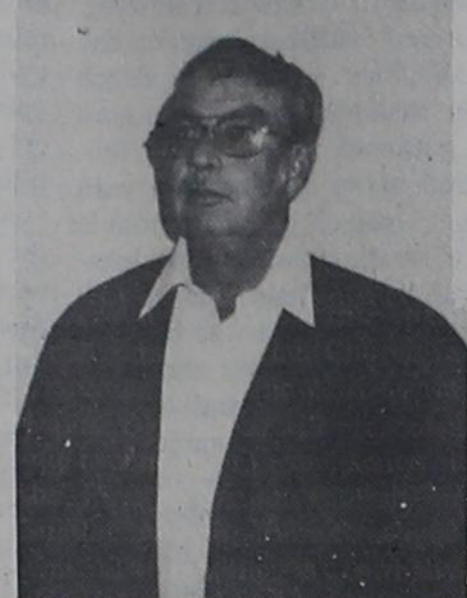

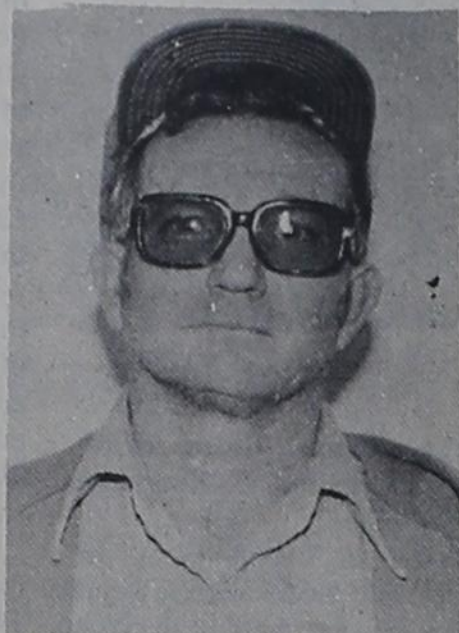

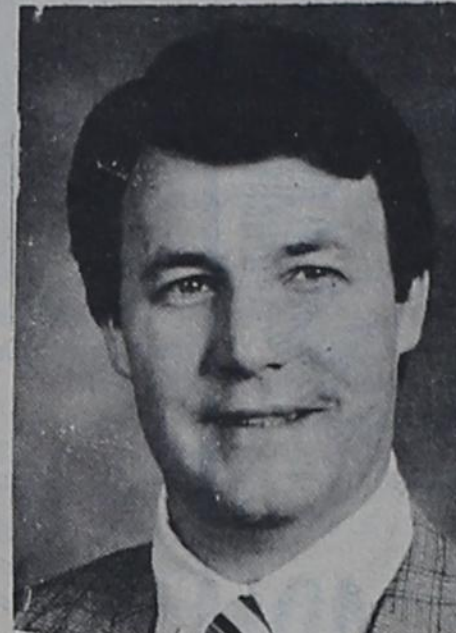

## Run-off election is Saturday

Saturday, June 7, 1980 is election day for the run-off election for three contested offices for county voters. The Democratic candidate for District Attorney for the 100th Judicial District will be decided between Sim Goodall, of Memphis and David McCoy of Childress. Both candidates are seeking the office for the first time.

In the run-off for Donley County treasurer are Freida Gray and Jan Altman. Both candidates are well known in the county. Ms. Gray is the former Freida Putman, daughter of Terra Putman, and Mrs. Altman is married to Don Altman and they live in Lelia Lake area where they farmed for several years.

Clarendon College has announced that an Emergency Medical Technician (EMT) course has been scheduled at the Clarendon campus. Registration will be held in the college administration building at 6:00 p.m. on Tuesday, June 17th. Classes are scheduled on Tuesday and Thursday evenings from 6:30 to 9:30 p.m. Registration fee is \$40.00 plus books.

This course consists of 90 classroom hours and 40 hours of in-hospital training. The Texas Department of Health will certify all persons satisfactorily completing the course and a certificate of completion will be awarded by Clarendon College.

Emergency Medical Technicians serving on ambulances have the greatest opportunity of any segment of society to alleviate human suffering at the scene of accidental injury or sudden illness and during transportation to a hospital. Lawrence Neece, chairman of the board, in making the announcement stated that the purchase of the two buildings from Tommie Saye was a made at no cost to the taxpayers. Repair is to begin immediately with the roof taking priority. Locklear Company from Hollis, Okla. will do the roof work. The purchased buildings include the building next to Barbara's Fabrics building and the north half of the space now used for Saye's Ready to Wear.

