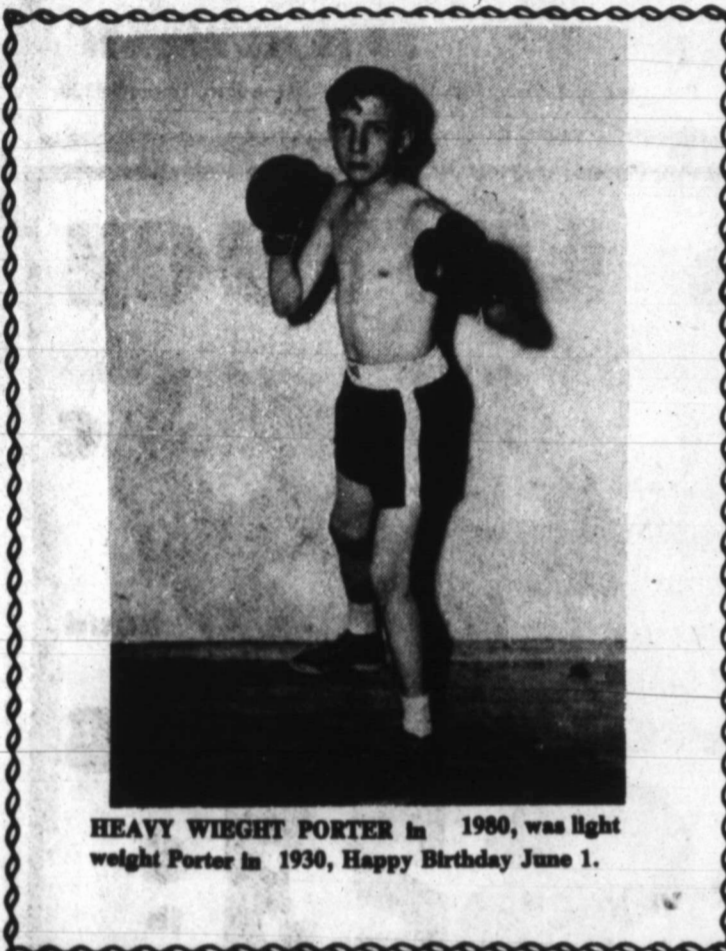

It is with regret that this letter is not one announcing to you that a fair and equitable settlement was reached between your employer and your Union. Communication Workers of America has analyzed General Telephone Company's last wage-benefits proposal offered to CWA on May 15, 1980, and has determined that the offer, if the Union accepted the Com-

pany's proposal, wages for GTSW employees would fall hopelessly behind the wages paid to employees of the Bell System working in comparable jobs.

For example, a Southwestern Bell Cable Splicer now earns \$403.50 weekly at top while a General Cable Splicer is paid \$341.20 weekly at top, a difference of \$62.30. If CWA accepted the 7% wage offer proposed by the Company, and if the Bell System negotiates a 10% increase in August, the weekly wage disparity would grow to \$78.75 weekly.

Another of the many, many examples of gross inequity cited by CWA is the disparity between wages paid to Office Clerks. A GTSW Office Clerk is now paid \$206.00 at top while a Southwestern Bell Office Clerk is paid \$276.00, a difference of \$70.00. If CWA accepted the 7% increase at GTSW and received a 10% increase for Bell System employees in August, the disparity would grow to \$83.18 weekly.

While hiding behind the wage guidelines (which allow substantially more than the company has offered), the company simultaneously refuses to recognize that these inequities can be addressed and corrected through exceptions to the Presidential pay standards. Section 705.21 of the Presidential pay standards states that, "The Council (on wage-price stability) may grant an exception for increases in excess of the pay standard that are necessary to restore equity with wages of comparable groups of employees, occasioned by the operation of COLA clauses." CWS has already had several informal discussions with economists at the Council who have said that GTSW wages would probably be eligible for an exception to guideline limitation.

GTSW has proposed to increase second and third year COLA increases at 6% at a time when we are experiencing rampant inflation which is now estimated by the government to be increasing around 18% this year and at least 10% in 1981 and 1982.

The Company has reported that their wage offer amounts to 9.5% in the first year, 8.5% in the second year and 8.0% in the third year. However, the real truth is that employees are being offered 7% in May 1980 (plus 0.5% for upgrades), 2.0% in November 1980, 2.5% in May 1981, a 6.0% COLA cap in November 1981, 2.0% in May 1982, and a 6.0% COLA cap in November 1982. This distribution of money provides our members with considerably less than 9.5% at the first day of the contract, 8.5% at the first anniversary...as it appears that the company would want you to believe.

