



SAW SHIP SHOT NEAR GIBRAL-TAR.

Vernon Record "We are back in the good old U. S A. once more." These are the first words of a letter received by Rev. H. Wilson, have become public. It was discovered today that what M. Long from his son, Lloyd, who sailed from Newport News, July 26. No one who reads his experiences

> back to America. Lloyd sailed as seaman, and when the quartermaster began having trouble with his head after they had been at sea three days, Lloyd was appointed quartermaster. He says that he can now ship as quartermaster on any ship. It ordinarily requires three years for a man to secure his quartermaster papers.

In this letter written from Savonna, Italy, Lloyd told none of his experiences, because the censor was not letting any information get by. That his trip was not devoid of thrills is manifest from the letter written on arrival in America.

Westbound, his vessel put in at Marseilles for a day, on account of a submarine scare, and there he saw his first big dirigible balloon in active war service. A near collision with another big liner is of little interest in comparison with much exciting ex-

"As we came into the bay of Gibraltar about daybreak, we sighted a convoy of four ships," Lloyd says. Without warning there was a boom from a big gun, and immediately one of the ships listed to port. It was a daring exploit. Three miles from erless children, usefully engaged but the guns of the world's greatest fortress, a submarine had made a hit. Immediately every avaible gun in the fort was brought into play.