Extensive remodeling is in the future and plans are being formulated for the removal of the connecting walls, lowering the ceilings, panelling, the installation of carpet and the addition of bath rooms.

Money has been donated for the purchase of the fireman's pole to be used by the children to get from the second floor to the ground floor. Other space in the upper story will be utilized for a board room, films and for the children's activities.

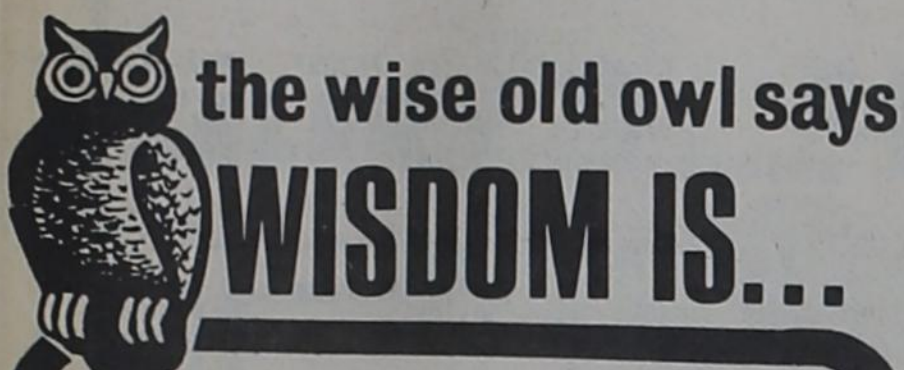

**The Speaker Reports**

by Bill Clayton

AUSTIN—An issue which will be considered during the next session is known as "truth in testing" among educators. There has been increasing concern by many groups that standardized tests, particularly at the postsecondary level, are poor measures of academic ability.

Many people advocate the abolition of the tests; others want tighter controls over the development of the tests; and still others simply want to diminish university reliance on them.

The first law requiring tests publishers to disclose information to the public was enacted in 1978 by the California Legislature. The law applied to the Scholastic Aptitude Test (SAT) and the American College Testing Assessment (ACT) and specified the information to be furnished.

New York enacted similar legislation in 1979. Additionally, New York required that graded tests themselves be filed with the state education commission for review by the test

takers. Two bills were considered by Congress in 1979. Achievement, occupational, and admissions tests were included, and provisions for disclosure and test development were outlined.

The controversy seems to resolve around four issues: (1) the role and power of the testing industry; (2) the nature and quality of standardized tests; (3) the need for new or improved state or federal legislation; and (4) the legal consequences of full disclosure of this sort of information. Each issue provokes very polarized opinions among educators, consumers, and testing representatives.

At a time when concern about educational quality and integrity is at the forefront of interest, the issue of testing becomes especially important. Not only postsecondary tests will be scrutinized, but also public school test instruments will receive attention.

With the proper balance of fairness and a demand for

educational excellence, testing problems can be resolved. The experiences—past and future—of California and New York in this regard should help in determining what is needed in Texas.

Lovell manages approximately 20,000 acres of ranch land in the Rough Breaks country southwest of Clarendon. His primary emphasis is the production of trophy mule deer bucks. In recent years, this ranch has produced the number one and number three typical mule deer racks and the number one non-typical rack in Texas. Last season, this ranch produced the largest mule deer in the Texas panhandle. Lovell is also carrying out an excellent program of range management utilizing a high-intensity, low-frequency grazing system.

Lovell was recently honored by the Texas Chapter of the Wildlife Society for outstanding contributions to wildlife management. This award was presented at the Society's annual meeting at Nacogdoches.

