Sawyer defeats Hall in GOP run-off vote

Dan Sawyer narrowly defeated Joe Hall for the Republican nomination for Donley County Precinct 4 Commissioner in a run-off election last Tuesday.

Sawyer received 68 votes to Hall's 64 out of 164 votes cast. He will now face Democrat Brad Dalton in the General Election this November.

Local Republicans also cast ballots in a statewide run-off for Supreme Court Justice, Place 3, and preferred Rick Green over Debra Lehmann by a margin of 81 to 66.

A Different Kind of Life

Bernice Ende from Trigo, Montana, leads a nontraditional lifestyle.

Inspired by watching black and white westerns such as Hop Along Cassidy and John Wayne when she was a child, the 56 year old former ballet teacher is a "longrider," traveling thousands of miles each year on horseback and calling a tent home.

Last week, Ende's current 2,700 mile journey from London, Texas, to Montana led her to Clarendon, and she made her temporary home at the Clarendon rodeo grounds.

"I would like to say thank you to the community for their hospitality and to Joe Neal Shadle for opening up the Cowboy Church and making sure I had everything out here," Ende said. "Everyone has been so helpful."

During her stay, Ende made a guest appearance at the monthly Friends of the Library meeting on April 14 and shared her experiences.


"I think she's an amazing woman," Librarian Jerri Ann Shields said. "Anyone who sleeps with her dogs and horses is amazing."

Ende's previous rides include 3,000 miles in 2009, 3,000 miles in 2008, 5,000 miles in 2006-2007 and 2,000 miles in 2005. This will be her fifth time to cross the Rocky Mountains.

"On my first ride I was so afraid I wasn't gonna make it because I had no place to go," she said. "But this is my life. It doesn't matter about getting to the end anymore. It didn't change until about 700 miles into this. The journey takes you, not you home. For me, this is home."

Aldermen updated on grants

The Clarendon Board of Aldermen received updates on several grants that the city has been looking into during their regular meeting April 13.

Interim City Administrator Phyllis Jeffers primarily raised concerns about a downtown revitalization grant for \$440,000 that would bring sidewalk and lighting improvements to Kearney Street.

Jeffers said part of the documentation for the grant application is not in the files and also said the grant is a reimbursement grant - meaning the city spends the money and is then paid back by the state - with a 20 percent local match.

The Clarendon Economic Development Corporation has previously agreed to provide \$50,000 for the match, but city officials must consider how to fund the remainder of the match as well as how to pay bills as they come in prior to the state's providing reimbursement.

"I am making this my number one priority," Jeffers said. "I've seen what this type of grant has done for other cities, and it's very important that we get this grant."

Jeffers said the grant won't be awarded until this fall, so the city has time to visit with other cities to see how they have handled the funding issues.

Board members said they had not been made aware of the reimbursement nature of the grant but also expressed support for moving forward.

Another grant for sidewalk improvements near the public school had not been submitted, a grant for a new trash truck was not successful, and a third grant for energy efficient street lights has some timeline questions that need to be resolved.

The board also accepted a letter of resignation, with regret, from Municipal Judge Jimmy Johnson, who is retiring. Aldermen then met for an hour in closed session before appointing Justice of the Peace Connie Havens as a temporary replacement for Johnson.

In other city business, the board authorized a mid-year audit that Jeffers hopes will help streamline city operations and ultimately save



Candidates impress the area press

Two statewide candidates for office impressed the members of the Panhandle Press Association last week at the group's 100th annual convention in Canadian.

Attorney General Greg Abbott addressed newspaper men and women on Thursday night, and Democratic gubernatorial nominee Bill White spoke at the Friday Luncheon.

A third statewide candidate, Democrat Barbara Ann Radnofsky, who is running against Abbott, was scheduled to appear at the convention but was unable to attend due to a bout of pneumonia.

Abbott spoke on a subject near and dear to the members of the press, that being open government, and specifi-

cally the Texas Open Meetings Act. Abbott's office has come up with innovative ways to educate elected officials about the requirements of the law, although it remains unclear how many of them actually appreciate the spirit of the law.

Abbott specifically addressed a lawsuit that is being brought by several parties which seeks to undermine the penalties for violating the Open Meetings Act by arguing that the law infringes on the free speech rights of elected officials by restricting what they can say to each other outside of an open meeting. In other words, some elected officials want to be able to discuss in secret the business that ought to be public. Abbott said he is prepared to defend the Open Meetings Act all the way to the US Supreme Court.

The attorney general also said that the act needs to be reviewed since social networking Internet sites, such as Facebook and Twitter, are blurring some of the lines about what is acceptable communications.

Another topic on Abbott's agenda is a lawsuit the State of Texas and several other states have filed questioning the constitutionality of the new federal health care law. Abbott said the law's requirement that every American must purchase health insurance would dramatically expand the powers granted Congress under the commerce clause, and he noted that there would be no limit to what the government could force you to buy.

The act also tramples on the tenth amendment, Abbott said, which reserves the right to regulate health insurance to the state governments.

White, the former mayor of Houston, made a strong impression with members of the press just by showing up after Governor Perry was "too busy" to address the group, and he followed that up by making a lot of sense during his remarks.

