





New and Approved Varieties.

Corn: Hybrid 8 corn made the best yields during 1943 at Lubbock experiment station. Hybrid corn produces about 20% more than native corn. Hybrid seed corn does not reproduce satisfactorily the second year, and new planting seed must be obtained direct from breeders each spring. About 3000 acres of hybrid corn for seed purposes will be harvested in 1944. Texas can use 30,000 acres to furnish hybrid seed to all corn pro-

If you intend to plant hybrid seed corn in 1945, you should place your orders in the near future, with reliable breeder for seed corn.

Hybrid corn 18 and 9W are new crosses and seed should be available after 1945 crop is harvested. Grain Sorghum: One of the best combine varieties of grain sorghum for Donley County is Plainsman. Second recommendation is Martin Milo. Caprock and Bonita have made good production records near Donley County. Sudan: Sweet Sudan has been proved by feeding demonstrations to be more desirable to livestock than ordinary sudan. To conserve seed it is recommended that only one or two pounds be planted in rows per acre.
