

Alexander Melville Bell explained his system of visible speech to the New York teachers of oratory and their friends in the assembly room of the Berkeley school the other night. "Any linguistic sound," he said, "can be written in the symbols of the scheme. All that visible speech wants to become popularized is age. It must come into general use after awnile.

In writing the symbols of Mr. Bell's system vowels are represented by vatypifies the voice. Consonants are depicted by variations of the curve, sympolizing the tongue. Sounds, not words, are recorded, so that men of a thousand years hence will be able to ascertain through this medium not only the grammar of a language, but also the intenation. 





Unless the showers come at longer intevals, there is danger of a serious loss of wheat, both in the actual destruction of grain and deterioration of the quality. As it ripens it must be cut, and when cut it needs sunshine for immediate handling.

Give us two or three weeks of fair weather and we will harvest such a crop of wheat as will tax the capacity of every granary and elevator in North and Northwest Texas; but the weather bureau is hereby warned that we will not be responsible for results as long as these daily showers are kept up .- Ft Worth Register