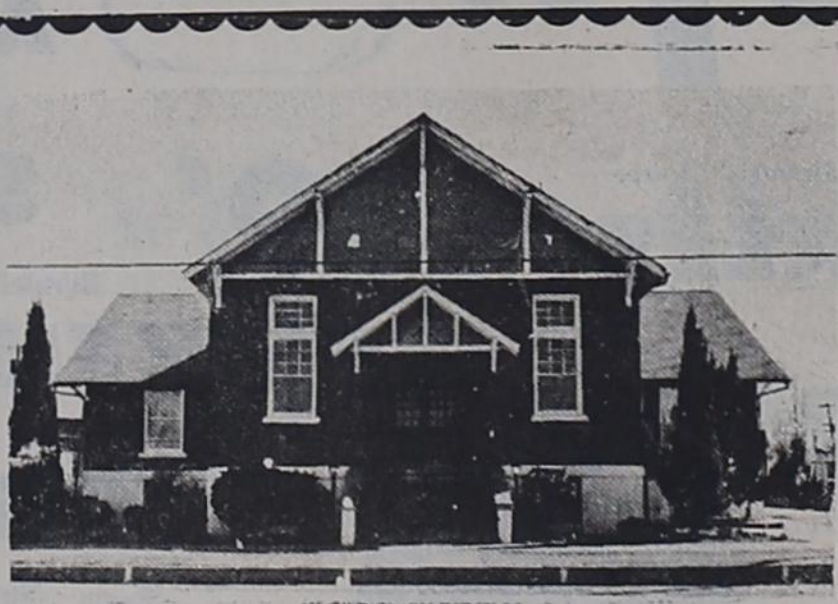

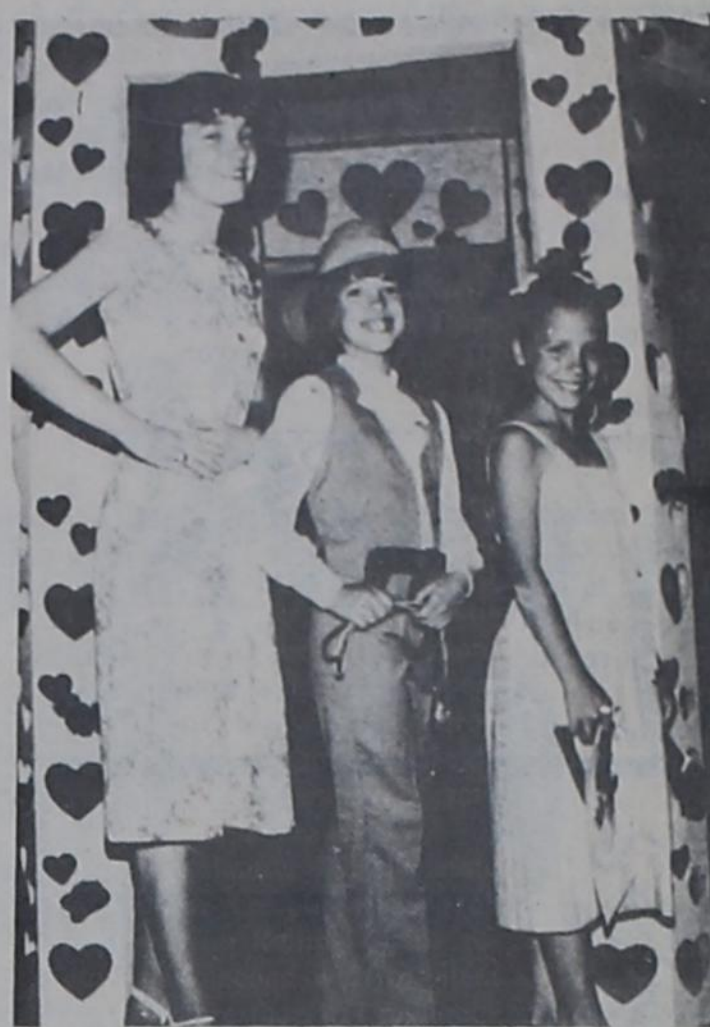

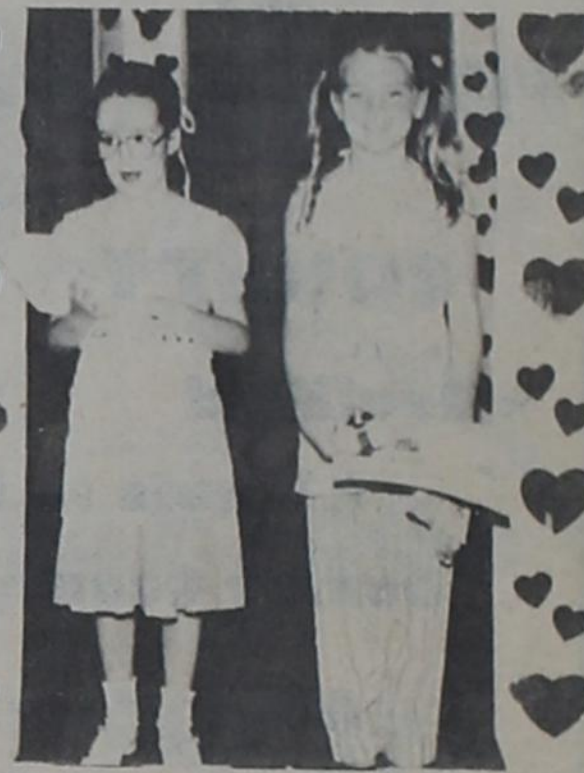

### Cash receipts from Texas crops

College Station—Cash receipts from Texas crops helped boost total agricultural sales receipts to a new high in 1979.

