Oneta Thomas nominee for distinguished service

Receiving nomination for the Texas Panhandle Award for Distinguished Service from Clarendon for 1980 is Oneta (Rampy) Thomas, who was selected from the field of medicine for outstanding service as a nurse.

Chosen by the Order of the Eastern Star, in Clarendon, as their candidate and the first time the OES has participated in the nominations, Mrs. Thomas was also chosen by the 1926 Book Club and the Pathfinder Club as their nominee. This truly dedicated professional has served her community, family and profession in the highest tradition.

Oneta Rampy knew in high school that she wanted to enter nursing training and with the courage of her conviction finished Clarendon High School, went to Amarillo and Northwest Texas Hospital School of Nursing to achieve her goal.

In 1957, Oneta graduated as a Registered Nurse and began her work in behalf of the ill and injured which is continuing at this time full speed.

Dedication to the medical profession leaves little time a variety of outside activities and as a full time wife, mother and nurse Mrs. Claude Thomas belongs to the Texas Nurses Association and has been named to the Executive Board of the LVN Association recently formed in Clarendon. There are no local organizations for R.N.'s During Red Cross blood drives she helped with donor histories as time from her job permitted.

Presently Oneta Thomas is

the office nurse for Dr. R.L. Gilkey, who does general practice in his offices at Medical Center in Clarendon. During an average day she assists with 35-40 patients. Some days there are 50-60 patients in addition to those who come for allergy shots and who do not have to see the doctor.

Until the routine of the combined offices of Dr. Gilkey and Dr. Carl Hudson who has very recently started his practice here in Clarendon are established, Oneta Thomas is assisting both doctors. She is pleased that Clarendon is able to have medical services provided for all who come for help, and whose numbers are more than one doctor can attend to. She is qualified to know how over-worked a medical team can be in an effort to provide needed services to patients.

Ever mindful of others Oneta admits that doctors and nurses work on in spite of headaches, sniffles and various ailments which keep some persons home. She has never lost a days work at the office because of illness.

She works in the field of general practice where there is unlimited experience from the new-born to the elderly, from minor ailments to the terminally ill. In addition to office work, Mrs. Thomas receives numerous calls at home from persons who need her help. She does not go to the office after hours nor does she do more than make suggestions or give the most general advice. But she does what she can for those who need her.

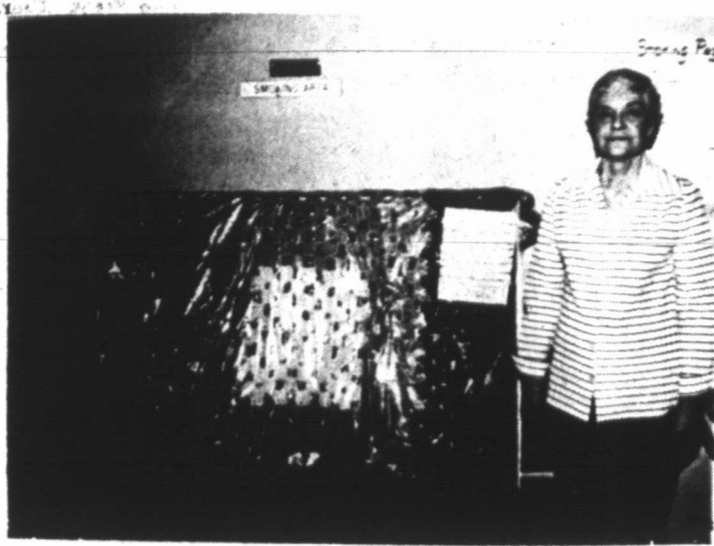
Women involved in education, medicine, business, civic service and professional areas in the 32 counties are eligible for nomination.

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What's burning in Maurine Kitchen

By MAURINE BUTTS

We are coming upon a traditional problem with the Easter eggs that have already been hunted several times. What do with them! After you have used them in potato salad or served them in tuna, or as deviled eggs, try this special sandwich.

