Aldermen discuss **Secretary position**

The Clarendon Board of Aldermen met in called session Monday morning to discuss the position of city secretary.

The job will become vacant effective February 1 following the retirement of City Secretary Linda Smith, who has held the position for 13 years.

City Administrator John Webb told the ENTERPRISE the board met in executive session and afterward decided to appoint him as the official city secretary and begin the process of training two current employees in City Hall.

"We're going to name Jeannie Molder as a deputy secretary and Macheil Covey as city clerk and deputy secretary," Webb said.

The women will begin a program to become state certified city secretaries, which Webb says is a status that has been lacking here for several years.

Smith, meanwhile, will be honored with a reception to recognize her years of service on January 27at City Hall from 9 a.m. to 1 p.m.

SWEPCO customers set new use record

The extreme Arctic cold weather last week brought a new all-time winter peak load for AEP Southwestern Electric Power Company (SWEPCO) on Friday, January 8, as its customers used 4,543,000 kilowatts of electricity at 8:00 a.m., when the average temperature across SWEPCO's three-state service area was 19 degrees.

This broke the winter record of 4,180,000 kilowatts on January 5 of this year. The previous record winter peak load had been 4,186,000 kilowatts on February 16, 2007, when the average temperature was 28 degrees. A kilowatt is the electricity required to burn ten 100-watt light bulbs.

State may cut some CC funds

Clarendon College would not be seriously impacted if state officials carry through with a possible five percent budget cut.

Gov. Rick Perry, Lt. Gov. David Dewhurst, and House Speaker Joe Straus sent letters to state agencies and institutions of higher learning directing each state agency to submit a plan to identify savings for the 2010-2011 biennium.

But CC President Bill Auvenshine doesn't think the college has much to worry about.

"This is a pre-panic," Auvenshine said. "The comptroller has said Texas was the last going into the recession, and she believes it will be the first to come out of it.

"Other states are really suffering. Arizona is asking agencies to cut 30 percent."

College officials had heard rumors before Christmas of a possible ten percent cut, Texas is now looking at five percent, and Auvenshine believes the final cut, if it comes, will be less than that.

"They did this in 2003," he said. "They asked for ten percent and ended up at three percent."

Five percent would amount to about \$200,000 coming out of the college's budget, but Auvenshine said CC did well in its last appropriation and that it can deal with the cut if it has to without cutting personnel.

"We met with staff members this week and asked them to look where they could cut in their budgets," Auvenshine said. "Deferring maintenance projects is the most likely thing. We've done that before."

The letter from the state requests CC submit a plan identifying savings no later than February 15, 2010.

Home loans available for rural families

AMARILLO - USDA Rural Development has announced their allocation for direct single family loans for Fiscal Year 2010.

Due to an increased level of funding as a result of the American Recovery and Reinvestment Act, USDA Rural Development in Texas has more than \$130 million in direct funding available to help families achieve the dream of home owner-

"USDA Rural Development is proud to assist rural Texans in meeting their housing needs, which is critical to the long term sustainability of our communities," said Paco Valentin, USDA Rural Development State Director.

USDA Rural Development's direct program provides low-interest, no-down-payment loans to help eligible families living in rural communities and rural areas to purchase their own homes.

The Direct Rural Housing Program is geared toward low to very low-income families. No down payment is required for the program and closing costs may be included in the loan. Under this program an applicant may be eligible for payment assistance, which would subsidize the interest portion of the house payment down to as low as 1%, lowering the overall monthly payment amount. In many cases, the total monthly house payment, including taxes and insurance, may actually be less than a family is paying for rent.

Homes must be in a community of 10,000 persons or less and locations not closely associated with urban areas.

Wet/dry issue one for voters, not Aldermen

The Clarendon Board of Aldermen took up an unusual topic last week - the sale of beer and wine and the possibility of legalizing such sales inside the city limits.

There appears to be no rallying cry for such sales and certainly no organized effort to bring the issue to the voters. Some citizens made mention of it to

one alderman, and she in turn threw it out for discussion and drew some interesting debate. The result: three aldermen favored the sales in package stores, and one opposed it. A

fifth alderman was absent. Those who favored the idea said they felt it would bring tax revenue into the city that is currently going else-

where and that it would be more convenient for people living here not to have to drive out of town to make their purchases.

