RURAL CARRIER EXAMINATION

The United States Civil Service Commission has announced an examination for the County of Donley, Texas, to be held at Jericho and Clarendon, on December 8, 1917, to fill the position of rural carrier at Jericho, Texas, and vacancies that may later occur on rural routes from other post offices in the above mentioned county. The examination will be open only to male citizens who are actually domiciled in the territory of a post office in the county and who meet the other requirements set forth in Form No. 1977. This form and application blanks may be obtained from the offices mentioned above or from the United States Civil Service Commission at Washington, D. C. Applications should be forwarded to the Commission at Washington at the earliest practicable date.

Examination starts at 11:30 a. m. The vacancy for which this examination is announced is caused by the enlistment of the carrier formerly employed on the route. Upon his honorable discharge from the military service of the government he will be entitled to reinstatement to his former position as carrier on this route in accordance with the statute approved July 28, 1916, which is as follows:

"Any postal employee who has entered the military service of the United States or who shall hereafter enter it shall, upon being honorably discharged therefrom, be permitted to resume his position in the postal department which he left to enter such service."

However, any person appointed to this position may, in the discretion of the Post Office Department, be assigned to other parts of the postal service; or transferred to other branches of the classified service for which he is eligible.

LOCAL RED CROSS NEWS.

Mrs. Cornelia Adair has very generously offered her home (the Walsh House) to the Red Cross for their headquarters. Mrs. Adair has always been most kind to Clarendon and this last generous act is one more of the many kind things she has done for the people of Clarendon. The Red Cross is most grateful to her.

The "Open House" held last Saturday the 10th, was attended by many interested visitors. The amount of work done by the ladies was a matter of surprise to all. Over 120 garments were cut last week and 91 garments were made during that one week, 193 yards of gauze was cut and made into 9 inch compresses. 432 compresses were inspected last month.

The Hedley Branch had a very nice exhibit of surgical dressings. The Giles Auxiliary had also a very nice display of surgical dressings and hospital garments. The neighborhoods of Chamberlain School house, Martin School house, Jericho, Goldston, Ashtola and some ladies near Leila Lake are all at work having become members of the Red Cross personally and work in connection with the chapter in Clarendon.

The knitting committee reports 16 finished articles and 25 not finished. This committee can do many times the amount of the above, but cannot get the wool.

The Executive Committee of the Donley County Chapter A. R. C. met in regular session the second Tuesday in November with eleven members present.

The reports from the various departments were remarkably good and show the Chapter to be in a very live and active condition, much progress having been made in all departments and much work done.

Prof. Lowe was elected Chairman of the department of General Propaganda.

Prof. J. R. Silvey has been requested to take charge of the development of the Junior Membership of the A. R. C. if in his opinion it is expedient to do so.

The Saturday Booth took in \$68.00 less memberships last Saturday, the 10th.

Mr. C. E. Reed of Philadelphia who owns land near Leila Lake sent a donation to the Red Cross of \$5.00 which is much appreciated.

THE PUBLIC SCHOOL.

The public schools are moving along smoothly with every appearance of effective thorough work. Both pupils and teachers are interested and the habit of application as well as that of promptness is being formed by the student body. Not only these habits but the power to think correctly and act accordingly is receiving careful training in the schools.

Really the public school of any town or community is the most vital as well as the most worthy enterprise that can be undertaken by all the people. And probably never in the history of this country was it more important than just at present. The drain of the educated young men of the country by the war will soon be felt. The demand for such to take their places must be largely met by the high schools. High school graduates are receiving recognition from the government on account of their training now and there is little doubt but that the demand will be greater later on. Parents should do their utmost to co-operate with the teachers and school officials to the end that nothing may be left undone that will promote the public school interests of Clarendon.

The attendance at the grammar school building has been almost perfect of late, with some new pupils entering every week. In the intermediate grades at the high school, some pupils have been working in the fields to some extent taking the places of the older ones who have gone to the war. In the high school the attendance lately has been almost equal to the enrollment and the progress is good. Parents are cordially invited to visit the school and inspect the work that is being done.

Pupils from the Clarendon high school are in attendance at many of the colleges or universities of the state. So far as the writer is able to learn all of them are making good at these schools. This ought to be proof of the fact that the training offered here is sufficient preparation for college entrance work.

Funds to the amount of \$225 were raised in the recent collections for books and school fixtures. Three liberty bonds were bought which will be used in making these purchases. The new victrola selected for the high school is greatly enjoyed by the school at mornings at the chapel period.

Pupils from Miss Moena Lane's class have given the Red Cross some assistance in their work lately. This industrious room gave one Saturday to picking cotton in order to raise funds to buy books.

If irregularities at school and on the way home are to be held in check, parents must co-operate with the teachers. Very little tardiness has occurred so far during the present term, but this could be lessened.

Parents should not expect the best of results from pupils in the high school unless there is considerable home study. Children should be made to understand that in reality school is the one thing of great importance—the consuming business of the five days set apart for that work. SEND BIGGER CHRISTMAS BOXES ABROAD.

Weight Limit on Parcel Post to our Fighting men in France is Advanced from Seven to Twenty Pounds—Mail Early.

Chicago, Nov. 14th.—Uncle Sam is determined that all his nephews fighting in France shall have as big Christmas boxes as relatives and friends here want to send them—up to 20 pounds, if mailed early enough.

The French Government recently gave notice that, because of its inadequate rail facilities, it could not transport and parcels-post packages weighing over seven pounds.

Now the U. S. War Department announces that it will handle all Christmas packages for the American expeditionary forces in France, on the lines there which have been built and are being operated by our nine railway regiments.

Accordingly the Post Office Department has issued a new order under which a Christmas package weighing up to twenty pounds may be sent to a soldier in France, but these regulations must be strictly observed:

"In addressing give the name of the soldier, the name of the unit to which he is attached and send it care of the Commanding General, Port Embarkation, Pier J. Hoboken, N. J. The package must comply with the regular postal regulations, and, in addition, the articles sent must be packed in a wooden box not more than two cubic feet in extent. It must be well strapped and should have either a hinged or screwed top. No perishable foodstuffs may be sent. The box should be marked to indicate it

is a Christmas package and should reach Hoboken not later than December 5. The rate of postage is 12 cents a pound.

To be sure it will get to France in time, mail your Christmas box before November 15th.

COMPLAINTS OF WIFE BEATING STOP SINCE CITY IS DRY.

Night Desk Sergeant Trammell of the central police station said last night that the police department had not had a single call for the apprehension of alleged wife beaters since local option became effective in Dallas county. He declared that prior to that time the department answered from three to a dozen calls nightly.

Other police officers who have made it a point to investigate the matter, declare that the all-night restaurants uniformly report larger sales at night since local option became effective. In some instances sales have increased 50 per cent, proprietors assert. Many of the smaller merchants interviewed by them also assert that their business has improved, some saying that it is even better than it was during the first week of the State Fair, when there were thousands of visitors in the city.—Dallas News of November 7th.
