It was decided that it was necessary to secure \$3,000 in annual contributions to carry on the work of the club outside of the annual dues of \$1.00 from each member. A committee consisting of J. E. To the successful handling of this men quake about the future of the clothing collection campaign must be nation. Such juvenile anarchy now added the detail, expense and organization of packing, centralizing, delivery to trains and to ships of the clothing collected. The funds and assistants of the American Red Cross will be efficiently used, but much saving can be made by individuals bearing in mind that only useful articles should be sent.

Only durable, warm clothing, soft hats, shoes of any size, under clothing, pieces of cloth, flannel, sheets, blankets, scraps of leather and articles of apparel should be donated that Americans would consider useful to themselves, were they in condition of privation experienced by the people for whom this clothing collection is made.

It exists in America in abundant quantities to comfortably care for these refugees until they can care for themselves, and Americans are asked to only give of their surplus-used, out-of-style, out-grown, need-ing repair clothing, shoes and bedding. Such gifts will be priceless to the people of Europe.

SOLDIERS PERMITTED TO RETAIN THEIR UNIFORM

Camp Travis, Texas, April 7th, 1919. All persons honorably discharged from the service in the army navy or marine corps in the present war are authorized to retain their uniforms. Orders to this effect have been issued at Camp Travis.

According to Act of Congress, approved February 23, 1919, any person who served in the United States Army, Navy of Marine Corps in the present war may, upon honorable discharge and return to civil life, permanently retain one complete suit of outer uniform clothing, including the overcoat, and such articles of personal apparel and equipment a Mr. Robinson and family of Arizona were here Sunday visiting the the Secretary of War or the Secretary tary of Navy, and may wear such uniform clothing after such discharge provided, that the uniform above re ferred to shall include some distinct tive mark or insignia to be prescribed, respectively by the Secretary of War or the Secretary of Navy, such mark or insignia to be issued respectively, by the War Department or Navy Department to all enlisted personnel so discharged. "Navy" includes the officers and enlisted personnel of the Coast Guard who have served with the Navy dur-

ing the present war.

The provisions of the Act apply to all persons who have served in the United States Army, Navy and Marine Corps during the present war, honorably discharged since April 6, the same shall be returned and given to such soldiers, sailors and marines.