After Easter open faced sandwich
1 slice toasted whole wheat bread
1 slice ham (or chicken)
2 hard boiled eggs
2 slices crispy fried bacon
1 T thousand Island Salad dressing

Layer them above and top with dressing. Serve with tomato wedges and pickles.

Now, what about the colored egg shells? Place shells between two layers of waxed paper. With rolling pen, crush shells. Now place all the blue shells in one part of a muffin tin, then all the green, pink etc. Let the children draw a tulip on paper. Using the colored shells, allow the children to glue the shells onto the drawn tulip.

To get the shells off of eggs easily, try this. Place 2 eggs in a small sauce pot. Shake the eggs so that they hit the sides of the pan and each other. The shells should nearly fall off by themselves.

Here is another recipe for hard cooked eggs. This is from the Betty Crocker Cookbook.

Eggs Continental
1/4 c dry bread crumbs
1 T butter or margarine, melted
4 hard-cooked eggs, sliced
3 slices bacon, diced
1 c dairy sour cream
1 T milk
1 T instant minced onion
1/2 t salt
1/4 t paprika
1/8 t pepper
1/2 c shredded cheddar cheese

Heat oven to 350 degrees. Toss bread crumbs in butter; divide among 4 buttered 10 ounce baking dishes. Layer egg slices over crumbs.

Fry bacon until crisp, drain. Stir together bacon, sour cream, milk, onion and seasonings; spoon over eggs. Top with cheese. Bake uncovered 10 to 15 minutes or until cheese is melted.

Deadline for SBA nears

The last day for filing loan applications for SBA Disaster Declaration #1708 is April 10, 1980, on loans for physical damages and the last day for filing on economic injury losses under this declaration is July 10, 1980.

Interest rates for loans under Declaration #1708 are 5% and 7-3/8% for Physical Damage and 8 1/4% on Economic Injury loans. The 7-3/8% rate is determined by availability of financing from other sources at comparable terms.

Declaration #1708 covers Deaf Smith, Parmer, Castro, Swisher, Briscoe, Lamb, Hale, Floyd, Cockran, Hockley, Yoakum, Caines, Dawson, Martin and Upton Counties and the counties adjacent to them.

Applications received after these deadlines will not be accepted.

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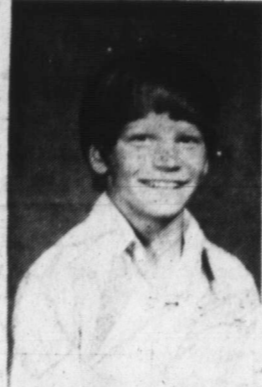

Had they have done it when it first happened it wouldn't have cost very much.

Now you be the judge of this, when you compare the 4 counties don't you think the 3 with no supervisor are doing the job they were hired to do.

Final reporting dates for small grains May 15 is the final date to report small grain crops (wheat, oats, rye and barley).

Be sure that your acreages are measured carefully. We are required to spot-check a number of these farms, so be as accurate as possible. If you are unsure of your acreages, measurement service is available from this office at a small charge. You need to make any application for measurement service as early as possible so that we can complete the work in time for you to make your acreage report.

1980 farm program We now have a farm program. It is a two tier concept. There are different target and disaster rates for this year. A lower rate will apply if you exceed the Normal Crop Acreage for the farm. The higher rate if you stay within the Normal Crop Acreage. The two tier concept will not apply to cotton. There will be only one level regardless of whether or not you stay within the NCA.

There will be no early sign-up; however, everyone should report acreage even if

you have no NCA. There are some program benefits available to you.

1980 target prices Farms staying within the NCA: wheat \$3.63 per bu., corn \$2.35 per bu., grain sorghum \$2.50 per bu., and barley \$2.55 per bu. Farms exceeding the NCA: wheat \$3.08, corn \$2.05, grain sorghum \$2.45 and barley \$2.29.

