



THE STATE TEACHER'S ASS'N.

Some impressions received by W. R. Silvey

One thing very evident to a mem. per of T. S. T. A. from the Panhandle upon his arrival at Fort Worth was that it was no small affair. There must have been at least 500 teachers in and about the station at Fort Worth Thursday morning waiting for the southbound Katy which was three hours late. When the train did arrive it was necessary to increase its length about one-third to accommodate the crowd. A better pleased crowd would be hard to find. There was much handshaking, many hello's and greetings of friends and acquaintances on the entire trip.

But the immensity of the crowd was still more evident upon arriving at Waco, where the total attendance was in excess of 3,000. Here there was a great demand for hotel accomodations which, so far as the writers kr.owledge goes, was well provided for at reasonable rates by the hotels of the city assisted by the Chamber of Commerce

All of the general sessions of the Association were held at the First Baptist Church which is capable of seating about 3000 persons, as an estimate. All the doors of this building were permitted to remain open until the building was filled by the teachers, when the president ordered the ushers to close the doors to be opened again as each topic for consideration was finished.

Another thing that impressed the members of the body was the fact that Texas State Teacher's Association had a real live presiding officer in the person of Annie Webb Blanton of Denton. Her rulings were fair, but prompt energitic and decisive with a thorough knowledge of parliamentary law. Very little time was lost in disposing of purely business matters. Never in the history of the association was business dispatched more promptly. The male element in the asociation has filled all important offices, bearing their attendant burdens, for the last thirty years. But assistance is now at hand. The women have discovered themselves.

Another thing that impressed the observer was the predominance of bald headed and gray haired veterans of the profession who occuped the floor of the main auditorium. It is thught by many that only middle aged and young persons are engaged in teaching. As a matter of fact, young teachers do predominate in the schools but not a great many of them are members of this association.

Training for citizenship was the zeneral theme of the convention. And high ideals for teachers in the training of the future citizen received much attention in the public addresses. The patriotism of the profession was proven by the fact that so many school men, prominent in the work had offered their services in defense of the country. There was cheering and patroitic demonstrations from the body when the national airs were ren. dered by the orchestra.

The addresses reached the high water mark in point of ability, so far as the knowledge of the writer goes to



previous state meetings. Dr. O. T. Corson, editor of the "Ohio Educational Monthly" was one of the most popular speakers from a distance. Being an educator of much experience and a writer of national reputation, he was given a careful hearing.

In point of eloquence, probably Mrs. Mary C. Bradford, State Supt., of Colorado, who is also president of the National Educational Association, has few equals in America. Her address, "The Nation and the Public Schools in the Present Crisis," was thoroughly saturated with patriotism, conveying a message of loyal support to the government for those engaged in training the future citizens. Her appeal along these lines found a responsive sentiment from the large audience who heard her.

Few teachers who make an effort to keep up with the literature of their profession but have read one or more of the books written by Dr. Frank McMurry of Columbia University: His address was devoted almost entirely to pedagogical questions, but was well received, coming as it did from such unquestioned authority on such subjects.

There were other noted speakers from a distance as well as some of the best from Texas. It is but fair to say, that in Texas may be found ne of the best in the nation. The entire meeting contained so many excellent things that it would be im. possible to describe its work in a brief sketch. In fact the proceedings are published each year in book form comprising a book of over 400 pages, that every teacher ought to have. It is sufficient to say that the meeting was an inspiration to every teacher in attendance, and will benefit all the schools.

There are about fifteen different sections to the State Teacher's Association. Each discusses topics peculiar to the work represented. As these are often nearly all in session at different places at once, it is impossible to hear much that is said, but the published reports of the convention that is sent to each member, it contains all the speeches delivered. As such they are valuable for study and reference afterwards.