The alderman who opposed it noted that alcohol destroys lives and said it is a major contributing factor to traffic accidents and criminal activity.

The discussion, although sharp, was not confrontational, and everyone agreed that it was a non-issue unless citizens presented a petition.

Temperance was a founding principle of Clarendon and, for that matter, of this newspaper. And for much of the last 132 years, the sale of alcoholic beverages has been prohibited within our community. It's what the town is known for and the way it got its old nickname "Saints' Roost."

But it hasn't always been so. In fact, when New Clarendon sprang up with the coming of the railroad in 1887, the city was wet... very wet. Several saloons dotted Kearney Street, and they advertised their goods in this newspaper. This went on for 15 years before the temperance movement that was so prominent in Old Clarendon reestablished itself, and the county was voted dry on July 1, 1902.

But what happened during those 15 years? Oddly enough, the community blossomed and produced some of its most notable cultural achievements, even securing another and more noble nickname, "the Athens of the Panhandle."

Yes, people were no doubt getting inebriated in local saloons, but other people were busy building a thriving little city. In those 15 years, Clarendon College was established as the first college in the Panhandle, St. Mary's Academy was established, our oldest churches were established, and this newspaper covered it all. This is not to say that alcohol led to these developments but rather to point out that they occurred while alcohol was in our midst.

People drink – not all people, but many people, including your humble editor. I don't drink for the purpose of getting drunk. I have an occasional drink because I like the taste. I enjoy a cold beer with my pizza or my steak, and I like a margarita with, well, most anything really but particularly chips and salsa. I personally believe there is nothing wrong with drinking responsibly, and I think that right ought to be extended to those who are old enough to vote or serve in our military. I also think the penalties for getting drunk and getting behind the wheel ought to be very harsh, particularly if you hurt someone in the process.

It is worth noting that the county is not entirely dry. If you do care to drink, it is available just few miles north of town. So it's not like we're a hundred miles from the nearest beer store.

But should Clarendon be voted wet? As the Board of Aldermen correctly surmised, it's really up to the people. The voters haven't been heard for nearly 108 years, and maybe everyone is okay with that. Changing the status quo is not a decision that should be made lightly. Let there be a debate if the people want one, and see where things stand in the 21st century.

I'll love my community either way - wet or dry.



How to pay for nation's health care

Now that Congress is entering the end game on health care, there really is only one issue of consequence that has to be resolved - how you pay for this ambitious new program.

Don't get me wrong. Emotions run high on the issues of abortion coverage and the public option. But there is a clear path to resolving those two issues... move to the Senate position. Abortion opponents won't like that result (they prefer the more stringent Stupak amendment contained in the House bill) and many liberal activists still want a public option as provided in the House bill. However, there is a clear path to crafting a majority in both chambers with these two issues out of the way, even on terms favorable to just the Senate.

However, coming up with the money to pay for providing subsidized coverage for millions of lower income people who would receive their insurance through the bill's system of insurance exchanges or through expanding the reach of Medicaid is another matter altogether.

The House closed this gap by providing for a 5 percent income tax surcharge on upper income taxpayers (individuals earning more than \$500,000 a year and couples earning more than \$1 million a year). The Senate rejected this approach and provided for a 40 percent excise tax on generous health care plans (those valued in excess of \$8,000 for an

individual and \$23,000 for a family). These are the "Cadillac" plans.

Organized labor hates the Senate provision and candidate Obama campaigned against such a proposal by Republican nominee John McCain to impose an excise tax on generous health care plans. President Obama now seems open to such an approach but it will be a very hard sell to House Democrats.

Organized labor has drawn a line in the sand on this one issue because unions agreed to increases in the value of fringe benefits like health care rather than pressing harder for increases in wages during collective bargaining in recent years. Union opposition to the health policy excise tax resonates louder in the House than in the Senate because union manpower and financial support often can make a bigger difference in a campaign in an individual House district than in a statewide Senate campaign. Also, rank and file union members feel betrayed by any backsliding by Obama on this issue since this was how union leadership convinced some reluctant blue collar workers to support an African American candidate in key battleground states in the Midwest.

