## Carter extends emergency loan program

President Carter has signed legislation extending the Farmers Home Administration Economic Emergency Loan Program until September 30, 1981. The program was due to expire on May 15 this year.

W.H. Pieratt, Farmers Home Administration Texas State Director said, "President Carter's action will enable us to continue the Economic Emergency (EE) program. Not only through the remainder of this year but through the next Fiscal Year as well. Although the EE program was not due to end until May 15, we were just about out of funds when the President signed the bill on March 30."

The EE program provides direct or guaranteed loans to farmers and ranchers who suffer economic hardship because of area or national economic conditions beyond their control. FmHA provided \$115 million in economic emergency assistance to Texas farmers last year.

Pieratt said the new law immediately increases the ceiling on outstanding principal for EE loans nationwide from \$4 billion to \$6 billion. FmHA has already obligated the \$4 billion authorized under the Agriculture Credit Act of 1978. The additional \$2 billion will be allocated to the states, about half of it for use this year.

The new law requires that stronger "credit elsewhere" criteria be enforced before an EE loan can be approved. Any application for an insured loan of \$300,000 or more must be accompanied by letters from at least two private lenders explaining why they turned down the request for a loan. FmHA expects to issue the strengthened regulations within 30 to 60 days.

The new law also requires the Secretary of Agriculture to conduct a comprehensive study of the EE loan program and to recommend to Congress by March 31, 1981, whether or not the program should be extended beyond the September 30, 1981, expiration date.

## Arrest made in theft of saddles

A reported theft of two saddles and other tack from the farm of Jerry Hodge, Amarillo mayor, from his farm near Hedley and the subsequent investigation by Donley County Deputy-sheriff Jimmy Thompson led to disposition of the case when the suspect was arrested April 1, 1980.

Hodge reported the theft in the early afternoon of March 27 after seeing a person crawl over a fence at the farm with two saddles. One saddle was dropped as the individual drove away in an automobile parked at the scene. Hodge followed in his automobile to US 287 when the person he was following turned west on the highway and Hodge turned east. Upon returning to the farm it was discovered that the dropped saddle had been taken away also.

### New Tax Pamphlet available

Pauline Leggett and Mary Neeley, tax assessor-collectors for the Hedley Consolidated Independent School District, today announced the availability of a new 12-page pamphlet which may help district residents save on their property taxes.

The pamphlet explains how the property tax system in Texas operates, and highlights possible tax savings available to citizens.

The publication was developed by the State Property Tax Board in accordance with the provisions of Senate Bill 621, passed by the Texas Legislature in 1979.

It is to be noted that homeowners are eligible for a \$5,000 school homestead exemption, and that certain disabled persons and those aged 65 or older may qualify for additional exemptions from the value of their property.

Also, farmers and ranchers have the option of having their agricultural land taxed at its productive rather than market value.

To qualify for exemptions and productivity valuation, however, applications must be made to the school tax office before the districts rendition period ends on April 30, 1980.

District residents are encouraged to review the pamphlet and make application for all tax relief to which they are entitled before the rendition period ends.

The pamphlet and applications for exemptions are available in the Hedley School Tax Office, located at the School Building, Hedley, Texas.

Commodity Credit Corporation is committed to the removal of wheat from the market place to offset the effect of suspending exports to the Soviet Union.

Beginning April 8 and continuing until 146.8 million bushels of wheat have been purchased, CCC will solicit offers from farmers to sell wheat on the basis of a price to be posted weekly in the local county ASCS office. Offers will be accepted on the first come-first served basis. Sales will be handled by the county office similar to farm-stored loan deliveries.

If you have wheat in storage that you wish to sell to CCC, offers must be delivered to the county ASCS office by 3:00 p.m., Thursday, April 10, 1980, or each Thursday thereafter until the limit has been reached. Please contact this office if you are interested in submitting an offer or if you have any questions.

Only one oyster egg in four million will reach maturity. This rather unusual Easter Bunny was seen at several events during the Easter season

### Observe water safety

As the weather warms up and our thoughts turn to that boat filled with winters dust and leaves, our fishing and water skiing gear comes down out of the garage rafters. Among the various water sport paraphernalia we get down, life jackets and life preservers should get first priority.