Cotton-All farms-\$0.584 The program extends the disaster program through 1980. Disaster rate is 1/3 the target price for all crops except cotton, which is 1/2 the target price. There is a \$100,000 payment limitation for all crops per person.

Farm Changes In order for us to bring our records up to date, we need to know of any changes in owner or operator of farms for 1980.

Census workers

Census takers for the 1980 Census of Population and Housing are easy to identify, according to Census District Manager.

They wear red, white, and blue cards with the U.S. Department of Commerce seal and "Census Enumerator, Official Credential" printed on them. Their cards also have their signatures, certifying that they have sworn to keep confidential all information they collect for the census. Any Census Bureau worker who breaks this oath faces a fine or imprisonment or both, but the Bureau's record on this is spotless, the manager said.

Census takers have started making their rounds here, calling at residences from which householders have not mailed back their census questionnaires. They are using the telephone to reach most of the householders who have mailed back questionnaires inadequately filled out.

Anyone without this official identification card who claims to be a census taker should be reported to the police or to the district office. Dial information for the local census number to call.

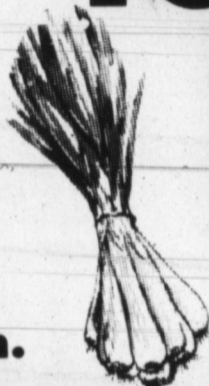

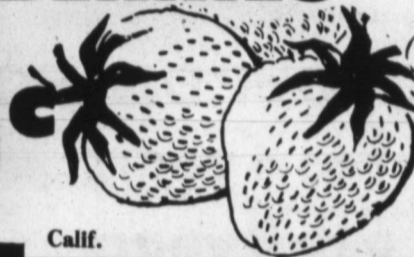

Accident Control: Surprisingly, rubber mats used to prevent slipping on steps often do more harm than good. Many mats are worn skid-smooth and are fastened down poorly. Bare wood is also an excellent non-skid surface, says the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, Texas A&M University System.

Tips for rookie tomato growers

Growing a few tomato plants can be a fascinating and rewarding venture, or it can be frustrating.

If you're growing tomatoes for the first time, a few pointers can help you avoid some common pitfalls, says Dr. Sam Cotner, horticulturist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, Texas A&M University System.

First, don't grow tomatoes unless you have an area that receives sunlight for at least six hours during the day.

Next, good soil is a must. Oftentimes, garden soil is poor but can be improved with the right amount of organic matter and fertilizer.

Select a variety of tomatoes with a maximum resistance to common diseases, advises Cotner. Bonus, Big Set, Better Boy, Spring Giant and Floramerica all carry multiple disease resistance to most common diseases.

Buy short, stocky, young plants. Select plants four to six inches tall and about as wide. If plants are in peat pots or peat blocks, do not remove them, says the horticulturist. Set the plants deeply into the ground with the top of the peat pot or peat material container below the surface. Plant them into well-prepared soil and water thoroughly immediately after transplanting.

When tomatoes start bloom-

ing, begin a weekly dust or spray program to prevent insects and diseases that are common in Texas gardens.

Stake, trellis or cage tomato plants for best results, adds Cotner. Any method is good if it keeps fruit off the ground to prevent rotting.

Mrs. Stavenhagen, in addition to directing the one act play, coaches students in the extemporaneous speaking contests of Persuasive and Informative Speaking together with Prose and Poetry Interpretation

Contests. Her winners were numerous: 1st place Persuasive Speaking-Rick Hayes; 2nd Place Persuasive Speaking-Mindy Morris; 2nd place Informative Speaking-Terry Cole; 3rd place Informative Speaking-Spencer Hayes; 2nd place Prose Interpretation Scott Newland; 1st place Poetry Interpretation-Dan Hansen. These students qualify for the regional contest at Odessa. Also winning was Charla Crump-4th place Oral Reading. Other students participating in the district speech contest were Kim Anderson, Taffie Williams, Lacreacia Petty and Anna Harrison.

