Lt. Hansard Jr. **Killed In Action**

Mr. and Mrs. V. A. Hansard of Amarillo have received word that their son V. A. Hansard Jr. was killed in action in Germany on November 19th.

Lt. Hansard was a pilot of a B-17 Flying Fortress, and had been in the Army since Feb. 13, 1943. He was recently awarded the Air Medal for meritorious achievement while participating in sustained combat operations over enemy occupied continental Europe. The citation accompanying the award read in part: "The courage, coolness and skill displayed by this officer upon these occasions reflect great credit upon himself and the Armed Forces of the United States.

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



Future of Nation At Stake

News accounts tell of the struggle to pour supplies into nations suffering from the ravages of inflation-Belgium, Greece, France, and others. It is said that an increase in supplies will relieve a glut of money. Here in our own country the people are told that war production has so cut into civilian production that consumer competition for the remaining goods would soon send prices out of sight but for stringent Federal

As a matter of fact, our Federal government could no more control prices than the countries of Europe if money and supplies ever were to get as far out of balance in the United States as they have in other nations. We have been able to control inflation because we have been able to produce both "guns and butter."

Every industry that has had a part in getting the "butter" to the people has helped to hold the line against inflation. The railroads are a dramatic instance of this. They have hauled guns and the butter of civilian ogods in quantities that defy the imagination, and at a price that is anything but inflationary-slightly less than a cent a ton-mile on the average. They have been able to do what they have as a result of years of preparation for just such an emergency; years in which many began to believe that the usefulness of the railroads was past. Consequently, there has been no failure in distribution of supplies, military or civilian, anywhere within the range of the American rail-

Sgt. Arthur Chase Writes Again From Italy

EDITORS NOTE-Mr. and Mrs. A. L. Chase have received the following letter from their son T/Sgt. Arthur L. Chase written October 28. He has been overseas for some time and has been located in Italy. It has been our privilege to print other letters he has written; the most recent follows:

My letters having been so few and far between during the past couple of months, there should be lots to write about and once I finally get started trying to catch point where they release new pic- free time and have only scratched to be earned. up, I'll probably end up sooner or later with another of those fifteen page books that I have written several times in the past. For one thing I have not yet written adequately of my impressions of Rome, although it has been several weeks since I was there and the vivid first impressions are by now a little dulled. The trip was a little bit disappointing in that I was unable to see as much of the more famous sights as I would have liked to have seen. It was still one of the great highlights of the time I have put in overseas.

St. Peters Cathedral especially is beautiful beyond all description on the interior and the whole city is a constant succession of one historical building and work of art after another. In fact there is so much to see, that it is confusing, especially with out a guide or even a half way effective guide book.

St. Peters, above everything else in Rome is so dazzling in its immensity and its exquisitely decorated interior that no written description, painting or photograph of it can begin to do it justice. I accumulated a large number of pictures of it, including some very unusual, large actual photographs of the interior, which come closer to showing it as it really is, than anything I have seen, at the time, ce there is nothing tangible to use as a basis of comparison in trying to imagine the colossal scale of the place.

The thing that impressed me most was the wide spread use of marble Mosaic throughout the Cathedral, both as a form of decoration and in the place of paintings. I guess they finally realized that Fescoes and other forms of wall paintings were too perishable and desiring to make everything in the Cathedral as endurable as possible, used this form of art exclusively. From a short dist-ance these huge Mosaic pictures look exactly like oil paintings so minute are the individual pieces of stone and so perfectly are the colors blended together. There are dozens of these immense panels in the niches around the sides of the Cathedral, and most of them being taken from famous original oil paintings. The same feeling of endurability is seen in all the other decorations. The marble columns and walls, the gold leaf decoration of the coffered ceiling of the Nase, the completely Mosaic covered ceiling of the dome, everything is made to last centuries.

I have bought some leather photo albums and as soon as I get time I am going to send my collection of postcard photographs

While at St. Peters I attended one of the Popes audiences and had a very close view of him in his regal robes as he was carried in on a sedan-like chair, but his speech was amplified over a very poor sound system and I was unable to distinguish a word he said, altho' part of it was in English.

A severe disappointment was that the Vatican with its famous Museum and Sistine Chapel were temporarily closed to the public, for repairs, though I hear it is now





Almost half the total, 432,000 tons to be exact, have been dropped since D-Day. In a recent month the rate was 4,400 tons per day, or three tons each minute around the clock. "Dropping one million tons," said Captain Smith, "means that five million individual bombs have been dropped down on German and Japanese targets. Approximately 175,000 tons concentrated on air craft factories, related plants and airfields. 140,000 tons have been dropped on oil plants, ballbearing works and other industrial targets. 





The fact is, he added, "workers jeopardize their own rights as well as their survivors' rights to insurance benefits in the event of death if the worker fails to show his correct account number to each employer."

Recently, a worker died leaving a widow and small child. When the widow called at the field office to file her claim for Old-Age and Survivors Insurance, she furnished her husband's social security card. When the field office secured the deceased worker's wage record, it was found that no wages were credited to the account; consequently, neither the widow hor child was entitled to any insurance payments based on this account. The widow, however, knew her husband had worked in employment covered by the Social Security Act in several other states and was able to furnish the names and addresses of some of the employers. When the report made by one of these employers was checked, it was discovered that the wage earner had obtained a second social security card, cancellation of the extra card.
