DEAN HAWKINS receives \$6,000 4-H scholarship

Dean Hawkins wins \$6,000⁰⁰ scholarship

Dean Earl Hawkins, an outstanding Donley County 4-H member, today received a four-year \$6,000 scholarship from the Houston Livestock Show and Rodeo.

Dean, son of Mr. and Mrs. Jerry Hawkins of Clarendon, is a recent graduate of Clarendon High School. A 4-H member for nine years, Dean served as president of the county 4-H council and vice president of his county 4-H club. He also won several beef, leadership and agriculture awards.

Named the Donley County Gold Star Boy, Dean was active in citizenship, leadership, agriculture, electricity, beef, horse, foods and nutrition and swine projects. While in high school, he participated in FFA and athletics, as well as church and community activities.

Dean, who plans to major in animal science at Clarendon College and Texas A&M University, was one of 50 recipients of Houston Livestock Show and Rodeo scholarships presented at the state 4-H Roundup.

The Show, which will also present 50 four-year, \$6,000 scholarships to FFA members during their state convention in July, is the largest donor of agricultural scholarships in the United States. During the coming school year, the Show will have 389 students on scholarships in Texas colleges and universities, representing a commitment of \$2.1 million.

The winners, carefully elected from hundreds of applicants, are the best in the state from the standpoints of academics and leadership. The only requirements made of the students are that they major in some form of agriculture at a college or university within the confines of the state.

The monies used to fund the scholarship program are derived directly from proceeds generated by spectators at the Houston Livestock Show and Rodeo, a civic, charitable organization whose efforts, actions and revenues are used directly to benefit youth and support education.

In presenting the scholarships, Show President Allen H. Caruth said that the presentation of each scholarship is far more than just a gesture of good will.

"The Show's concern for youth and its commitment to agriculture is exemplified by the awarding of these scholarships today. We are assured that these outstanding youngsters are given the opportunity to obtain a college degree and to contribute directly to the field of agriculture by their future work," he emphasized.

Dean's school activities include extemporaneous speaking in UIL, one-act play in district and regional competition. He has been active in sports lettering two years in football and three in track. Dean has competed at the regional track meet the last three years.

Dean is the second member of the 1980 graduating class to

receive the Houston scholarship. Buddy Hall, son of Mr. and Mrs. Donny Hall received the scholarship through the FFA.

Dean and Buddy will attend Clarendon Jr. College this year. There are four other Houston Scholarship winners that will attend Clarendon College this next year. They are; Gary Vogel-Hereford, LeAnne Hughes-Hereford, James Baxter-Shamrock and Tommy Perkins-Silverton.

Be sure report your spring seed crops

July 31 is the last day to report spring seeded crops. As in the past, it is very important to be accurate in measuring and reporting crops. Failure to report timely and accurately could mean loss of all program benefits (loans and purchases, deficiency and disaster payments). If you are unsure of the acreage, we have a measurement service available from this office. Payment could be reduced or lost when individual program crops are overstated or understated or the NCA is exceeded on farms reporting within the NCA. Some producers have already lost all program benefits due to inaccurate wheat certifications.

Disaster Affected Crops
Crops destroyed by drought, hail, wind, rain, or other natural disasters must be reported to this office and an appraisal made before other use is made of the land in order for the farm to be eligible for disaster coverage.

Disaster claims for wheat and barley that were disaster affected but carried through to harvest must be filed within fifteen days from the last date of harvest for each farm. To be eligible for disaster payments on wheat and barley, the total

production of each crop must be less than 60% of the established yield.

Farm Storage Facility Loans

The maximum amount a producer may borrow to build a grain storage facility has been increased from \$50,000 to \$100,000. However, amounts over \$25,000 require State Committee as well as County Committee approval. The down payment of 15% remains unchanged and the current interest rate is 13%.

Agricultural Conservation program

At the present time, the county allocation is used up and it appears the only additional funds we will receive is through underearnings. We ask that producers who have outstanding approvals report these practices so that if the practice is not fully carried out or not done at all, the funds may be used by other producers.

Bullock said Enforcement Officer John Hodges will meet with local taxpayers in the Donley County Court House from 11:00 until 1:00.

"If Donley area merchants, or anyone else for that matter, have any questions about state taxes or need help in preparing tax forms, Mr. Hodges will be there to assist them," Bullock said.

"We're trying to cut the red tape in this office and we believe these face-to-face sessions with taxpayers help do just that," Bullock added.

Bullock reminded those taxpayers who are unable to meet with his representative on June 18, 1980, that they can still get their questions answered quickly by calling his toll-free tax information number in Austin. That number is 1-800-252-5555.

Artist Studio Club of Clarendon has made plans for another of their annual show and sales for this year to coincide with the Fourth of July celebration and will be held at the Clarendon Lions Club Hall.

