Feasibility study asked for Greenbelt reservoir

Seeking an engineering and feasibility study which could lead to the construction of an additional reservoir by the Greenbelt Municipal Water Authority linking other communities to an expanded Greenbelt system, representatives of the City of Vernon and West Texas Utilities Company expressed willingness to pay their share of the \$35,000 cost of the study at the May 1, 1980 meeting.

Plans are being finalized for a May 15, meeting of the new entities to work out a cost-sharing plan for the study.

Representatives from Crowley, Quanah, Childress, Hedley, Clarendon and other communities already served by a 120-mile line from Greenbelt Lake near Clarendon were present for the meeting. Walter A. Meller, manager of System Production for WTU at Abilene said his company would need one million gallons of high-quality treated water per day for its coal-fired electric generating plant at Oklaunion and would prefer to obtain the water from Greenbelt as an economy measure rather than provide its own treatment facilities for water it will receive from Lakes Kemp and Diversion for use in the boilers.

Several representatives expressed reservations about the study and the project. Two sites mentioned as possibilities were Mulberry Creek with more than enough capacity and Lelia Lake Creek, which although slightly smaller would provide higher quality water.

James L. Kuhn, of Clarendon, general manager and treasurer of the Greenbelt Water Authority, provided the cost estimates on duplicating the Greenbelt system as \$35 million when developed in 1975. Present costs would be higher, Kuhn added.

Rabies clinic held in Clarendon

On Thursday, May 15, 1980, from 2:00 until 5:00 p.m. there will be a rabies vaccine clinic held at the City Hall in Clarendon. All City and County residents are encouraged to bring their dogs and cats at that time to have them vaccinated. Charge for the rabies vaccine will be \$6.00 per animal, and City residents are required to purchase a City license which is \$1.00.

Candidates face run-off

Three separate offices will be decided in the run-off election to be held on June 7, 1980 for democratic voters.

These are: District Attorney for 100th District between Sim Goodall, of Memphis and David M. McCoy, of Childress; Treasurer of Donley County-Freida Gray and Jan Altman; Commissioner Precinct 1-James R. Graham and Gene White (inc.). "Only those persons who voted in the Democratic primary will be eligible to vote in the run-off election," said Mary S. Cooke, Democratic County Chairman.

There are 2800 registered voters in Donley County and of this number 1442 voted in the May 3, 1980 Democratic Primary Election. This is just slightly over 51% of the eligible voters who went to the polls in May. If you want to do something to influence the trend of political movement your vote is needed to add to the other votes of persons who want things changed too.

May 15th last report date on small grain

The final date to report small grain acreage is May 15, 1980. Acreage reports are required, if no acreage report is received the farm will be ineligible for program benefits. The farm will receive a zero yield for proven yield purposes and the zero yield cannot be adjusted.

IMPORTANT: If you have small grains on your farm and do not report the acreage, the farm will be ineligible on all other spring seeded crops (cotton, feed) grown on the farm for 1980.

Wheat harvest is not far away and if you have previous years' grain in your storage facility and you are going to dump any of this year's production on top of it, you need to have the old grain measured before harvest. If you don't, the entire amount of grain in the bin will count against your production in the event you request a low yield. The cost of measuring the grain is \$10.00 for the first bin plus \$3.00 for each additional bin.

Commodity loans and storage facility loans has increased to 13% per annum.

Crop and livestock reports needed. During May and June, Texas farmers and ranchers will receive a questionnaire from the Texas Crop and Livestock Reporting Service. Prompt and accurate completion of the survey provides more reliable estimates for program planning.

Gasoline prices to increase

Texas consumers will be faced with the largest single gasoline price increase in history on May 15, when President Carter implements his 10c per gallon conservation fee.

He noted that 21% of a barrel is used for making distillates and 11% residual fuel.

"The public is going to be outraged over this ill-advised and unnecessary fee and they have every right to be," says John Calhoun, president of the Texas Oil Marketers Association.

Texas is the second largest gasoline consuming state in the nation. Because of the vast distances that consumers must travel and the lack of subways and mass transit systems, the 10c per gallon fee is expected to impact this area heavier than other parts of the country.

