

#### TEXAS NEWS ITEMS.

Comanche county a few days ago redeemed \$1000 courthouse bonds held by the school fund.

Several mornings ago the residence of J. H. Turney, in Corsicana, was destroyed by fire. Loss \$600; insurance

Floyd county redeemed \$1000 of jail bonds recently, held by the school fund and Hamilton county redeemed \$1000 of courthouse bonds.

The Hoffer schoolhouse, eight miles from Kaufman, Kaufman county, burned some days past. Total loss. Value about \$300; no insurance.

The cotton gin belonging to W. J. L. Cornell, ten miles northwest of Rockdale, Milam county, burned several days ago. Loss about \$2500, insured for \$1500.

James Paul, a prisoner, confined in the county jail at Marshall, was found in his cell a few nights ago in a dangerous condition. He almost died from strangulation.

The Exchange hotel, belonging to J. S. Brown, in Taylor, Williamson county, caught on fire a few days ago and was damaged to the amount of \$500, and the furniture \$250.

The residence of Ed Bechtold, a farmer, residing nine miles west of Marshall, was burglarized recently. Mr. Bechtold's trunk was broken open and \$225 taken out of it. No clew to the

The San Antonio and Gulf railroad the other day paid \$12.67 tax on \$1267.70 of passenger earnings, and \$1.93 on telegrams handled during the quarter ending Dec. 31, 1897, to the comptroller at Austin.

Richard Ship, a negro, arrested at Texarkana the other day, on the charge of criminally assaulting the young negro girl, Lena Bowen, was remanded and went to jail to await the action of the grandjury.

A little son of J. K. Dennis, of Hillsboro, swallowed some gasoline the other day. His mother promptly gave him an emetic, and with medical aid he is considered out of danger. He was quite sick for awhile.

Charles Mime, a son of John Mims, a prominent citizen of Marion county, was knocked in the head with a canthook at Brown's mill by a negro a few nights ago and killed. No particulars of the trouble known.

As soon as the charter is secured and the site is selected work will commence on the new ice factory at San Angelo. The plant will cost \$25,000. Several parties of San Angelo have subscribed to the amount of \$1000.

Fire was discovered in the stone building in St. Jo, Montague county, owned by J. D. Bellah, a few nights ago. The building was partially filled with hay, and all the household goods of H. C. Kinman. The building is a total loss. The loss on building and contents was over \$3000. No insurance.

Mail has been missing for some time from the postoffice boxes at Bonham, Fannin county, and has been a mystery until a few days ago, when Lige Eastman, a little 14-year-old negro. was caught taking mail. Upon being searched, nearly \$400 in checks and postoffice money orders were found on his person.

While Fritz Lehde and Frestian Boenighausen were returning from a party at the Ssholtz place, near the old county, to Navasota, Grimes county, a few nights ago, the lattice town of Washington, Washington w nights ago, the lattter was cut in the head in a manner that caused his brains to run out, and resulting in his death. Lehde is aged 17, the other 20.

The residence of S. D. Larkins, a mile and a half southeast of Denison, burned recently. The house was a large two-story structure, valued at \$3000. All the household goods, and everything about the house was a to-tal loss which was estimated at \$4000. All the clothing of the family burned and left them with nothing but what they had on. There was no insurance on the property.

Several mornings ago the 3-year-oid twin boys of Will Swindell, who lives near Luling, Caldwell county, caught fire from a log burning in their father's field. One was so badly burned that he died. The other had part of his clothing burned off, but was unin-






