Snyder, Texas, July 25 .- Byron Harris, state ranger here today, reported the arrest of an Apostolic preacher and two singers, who were conducting a meeting at Fluvanna Saturday night. The preacher is charged with denouncing President Wilson and all higher officials and praying for Germany.

One of the singers is said to be German without naturalization papers. Between sermons, it is said, they advised young men not to go to war.

CENTS

Austin, July 25 .- The State Automatic Tax Board this afternoon fixed the state ad valorem tax rate at 35 cents on the \$100 of property. This is the constitutional limit and on increase of 15 cents over the present rate of 20 cents. The school tax rate was fixed at 20 cents, which is the same as at present. The Confederate pension remains at 5 cents. The question as to whether the university appropriation is included or not does not cut any figure as constitutional limit has been reached.