"One of the unfortunate problems is that the public will not realize the impact of this program until they see the signs at the service stations go up by 10c per gallon," Calhoun noted.

"Almost 80% of the petroleum products distributed in Texas is sold through small business petroleum marketers," TOMA President Calhoun noted.

Thus, consumers will see the largest single price increase they have ever known on May 15.

The Farm Bureau Energy Idea Search program was recently announced to the membership of the organization, and FB leaders expect to surface some innovative ideas and technology which will save energy in farm buildings, farm operations, or produce energy needed for agriculture.

Ideas will be judged by a panel of qualified judges, and ideas selected will be published in Texas Agriculture, the organization's publication. TFB will pay \$25 for each published idea. Each idea selected by the state organization will be sent to the American Farm Bureau Federation headquarters in

Chicago, Ill., where a number will be selected for publication in AFBF's publication, Farm Bureau News, for \$25 each. Up to ten ideas will be selected for presentation as symposium papers with awards for \$500 each, and up to ten entrants will receive \$5,000 research grants to continue work on their ideas.

"Federal funds for basic agricultural research have fallen behind in the past several years," said Carrol Chaloupka, president of Texas Farm Bureau and a cattleman from the Panhandle.

"Also, with the shortage of liquid fuel that agriculture requires, there is a need for the private sector to assume leadership in developing innovative agricultural energy technology," he said.

The idea search is designed to stimulate Farm Bureau members to share their energy-saving ideas and to encourage them to participate in further research and development of ideas that

could benefit agriculture the most.

The Energy Idea Search is open to all Farm Bureau members and their immediate families, except Farm Bureau employees. Entry forms are printed in "Texas Agriculture", (May, 1980) and additional forms can be obtained at county Farm Bureau offices.

Ideas will be accepted through Sept. 1, 1980.

US Soil conservation news

More than 68,000 individuals and organizations have provided written comments on the Resources Conservation Act to the Response Analysis Center in Athens, Georgia, Jim Donaho, district conservationist for the U.S. Soil Conservation Service to Clarendon said this week.

The written responses are in addition to statements made at public meetings held in Texas during the 60-day public review period of the draft RCA

documents which ended March 28, Jim said.

All responses are to be analysed by sometime in early May. After all comments have been studied by USDA officials, a recommended soil and water conservation program will be developed and presented to the public for review this summer. The USDA coordinating committee is preparing a schedule of activities that will be released as soon as it is completed.

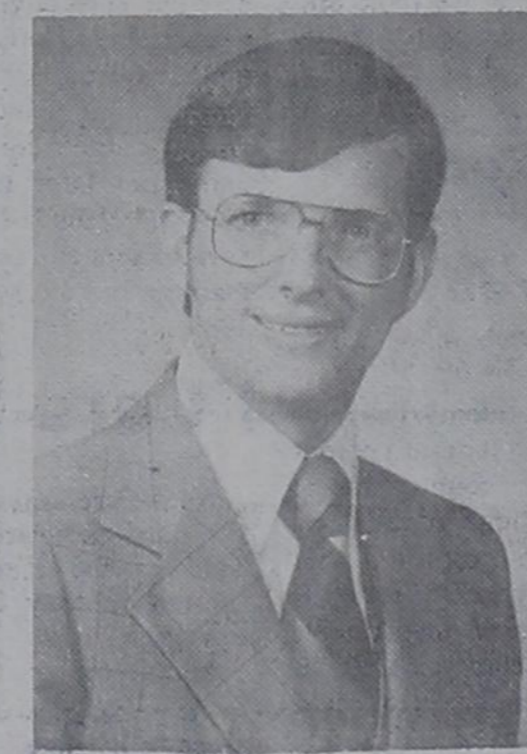

BEEF AND BROCCOLI DINNER BELLS

1st Place Winner-1980 Texas Beef Cook-off Mrs. Beverly Sebastian, Fort Worth

- 2 lb. beef top round
- 3/4 C. chopped onion
- 1/4 C. cooking oil
- 2 tsp. garlic salt
- 2 tsp. lemon-pepper seasoning
- 1 C. chopped tomatoes
- 1 (10 oz.) pkg. frozen broccoli spears in butter sauce
- 6 frozen patty shells, thawed
- 1 C. shredded cheddar cheese
- 1 C. shredded Swiss cheese
- 1/4 C. brown sugar
- 2 T. melted margarine
- Juice of 1/2 lg. lemon
- Parsley
- Cherry tomatoes
- Lemon slices

