Many Thanksgiving seasons have found America in better condition in many respects than this one. But few have been observed that hold greater cause for the giving

of thanks. After all, our esti-Thanksgiving mate of our own condition is based largely upon a comparison Today of the present with what has gone before, or what might have been, or what the future apparently holds. Upon any one of these promises, America has much for which to be thankful.

To be sure, few of us as well off financially as we would like to be; few as prosperous as we were some six years ago. But even from a financial standpoint, conditions are so much better than they have been in many years that there is ample cause to be thankful. Business conditions at present undoubtedly are much better than they have been for several seasons. Financial experts predict that the Christmas season will be the best since 1928; commerce and industry are enjoying a return to prosperity that has caused a pre-depression renewal of bonuses to workers and extra dividends to stockholders.

At no time in the history of the United States has so much progress been made in Social Security work. It is apparent that at least the Government, both State and Federal, is assuming the duty and burden of supervising a planned program for security in old age for workers as well as those who cannot or will not work. Whatever the program is a wise one, the future will tell, but certain it is that there will be no looking back; that the government is pledged to making some sort of provision for the aged. It is a radical departure in the American system of government, but one which should result to the benefit of those least able to look after their own affairs.

Americans should be thankful, too, that the Atlantic ocean separates this country from the turmoil that appears to be bringing Europe into another war, and that sentiment in this country is so strongly against American participation in any European conflict that this country likely will be able to remain outside any major war that might engulf most of the world. If this sentiment can be nurtured and maintained, there is little cause to worry about what the future holds for this country.

America has much for which to be thankful; this should be a happy Thanksgiving Day.

Best example of this is the House of Representatives. It was universally conceded, before November 3, that the Republicans would make gains, irrespective of who won the Presidency. Democratic spokesmen said hopefully that these gains would not amount to more than 20 or 30 seats, while Republicans claimed they would gain well over 100 seats. Non-partisan commentators placed Republican gains at 40 to 50 seats.





In the Senate, it was mathematically impossible for the Republicans to achieve control, but everyone thought they would have a better showing next Congress than last. Result: The GOP lost 6 seats. The Democrats gained 5. The discrepancy of one is explained by the reelection of Senator Norris on an Independent ticket.

Worst of all, a number of the remaining Republican senators belong to the "Progressive Bloc" which is bitterly opposed to Hoover, Landon, Hamilton and other leaders.


The next Congress, then, will answer the roll as follows: Democrats in the House, 334; Republicans, 89; Democrats in the Senate, 75; Republicans, 17.

Also vitally important to any party are Governorships - a great deal of the patronage that keeps political machines well ioled and members contented flows from statehouses. Here again the Republicans made the worst showing in their long history. There were 33 Gubernatorial chairs to be filled - and Democrats won 27 of them. This gives the Democratic party 39 State Chief Executives.

So the party received the largest vote ever accorded a losing ticket, got almost nowhere in attaining representation in high offices. Leaders of the party thus say, with some justice, that our elective system is unfair to minorities. On the other hand, Democratic spokesmen say the Roosevelt victory is important not only because of the majorities attained, but because it extended to every section of the country and broke down long-established lines of partisan sympathy.

To get back to the original question, can the Republicans come back? Their party heads say they will. Among non-partisan commentators opinion is that the party has a good chance to come back - but that considerable reorganization must take place, a new and aggressive program must be adopted, and new faces must replace some familiar ones in party councils. One leading Republican, Representative Fish of New York, has already demanded that present party heads resign.

What will happen remains to be seen. The hard fact is that no major party ever was at so low a state as the GOP is at present - the Democrats in their hungriest days always had a large representation in Congress, governorships, state legislatures, municipal councils, etc. But politics is a surprising game - and the unprecedented can always occur. One guess as to what will happen to the two-party system in the next four years is as good as another.