Other than wages, there are 14 points on which CWA and the Company differ.

The Company did offer a revision to SN, Contract Labor, still using a 5% figure of the bargaining unit for six months except to give the Company the right to use an unlimited number of contractors in case of emergency. You know what this would mean.

This kind of contract is one we could not live under for 3 years. That is why it was rejected. That is why we had to strike.

We walked out together, we will stay together, and we will go back together when we can acquire a fair and equitable settlement.

GTE express regret

General Telephone officials expressed extreme disappointment Friday with the rejection of the company's \$38.3 million wage and benefit package presented to Communications Workers of America Local 12171 Thursday (May 15, 1980).

The offer, the largest ever presented by the company, provided for six wage increases averaging 28.65 percent for all employees, including cost of living adjustments. The total wage and benefit offer amounted to approximately 36.50 percent.

Shirl Koenig, chief negotiator for General Telephone, said "The general wage increase alone would yield annualized increases ranging from \$2,704 for House Service attendants up to \$5,345 for some top craftsmen -- annualized over the three year period.

"The Union demands for wage increases greater than offered, exceed the wage and price guidelines and feed the inflationary spiral.

"Their demands also show a high insensitivity to the customers of General Telephone since it is ultimately the customer who pays the wages and benefits of employees.

"The company recognizes that employees should make fair wages that are competitive in the area where they live. We feel our offer was a very generous one and recognized these needs."

He also said that all employees are being mailed today a bulletin explaining in detail the generous package rejected by

opinion consultation from a board certified surgeon; increased car fare payments for employees working split tours; increased mileage payments for persons using their own vehicles; increased daily per diem allowance; and incidental meal allowance hike.

Thanks to the concentrated efforts of both public and private sectors, Texas tourism surmounted these crises admirably," Taylor said.

The 1979 Visitor Industry Report contains an extensive statistical profile of the visitor who traveled to Texas by automobile. Data are based on results of an ongoing survey conducted by the department through its eleven tourist bureaus serving travelers statewide.

Gasoline and auto expenses took 7 1/2 cents more out of each tourist dollar last year compared to 1978, while tourists spent somewhat on lodging, food and entertainment.

More visitors arrived from Oklahoma during 1979, whereas California was the foremost

origination point the year before. And the average auto visitor spent an estimated \$19.76 per person each day, \$2.32 more than in 1978.

Dallas, San Antonio, Houston, El Paso and Fort Worth, in that order, were the five most visited cities in the state. Austin, Galveston, Corpus Christi, Brownsville and Laredo rounded out the top ten. Altogether, the report lists the 30 most visited cities.

Foreign visitors to Texas, both by automobile and by commercial carrier, increased 4.6%, indicating a burgeoning international interest in the Lone Star State. Mexico, Canada, Great Britain and West Germany generated more foreign travelers to Texas than all other countries combined.

Paul had great difficulty in overcoming the distrust of others as to his instant conversion and turn about in his life. Paul was not the only one who had difficulty. They have been many who have had to change their residence in order to live their new found faith.

The kind of distrust that I would like for you to consider is the kind that is hatched by the lack of change on the part of a profession Christian and Church Member. This lack of change on the part of some cause all to be suspect. The person who used God's name in vain before conversion who didn't quit when he was saved probably wasn't saved, but this cannot be proved. Promiscuous adulterous sex continued in after a professed conversion is evidence of no change. To break any of the commandments or to teach men such has the pronouncement of Jesus that "it is better than a millstone be hanged about his neck and he be cast into the midst of the sea". So thinking men who hear men use God's name in vain, brag on sexual conquests or know of them, and loose property to a thieving professing Christian, have a little doubt and are very distrustful of those kinds of professing Christians. No wonder it is hard to reach them for Jesus.

It seems then that if we as professing Christians are to overcome this distrust there must be a change as there was in Paul. The cause for the change in Paul was Jesus Christ, not turning over a new leaf or deciding to do better. Paul not only had a vital experience with Jesus, but some time alone with Him. This time alone equipped Paul to face with courage any task Jesus assigned to him, but it also helped get out of his system, cursing, self, and sin that in any way might stand in the way. No wonder He became the world's greatest missionary.

Is the faith you profess suspect of distrust because of the lack of change in you? If so Jesus is still in the changing business and will change you if you will ask Him to forgive you and to save you.

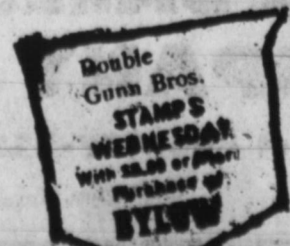