Texas has about 1.2 million surface acres in lakes and we are blessed with a part of that acreage with Lake Greenbelt being so near. Unfortunately, Texas also has a high rate of drownings on those lakes, rivers and salt water bays.

In the past four years, 403 persons lost their lives in boating-related accidents. Of that total, 202 were fishing, 13 were skiing, 10 canoeing, 12 whitewater boating and seven sailing.

Most accidents, of course, are preventable. Many fatalities on the water result from the boat operators carelessness. The U.S. Coast Guard found that nearly half these Texas fatalities could have been prevented by either action or inaction on the part of the boat operator.

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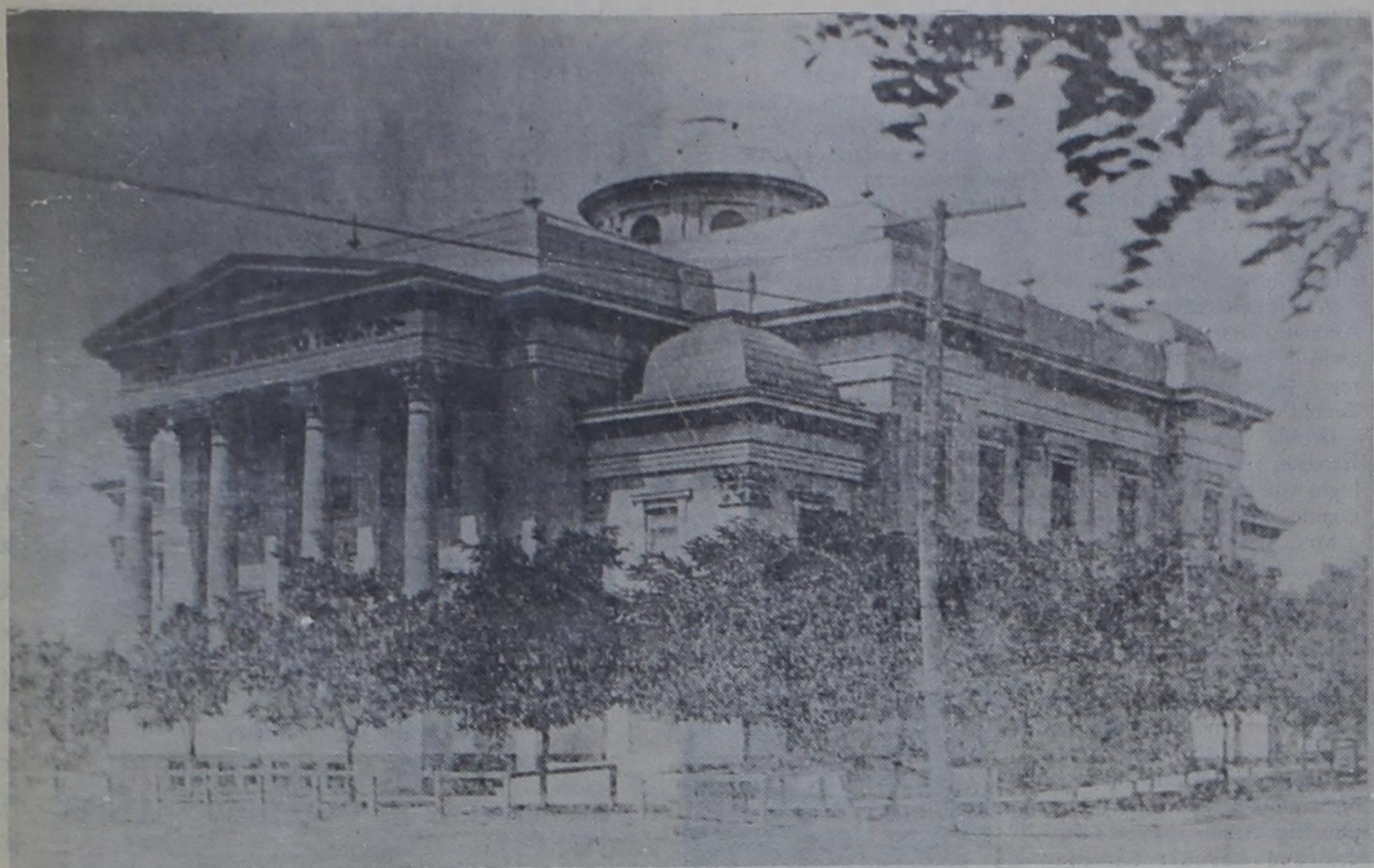

He had seemed the most healthy member of the whole family; so alert, and so alive in his financial business as well as his ministry for the Lord. In less than a week after Easter, he was extensively weakened by the disease and the treatments; yet he had no pain. May 15, God called him home.