Although final figures are not yet in, Texas Agricultural Extension Service estimates place cash receipts from crops at more than \$3.9 billion, up from \$2.9 billion in 1978. Last year's crop receipts should have an agribus-ness impact of about \$16 billion on the Texas economy.

The big jump in cash receipts was due in part to a bumper cotton crop, says Dr. Carl Anderson, Extension economist in marketing. Intensified efforts in using short-season production systems boosted projected receipts on the 1979 crop to \$1.5 billion. An estimated 6.8 million acres were harvested, producing 5.5 million bales.

The South Plains area of Texas brought in the bulk of cotton receipts with an estimated \$100 million. The rolling Plains region had the second highest cotton receipts at \$24 million.

The South Plains again led in

cash receipts, with sales toasting \$195. The Panhandle was second highest with estimated receipts of \$81 million from corn.

Rice ranked fifth in estimated cash receipts from crops at \$231 million. Texas rice farmers planted 560,000 acres in 1979. The Upper Coast boasted rice receipts estimated at \$217 million for their crop and the Coastal Bend area pulled in an estimated \$13 million.

Vegetable sales totaled \$223 million. Sales in South Texas are estimated at \$116 million while Southwest Texas farmers registered sales of \$27 million.

A surprising \$160 million was estimated in cash receipts by the Texas nursery industry in 1979, points out Anderson. The Upper Coast showed an estimated \$42 million for nursery crops while Northeast Texas posted nursery crop sales of more than \$40 million in 1979.

Cash receipts from soybeans placed eighth on the Texas crops list. Soybeans, harvested on more than 800,000 acres, brought in an estimated \$143 million.

A record peanut crop of 516 million pounds brought in receipts of almost \$97 million. Central Texas growers led the pack with a \$37 million crop while Southwest Texas farmers

received an estimated \$22 million for their peanuts.

Hay was the tenth best seller in the state, bringing in an estimated \$65 million in actual sales. Most hay is produced and fed to livestock on the farm. Therefore, cash sales of hay account for only a small part of the total value of hay produced.

North Central Texas farmers cut an estimated \$75 million worth of hay followed by Northeast Texas with more than \$66 million worth of hay harvested.

Estimated cash receipts in 1979 from other major crops in Texas included pecans, \$48.5 million; melons, \$48 million; grapefruit \$27 million; sugar cane, \$18 million; and oranges, \$14 million.

While cash receipts from crops were up last year in Texas, net farm income made only slight gains due to increased production costs, points out Anderson. And in the wake of high interest rates and high levels of inflation, the squeeze between costs and sales receipts will be even more severe in 1980. Thus producers will likely hold off on purchasing certain inputs, such as machinery.

Farmers will also need to consider forward contracting & hedging alternatives to reduce financial risk and to avoid prolonged storage costs.

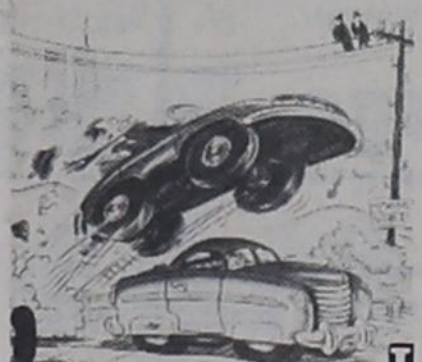

### Accelerating Experiences



Accelerate smoothly and moderately, not only from a standing start, but also when increasing your speed. Sudden bursts of speed are gasoline wasters.

Get into high gear as soon as possible. With an automatic transmission, you can "trick" your car into shifting up by releasing the gas pedal at about 30 mph for a moment, then putting your foot down gently to continue accelerating.

Maintain even speed by pretending there's a raw egg between your foot and the pedal. And be sure to observe the legal maximum speed limit of 55 mph.

