The county institute will be in session from Sept. 2 to Sept.


ed to attend the county insti-tute, the public school will not open until Sept. 9th.





Clarendon College Section

History

Clarendon College has had nineteen years of successive successful history. It is the property of the Northwest Texas Annual Conference of the M. E. Church, South and is the only educational institutuion of that church that will be in operation in this territory during the session of 1918-19. In addition to the territory of the Northwest Texas Conference it draws patronage from Southwestern Oklahoma and New Mexico.

While numerous institutions of similar character have gone out of business for various causes. Clarendon College has continued to grow stronger year by year. It has continued longer under its present management than any school under the auspices of the Methodist Church in Texas. This has assured the carrying out of definitely fixed policies, and given time to mature plans of far reaching consequences.

While it is regarded by those who should know, as one of the best Junior Colleges in the South, and has reached a splendid state of efficiency, those who are officially responsible for its management and know all the facts believe it has only fairly begun its fancy prices for things that are no better than those at your very door.

7. Other things being equal, the home school should be patronized because of making it possible to have such influence and such opportunities in the West. Home pride and home enterprise should have something to do with it.

8. In order to broaden the fields of usefulness of the existing institutions that are doing so much for this section of the country, your patronage and support are necessary. Preachers and Laymen Co-operate The preachers and great numbers of laymen outside of Clarendon and Donley County have been loyal and contributed to its building funds and directed pupils to it.

Efficient Management

The Board of Trustees, which is composed of twenty-five of the leading laymen and preachers of this section of the country have planned wisely. They have co-operated with the faculty and the president of the school is such a way that there has been team work. While a great deal of money has been expended in the property and some debts made, still those who had it in charge were men of business judgement and have been jealous of the financial credit of the institution. So all this work has been done, the school has made its expenses and has as good financial credit as any institution in the twon of Clarendon.

STATEMENT TO THE PUBLIC

Complaints have reached me from time to time of overcrowded trains and unsatisfactory conditions prevailing in some sections of the country in passenger train service. I feel certain that there are grounds for some of these complaints, but I am sure the public will be interested to know that the reasons are twofold :

First, the great number of troops now being handled over the various railroads between the homes and the cantonments, between the different cantonments and then to the seaboard, is making extraordinary demands upon the passenger car and sleeping car equipment of the country. This caused a scarcity of day coaches and sleeping cars which it is impossible to remedy immediately.

Secondly, the increased demands upon track and terminal facilities for the transportation of the tremendous amounts of coal, food supplies, raw materials and other things required for military and naval operations, as well as for the support of the civil population of the country, force the largest possible curtailment of passenger train service. The movements of troops and war materials are, of course of paramount importance and must be given at all times the right of way.

It was hoped that the increase in passenger rates recently made would have the wholesome effect of reducing unnecessary passenger traffic throughout the country. The smaller the number of passengers who travel, the greater the number of loger the amount of track and State to sow that number terminal facilities that will be freed for essential troop and war material movements. Engineers, firemen and other skilled laborers will also be released for service on troop and necessary freight trains.

Among the many patriotic duties of the American public at this time is the duty to refrain from traveling unnecessarily.