Cut top round into thin strips, about 2-3 inches long. In large frying pan, cook steak and onion in hot oil until golden brown. Sprinkle with garlic salt and lemon-pepper seasoning while cooking. Cover. Simmer 20 minutes until steak strips are tender. Remove from heat. Stir in chopped tomatoes. Prepare broccoli as directed on the package. Split open cooking bag and cool. To shape bells, roll each patty shell on floured surface to 7-8 inch square. Divide steak mixture evenly among squares. Place a broccoli spear on each with blossom clusters near corner. Cut spears lengthwise if necessary to make six even portions. Sprinkle with cheeses. Bring two corners together to form a cone, leaving blossom ends open at the bottom. Round small end and press with wet fingers to seal seams. Sprinkle with brown sugar. Drizzle with melted margarine. Squeeze lemon juice over all. Bake on ungreased cookie sheet at 400 degrees F. for 20 minutes or until golden brown. Garnish with parsley, cherry tomatoes and lemon slices. Serves 6.

Dr. Smith continued, "This year's Educator of the Year was born September 27, 1932. He attended Clarendon Public Schools and graduated there in 1950.

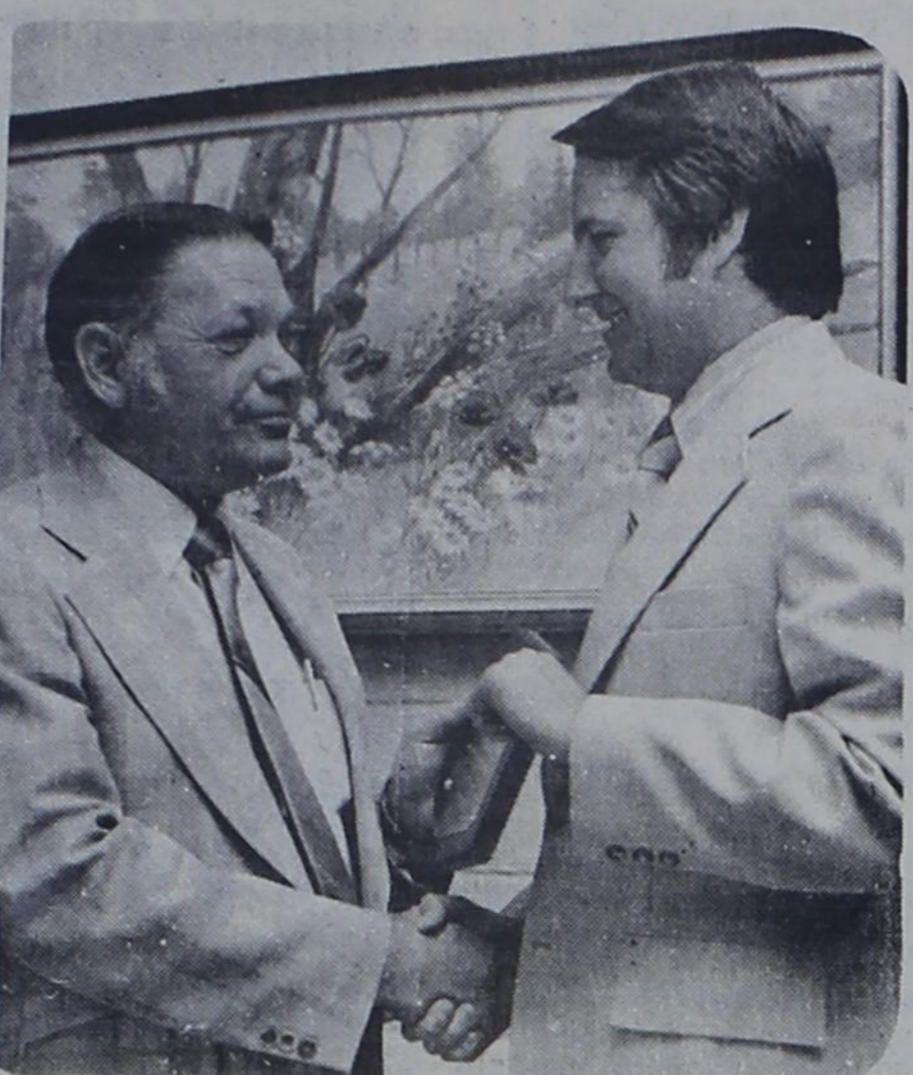

The Consumer Alert

AUSTIN—The purchase of a new motor vehicle is one of the most expensive and important transactions entered into by a consumer. Many new vehicle purchasers encounter problems with the warranty which accompanies the new vehicle. Frequently a dispute arises between the consumer and dealer as to the rights of the consumer under a new vehicle warranty.

In 1971 the Texas Legislature enacted the Texas Motor Vehicle Commission Code which created the Texas Motor Vehicle Commission. The Commission is authorized to mediate, and, if necessary, hold a hearing on a consumer complaint if it involves a new motor vehicle warranty problem. The Commission's authority to assist in the resolution of consumer complaints extends only to new motor vehicle warranty problems. "Motor vehicle" includes any self-propelled vehicle which has as its primary purpose the transport of a person or persons, or property, on a public highway, and having two or more wheels. Thus, new recreational vehicles and motorcycles in addition to automobiles are included. Mopeds, however, are excluded because they are not totally self-propelled.

The Motor Vehicle Commission requires any consumer who wishes to file a complaint with the Commission to write a letter to the dealer setting out all defects in the vehicle which are covered by the warranty. A copy of the complaint letter must be sent to the manufacturer and to the Commission. Upon receipt of such a letter the agency initiates communication with the dealer in an attempt to resolve the consumer's