On April 6, 1974, our son, only thirty-five years old, was diagnosed with myelogenous leukemia. It had struck suddenly and viciously. With chemotherapy, life was extended a few months. October 28, 1974, he left the cares and insecurities of

### "Trail Boss" breakfast planned

A "trail boss" breakfast and worship service Sunday will signal the start of a Pony Express "run" at Clarendon First United Methodist Church.

The Rev. Bill Watson, pastor, said he expects 25 members filling the roles of trail bosses and station agents to be on hand for the breakfast briefing.

Church families on the Pony Express run will be relaying stewardship saddlebags to gather "estimate of giving" cards.

Flip Breedlove, general manager of the stewardship campaign, will hand out the saddlebags and run route lists at the breakfast.

A relay of the saddlebags among church members will begin immediately after morning worship, he said.

Each saddlebag bears the names of 10 church families. A family fills in a giving estimate card, seals it in an envelope and inserts it in the saddlebag pouch and then hand-carried the saddlebag to another of the families on the route.

"We're excited because of the enthusiastic reception the plan has received thus far," he said.

"There's a spirit of teamwork and, at the same time, competi-

tion." He said the teamwork is similar to that of the Pony Express riders of a century ago, knowing they can count on the next rider to relay the mail to its next destination.

The competition, he said, comes in the eagerness of the trail bosses to see that their run is completed before another's is finished.

"It's good, healthy competition for a good cause," he said. Each trail boss is responsible for supervision of the relaying of one saddlebag to 10 families. The trail bosses report periodically to station agents.

Texas produced 5,775,570,824 Mcf of gas well gas in 1979 against 5,690,601,922 Mcf a year earlier.

Texas produced 28,300,993 barrels of condensate last year, up from 26,000,268 barrels in 1978.

Texas produced 1,340,247,339 Mcf of casinghead gas in 1979, down from 1,386,499,376 Mcf a year earlier. Casinghead gas is gas produced with oil from an oil well.

