





## CISD Trustees extend Hysinger's contract

The Clarendon ISD Board of Trustees reviewed the performance of Superintendent Monty Hysinger during the board's regular meeting January 14.

Following a closed session that lasted over an hour, the board reviewed the Superintendent Evaluation and considered his contract renewal, and a summative conference was held with the superintendent.

The board unanimously approved a motion to approve the Superintendent salary and benefit package and to extend the Hysinger's contract through the 2014-2015 school year.

In other school business, a public hearing was held to discuss the following Annual Performance Reports: AEIS Report 2008-2009, District Student Performance Objectives Results for 2007-2008 and Performance Objectives for 2009-2010, Title I Adequate Yearly Progress

Report (AYP), Summary Report of the 2009-2010 Performance-Based Monitoring and Analysis System (PBMAS), ACT College Readiness Report, and Report on Violent, Criminal Incidents, and Prevention and Safety Policies.

The board voted in favor of offering a new elective course, The Bible and Its Influences Part I and Part II, at Clarendon High School as presented.

Prior to the regular board meeting, a called meeting was held at the Family and Consumer Sciences Classroom.

Hysinger presented certificates to board members in acknowledgment of their years of service. The campuses expressed their appreciation in numerous ways.

Missy Reynolds and students in her FACS class served the board members and administrative personnel a meal in honor of Board Appreciation Month.



The Clarendon Lions Club held its regular Tuesday noon meeting January 29, 2010, with Boss Lion Chuck Robertson in charge.

We had 21 members and no guests this week.

Lion Monty Hysinger reported that the school had been undergoing intensive TAKS training in order to administer the test soon, and Lion Mike Word said the elementary school had received a national Title I recognition this week and is one of only a dozen or so schools in Region 16 to do so well.

There being no further business, we were adjourned.

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# ML King changed the course of our nation

As I watched the Dallas Cowboys self-destruct yesterday, I just wondered what would have happened if Roger Staubach or Troy Aikman and Emmitt Smith had been playing. Probably the same results. Well, there is always next year, and I will still be a fan, a disappointed one.

Monday was Martin Luther King, Jr. Day, with the post office, schools, and many stores closed. Dr. King was born in 1925 and assassinated on April 4, 1968 in Memphis, Tennessee, so we are talking about recent history. What was there about Dr. King that caused him to become the youngest person to receive the Nobel Peace Prize in 1964 and to be revered today?

To understand recent history we must go back in time to look at

the Emancipation Proclamation that was issued by President Lincoln on January 1, 1863, during the middle of the Civil War. This set free slaves in states that had seceded from the Union when the Union army won battles. It did nothing for other slaves and it depended on Union victory.

There continued much discrimination against blacks, especially in the south with local laws preventing them from eating in a restaurant of choice, sitting in a bus or going to the local school, and especially voting.

The civil rights movement was strong with Dr. King working tirelessly to awake the American people to their plight. He led the Montgomery bus boycott in 1955 after Rosa Parks famously refused to give up

her seat to a white man. The boycott lasted 365 days and resulted in the Supreme Court abolishing the Alabama law and allowing anyone the right to sit on a bus.

Dr. King was a founder of the Southern Christian Leadership Conference in 1957 and its first president. His efforts led to the March on Washington in 1963 and his famous "I Have a Dream" speech. With that he helped raise public awareness of the civil rights movement. He had met and followed the teachings of Mahatma Gandhi in ending racial

discrimination through civil disobedience and other non-violent means, working in a Christian manner.

The Civil Rights Act of 1964 outlawed racial segregation in schools, at the workplace, and by facilities that served the public such as buses and diners but also parks, playgrounds, movie theaters and so on. It also extended voting rights making poll taxes and other practices illegal. At the last minute a small word, "sex," was added amid laughter but that led to greater rights for women.

Today those laws still live on and have led to more freedom for everyone.

Dr. King with his civil disobedience and oratory can take their rightful place in history.

Recipe: Chunky Garden Lasagna: 1 lb. Lean (at least 80%) ground beef, 3/2 cups hot water, 1 box Hamburger Helper Lasagna, 1/2 teaspoon dried oregano leaves, 1/4 teaspoon garlic powder, 1 small tomato, coarsely chopped (1/2 cup), 1 small bell pepper, coarsely chopped (1/2 cup), 1 small zucchini, thinly sliced (1 cup), 1 cup shredded mozzarella cheese (4 oz.), 1/4 cup sliced salad

olives. In 10" skillet, cook beef over medium-high heat 5-7 minutes, stirring occasionally, until thoroughly cooked; drain.

Stir in hot water, contents of uncooked pasta and sauce mix pouches from Hamburger Helper box, the oregano and garlic powder. Heat to boiling, stirring occasionally. Reduce heat; cover and simmer 10 minutes, stirring occasionally. Stir in tomato, bell pepper, zucchini and mozzarella cheese.

Cover; simmer 5 min., remove from heat and Uncover (sauce will thicken as it stands). Stir before serving. Serve with sliced olives.