problem. If the dealer and consumer cannot reach an agreement the consumer may request that the Commission hold a hearing on the unsatisfied complaint. All unresolved complaints must be heard by the agency unless it determines that the complaint was made for purposes of harassment of the dealer or Commission. At the conclusion of a hearing the Commissioners will either order the dealer to comply with the warranty or dismiss the consumer's complaint. If the consumer is dissatisfied with the Commission's order he may still pursue his statutory remedies for a breach of warranty by filing a lawsuit against the dealer.

The advantages to the consumer of proceeding under the provisions of the Motor Vehicle Code rather than through the courts in terms of cost and time, are apparent. If the consumer has incurred little expense as a result of a warranty problem and is interested only in resolving the actual dispute, the Commission provides a forum where legal representation is largely unnecessary. Further, in most instances, the Commission is able to settle a dispute within eight weeks.

In addition to providing consumers with an accessible forum to resolve new motor vehicle warranty problems, the Motor Vehicle Commission Code also allows a consumer suffering actual damages from certain violations of the Code to maintain a private action pursuant to the Consumer Protection Act. The same remedies that are available to a consumer suing under the Consumer Protection Act are available to a consumer suing for a violation of the Code.

Litter pick-up costs taxpayers

Litter pick-up along the state's highways cost Texas taxpayers \$9.2 million during 1979, said the chief administrative official of the State Department of Highways and Public Transportation.

The department's engineer-director, Luther DeBerry, said the most frustrating aspect of the litter dilemma is that littering is completely unnecessary and occurs because of the thoughtlessness and carelessness of individuals.

DeBerry said, "The department is confronted daily by the litter problem and, believe me, it is an ongoing and costly struggle. Litter pick-up by our statewide maintenance personnel is a continuous and time-consuming chore, but one that must be tended to. Otherwise our highways would become unsightly, unsafe and unsanitary garbage dumps."

"The problem is particularly irksome in a time when the department is attempting to carry out the most constructive program possible despite increasing inflation," DeBerry continued.

In an effort to educate the public concerning the expense, the adverse effects, and the needlessness of littering, the department has recently released an informative and colorful anti-litter folder. The pamphlet urges Texans to "Dispose of trash properly" and lists the amount of time it takes for familiar items of litter to decompose. Few people realize the aluminum cans they toss out car windows, if left undisturbed, can last 80 to 100 years.

DeBerry said the pamphlets are available free from local offices of the State Department of Highways and Public Transportation, or by addressing a request to "Litter Folder," Box 5064, Austin, Texas 78763.