The extemporaneous speakers are well informed about current issues. The topics about which they speak include the Iranian Crisis, the Russian invasion of Afganistan, inflation, and similar prominent happenings. The poetry and prose interpreters prepare by choosing several selections from a list of writings compiled by the University Interscholastic League office. These students spend many hours practicing their readings.

spelling contest were Mrs. Noonkester's spellers. These students captured all three places, thus qualifying them for the regional contest. Winners were as follows: 1st place-Brenda Daniel, 2nd place-Kelli Hardin and 3rd place-Sherilyn Walker.

Easily the most successful of recent years, the CHS writers captured all five first places in contests entered. 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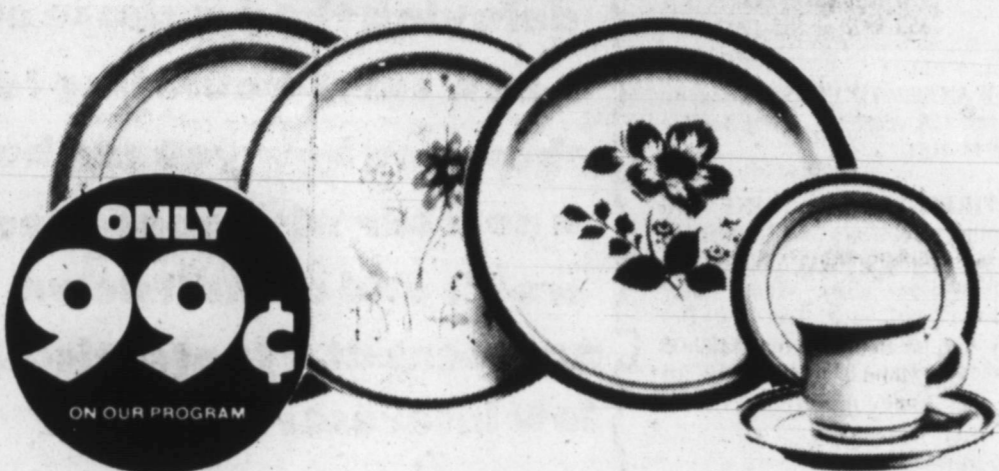
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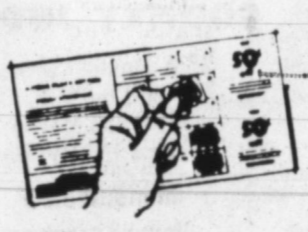

SS Question & Answer

Q: My state job is covered by Social Security. At retirement, I'll be eligible for Social Security Benefits on my own work record, as well as a state pension. I'll also be eligible for a wife's benefit on my husband's social security record. How will the public pension offset affect my situation?

A: If you qualify for Social Security Benefits on your own record and on your husband's, you'll get an amount equal to the larger of the two amounts. Any Social Security Benefit you receive based on your husband's work record will not be affected by your public pension because your public employment is covered by Social Security. Also, since the offset provision only applies to Social Security dependents' and survivors' benefits, it will not affect any benefit you get on your own Social Security record.

Q: At the beginning of the year, I hired a woman to do housework twice a week. I understand that I'm supposed to pay Social Security taxes on her wages and file a report with IRS. When should I do this?

A: If you pay a household worker \$50 or more in cash wages in a calendar quarter, you must deduct social security taxes from the wages and pay an equal amount as the employer. Before the end of the month after the calendar quarter, you must send the taxes and a report of the wages to the Internal Revenue Service. The report, Form 942, Employer's Quarterly Tax Return For Household Employees, is available from local IRS offices.

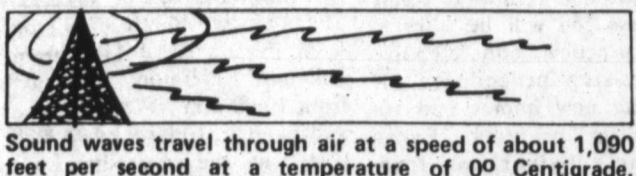