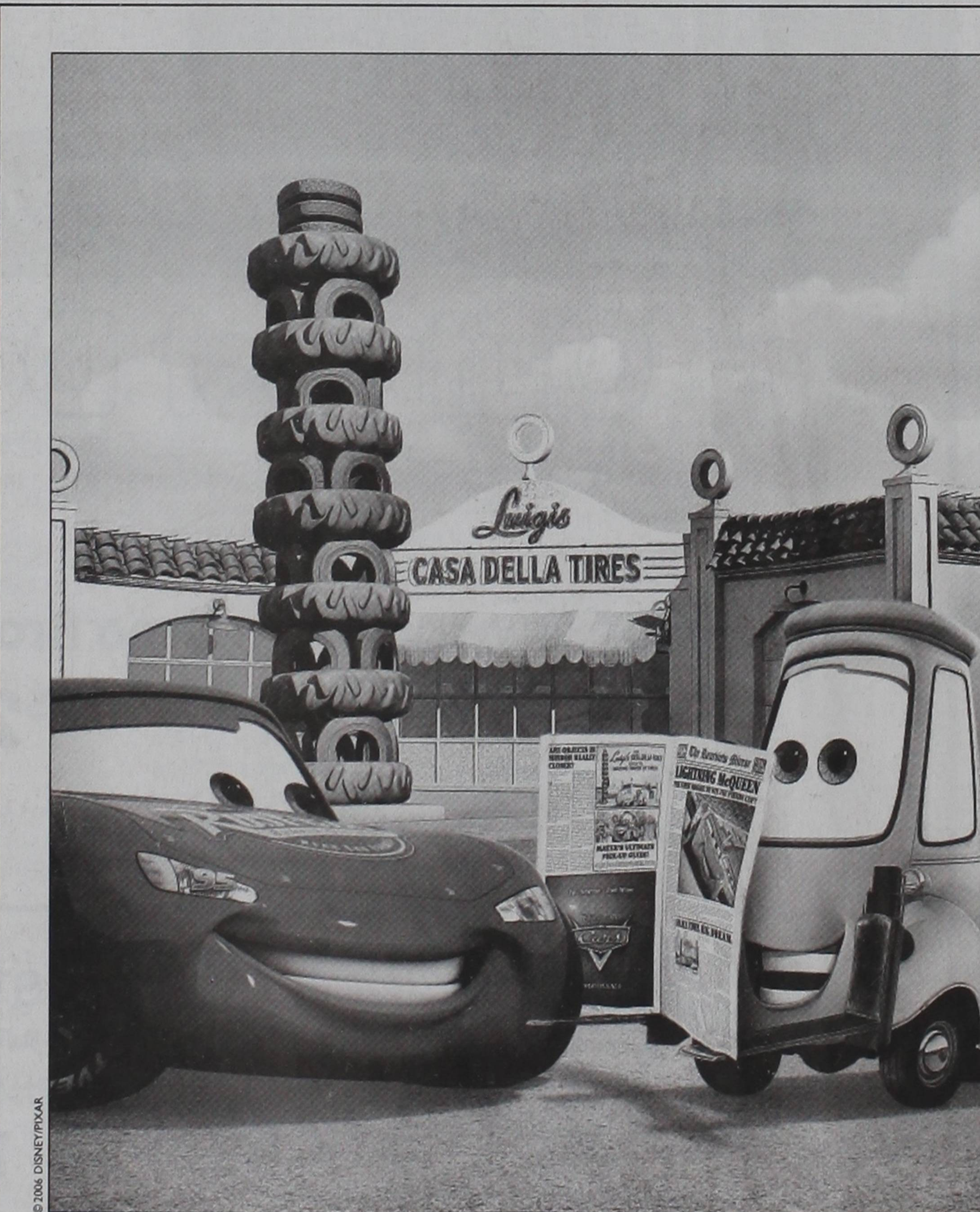

Scoring this game were Burton 27, Shields 14, Verstuyft 5, Wheatly 4, Jodee Widener 3, and Starlette Herrera 2.

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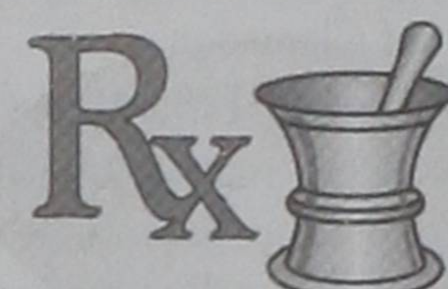
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## Drugs in the News

### New Flu Vaccine Approved for Seniors

The US Food and Drug Administration (FDA) recently approved a seasonal influenza vaccine specifically for persons greater than 65 years of age. Clinical studies have shown that the new vaccine, called Fluzone High-Dose, produces a greater immune response compared to the normal Fluzone vaccine in persons 65 and older. This is thought to be important because the immune system gets weaker as people age, and this may affect how vaccines work in this age group. Following approval, the manufacturer is required to conduct more studies showing that the vaccine will be effective in decreasing seasonal influenza. Because Fluzone High-Dose is more potent, it has been shown to have higher rates of mild side effects compared to Fluzone. These side effects may include injection site pain, fever, muscle pain, and malaise. The vaccine is given as a single preservative free injection in the upper arm. People 65 and older may be at a higher risk for complications due to seasonal influenza. These complications can lead to hospitalization. Experts agree that the best way to prevent seasonal influenza is annual influenza vaccination.