Forget about all the noise about other issues in health care. This is where the rubber meets the road. It will take all the collective skills of President Obama, House Speaker Nancy Pelosi and Senate Majority Leader Harry Reid to sort this out. Pelosi, in particular, has so far provided great flexibility in sorting through some issues unpopular with parts of her Caucus in order to put together the 218 votes necessary for House passage of health care.

Top union leaders are in the midst of negotiating this issue with the White House this week.

Here's the formula: increase the threshold for taxation of "Cadillac" health care plans high enough so that most blue collar workers are not affected AND index this each year to inflation so that blue collar workers won't be subject of "bracket creep." Some observers have suggested that an initial family threshold of \$28,000 would exempt the health plans of most union members.

In order to make up for the revenue lost by this higher threshold, the Senate would have to agree to some version of the House's millionaire's tax (perhaps a 2.5 percent surcharge). Also, the Senate's increase in the Medicare payroll tax on certain taxpayers would have to be preserved.

Democrats can not fail this close to the finish line. There must be a true compromise on the revenue issue. Failure to pass health care would be a death blow to Democrats chances to keep down Senate and House losses in the 2010 elections. Everyone knows this. It's time to make a deal.

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New Flu Vaccine Approved for Seniors

The US Food and Drug Administration (FDA) recently approved a seasonal influenza vaccine specifically for persons greater than 65 years of age. Clinical studies have shown that the new vaccine, called Fluzone High-Dose, produces a greater immune response compared to the normal Fluzone vaccine in persons 65 and older. This is thought to be important because the immune system gets weaker as people age, and this may affect how vaccines work in this age group. Following approval, the manufacturer is required to conduct more studies showing that the vaccine will be effective in decreasing seasonal influenza. Because Fluzone High-Dose is more potent, it has been shown to have higher rates of mild side effects compared to Fluzone. These side effects may include injection site pain, fever, muscle pain, and malaise. The vaccine is given as a single preservative free injection in the upper arm.

People 65 and older may be at a higher risk for complications due to seasonal influenza. These complications can lead to hospitalization. Experts agree that the best way to prevent seasonal influenza is annual influenza vaccination.





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Clarendon Church of Christ WHO IS BEING REJECTED?

1Thessalonians 4:8, "Therefore he who rejects this does not reject man, but God, who has also given us His Holy Spirit." In the previous 7 verses, Paul pleaded with the Thessalonians to follow the commandments that he had given them. In verse 2 he explains that these commands were through Jesus Christ. These weren't commands of Paul but the Lord. He pleads with them to abstain from sexual immorality and live holy. Back to verse 8, Paul reminds them that when they don't follow these commands that come from the Lord, they aren't rejecting Paul but God Himself.

This is something we should take note of. When the Bible, or God's Word, gives us commands, they come from God. As a minister I ask people to not take my word for anything, but go to the Bible and confirm whatever I have said. If the Bible and I differ, a person must always go with scriptures. If a person's minister or church ignores or adds to God's word, then that person is rejecting what God has said and is in sin. Paul said in 1Corinthians 1:10, "Now I plead with you, brethren, by the name of our Lord Jesus Christ, that you all speak the same thing, and that there be no divisions among you, but that you be perfectly joined together in the same mind and in the same judgment."

Denominationalism or sectarianism is sinful. Ephesians 4:4ff., "There is one body and one Spirit, just as you were called in one hope of your calling; one Lord, one faith, one baptism; one God and Father of all, who is above all, and through all, and in you all." There can't be denominations or sects according to scripture! The church or the "called out" refer to one church. Matthew 16:18, Jesus said He would build His church. That means He built one and it is His posession. It can't consist of anyone who rejects His teachings and it can't be called by any other name. If Bob own's a truck, you wouldn't call it Fred's truck would you? Fred didn't make the payments on the truck, and no one else died for the church in Jesus' case. Jesus "bought" the church with His blood. He is the cornerstone and foundation of the church and why in the world would anyone name it after man or other groups? I pray that we would all think about this subject. Doing things man's way is a rejection of the Lord.
