#### Powerful Magnet Removes Pin From Child's Stomach

Betsy Johnston, 3 - year - old daughter of Mr. and Mrs. H. Johnston, Schenectady, N. Y., was frisky as a colt today, showing no effects of a 2-inch bobby pin she accidentally swallowed last week and which four days later was skillfully removed by a 4-foot tube injected down her throat with a special magnet assembly attached to the end.

The unusual operation which saved her from the possibility of serious consequences was performed at Ellis Hospital by Dr. Arthur Q. Penta of Schenectady It was made possible by the rapid which General Electric made to his request for a specialty fashioned Alnico magnet. Using this magnet, the doctor fished out in 30 seconds the pin, which had remained in the child's abdomen for four days.

According to her parents, Betsy was holding the bobby pin in her mouth, preparatory to inserting it in her hair, when it accidentally went down her throat. She was rushed to the hospital, and there a



#### HE LOST HIS PENCIL - -BUT HE FOUND IT SIX MONTHS LATER - - ON NAZI

Just before he went overseas. Pvt. Anthony Zerr of Hondo, man with Patton's Third army. received an automatic pencil from a representative of the Santa Fe railway, which was inscribed with the railroad's trade mark.

A little thing, perhaps, but to Pvt. Zerr the pencil was one of his proudest possessions, and when the intrepid 35th went into the battle of St. Lo last July, it nestled sngly in his breast pocket.

One night he lost the pencil while on patrol deep within the enemy's lines. Soldiers are accustomed to losing personal articles in this war's fast pace, so he forgot about it.

Six months passed and the 35th reached German soil. Lined up in the snow was a group of captured nazis, and searching one of them was Pvt. Zerr. Suddenly, he pulled an object from the prisoner's pocket. You guessed it-his longlost pencil was found.

In writing of this strange coincidence to his railroad friend, Pvt. Zerr added, "Of course, I was

THEN YOU HEAR: "But what sort of container will I use?" Any kind of tin can will do. The next time you open a can of fruit or juice or soup or vegetables, save it. But please don't use glass it almost always breaks and makes the fat difficult to salvage. When the can is full, take it to your butcher. For every pound, you'll get 2 red points. If you have any difficulty disposing of your fats, call your Home Demonstration or County Agent.