For most cars, 35 to 45 mph is the most fuel-efficient rate. At 50 most automobiles get about 18% better gasoline mileage than they do at 65, and at 55 they get 20% more miles per gallon than at 70. Tests also show that speed variations of more than 5 mph can raise fuel consumption by 7% to 9%, so it's better to maintain a constant speed.

## Tips from Katydid

The salt of the earth has lots more to add to life than just savor. Try one of these hints.

1. Add a little salt to water when poaching or hard boiling an egg. It helps keep the poached egg from sticking to the pan and it sets the white of a boiling egg if the shell cracks.
2. When fruit pies boil over in the oven, salt sprinkled on the burned area loosens it.
3. When an enamel saucepan is burned, fill it with cold water, add two or three tablespoons salt, and let it stand over night.

In the morning, bring the water slowly to a boil- you'll have a clean saucepan.

4. Soak clothespins in a strong brine and they won't freeze on the line.
5. If there are too many suds in the dishpan, sprinkle some salt on them.
6. Before freezing or canning fish, soak them in a brine solution of one cup salt to one gallon of water for about an hour to firm the flesh and reduce leakage when thawing.
7. To remove odors of fish or

onion from hands, rub hands with salt, then rinse.

8. Place apples, pears or potatoes in cold water with a generous amount of salt in it to keep their turning dark.

If you have any further uses of salt, send them in and let's see what we can use salt for before it all loses it's savor.

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## Extended time to some FmHa borrowers

Some borrowers who received loans from the Farmers Home Administration to buy new homes during parts of 1976-77 have been given additional time to apply for compensation for structural defects which may have occurred in their homes.

A provision of the Housing and Community Development Act of 1979 authorizes those who received housing loans between April 12, 1976 and October 12, 1977 to make claims for construction defects until October 12, 1980, said W.H. Pieratt, State Director.

Since October 12, 1977, Farmers Home, the rural development service of the U.S. Department of Agriculture, has offered a program of compensation for construction defects to its borrowers who purchase new homes. Borrowers can file claims for 18 months after they purchase homes.

If defects are noted in an FmHa-financed home, the borrower first should contact the builder or contractor who issued the builder's warranty to try to resolve the problem.

If problems cannot be resolved with builders and the defect "directly and significantly reduces the useful life or habitability of the dwelling", borrowers should contact the nearest FmHA County Office.

"Compensation can be made for defects which affect the basic components of a dwelling, such as its foundation, basement, walls, floors, framing or roof, or the heating system, water supply, or sewage disposal system," Mr. Pieratt said.

Farmers Home has advised its field offices to notify by letter all borrowers who may be eligible to file compensation claims during the extended period. The letters will inform borrowers how and when they may apply and explain the types of defects covered.

"Up to \$5 million is available nationwide for compensation for structural defects during fiscal year 1980," Mr. Pieratt said. "However, the number of complaints is small. As of

March 12, only \$220,064 had been expended for 121 claims." He added that in fiscal year 1979, \$1 million was allocated for the national program, but \$383,188 was paid for 229 claims.

The home ownership program of Farmers Home is conducted through 148 county offices serving every rural county in Texas. The Agency's housing program-including home ownership, rental housing, farm labor housing, and site development-is budgeted at \$152,375,000 for Texas during fiscal year 1980.

## Outlook for cotton brighter

National Cotton Council President Herman Probst today said the outlook for cotton the world over is brighter now than it has been for many years.

Speaking to the Universal Cotton Standards Conference here, he pointed out that cotton exports throughout the world are at record levels and that cotton consumption is expanding for the third consecutive year with gains being made in all regions.

He noted that the Financial Times of London recently commented that cotton during the 1970's achieved the "near-impossible" as far as the world of textiles is concerned. After cotton's share of the world textile market consistently declined in the previous two decades because of synthetic fiber competition, its share in recent years has stabilized and edged upward again.

"Our fiber today is in step with an age that is putting increasing emphasis on renewable resources," the Council president said, "and its natural qualities of comfort and softness are in great demand by a generation grown tired of synthetics."

Probst said the promotional

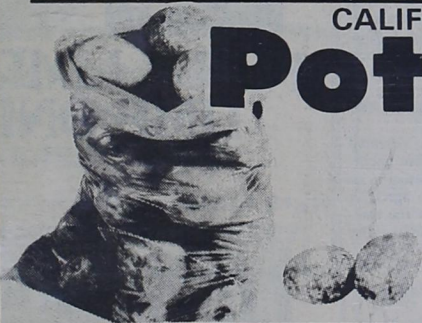