White focused on public and higher education as a key responsibility of state government and specifically criticized Perry's veto of some funds for community colleges three years ago. He said he wants to work with everyone for what is best for Texas and pointed to his record in Houston of strong fiscal policies, bipartisan accomplishments, and re-election wins with 80 and 90 percent of the vote.

White also said he would listen to as many points of view as possible even though he wouldn't always agree with every view.

The mayor praised the press and said democracy has four main pillars - an educated people, a method by which the people get information about the government without bias (i.e., the press), people willing to run for office, and people getting out to vote.

Both White and Abbott are to be commended for making the trip to Canadian. While they both no doubt relished the opportunity to address dozens of journalists, their appearances shows a respect not just for the press but for you, our readers. These men took the time to come to a rural West Texas town because they knew it was a way to speak to you through columns like this. And that respect is something to consider as you prepare to cast your ballots this November.

A tip of the hat...

One of the most talked about conventions of the West Texas Press Association continues to be the 2006 convention in Clarendon. Four years later, members of the press are still bragging on it and telling your humble editor what a good time they had here. Now the members of the Panhandle Press Association also have a convention to talk about, and the 2010 gathering in Canadian will likely be the yardstick by which future PPA conventions are measured for many years.

The convention, which is usually held in Amarillo, was returned to its birthplace this year to celebrate the past 100 years. The Canadian Record, led by Laurie Ezzell Brown and Mary Smithee, hosted the event; and together with the people of their fair city, they put on a first class convention with venues, speakers, and meals that just blew the socks off everyone in attendance.

If you haven't been to Canadian lately, it's time to take a road trip. You will be impressed.

Clarendon College making a difference

Clarendon College is making a difference in the lives of Donley County citizens and the entire Panhandle Region. Since 1995 when Senate Bill 397 established service areas for the fifty community college districts, Clarendon College has been responsible for providing higher education to eight counties in the eastern edge of the Texas Panhandle. The two largest cities in our service area are Pampa and Childress. In May of 2008, both of these cities passed a five cent maintenance tax to support Clarendon College in their city. Clarendon College now has an extension center campus in each of these cities supported by their own tax.

I have heard concerns that these extended campuses are detrimental to the main campus here at Clarendon. have also heard that local taxes are being used to support the operation of these off campus endeavors. This is simply not the case. The local taxes produced in Donley amount to \$385,000. Our total annual budget in Education & General is \$7.5 million and in Auxiliary is \$2.1 million of which \$425,000 is used to pay our utility and telephone bill. As you can see, our local taxes do not even pay our total utility bill. Also, not a single building on our campus in Clarendon was paid for with tax money. Every

one of our buildings was paid for with donated money or student generated revenue bonds.

In Pampa, our main building was built with funds generated by the Pampa Foundation for Clarendon College. The building and fourteen acres were donated last year to Clarendon College by the Pampa Foundation. The five cent Clarendon College tax in Pampa generates about \$800,000 per year for the operation of our campus in Pampa. We are presently building two new vocational buildings on fifty acres purchased last year with Gray County tax dollars. All of this is made possible through the taxes generated in Gray County. Neither the Pampa nor Childress campuses create any burden on Donley County citizens. In fact, there are many benefits to the Clarendon campus by having these extension campuses. Several of our teachers would not have a full load if it were not for their ability to teach at off campus locations. Also, if we were not at these locations, these communities could start their own college or some other college might move into their community. Either case would put them in direct competition with Clarendon College which would not be desirable for Donley County.

Yes, Clarendon College is making

a difference in the lives of our citizens. We are growing and have increased enrollment by 28 percent during the last two years. We have added six new full-time faculty, added several new vocational programs, increased our continuing education programs, and have almost 100 students declaring wind energy as their major. We received \$732,000 in grants and donations in the last two years. We spent almost \$500,000 in renovations to the Clarendon Campus last summer. We were able to give a four percent increase in salary to all employees. All of these new programs and additions have helped to improve the economy of this area and is being done without increasing local taxes.

On all indicators in which our students are compared with other colleges, Clarendon College students rank at the top. Clarendon College is truly an asset not only to Donley County but to the Texas Panhandle. Many projects are underway and our future is very bright. We are fortunate to have an outstanding staff, dedicated teachers, and a terrific Board of Regents.

As technology grows more sophisticated and the government and its corporate allies further refine their methods of keeping tabs on the American people, those of us who treasure privacy increasingly find ourselves engaged in a struggle to maintain our freedoms in the midst of the modern surveillance state.

Just consider the many ways we're already being monitored and tracked: through our Social Security numbers, bank accounts, purchases and electronic transactions; by way of our correspondence and communications devices email, phone calls and mobile phones; through chips implanted in our vehicles, identification documents, even our clothing. Data corporations are capturing vast caches of personal information on you so that airports, retailers, police and other government authorities can instantly identify and track you. Add to this the fact that businesses, schools and other facilities are relying more and more on fingerprints and facial recognition to identify us. All the while, banks and other financial institutions must verify the identities of new customers and make such records of customer transactions available to the police and government officials upon request.

