## **GOV. FERGUSON IS IMPEACHED** AND

The last act of the impeachment proceeding against Governor James E. Ferguson of Texas was recorded on Tuesday, when the senate high court of impeachment pronounced judgement, removing Mr. Ferguson from office and disqualifying him from holding hereafter any office of "honor, trust or profit" in Texas, by a vote of 25 to 3.

## KANSAS CITY STOCK MARKET

Kansas City Stock Yards, Sept. 24. -Cattle received today were 39,000 head, which, in conection with combined receipts at the five leading markets amounting to 123,00 head, 20,000 head more than on any day last fall, made a very weak feeling, sales mostly 25 lower. Hogs today 4000, nothing choice, top \$18.95, but choice hogs worth \$19.00. Sheep and lambs today 14,000, market slow and weak, receipts practically all feeders and breeders.

### **Beef** Cattle

Strictly prime cattle are not affected by the outpouring of middle and low grade cattle today, and the quotation of \$17 or a little better still applies to top notch finished steers. Kansas grass beef steers range from \$9.50 to \$13 in most cases, Oklahomas \$7.50 to \$11.50, Texas \$10 to \$11.90, Northwest Nebraska \$10 to \$12, Colorado \$9 to \$11.25, Idaho and Oregon \$9 to \$11.50, odd head recently \$12.50, Utah \$9 to \$10.50. The entire range country is busy shipping, hence the extraordinary large supply offered today. Butcher grades sell at \$6 to \$10, veal calves up to \$13.25.

### Stockers and Feeders

Shipments out last week were 24,000 head, rather light in view of the run of 81,000 cattle, prices firm at the start, but 25 to 40 lower at the finish. stock steers \$6.75 to \$10.50, feeders \$8.75 to \$11.50, choice fleshy feeders up to \$15.