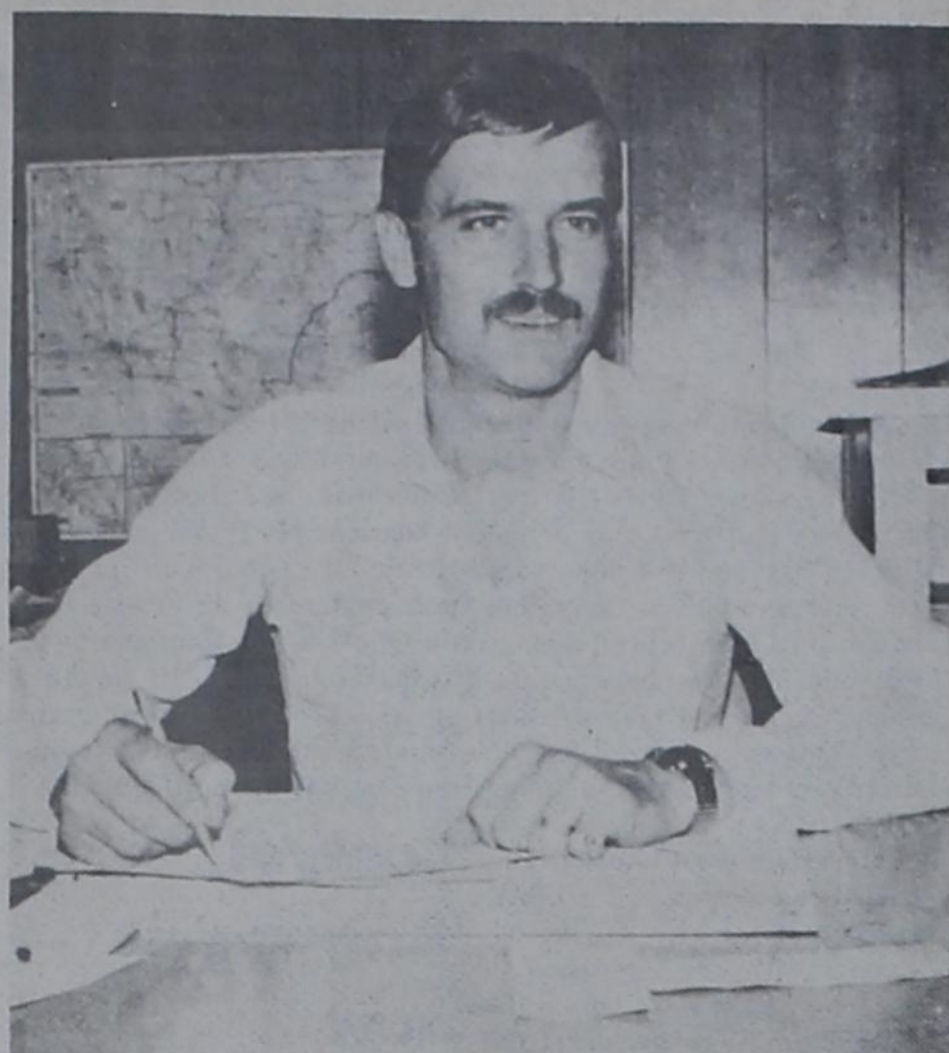

**Girlstown to rebuild  
burned building**

The Administration Building of the Girlstown USA Campus at Borger that was destroyed by fire will be re-built as soon as possible. This announcement comes from Bob Wilson, superintendent of Girlstown's Borger unit. In a meeting with a Long-Range Planning Committee of District 2-T1 of Lions International, plans were made to start the re-building process just as soon as plans can be finalized for the financing of this restoration of the original building.

Under the direction of District overnor Charles Cooley and Past District Governor Jimmie Pigman, the Lions Clubs of the Panhandle, together with all of the citizens who wish to support

Girlstown, a campaign is underway to raise \$250,000.00 to replace the destroyed building, and contents. "Much of the lost value was in inventory of supplies, garden tractors, paint, clothing for the girls, and office equipment and supplies," Superintendent Wilson stated. All of this will have to be replaced.

KGNC Radio is conducting a campaign to raise funds for this cause by asking for "\$1.00 per listener", and the Lions of the District ask that everyone support this effort. **Farnell McAfee honored at  
Tech**

Included in the 25 graduate students invited to participate in the 1980 Sigma Xi mini-conference is Farrell McAfee, of Clarendon who will compete in the scientific presentations to be held April 2-3 at Texas Tech University, in Lubbock.

Geosciences Professor Rae L. Harris Jr., chairman of the mini-conference on Research in the Sciences and Engineering at Texas Tech said, "All students speakers are automatically 'winners' and deserve recognition for having participated in

the mini-conference". The Society of Sigma Xi is an honorary organization of persons with special interests in scientific and engineering research. Invited to participate in the society's mini-conference is Farrell McAfee, undergraduate student of chemistry and the son of Cecil McAfee, Clarendon.

McAfee will discuss "Acidity and Temperature Effects on Migration Tendencies of Substituents in Cationic Rearrangement Reactions."

Gooch says the simplest method is to remove old cocoons hanging from tree limbs. He also advises burning or depositing them with trash to be hauled away. If cocoons are dropped on the ground, reinfestation may occur.

This method of control can best be understood by looking at the life cycle of the bagworm, says Gooch. During the winter the cocoon contains only eggs. In the spring, each larva (caterpillar) crawls from the old cocoon and spins its own. It never leaves its cocoon, so it is relatively safe from predation by birds.

As the larva matures, its food supply declines. Upon reaching adulthood, the larva seals the cocoon to form a pupal stage and transforms into an adult moth. The female moth is wingless and does not leave her cocoon. The male is winged and

does leave in search of a female. The male moth dies soon after mating while the female deposits her eggs in the cocoon and then dies. Her remains plug the lower end of the cocoon. The eggs remain in the cocoon until the following spring when the cycle begins again.
