# ARMISTICE IS SIGNED

HOSTILITIES CEASE AT 5 O'CLOCK THIS MORNING-KAISER IN HOLLAND ARMISTICE TERMS MORE DRASTIC THAN GIVEN TURKEY OR AUSTRIA

JOYOUS TELEGRAM TO NEWS ANNOUNCES ARMISTICE

(Special By The Associated Press) NEWS, Clarendon, Texas:

Fort Worth, Texas, Nov. 11, 1918—Armistice signed at midnight. All fighting stopped at 5 o'clock Fort Worth time. Ex-Kaiser and all his flock of Pet Generals now in Holland.

While the terms will not become public until President Wilson gives them out in an address to the Congress this morning at 11 o'clock the forecast is that the terms are more severe than those given to Turkey or Austria. They include the taking over of the entire German fleet, the disarming of the German army, the occupation of the border fortresses in Germany, the policing of the German empire, the return of all American, French and English prisoners immediately, while the Allies will not release a single German, and many other provisions which will render Germany helpless and altogether unable to again commence the struggle.

THE WAR IS OVER—all but making Germany sign on the dotted line. Demobilization will be effected within

two years after the signing of the treaty

# ARMISTICE INTENSIFIES THE WAR WORK CAMPAIGN

Feeling the immediate immanence of peace the National Headquarters of the United War Work Campaign has issued a most urgent telegram earnestly begging the people of the United States to rally to the call of the campaign which begins today, and provide the comforts and moral safeguards for our boys, made ten times more necessary with the coming of peace and the necessary long months of delay in demobilization. Read the telegram as transmitted here to County Chairman Braswell of the local campaign:

Dallas, Texas, Nov. 9, 1918.

S. M. BRASWELL, Clarendon, Texas:

National Director General Mott wires to relay following: "Our united conclusion that no matter how near or how distant permanent peace may be the long period of demobilization and the period which will precede demobolization will present greater need than ever for the service of the seven co-operating organizations and therefore that the request of over subscription of fifty per cent is most necessary. Our advisers of the American Army and Navy concur in this judgment. I have conferred on the subject with war department and President Wilson and they strongly emphasize the need and importance of this work for the period to follow cessation of hostilities. President Wilson will appear within two days, expressing his satisfaction that our plans have been enlarged to render this great patriotic service.

"The months following the victorious ending of the war will be accompanied with special dangers. We need not be solicitous for our soldiers when they are drilling and fighting and confronting the great adventure of the life and death but rather when this great incitement is withdrawn and discipline relaxed and hours of leisure multiplied and temptations are increased the seven organizations will then be more needed than ever to prevent period of demobilization becoming period of demoraliza-

"It took over two years to complete demobilization at the Franco-Prussian war; eighteen months after Turkish-Russian war; sixteen months after Spanish-American

war; ten months after South African war, and thirteen months after Russo-Japanese war. All with whom we have consulted agree that it will require more than one year to demobolize American forces. For this period of gravest danger our organizations are planning to enlarge greatly our physical and social program by presenting such helpful counter attractions as to keep men from wrong associations and practices. We are also extending great educational program involving using of thousands of teachers and spending millions of dollars on text books and reference books. Remarkable religious program will be conducted including using of religious program will be conducted including using of leading religious preachers and teachers of America to occupy all of the time of our men in these useful

"It will cost much more than to help them during fragments of their time. We therefore call upon the entire American people to subscribe generously in grateful recognition of the marvelous service rendered by our men and with the firm purpose to make the period of demobilization not a period of physical, mental and moral deterioration, or awakening but rather a period of character building of growth in useful knowledge and working efficiency and of preparation for assuming larger responsibilities as citizens on their return home."



### PLENTY TO DO AND EVERYBODY DOING IT



Every man for himself and devil take the lonesomest, is, apparently, the philosophy of Uncle Sam's soldier boys in the great military camps where they are undergoing intensive training for the real thing "over there." Here is a typical scene in an army Y. M. C. A. building an hour or two before the formal entertainment begins. On the stage one of the boys in khaki is leading an informal "sing song." About two score of the fellows are up there with him, and it must be a pretty good song, for it can be seen that about half the crowd in the building is facing the music. But this doesn't disturb the nine or ten checker games, seen in the foreground, in the least, nor does it get the goat of the scores of fellows who are grabbing a few minutes in which to write to the folks at home. The man in the extreme right front of the picture has received a newspaper from "the little old town back there," while the boy seen strading in the very center of the picture plainly admits himself to be either on a "point" or on a "pose"—it's nobody's business which. The Y. M. C. A. huts are the soldiers' clubs, churches, homes and whatever else they want to make them. The principal cantonments of the country contain from ten to twenty large "Y" buildings, to say nothing of the huts overseas and outposts on the Mexican border.

#### THE ARMY MAN'S BANK



A banking hour in a Y. M. C. A. building of a Southern department camp. The army "Y" is the soldier's financial agent; it takes his savings and deposits them for him in a local city bank; it sells him Thrift stamps; it issues him express money orders, and in certain cases keeps money and valuables for him temporarily in the building. One "Y" man in each building is authorized to act as the agent of the express company to issue money orders to the soldiers. The banking service and the Thrift stamp sales encourage the army man to save his money, and this is made more possible by the free comforts, conveniences and entertainments offered by the Y. M. C. A.

G. S.