New loan rates at Federal Land Bank

Talmadge P. Porter, manager of the Federal Land Bank Association of Memphis, announced that effective June 1, 1980 new loans will be closed at the variable interest rate of 9 3/4% on farm loans and 10 1/4% on rural residence loans, the same rate now being charged existing borrowers on the variable rate. This is a reduction from a 12% fixed rate on farm loans and 14% on rural residence loans which was put into effect earlier this year.

The Federal Land Bank of Texas introduced the variable rate loan in 1969, which allows

the billing rate to increase and decrease with variables in the money market. Earlier this year, faced with unprecedented high money cost, a fixed rate loan was offered on a temporary basis. Improvement in the money market in recent weeks makes it possible to return to the variable rate on new loans.

The Federal Land Bank Association of Memphis makes long-term real estate loans on farm and rural residence property in the counties of Collinsworth, Childress, Cottle, Wheeler, Hall, King and Donley.

Swine Short course June 26

"Settling down" the sows for healthy reproduction of fast-growing porkers can be an unsettling experience for price-pinned hog farmers, say swine experts coming to Texas Tech University this summer to offer answers to some of the problems.

Confine a stressed sow in an environmentally-controlled pen with too many other unsettled sows and the dip in income can unseat even established hog farmers, animal scientists warn.

Feed a slaughter-bound hog too little or too much protein,

and profits can disappear even when good market prices exist. Current low \$30-per-100-pound prices allow for little or no judgment error, says Dr. Leland F. Tribble, animal science professor at Texas Tech's Animal Science Department.

Those persons attending the June 26 Swine Short Course at Texas Tech can expect detailed advice on confined hog production from experts from Missouri, Kansas, Illinois and Texas, he said. The program will begin in the New Livestock Arena, at Indiana Avenue and

the Tech Freeway, at 8:30 a.m.

The major problem for hog producers today is a price that does not cover all out-of-pocket costs such as feed or fuel, much less fixed costs such as taxes, loan interest and property depreciation, Tribble said.

Adding to the price problem are production problems such as deciding the most profitable feed levels of expensive lysine, an amino acid in protein and the most likely to be deficient in most hog diets. It is an essential amino acid for growth and carcass quality, tests have shown.

The short course will discuss how producers can juggle their lysine and other costs to best advantage.

Strangely, Tribble said, there is not much evidence that Corn Belt hog raisers are doing the most logical thing to help profits. They do not seem to be cutting back production in spite of the low prices, he said. The industry has fewer diversified farms, the ones that can easily cut production and beef up other areas like cattle and crops, he said.

The industry has more larger confined operations tied to mass production economics than ever before but still not enough big operators to exert strong control over production levels industry-wide, Tribble said. "They are all independent operators making their own decisions out there," he added.

Larger, confined units have skilled labor, expensive facilities and technicians they cannot afford to idle in spite of or because of the low prices, the animal scientist said. Curtailment in production will have to come with continued \$30 average prices, he said.

Experts thought producers would cut back at the current price levels, Tribble said. Estimates in 1967 value dollars put current prices at 12 cents per pound equivalent, he said.

Some economists attribute the lack of major cutbacks to the overall trend in mass production, from high intensity grain farming through meat animal production to the supermarkets. Diversified farmers used to be

able to market unwanted grain or milk through their hogs, and some still do, Tribble said. The trend, however, is toward specialized farming.

Farm Bureau advise

The Texas Farm Bureau is urging Congress to defeat a proposed compulsory national health insurance program, according to Carrol Chaloupka of Dalhart, president.

A number of health insurance bills are under consideration, including Senator Edward Kennedy's "Health Care For All Americans Act - S. 1720," said Chaloupka. Projected costs to taxpayers for these proposals,

he said, run from the \$28.6 billion needed to begin Senator Kennedy's proposal, down to about \$7 billion for the Republicans' "Medical Expense Protection Act."

"Costs would, of course, increase rapidly each year of operation," he said.

In a letter to Farm Bureau county leaders, Ed McKay, TFB national affairs director, asked members to write their Congressmen and urge defeat of all compulsory national health insurance legislation.

"National health insurance proposals differ primarily in the amount of coverage offered to individuals, and in the amount of federal control involved," McKay said. "Senator Kennedy's proposal simply directs the federal government to take over the private insurance industry and provide comprehensive benefits to all without any consideration of the ability of the individual to pay."

The Republicans' "Medical Expense Protection Act" concentrates on filling in the gaps in existing coverage provided by the private insurance industry to assure unlimited catastrophic protection for all Americans, he said.

Farm Bureau policy reads in part: "We oppose compulsory national health insurance in any form. Nationally implemented and administered health insurance... would be one more step in the socialization of this country. We believe reliance should be placed mainly upon the private sector to solve the financial aspects of health care problems."


