KILLED NORTH OF FT. WORTH

ENGINEER AND FIREMAN ARE

F. A. Faker, locomotive engineer living at 2807 Travis Street, Fort Worth and W. B. Poteet, fireman, living in Wichita Falls, were scalded to death shortly after 10 o'clock Friday morning when the boiler on the engine of the northbound Ft. Worth & Denver passenger train No. 3, exploded a mile north of Avondale. This eighteen miles north of Ft. Worth.

The engine was completely demolished by the explosion, the frame being blown into the ground, tearing away the track for a distance of probably a full city block. The express mail and baggage cars were thrown from the track by the force of the explosion. Pieces of iron and steel from the frame of the engine were scattered for 200 feet on all sides of the train. Telegraph and telephone wires were torn from the poles. Occupants of the three cars knock-

ed from the track were uninjured. Within fifteen minutes after the explosion, farmers from the section surrounding were on the scene of the accident endeavoring to give aid to the passengers. The train was well loaded with passengers, having left Fort Worth at 9:40 Friday morning.

A special train carried physicians, undertakers and officials of the Fort Worth & Denver to the scene of the explosion shortly before noon. In the party were H. A. Gauswitz, general superintendent, and Chief Clerk May. The special train retunred to Fort Worth Friday afternoon after orders had been given for the delayed train to detour to Bowie, Texas, over the Rock Island lines.

The bodies of Faker and Poteet were badly scalded. The force of the explosion knocked both men against the frame of the engine, lacerating their faces and bodies to some extent. bodies were brought to Fort Worth in the ambulance of the Robertson Undertaking Company, which made a run to Avondale soon after news of the explosion had been received here.

Low water is supposed to have caused the boiler to explode. The train, consising of ten coaches, including six passenger coaches, was raveling at about thirty-five miles an nour. The sudden jar by the airbrakes being automatically applied when the boiler blew up, threw many of the passengers out of their seats. None were injured, however. The boiler was blown about forty

feet into the air and about 600 feet from where the explosion occured. The engine was a complete wreck Parts were found within a radius of

600 feet. About 500 feet of track was badly damaged.

The bodies of Faker and Poteet were found forty feet from where the boiler exploded. They were badly

scalded and their heads were crushed They were dead before passengers or any of the members of the train crew could get to them. The train was taken back to Fort

Worth and sent over the Rock Island damaged track.





Many Plans With One Aim.

is the ranking member of the Interstate Commerce Committee of the United Senate, and it is in this committee that the new railroad bill will take final form. In an address before a national meeting of business men at St. Louis Senator Cummins stated that since the close of the war fully thirty complete plans for new railroad egislation had been submitted to him by business men, economists, bankers, railroad officials and owners, Government officials, railroad workers and just plain citizens.

The basic principles upon which all of these plans, with one exception, agree are as follows:

1. Private operation is more efficient and more economical than Government operation, and the public interest will therefore be served by a return of the roads to private management.

2. To make certain that new capital will be attracted to the expansion of railroad facilities, there ought to be greater certainty that a fair return will be earned on the investment.

3. The merging of weak and strong roads into large competing systems should be encouraged.

The making of a formula to provide a fair return on railroad capital seems likely to be the phase of the problem most thoroughly debated in Congress. The Director General has been urging that the Government ought to guarantee a certain return and share in any excess earnings. Leading bankers, especially some of the international bankers in Wall street, who have in the past marketed many hundreds of millions of railroad securities, also look favorably on the suggestion of a Government guarantee, which will make it easier to sell 25 pd. new securities, and will also stabilize the market for the old bonds and