In recent years, this information glut has converged into a mandate for a national ID card, which came to a head with Congress' passage of the REAL ID Act in 2005. REAL ID requires states to issue machine-readable drivers' licenses containing a wealth of personal data. However, because the REAL ID Act has been opposed by many states due to its cost and implementation, we have yet to be subjected to a nationwide implementation of a national ID card. That may all change depending on what happens with the immigration reform bill now before Congress.

A centerpiece of the immigration bill as proposed by Senators Charles Schumer (D-NY) and Lindsey Graham (R-SC) is a requirement that all U.S. workers, citizen and resident alike, be required to obtain and carry biometric Social Security cards (national ID cards under a different name) in order to work

within the United States. Attempting to appease critics of a national ID

card, Schumer and Graham insist that "no government database would house everyone's information" and that the "cards would

speak truth to power by john whitehead not contain any private information, medical information, or tracking devices." However, those claims are blatantly false. Indeed,

this proposed biometric card is nothing

more than an end-run around opposition to a national ID card. Civil and privacy rights advocates, as well as liberal-, conservative-, and libertarian-leaning organizations, have long raised concerns that a national ID card would enable the government to track citizens and, thus, jeopardize the privacy rights of Americans. President Reagan likened a 1981 proposal to the biblical "mark of the beast," and President Clinton dismissed a similar plan because it

Most recently, The Rutherford Institute and the American Civil Liberties Union, along with a host of other organizations, voiced their opposition to the biometric ID card. In a letter to both the U.S. House of Representatives and Senate Judiciary Committees, Senate Finance Committee, House Ways and Means Committee and the White


smacked of Big Brother.

House, this coalition of groups declared that such a national ID card would "not only violate privacy by helping to consolidate data and facilitate tracking of individuals, it would bring government into the very center of our lives by serving as a government permission slip needed by everyone in order to work. As happened with Social Security cards decades ago, use of such ID cards would quickly spread and be used for other purposes-from travel to voting to gun ownership." And the national biometric ID card would "require the creation of a bureaucracy that combines the worst elements of the Transportation Security Administration and state Motor Vehicle Departments."

When all is said and done, the adoption of a national biometric ID card serves one purpose only: to provide the government with the ultimate control over the American people. As one commentator has remarked, this is a "naked government power grab."

The time to resist is now. If we don't, eventually, we will all have to possess one of these cards in order to be a functioning citizen in American society. Failing to have a biometric card will render you a non-person for all intents and purposes. Your whole life will depend on this card-your ability to work, travel, buy, sell, access health care, and so on.

Whether a national ID card is the mark of the Beast or the long arm of Big Brother, the outcome remains the same.


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Next Seasonal Flu Vaccine Recommended

In mid February the World Health Organization (WHO) made its recommendation regarding the seasonal influenza vaccine (fall and winter, 2010-11) for North American and the countries in the northern hemisphere. They indicated that this year's seasonal vaccine should contain the pandemic H1N1 strain (the so-called Swine Flu strain). Shortly after the announcement, public health officials in the United States accepted the WHO recommendation. This decision essentially eliminates the need in the United States for two different flu vaccines starting this fall.

The WHO recommendation involves dropping the non-pandemic H1N1 strain that was in the vaccine this past flu season and replacing it with a pandemic H1N1 viral strain. The recommendation by WHO was based on the fact that the overwhelming number of viruses isolated around the world in the past year was of the pandemic variety. Viruses recommended for the 2010-2011 flu vaccine includes an A strain (A/ California/7/2009 -H1N1 like virus), an A strain called A/Perth/16/2009 (H3N2) and a B strain called B/Brisbane/60/20091-like virus.



Applications for emergency farm loans for damages and losses caused by drought, above normal temperatures, and associated wildfires on January 1 - December 31, 2009 are being accepted at the Farm Service Agency (FSA) office located at 321 Sully Street in Clarendon, Larry Goetze said this week.

Donley County is one of 87 in Texas recently named by the Secretary of Agriculture eligible for loans to cover losses and damages resulting from the drought, above-normal temperatures, and associated wildfires.

FSA Farm Loan Manager Larry Goetze said farmers may be eligible for loans of up to 100 percent of their actual losses or the operating loan needed to continue the agriculture business, whichever is less. For farmers unable to obtain credit from private commercial lenders, the interest is 3.75 percent.

"As a general rule, a farmer must have suffered at least a 30 percent loss of production to be eligible for an FSA emergency loan", Goetze said. Farmers participating in the Federal Crop Insurance program will have to consider proceeds from those programs in determining their loss.

"Applications for loans under this emergency designation will be accepted until December 14, 2010 but farmers should apply as soon as possible. Delays in applying could create backlogs in processing with possible delays into the new farming season", Goetze said.

FSA is a credit agency of the U.S. Department of Agriculture. It is authorized to provide disaster emergency loans to recognized farmers who work at and rely on farming for a substantial part of their living. Eligibility is extended to individual farmers who meet U.S. citizenship requirements and to farming partnerships, corporations or cooperatives in which U.S. citizenship requirements are met by individuals holding a majority interest.
