

Texas and the Cuban Cause

Waco, Tex., Feb. 15 .- Information was furnished the federal authorities here that a movement is on foot in Texas to give aid to the Cuban cause of independence by arming and equiping volunteers and sending them against the Spanish government to inflict damage by sea and land as a means of enabling the insurgents to gain the end they seed-permanent separation from the mother country and establishment of the republic of Cuba.

The attempt is said to have ratifications in Mexico, and at several pcints in Texas. A reporter called yesterday morning on Hon. John H. Finks, United States commissioner, and ascertained that there was good ground for the report.

The facts, as far as known, are in possession of the secret service officers and can not at present ge given out for publication.

It is rumored that stores of rifles cartridges and dynamite have been collected and will be loaded on a ship which will leave the coast of Texas or Louisiana

The detectives of the Spanish government believe that McLennan county is the seat of the agency for furnishing both men and money to the Cuban cause, and that the towns of Riesal and Bruceville have lately been the scenes of important meetings in behalf of the patriots.

At the suggestion of Commissioner Finks Deputy United States Marshal Burke visited some of the suspected points in search of information as to the alleged organization of societies for the aid of the insurgent cause.


When the report got out last summer that military drills were in progress to fight Spain, a warning was published that such conduct was in violation of the laws of the United States and was a breach of the neutrality required by treaty, the country being at peace and on friendly terms with Spain. The warnings were repeated and probably served to cause the disbandment of the organizations and the withdrawal from Texas of Cuban recruiting officers, who were seeking openly to enlist men for mounted and infantry service. That the work has been resumed in Central Texas is fully believed by the Spanish agents.

Mr. Finks, the United States commissioner at Waco, says the penalty for breach of neutrality is rather severe, the offender being subject to a heavy fine and imprisonment.







BATTLESHIPS AT GALVESTON.

The Texas and Nashville to Anchor in the Bay.

Galveston, Feb. 15 .- The U. S. battleship Texas (to which the citizens of Texas presented a \$5000 silver service one year ago), together with U.S. battleship Nashville and U.S. torpedoes Winslow and Erricson, will maneuver in the Galveston harbor. February 18. to the 22. The battleships will anchor at the mouth of the jetties and ample facilities will be provided for transportation from the wharves to the battleships, for parties desiring to inspect these ships.

The torpedo boats, which are comparatively small drawing only about five feet of water, will maneuver in the channel immediately opposite the docks, where all may witness them.

The government has about completed a mortar fort on Galveston island. The largest gun for this fort, weighing thirty tons, will be received in Galveston during the visit of the naval vessels, and will be on exhibition at the Santa Fe new passenger station grounds.

In addition to this, the citizens committee of Galveston have arranged a complete program for each day's entertainment and for this occasion.
